

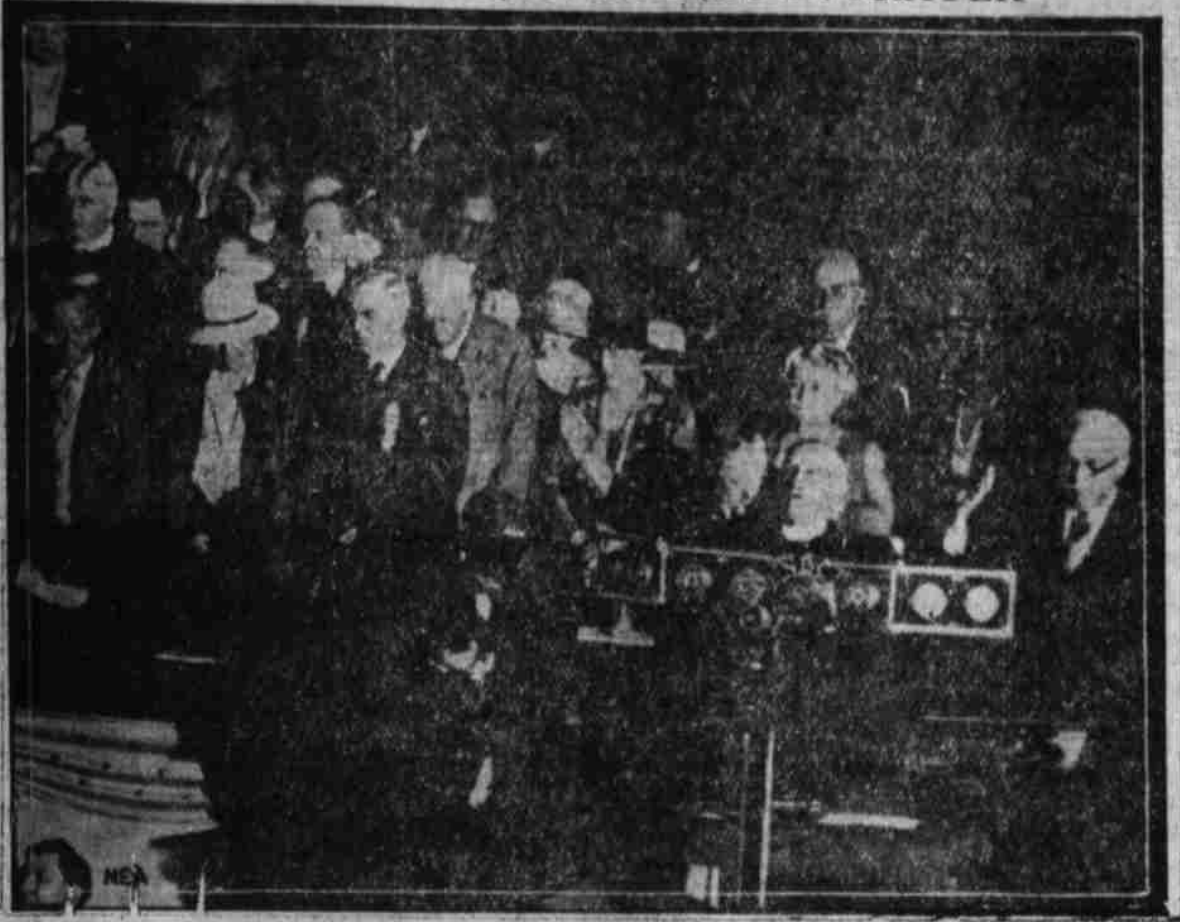

Republicans Fight Over Farm Plank Question May Close Tomorrow

Hoover Coolidge Forces Withstand All Attacks of Farm Forces; May Adjourn Tomorrow

Kansas City June 14 (AP)—Advancing with swinging stride toward the nomination of a ticket and final adjournment by noon tomorrow, the Hoover majority in the Republican National Convention today rallied in overwhelming numbers to repel the final spectacular attack by the western insurgents and members of the McNary Haugen block on an administration platform omitting the mention of the equalization fee.

In the floor fight the real proportions of dissenters made repeated sallies at the steadfast ranks of the Coolidge Hoover forces with the Farm Relief plank as their central objective.

Senator Lafollette of Wisconsin took the lead in the assault on the tentative platform draft submitted by Smoot of Utah, chairman of the platform committee, offering a complete platform of his own. The Wisconsin Senator was smothered under a chorus of "no" when the votes were taken.

Ballooning on the presidential candidate is not expected until late today.

The Platform Submitted Here are the high spots in the platform as presented to the Republican National Convention today by its resolution committee:

AGRICULTURE—Reorganization of the marketing system on a sounder and more economical line. Creation of a farm board with power to set up a farmer owned and controlled corporations to prevent control of surpluses through an orderly distribution.

PROHIBITION—The observance of a vigorous enforcement of the eighteenth amendment. Honesty in Government appointment of officials whose integrity cannot be questioned.

CAMPAIGN EXPENDITURES—Economy, honesty and decency in the conduct of political campaigns with the contributions for the common good or not at all.

PUBLIC ECONOMY—Pledge to live up to the high standard set by President Coolidge.

TAX REDUCTION—A further reduction of the tax burden as the condition of the treasury from time to time may allow.

Robbers Make A Big Haul

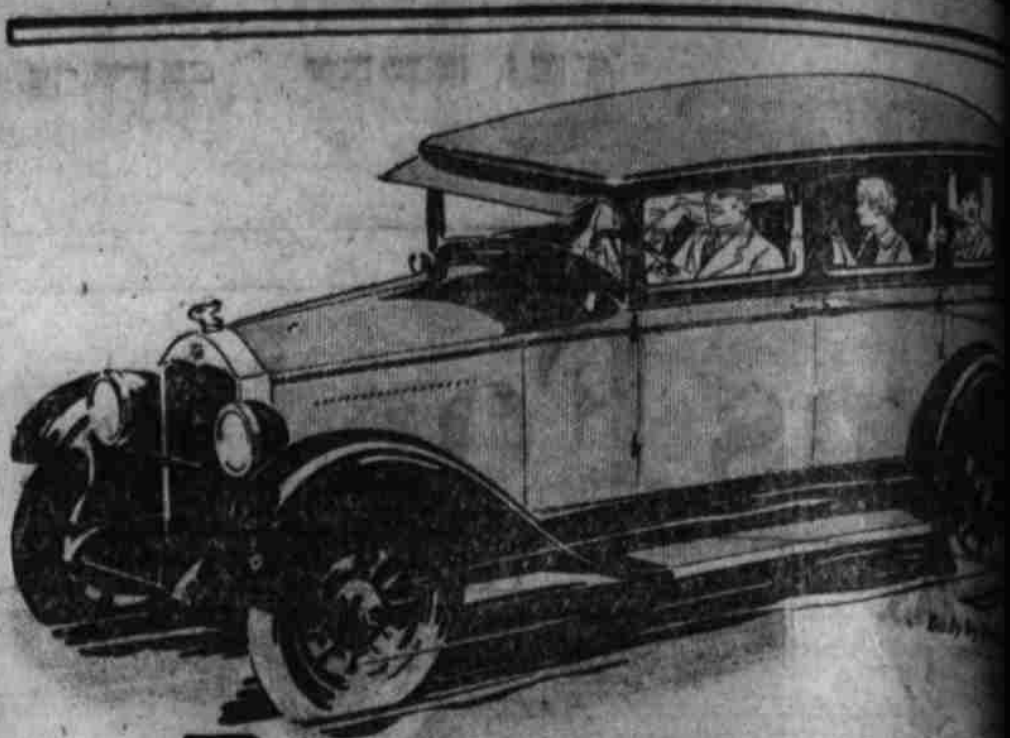

EL PASO FIRM BUYS COMPRESS

Plan \$50,000 Improvement Program to be Started Immediately. Federal Bonded Warehouse
 The El Paso Compress and Fumigation Company of El Paso on June 4th closed a deal for the purchase of the Big Spring Compress and Warehouse Co. from R. F. Shoemaker. It was announced Friday. Many improvements are to be made immediately, according to H. E. Reiss, who is to be permanently located here as superintendent for the El Paso owners.
 Mr. Reiss states the improvements to be made will approximate \$50,000. Within two weeks the work of installing a fumigation plant as required by the state and federal regulations under the pink boll worm quarantine measures.
 The warehouse facilities are to be greatly enlarged and improved. The warehouse department will be operated under the Federal bonded warehouse act and the warehouse will be completely enclosed.
 While the local compress and warehouse has been handling an average of 30,000 bales of cotton annually, it is believed it will handle around 60,000 bales of cotton the present year. One reason for this increase will be the moving of a compress and fumigation plant owned by the El Paso company from Pecos to Roswell, N. M.
 Mr. Reiss states that no expense is going to be spared in making the plant at Big Spring one of the very best in West Texas and they are going to give the cottonraisers of this section of our state the greatest measure of cooperation.

Cosden Yet to Map Howard Program

Cosden & Company have as yet formulated no plans which would look toward the opening up of deep production in the Howard County pool.
 Statement to this effect was made by J. S. Cosden Saturday following reported purchase of 160 acres from Owen & Sloan with production from the Roberts deep pay and two other levels, for a reported \$1,200,000.
 The situation has not developed far enough for formulation of a policy, Cosden said. Following report of the purchase, report indicated that Cosden might produce the deep well on the lease. All deep wells in the pool are now shut in.
 The purchase brings Cosden's stake in the pool to more than \$2,000,000. The company owns several hundred acres of proven, semi-proven and semi-wildcat acreage, assembled in the past few months.
 Several tests are drilling for the deep pay on one of the largest pieces—in the section adjoining on the north the one in which he has just purchased the Owen & Sloan quarter.
 In the same section as the latter Moody Oil Company last week purchased a producing property from Dora Roberts and the F-H-E Oil Company. — Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

 Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Hill at whose place the beer was found were arrested and upon entering a plea of guilty were fined \$123.85.
 The officers raided two places in the north part of the city Sunday and captured more beer. A. Mr. Leonard was fined \$33.85 in connection with a raid on his place and H. D. Mirkliff was placed under \$300 bond on a similar charge.

FARMERS GIN IS SETTLED

Elect Seven Directors and Authorize Them to Select Site To be Capitalized for \$30,000

At a meeting of citizens of Howard county interested in organizing a cooperative cotton gin held at the district court in Big Spring at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon and completed arrangements to proceed with the establishment of a modern cotton gin.
 After the object of the meeting had been explained by Ray Wilcox a motion prevailed that a chairman and secretary be elected. Ray Wilcox was placed in nomination for chairman and was elected by acclamation. P. F. Cantrell was nominated at secretary and was elected by acclamation.
 It was moved that a board of directors of seven be elected from the stockholders and these directors be empowered to elect officers select a site, order the necessary machinery and proceed with the work of getting the gin in operation for ginning cotton this fall.
 The following directors were elected to serve for a period of one year: Ray Wilcox, I. B. Cauble, R. D. Matthews, P. F. Cantrell, O. C. Bays, G. Wiley Davis and Chas. Robinson.
 Several members present doubted their stock in the gin but I. B. Cauble, Ray Wilcox and others agreed to double theirs but as they had already subscribed for five shares they could not be allowed to do so.
 I. B. Cauble asked to make a few remarks in which he stated that this was one time they were going to show the doubting Thomases the farmers could cooperate. He pointed out they used the same post office, they used the local banks, which are cooperative institutions; and they could use the same cotton gin and make all the profit out of the product they produced. He urged every cotton raiser who was able to buy a share of stock in this cooperative gin to do so and then jump in and help make this cooperative enterprise a success. The money powers can make

cotton gins a profitable investment and so can the farmers if they will just join in on the proposition and stick with it.
 About \$24,000 worth of stock has been sold in this gin and it is believed the balance of the \$30,000 capital will be raised during the coming week.

Coahoma School To Be Enlarged

The contract for an addition to the school building at Coahoma was awarded Friday, June 8. H. H. Shell and Sons of Lubbock were awarded the contract for the addition. Their bid of \$27,000 was the lowest submitted.

This addition was made necessary by the large number of scholars in the Coahoma Independent School district. The growth of Coahoma due to oil development continues at a steady pace.

The Nine Room Apartment Mr. and Mrs. Compton Burned

An inquest to get at the facts in the case will be held at 10 o'clock in the morning.

The apartment was a two story frame structure and the upper story seemed to be ablaze from end to end when the fire alarm was turned in. The flames spread so rapidly that only a few personal belongings were saved by the occupants when they had to make a hurried run for safety.

terest.

Flowing an estimated 500 barrels
per day, with the bit but eight feet
in the pay at 1755 feet, this well is
believed to be on a high structure.
This is a sweet oil, and rated 34

tion today.

The Green interests are plan-
ning to drill another well right

He is indeed proud of the way
his well is performing; but it
couldn't be anything but a good
one as indicated by the log. More
than four pays are already prov-

gas sand at 1600 feet; a commer-

Ft. Worth Trip Is Discussion Of Lunch Club

Big Spring Has Told World It Is Coming to Fort Worth; It Must Make Good

There was a fine attendance at the meeting of the Wednesday Luncheon club this week and after the election of officers the session was turned into an "On to Fort Worth" pep meeting.

Willard Sullivan was nominated to be president of the Luncheon Club and Joe Worthy secretary and on motion both were elected by acclamation.

Judge Garland Woodward told of the status of the Fort Worth trip and said while everything was lovely financially, the movement seemed to be a flop enthusiastically. He said he had been getting wonderful publicity on account of the large delegation we were promising to send to Ft. Worth and it was going to be embarrassing if we sent a less number than the 500 delegates. So far he said only 32 automobile owners had signed up for the trip whereas we should have 150 cars. He said it was not going to be convenient for many of us to go some must make sacrifices in order to go. He said we owed some service to our community and a big delegation would do Big Spring a great amount of good.

He said no other coming city held such an outstanding place in the limelight just now and the citizens from all over Texas are expecting Big Spring to do her stuff at the convention. He urged everyone who could furnish a car to go so that all this publicity about Big Spring coming 500 strong would be substantiated. He said he couldn't afford to send just a few after all the publicity spread over Texas that our city would be there with bells on. Others who spoke along the same line and emphasized the statement that we have talked too much to lay down were Robbins, Bob Cook, Joe Fisher, Fox Stripling, Tom Cook, T. W. Ashley, C. T. Watson and others.

T. W. Ashley stated he had canvassed the business section thoroughly to secure the 32 automobiles but was willing to keep trying if a few more would volunteer to assist him. The following stated they would spend the afternoon on this work: Rube Martin, Fox Stripling, Ralph Rix, Jim Little, Judge Woodward, and others.

C. T. Watson made the point that if we were all too busy to go it might be well to put on a campaign to secure more grocery stores, more drug stores more dry goods stores and other establishments so we could have a little time to devote to community enterprises such as the motor caravan to Fort Worth. He said Big Spring could not afford to fall down on the proposition. He announced that there would be a mass meeting at the courthouse Thursday night at 8 o'clock at which time the full plans for the Fort Worth trip will be announced and more people invited to make the trip to Fort Worth. A big rehearsal parade will be staged on Main Street at 6:45 p. m. Friday night under the direction of Fred Dimstead.

It was announced that the uniforms, hats, banners and advertising matter was here so everything is O. K. and only the attendance is the source of any worry.

Judge Fritz Smith made a brief talk in which he commented on the wonderful progress Big Spring is making, saying he could note a big improvement every few months and he predicted that Big Spring would have more than 500 delegates at Fort Worth. He said Big Spring had always done things in a big way and that on June 18, more than 150 automobiles will leave here for Fort Worth. He said when they attend the meeting Thursday night, hear the band and see the parade Friday, the folks just can't resist the appeal and you will have many volunteering to make the trip.

L. A. Eubank called attention to the fact that Big Spring had a creditable daily newspaper and pointed out that it deserved the loyal support of the community. He pointed out that to successfully operate a daily newspaper it was necessary to have this support. In order to operate it is essential to have at least 65 per cent of the space it will be a paying investment. He stated he noted Tuesday's daily Herald had 32 columns of space with only 13 columns of advertising indicating that the paper was not getting sufficient advertising to justify its publication unless the owner was a philanthropist. He said the paper was a credit to our city, and since we had been urging the establishment of a daily paper in Big Spring that we give the editor advertising enough to justify him to continue the daily.

A motion prevailed that meeting of the Luncheon club next Wednesday be held since every loyal member should be attending the convention at Fort Worth on that day.

Farmers Request a County Agent

The farmers of Howard county are requesting the Commissioners' Court to employ a county agent and a home demonstration agent for Howard county and are asking the business men to join with them in making such request.

The business men should prepare a petition at once and be prepared to submit it to the court on June 15th, the date five petitions signed by farmers and their wives are to be presented.

It goes without saying that a county agent and a home demonstration agent can be worth much to our citizens and to our county.

If through their aid, boys and girls club work is promoted; baby beef, poultry, home canning and other clubs are encouraged, they will more than earn their salaries. They can aid in promoting terracing, poultry raising and dairying, marketing and in many other ways. The farming industry is one of our county's greatest assets and it stands to reason that an able and conscientious county agent or home demonstration agent can be a big help to every citizen who will seek and follow their advice.

Sante Fe Was After Orient

The report that the Santa Fe had bought the Orient seems to have had only the fault of prematureity. Officers of the Santa Fe have kept silent. But Mr. Kemper of the Orient is authority for the information that what the Santa Fe has bought is the stockholding of the English group. This, though, is only 40 per cent of the total, so that the report that the Santa Fe has bought up the Orient ran ahead of the fact. Yet the fact is apt to catch up, for Mr. Kemper says the Santa Fe is now negotiating for the stock held by him and his associates. It is not likely the negotiation will be barren.

In the days when it was a popular pastime to wish the Orient on some system which could at once use it and afford to own it the Santa Fe was now and then nominated. But at least three others were put under larger call. The Southern Pacific, the Missouri Pacific and even the Frisco, were much more numerously tagged than the Santa Fe.

The Santa Fe has been engaged for a year or more in a struggle with the Burlington in West Texas for primacy in that empire, and on the whole a losing struggle. It should seem, its efforts to extend its lines have not fared well, whereas those of the Burlington have. Its position in that section would be greatly improved if it could add the Orient's mileage to its own. The Orient goes into Kansas City over the tracks of the Santa Fe, and its Southern reaches do not intrude troublesomely nor competitively into Santa Fe territory. The Orient is destined to become a great railroad in any case. But it would become a great railroad in any case. But it would become such much more speedily as a Santa Fe property.—Dallas News.

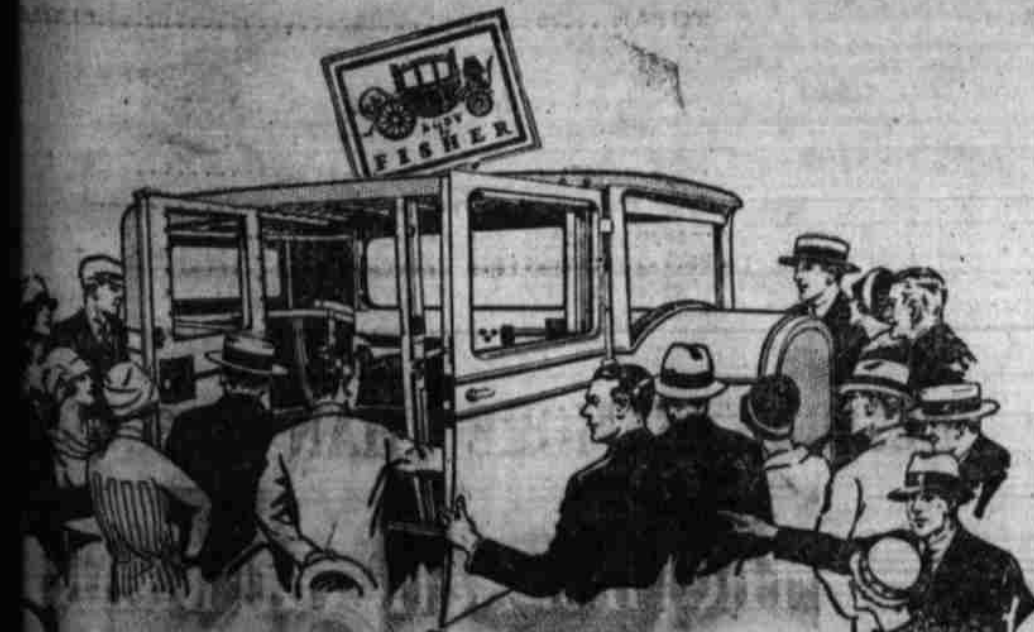

Big Spring Is Assured Water Now

City's Test Well Now on Test is Producing 250 Gallons Per Minute

Dr Hawley Drills Well

No Longer Any Doubt of Water to Supply Needs of Growing City

The long sought sinecure which was to indicate whether or not the future water supply of Big Spring was assured, has been located by the sixth test well drilled under the supervision of Dr. Jno. B. Hawley one of the most capable and best known hydraulic engineers of the United States.

This test is known as well No. X and is located two miles south of the city water works plant. The well was completed to a depth of 286 feet last week and that it was the best well ever drilled was apparent from the very start. The air lift pumping equipment was installed over the well and a record is being kept on same. The pump was started Saturday and is producing at the rate of 250 gallons per minute.

Dr. Hawley when informed of the city's good fortune, stated the tests being made are turning out just as expected and he expects to make a full report on the water resources of Big Spring at an early date.

The securing of a well capable of producing 250 gallons per minute is about the biggest piece of news Big Spring folks have had in a blue moon. Watch Big Spring!

Convention Is At Standstill Daily Reports

Anti-Hoover Delegates From Texas Are Refused Seats in the Convention

Convention Hall, Kansas City, June 13, (AP)—Postponing its decision on the ever fermenting farm question, the republican National Convention spent another session today in perfecting its organization and listening to the exhortations of some of its best spellbinders and twirling its thumbs while it waited in vain for the platform committee to conclude the twenty-four hour dispute and bring in the party platform.

Both within and without the convention hall a voiced protest against President Coolidge's veto of the McNary Haugen-bill sought to make itself heard by the party leaders. While a delegation of farm demonstrators were being denied admittance by the police, a North Dakota delegate sought permission for Senator Mackmaster of South Dakota, to address the convention, got the temporary chairman, Senator Fess, ruled him out of order.

The platform committee in the meantime, was in such a tangle over the farm relief plank that it sent word that it probably would not be ready to report until tomorrow.

Twenty two district delegates from Texas hostile to Hoover failed to gain permanent seats in the Republican Convention today after a fight had been made from the floor to place them on the roll in place of the Hoover pledged delegates.

TEXANS TO BENEFIT BY EX-SERVICE MEN'S ACT

Approximately 185,000 Texans, veterans of the World War, are eligible to the benefits provided by the amendment to the Veterans' Act, recently passed by Congress and signed by President Coolidge, according to officials of the Veterans' Bureau here.

The recent amendment liberalize the Veterans' Act in many ways. They provide opportunity for adjusted compensation in the form of paid-up life insurance, with loan privileges, to those who did not apply for it when it first was introduced. Those who did not then apply have until Jan. 2, 1930, to apply under the amendments. The former time expired July 2, 1927.

Laundry Changes Site; New Bldg.

The Big Spring Laundry plans the erection of a modern laundry building about 40x50 feet at the corner of Main and Ninth just across from the Southern Ice and Utilities Company's retail station. Plans for the new building are now being prepared. They will continue to operate their main plant as at present.
