The students of 1917 recognized $t$. threat when Germany began sinking U.S ships and demanding submissive action from the American people.

The students of 1941 recognized this threat-not when Adolph Hitler was slowly taking over the small countries of Europe, but only when action was forced upon them.

Today, the threat of Communism has been definitely written and a predetermined route to take over the earth has been laid down.

No, we do not see a communist behind every bush, nor do we want to. We also feel that the students of today do not want to see this either, and that they would rather stop communist advances in Viet Nam and save as much of the world as they can for the peoples of the world.

Rather than propose that we abandon Viet Nam and the rest of the world to Communism, we would rather see actions supporting the U.S. stand.

We wish that the responsible students at Tech and throughout the country would take the initiative and write, call or otherwise notify the President and other leaders, telling them that they recognize the gravity of U.S. commitments and that they support them.
It is time to do away with passive approval and let others know that today's students are responsible and worried about the future, and that not everyone goes around laying in the streets.

## We're Not Crying

"Foul" But...

All coaches react differently to defeat. Some are philosophical. Others analyze the game, pointing out key plays that led to the final outcome. Most are at least hospitable.
