Host System Planned For Foreign Students

The Student Senate's Foreign Students Committee is initiating a new program this year to help Tech's international students—a host system.

One American student will serve as a host or "buddy" to a foreign student during his term at Tech. The purpose is to match a foreign student with an American student so both can benefit during the school year.

"The foreign student will benefit by having someone to explain American customs to him, to help him with registration, to answer his questions and to get nim involved in campus activities and organizations," said Don Henry, committee chairman.

"The American will benefit by having an opportunity to learn more about a foreign country, to learn some of its customs and to help the foreign student," Henry added.

Application Ready

American students who want to participate in the program can pick up applications at the Student Government Office beginning Monday. The application should be returned the following Friday.

"We want as many people to apply as possible," Henry said. "We hope to have at least one American for every foreign student." This year there are 79 international students enrolled at Tech.

The students who have been selected to participate in the program will be notified shortly after the second semester begins and a meeting will be arranged between the foreign and American students. The Americans who participate in this program will form a Foreign Students Host Organization which will meet and work as a group to plan other activities for foreign students.

Henry's committee hopes to get the host program started at the beginning of the second semester so it can carry over to the first of next year.

New Arrivals

"The time when we most need to help foreign students is when they first arrive on campus at the beginning of the year. They do not know their way around campus, are not acquainted with American customs and usually have some difficulty with the English language. By starting the program now we hope to have an American host ready to work with each foreign student as he arrives on campus. We want to get the foreign students acquainted with individuals who can get them involved in campus activities, encourage them to attend athletic events and parties and study with them."

Either individuals or organizations can apply to serve as hosts for foreign students. However, the organization should appoint one student who will work closely with the foreign student.

Members of the Foreign Students Committee, which is sponsoring the "buddy" program, are Janie Kinney, Vicki Nichols, and Jimmy Irish. This committee was appointed by the Senate last month to research the problems faced by foreign students and suggest ways in which the student body could best help them.

Band-athon Needs Talent

If you can sing, dance, or act you are in demand at Texas Tech.

That was the word Wednesday from Dean Killion, director of the Tech band. The band is making plans to attend the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla. on Dec. 31. The trip will cost \$32,000 with the band footing half the bill. The College has agreed to provide the rest of the funds. Arrangements have been competed with KLBK for a protracted radio-television program beginning at 6:30 p.m. Saturday to "raise the money."

"The Big Red Band" will serve as the backbone of the program with several ensembles from the organization due to perform. "We need local and area talent to help on the show," Killion said. The program is expected to continue until 10 a.m. Sunday.

Interested performers are asked to contact Killion's office.

"We are coordinating the talent and will be able to answer any questions," Killion said.

If the Raider band goes, both the Texas Tech and Georgia Tech bands will perform during the half-time show which will be nationally televised.

Three charter airliners have been reserved for the trip. The band has hotel reservations at Fernandina Beach near Jacksonville.

"Band members who want to go will be given the opportunity," Killion said, "but we feel sure that some will not want to make the trip because of the holidays."

"It is an excellent opportunity for the band to receive some nationwide exposure," he added.

Killion said at least 270 band members, plus the official party, will make the proposed trip. The total, including chaperones and instructors, will be 284.

Bus transportation already has been arranged from Fernandina Beach to Jacksonville.

The football team is tentatively scheduled to leave Lubbock on two chartered planes on Dec. 27. It will stay at the Roosevelt Hotel in downtown Jacksonville.





Another senior said, "I don't know if I like computer dates or not. I got stood up twenty minutes before the dance."



Judge Says Oswald Aimed For Connally

DALLAS (AP) — Judge Joe B. Brown says that Lee Harvey Oswald really intended to shoot Gov. John Connally instead of President John F. Kennedy.

This was shown Thursday in a transcript of a television appearance broadcast Nov. 27 in the New York area.

"I really think Oswald was shooting at Connally," the judge said. "The president got in his line of fire."

Brown said he believes Oswald, later killed by Jack Ruby, wanted to kill the governor because Connally had not changed Oswald's undesirable discharge from the Marine Corps. Connally had resigned as secretary by the time Oswald's letter was received and had no power to act.

A transcript of the television program was filed this week as a part of a legal brief in appeal procedures

Judge Brown also said, "I think Ruby got a fair trial. He thinks he got one, too. He told me so two weeks ago."
