THE STUDENT MUST indicate his preference at registration for either a letter prade or a pass-or-fail mark. He cannot change during the semester from a letter grade to pass-fail, but he can
change from pass-fail to a letter grade, provided he submits a letter to his instructor 30 days before the final examination is scheduled.

and decides which would be the best for the patient.
After a contraceptive is prescribed, the woman comes to the clinic periodically

tressed that there is no method of contraceptive that is perfect for every woman all the time. This doesn't mean that the available methods don't workthey do. But a method which works
perfectly for one woman may not be perfectly for one w
suitable for another.
There are more than 50 different birth control products on the market today The popular methods of birth control are explained in the following: -PILL: The pill is a systemic method of birth control, taken orally. There are a
number of "pills" on the market; all work in about the same way. It is taken like aspirin. The tablet dissolves and enters the blood stream. It stops the monthly egg from dropping as it normally would thereby preventing
-DIAPHRAGM: This method is fitted Always sued witha jelly, creas arcin fltis whacs provides a chemicel baatrier that acts to kill the male sperm.

-CONDOM: This method is also called a sheath or rubber. It has probably been more widely used than any other method.
Although the condom is one of the safest birth control devices, its specific purpose is to prevent venereal diseasas. -RHYTHM: This method is simply the couple avoids intercourse during the likely time of ovulation. This period, during which pregnancy is most apt to ovulation and ends several before thereafter. Most doctors agree that the thereafter. Most doctors agree that the
