TThe Tech campus has gone "Hog-wild" in preparation for today's scuffle with the herd of Oinkers from the Ozarks and apparently there's never before been anything like the excitement.

It certainly doesn't compare with anything I've ever seen here," Tech Athletic Director Polk Robison said.
