
For Sunday, Miss Rank chose another three-piece outfit, of olive green. A blazer covered the beige blouse and straight skirt.

1. Poll Campaign A. There shall be no campaigning or electioneering within 15 feet of the voting polls.

B. Restricted media 1. Sound trucks, microphones, amplifiers, dorm P.A. systems, or sound systems may NOT be used by candidates. 2. Painting of any kind may not be placed in or on cam-

pus buildings or on any part of the campus grounds. Handbills, leaflets, etc., may may not be placed in dormitory mail boxes or on cars.

2. Campaign Stunts A. No stunts in academic buildings or dormitory cafeterias. B. Stunts cannot be annoying, ob-

noxious, or destructive. C. Students including bands, yells, etc., may be used only between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. during the 10 minutes between casses.

D. Signs may be won by campaign-E. Candidates may not use vehicles moving or stationary for any pur-

pose other than to transport voters to the polls. F. Building regulations state that no confetti, paper, or other such media may be thrown within the

auditorium. 3. Violations A. Each candidate will be held personally responsible for every phase

of his or her campaign, B. Violations of these regulations are to be reported within 24 hours following the violation in the form of a signed statement, to the Election Chairman. These may be left in the Student Coun-

C. The accused candidate shall have cil Office. the privilege of a hearing before a quoruf of the Election Commit-

D. The Elections Committee has the power of disqualification for in-





Because of a new rule of eliminating any group which has won the race three consecutive years, the Dolphin swimming fraternity and the men and women's divi-



No, this has been an unusual year and no cases have been brought before the Supreme Court.



Northwestern and Loyola will be cohosts to the finals of the National Collegiate Athletic Association on March 18-19. The regional meets will be held March 11-12.

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
