$\mathbf{A}_{\text {to }}^{\text {LL THE VOICES IN the South may shout opposition }}$ to the President's voting rights proposals, but they cannot defend states' rights while denying the rights of individuals.

For too long have we trampled upon the rights of the Negro. For too long have we said he has complete equality under the law, yet denied it to him. For too long have men of good will remained silent while the Negro carries his Too many Southerners must wear the letter of Guilt
because we have done the very same thing in this country as many Germans did in Nazi Germany

We either sit and watch while innocent people are brutally beaten and denied their rights, or we turn our head and pretend not to see what is happening.

Look at ourselves here at Texas Tech. There were no audible voices of protest against the tyranny in places like Selma, Ala. We are caught up in our own little world, securely isolated from human suffering.

And now the nation must do what we in the Southern states would not. The price will surely be great to the states, but individuals are of greater worth than the states. No new law would ever have to be made if all men would recognize the rights of others.

It would be best, of course, if the South would voluntarily take the action that the President proposes. But there is no evidence the South intends to do so. The Southern electorate continues to allow tyrants like George Wallace to rule. And we are Southerners and we are responsible.

The only hope left for the South is with the new generation of students. If we are not already too late, we must join with the Negro. Together, We Shall O Bronson Havard

On today's editorial page, we have published the pro posed new constitution for the second time in compliance with provisions of the current constitution. Read over the proposal.

As has been pointed out before, the new constitution is very unlike the current one. First of all, three distinct
branches of student government are outlined: Executive branches of student gov
Legislative and Judicial.

The executive branch will consist of the elected president of the student association in addition to a number of appointed cabinet and department officials. The president has no direct relation to the proposed Student Senate other than he may recommend legislation and veto any bills passed.

The legislative branch will consist of the senate with the student association vice president as its chairman. The senate will concern itself with legislation rather than the daily affairs of student government. Presidential veto may be overridden by a two-thirds vote in the senate.

The judicial branch proposals pave the way for an extensive student judiciary system here. The Student Supreme Court will become the final authority on senate legislation and lower court appeals.

If passed the new constitution will form a better student government by making it more efficient. It is in the
