Official Enrollment Tops 1964 Records


The official enrollment after the 12th day of classes is 16,306. This is an increase of 2,479 over last



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
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A Space Well-Used.

PREAMBLE

We, the members of the Student Asso-We, the members of the Student Asso-ciation of Texas Technological College, in recognition of the responsibility shared by the Administration, the Faculty, and the Student Body in student life and in order to be active participants in the life and activities of the College, do hereby consti-tute the Texas Technological College Stu-dent Government, and do ordain and estab-lish this constitution.

ARTICLE I

THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION SECTION I. Name: The name of this organization shall be The Student Association of Texas Technological College.

SECTION 2. Membership: The Student Association shall consist of all students who are duly registered in Texas Technological College.

SECTION 3. Distribution of Powers: The SECTION 3. Distribution of Powers: The Powers of the Texas Tech Student Association are divided into three distinct departments: The Legislative, Judicial, and Executive. No person or collection of persons being in one of these departments shall exercise any power properly belonging to either of the others, except as hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

ARTICLE II LEGISLATIVE

SECTION 1. Student Senate: All Legislative power shall be vested in the Student Senate. It shall be the purpose of the Student Senate to promote, regulate, and coordinate student activities and to provide for the student welfare. It may make such rules and regulations as may seem necessary for the accomplishment of these purposes.

SECTION 2. Composition: The Student

- nate shall be composed of:
 Representatives elected from each academic school, by the student enrolled in that school, and in proportion to the number of students in each school. The proportion of representation shall be determined annually by the Student Senate, at least one month before elections are to be held.
- ate, at least one months are to be held.
 The Vice President of the Student Association shall be chairman of the Senate, but shall vote only in ease of a tie.

 SECTION 3. Qualifications:

 Each member of the Student Senate must be enrolled for at least 12 semester hours of residence credit courses and must have a grade point average of at least 2.00 for both the whole of his college work, and for the semester preceding his election. A Senator must be registered in the School from which he is elected. A 2.00 grade point must be maintained during a Senator's term.

 Each Senator must have completed 12 semester hours before election time.

 SECTION 4. Elections:

- Special committees may be established by the Senate as from time to time may be necessary.

 Members of the Student Senate may be removed by a 2.75 vote of the Senate. Malfersance, neglect of duty, or improper conduct shall constitute cause for removal. Persons whose removal is being considered shall be entitled to an open hearing before the Senate.

 Any committee member may be removed by a 2.73 vote of the Senate. Reasons for dismissal include malfeasance, neglect of duty, or improper conduct.

 SECTION 9. Installation: All executive

SECTION 9. Installation: All executive offisers, other than the President, and all representatives shall take the following oath to be administered by the incoming President: "I do hereby solennly swear that I will faithfully execute the duties of

ARTICLE III EXECUTIVE

ARTICLE III EXECUTIVE
SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in a Student Body President who shall hold office for a term of one year. In the event of the inability of the President to fulfill the duties of his office, he shall be succeeded by the Vice President. The President, at the time of his election, shall be classified as a senior by the end of the semester in which the presidential election is held. No person who has previously held the office of President may again become a candidate for this office.

SECTION 2. Election: The Student Association President, along with the Vice President, Secretary of the Senate, and Business Manager, shall be elected by an all-campus election.

- President: The President shall be classi-fled as a senior by the end of the se-mester in which the election is held.
- Vice President: The Vice President shall be classified as a senior by the end of the semester in which the election in held.
- Secretary of the Senate: Secretary of the Senate shall be classified as a sen-ior by the end of the semester in which the election is held, and shall be a
- Business Manager: The Business Manager shall be classified as ajunior by the end of the semester in which the election is held.
- The Officers shall also be required the qualifications of the members of the Student Senate.

SECTION 4. Duties of the Student dy President shall include:

- Presentation of a legislative program to the Senate at the first Senate meet-ing following his election, and at the beginning of each semester.
- The appointment, with the advice and consent of the Senate, of all officers whose appointment shall not be otherwise provided for.
- Presentation of periodic messages upon the state of the Student Body Govern-ment to the Senate.

SECTION 5. Committees: The President shall set up those committees which he deems necessary to carry out the duties of his office, and the Student Association. Appointments shall be made with the advice and consent of the Senate.

SECTION 6. The President shall be em-

- Enter into agreements with agencies and organizations outside the University Community by and with the consent of the Senate, and the proper University Authorities.

Each Senator must have completed 12 semester hours before election time.

SECTION 4. Elections:

The Student Senate shall provide for the holding of elections and shall enact an election code thereof.

Senators shall be elected by majority vote of students voting for each of the positions in question. Elections shall have been completed by the first day of May in each year.

Vacancies shall be filled in elections provided for the Student Senate.

SECTION 5. Meetings:

The newly elected Senate shall have its first meeting no later than four weeks after its election.

SECTION 1. The Judicial Power of the Student Association shall be vested in a Supreme Court, and other such courts as may be set up by the Student Senate as from time to time may be deemed necessary. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction over any inferior courts created by the Senate.

SECTION 2. Composition of the Supreme Court: The Supreme Court shall be composed of a Chief Justice, and one Associate Justice from each of the academic schools. They shall be appointed by the President of the Student Association, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

and consent of the Senate.

SECTION 3. Each member of the Supreme Court must be enrolled for at least 12 semester hours of residence credit courses and must have a grade point average of at least 2.00 for both the whole of his college work, and for the preceding semester. Each shall be officially classified as at least a senior by the end of the semester in which he is appointed.

SECTION 4. Term: Members of the Su-preme Court shall be appointed and con-firmed before the conclusion of the spring semester in each year, and shall serve until their successors shall have ben appointed and confirmed.

SECTION 5. Duties of the Supreme ourt: The Supreme Court shall:

- Upon written request signed by the President of the Student Association, advise the Senate as to the constitutionalty of any existing or proposed legislation, or render an advisory opinion to the Senate on interpretation of this Constitution
- to the Senate on interpretation of the Constitution.

 Upon receipt of a petition signed by 5% of the members of the Student Association, review a designated act of the Student Senate, or any action or policy of the Executive Department, to determine its conformance to this constitution.
- consider appeals from decisions of the Election Committee. Settle any disputes as may arise under this Constitution.

SECTION 6. Procedure:

- The Supreme Court shall promulgate such rules of procedure and appoint such officers as it shall deem necessary for the conduct of its business, provided that the Student Senate, by majority vote, shall concur in such rules of procedure and in such appointments.

 Any member of the Student Associa-
- Any member of the Student Association who may be party to any action, before the court shall have prior notice of charges involved in the action; shall have ample time to prepare his case; shall be entitled to the assistance of counsel; shall be confronted by and have the right to compel witnesses to appear in his behalf.
- All decisions and opinions of the Court shall be in writing, signed by members participating and put on file by the Chief Justice in the Office of the President of the College, and of the Student Association.

ARTICLE V. AMENDMENT

SECTION 1. Proposal: Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed either by a 2/3 vote of the Student Senate, a petition signed by 10% of the Student Association, or by the President of the Student Association. Proposed amendments shall be published in their entirety at least twice in the student newspaper before their submission to the Student Association.

The Cattlemen's Roundup begain 1960 when a Coke County ranch er offered the center 20 cattle a a donation to its work of rehabili tating crippled children and adults


One of the first contributors wa the LBJ Ranch, owned by Presi dent Lyndon B. Johnson, who wa at that time a U.S. senator.
