Former Raider Works For Frnka

Dennis Vinzant, former Tech Red Raider has been named first assistant to Coach Henry Frnka and reported last week to Tulane to take over duties there, it was announced Saturday by Athletic Director Claude "Monk" Simons.

Vinzant was head coach at East Texas State Teachers college when he accepted the position at Tulane. Working under Frnka will not be a new assignment to Vinzant, who worked with Frnka at Greenville High School, where Frnka turned out top teams. He lettered in baseball, football, basketball and track at Tech.

Vinzant played during the seasons of 1927-28 and 29 at Tech. He was head basketball coach at East Texas, and assistant football coach before the war, working under Bob Berry, long time East Texas grid mentor, who entered the Navy in 1942.

Red Raiders Drop Fast Contest To W. T. Buffaloes

Locals Ahead Only Twice In Second Game With Teachers

Before a crowd which packed every available foot of Burton gym in Canyon last Saturday night the Texas Tech Red Raider basketball team dropped a slam-bang contest to the West Texas Buffaloes, 45-44, the second loss of the season to that team.

Tech was ahead only twice, once early in the game when Jay Kerr netted a field goal, was fouled and dropped through the free throw for a 3-2 count and early in the second half when Gene Hardey dropped through a bucket from afteld, also was fouled and made his gift shot good to place Tech in a 26-25 lead.

Otherwise, the Raiders fought an uphill battle, trying hard to get out in front again. The Buffs were never more than four points ahead and neither side gave up fighting until the final whistle. Carland Head netted a free throw after the final whistle to run the Tech total to 44, just a point short of a tie. Head, playing his first conference game since his return from three years in the paratroopers, made six baskets and four free throws to lead scorers with 16 points. He dropped through each of the four gift shots allowed him. In a game earlier last week at Clovis he made ten baskets and a free throw.

Tech made 10 of 12 free throws, while the Buffs counted but 9 of 17 gift shots.

Canyon was paced by little J. W. Malone, the Stratford lad with the dribble complex. He made five baskets and four free throws. Big Hank Decker, 6 foot, 4 inch Buff center, was close second with five field goals and two free throws.

Track workouts at Texas Tech started this week and Coach Walker Nichols is urging all men students who feel they have ability to report to him immediately. He said three meets at least will be held this spring and negotiations are on for more. No definite commitments have been made or dates set.

"We hope to have a strong team, one which will compete on at least even terms with other colleges," he said. "We apparently have some good men lined up for each event, although it is too early to reach a conclusion."

Nineteen men reported Monday afternoon at the initial workout, with particularly strong talent in the field events. A majority of the candidates were members of the football squad last fall.

Reporting for the shot put, discus and javelin throw were: Walter Schlinkman, Tech's great full-back from Dumas; Bernie Winkler, 210-pound tackle from Temple; Douglas McSwane, freshman tackle from San Angelo; and Buck Terrell, new student from Port Arthur, former lineman at Tulane. Candidates for track events include: Harold Butler, speedy little Lubbock half-miler; Jim Hutchins, Memphis, dash and hurdle expert; Doc Savage, former Bonham 440 star; John Sessums, San Angelo 440 man; Cecil Norris, Beaumont dash man and Red Raider half back the past two years and Jim Scarborough, Fort Worth half miler.

Nichols is holding daily workouts and expects reinforcements for his squad when the basketball season is over and members of the court team are able to turn their attention to track matters.

Adams, J. T. Album of American History, 1783-1853. 1945 Volume 2 of a history of America told chiefly through illustrations from contemporary sources. Emphasis upon manners, customs, and economic progress.

Aselrad, Jacob. Anatole France, 1944. A convincing and inclusive study, with emphasis upon France's mental traits and development rather than upon external events.

Brogan, D. W. The American Character, 1944. An admirably well-informed discussion of American political affairs, institutions, and social conditions, written with detachment, and convincingly interpreted with reference to the future.

Brown, J. M. Broadway in Review, 1940. Lively criticism of the drama of the 'thirties' in America and England, including comment upon Life With Father, The Man Who Came to Dinner, The Time of Your Life, and Ladies in Retirement.

Koch-Weser, E. F. L. Hitler and Beyond, 1945. An account of the events and conditions which preceded and made possible the Hitler regime, written by a former chairman of the German Socialist party, who died in exile.

Marquand, J. P. So Little Time. In the same vein as The Late George Apley and H. M. Fulham, Esquire, but with a war background and a more completely developed central character.
