Pacifist Burns Body In Viet War Protest

NEW YORK (AP)-A young Roman Catholic pacifist, almost every inch of his body burned, lingered on the brink of death after turning himself into a human torch Tuesday outside the United Nations to protest the Viet Nam war.

Later, he apparently repented the ghastly deed.

"I'm anti-war, all wars, I did this as a religious action," said Roger LaPorte, 22, the second American in a week to set fire to himself in such a protest.

Taken to Bellevue Hospital with 95 per cent of his body seared, LaPorte showed signs of kidney damage and his breathing was labored. Nevertheless, he was conscious and able to talk.

"I know of no one who had 95 per cent total body burns surviving," declared Dr. Jay Grosfeld, a member of a medical team working over LaPorte.

The last rites of the Roman Catholic Church were administered to LaPorte, after he expressed repentance over his violation of its strict religious crede against suicide.

The Rev. Alexander Busuttil, Catholic chaplain at Bellevue, said: "It was the most devout act of contrition I've heard. He was clear and expressive when I spoke with him."

burned from his body, his meager possessions strewn about him on the pavement at 42nd St. and 1st Ave., was taken to the hospital by police, he murmured: 'Give me some water. Give me some water."

Unlike Morrison, who committed suicide in full view of homegoing Washington workers Nov. 2, LaPorte set fire to himself an hour before sunrise, with Manhattan still asleep and only one U.N. guard on hand. The victim's wrist watch was stopped at 5:20 a.m.

The guard, Henry Okai, 35, did not see LaPorte douse himself from a can of gasoline nor set fire to himself.

"I saw this person rolling and screaming in the street, all on fire," Okai said.

Guard Called For Help

Okai called for help from his guard booth, and later was treated for smoke inhalation and nausea after he tried to extinguish the flames with a fire extinguisher.

One of the guards who joined Okai was Sgt. Benjamin King, who said: "LaPorte was squirming and groaning when we got there. His hair was all burned off. He was a human torch, let's

Of a deep religious bent, La-Porte was a volunteer in the Catholic Worker movement, a pacifist group that has no official connection with the Catholic Church, However, its members consider themselves as pursuing Catholic principles in their work for social causes and in behalf of the poor.

LaPorte apparently had not confided to anyone his plans.

OR Men's No. 9 Backs Policy

Men's 9 will send 5,000 Christmas cards to American forces in Viet Nam.

The cards will read, "Because of You . . . America Breathes a Little Easier; America Sleeps a Little Sounder; and Americans Walk a Little Taller . . . Merry Christmas and Thanks."

The cards are being sent to convey thanks to the Asian-based forces and to counteract anti-U.S. policy demonstrations on other college campuses.

In a statement Tuesday afternoon, Dr. R. C. Goodwin, president of Tech, said the residents of Men's 9 are to be congratulated on their patriotism by letting our military forces in Viet Nam know "that the students of Texas Tech stand firmly behind them and appreciate the sacrifices they are making in behalf of the free peoples of the world."

Dr. Goodwin also lauded the men "upon their desire to offset the actions of those who do not exhibit a similar devotion to their government."

The cards will be presented to a representative of the Red Cross in a ceremony next Wednesday in the cafeteria of Men's 9.

Officials representing Reese Air Force Base, the Army and Marines will attend.

Tech officials are also expected to be on hand.

In conjunction with the Christmas card presentation, the dorm will sponsor a petition to be signed by Tech students supporting the United States' policy in Viet Nam.

The petition will be placed in the Tech Union later this week and will be sent to President Johnson next



Famed Bowler Tied To Gambling Offense

The jury named Clem E. Sheldon of Arcadia, Calif., his brother Melvin of Port Washington, N.Y., and John A. Belcher, also of Arcadia, in its true bill, with Edward P. Ned Day named as co-conspira-

55-year-old Day is former world match bowling champion and has held many other records and titles.

The indictment said that the basement of Day's bowling and billiard supply firm in downtown Milwaukee was the local headquarters for the gambling operation called Nationwide Service.

The defendants, the indictment said, used coded messages to provide betters with tips on horse races at tracks throughout the country. The service operated at least until June 15, the government contended.


