> Reynolds, subject of today's lecture, was one of the most famous English portrait painters and one of the most expensive. He turned out a large number of portraits of influential 18th century personalities. Samuel Johnson, Oliver Goldsmith, David Garric, and Lawrence Sterne can be numbered among his well-known subjects.

Sir Joshua gained much prestige when King George III appointed him "Painter to the King" in 1784. His painting was primarily influenced by Sir Anthony Vandyke and the Venetian painters. Though he equaled neither in drawing or composition, the royal appointment evidenced the popularity of his overall effect.

His most famous works include "The Age of Innocence", "Mrs. Siddons as the Tragic Muse", "The Infant Hercules", "The Strawberry Girl", and "Garrick Between Comedy and Tragedy'

All lectures include slides of the artists' work from Rabbi Kline's personal collection of over 80,000 prints.





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

However, this last weekend things got out of hand all the way around:

- The few students protesting and demonstrating may have had good intentions (to them anyway), but their actions did not justify their goal.
- The persons who attacked the marchers were also wrong in their actions, although they probably thought they were doing the right thing.

In short, we believe the entire fiasco should never have happened, especially in America.

The ludicrous marches by the college "students" bordered on the absurd. Besides accomplishing nothing, the demonstrators encountered resentment and closed minds, which resulted in far too much physical injury.

It was ridiculous to beseige local Selective Service centers. If they truly want a change in the draft system, the only way to accomplish it is through national legislation.

And the only way to bring about national legislation is by responsible actions, not by laying down in public streets and in front of Army depots. Such actions as were used this weekend were childish, and they were looked on as childish and very irresponsible.



Senate Objects **To Anti-Draft** Demonstrators

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senators exploded in angry criticism today of anti-draft demonstrations saying they bordered on treason and undermined efforts to attain a negotiated peace in Asia.

Sen. Thomas H. Kushel of California, the assistant Republican leader, told his colleagues that protesters who burn draft cards and fake illnesses to escape military service are "sowing the seeds of treason.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he was "shocked" to see pictures of protesters putting a cigarette lighter to their draft cards. Both he and Kuchel applauded the FBI investigation of such actions, which led to the arrest today of a 22-yearold student in Hooksett, N.H.

Sens. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, Spessard L. Holland, D-Fla., and Milward L. Simpson, R-Wyo., plugged for passage of a pending bill which would make it a crime to delay the transportation of military personnel or equipment.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Johnson, moving with obvious effort, took a half-hour walk Monday. His press secretary later predicted Johnson's recuperation will stretch out longer than anyone thought.

Johnson, after walking slowly, sometimes gingerly, for about a quarter-mile around the grounds of the Bethesda Naval Hospital, was quoted by press secretary Bill D. Moyers as saying "It takes something to take those steps."


