Board Gives Formal Approval For Dorms

Formal approval of plans and specifications for construction of the first unit of proposed men's dormitories, and confirmation of the loan agreement for the women's dorm now under construction, highlighted the Tech Board of Director's meeting Friday afternoon in the office of Pres. E. N. Jones. Bids on the men's housing will be opened Dec. 11 in the Aggie Auditorium.

The building committee was authorized to work with architects on preparation of preliminary plans for enlargement of Jones Stadium. The Board also accepted the inventory of donor Jack Frost of San Antonio, who gave the col-

Approximately 4,000 exes crowded into Lubbock Saturday to take part in Tech's 29th Homecoming celebration.

Highlighting the day was the announcement of parade float winners during half-time activities at Saturday afternoon's game between Tech and Oklahoma A&M, which resulted in a 13-13 tie.

Over-all winner, as well as fraternity winner, was the revolving Sigma Chi float, with mascot symbols representing each of the Southwest Conference members.

The float had a sign saying "Looking Forward to '60" and depicted Tech's Matador surveying the other Southwest Conference competition.

Tri Delt's Win
The sorority division winner was Delta Delta Delta's "Holy Mackerel, Win" float. It pictured a large fish and a mermaid.

The all-campus division winner was the Newman Club's "Sittin' On Top of the World," which showed a double-T for Texas Tech atop a large world globe and the SWC school pennants.

Second-place division winners were: Fraternity-Sigma Nu's "Chill 'Em Raiders," a Tech gridded kicking the Okies clear out of the stadium to land head first in an igloo; Sorority—Kappa Alpha Theta's "Bewitch The Aggies," showing a witch's head peering out of her flowered house; All-campus—the Air Force ROTC's silver jet plane with AFROTC sweethearts.

Jeweler Presents Trophies
Trophies were presented to the winning organizations by Lucian Thomas, Lubbock jeweler.

Other homecoming honors included the presentation of an award to Doak Hall for the best-decorated dormitory. The display featured a Tech Matador about to spear an Aggie football player.

The game was followed by various open houses and other social events, and a dance to the music of nationally famous Woody Herman's Third Herd in Municipal Coliseum.

Earlier in the day, hundreds of ex-students attended a luncheon in the Tech gymnasium.

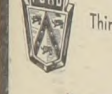

lege a registered herd of Hereford cattle, including 21 cows and 20 calves, with a total worth of \$30,800.

Hopes are that construction on the first unit of the men's housing will be started Jan. 2 1957. A definite beginning date has not been set on the second unit according to M. L. Pennington, college comptroller, because the loan on the second unit is at present indefinite. However, there is a 90-day option clause in the contract and if the loan is approved within that time the contractor will begin the remaining unit.

Approximate cost of the initial dormitory will be \$2,985,000 while approximate cost of the second building is \$2,904,400. The difference in cost is due to the underground extension from the campus power house to the first building which will be the farthest from the power house.

The construction site will require approximately 35 acres with parking lots, walks, curbs, drives and landscaping all included in the plans.

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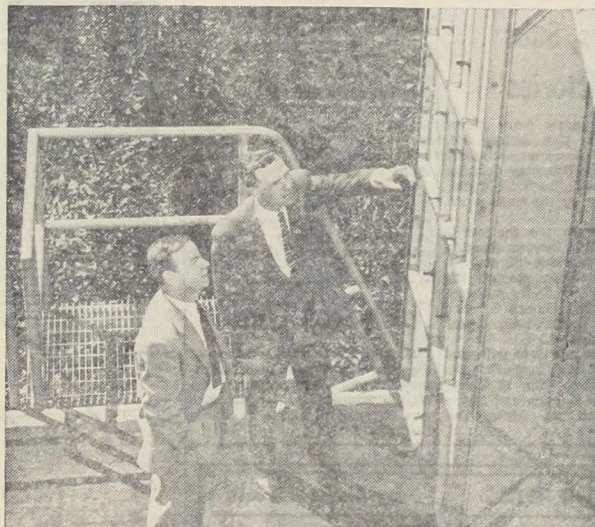

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Raiders To Test Horned Frogs Saturday

After coming from behind to tie Oklahoma A&M 13-13 in a mild upset, Tech's Red Raiders face a formidable stumbling-block on the comeback trail Saturday in the form of TCU.

Texas Christian boasts a big line behind which such stellar performers as quarterback Chuck Curtis, halfback Ken Wineberg, and All-American Jim Swink operate.

Last year Swink was everybody's All-American. This year he has been used mainly as a decoy and a pass receiver. However, make no mistake about it, Swink is the backbone of the TCU offensive attack.

On a comparative score basis TCU is definitely the favorite. They lost a 7-6 battle to Texas A&M and won by that same 7-6 score from Baylor. The Aggies trampled Tech 40-7 and the Bears shutout the Raiders 28-0.

But Tech is definitely improved. Coach DeWitt Weaver declared Sunday that the Raiders fought as hard a game against the Aggies as they have all year. He was especially impressed with the work of fullback Gene "Bull" Bentley and halfback Duke Frisbie. He praised the defensive work of linemen Ken Vakey, Jack Henry and Floyd Hood.

Several Raiders are on the injured list for TCU. Halfback Ron-

nie Herr is out with a shoulder separation and all four quarterbacks are ailing. John Riddle and Wick Alexander both have injured knees; Don Williams suffered a broken nose and Buddy Hill's knee will keep his action limited for the rest of the year. Williams received his broken nose on an apparent foul by an Aggie lineman after the whistle had blown.

Last week's chilled homecoming crowd was generally pleased with the inspired play of the Techsians. After a slow first quarter Tech perked up and actually dominated play in the second half.

So superior was Tech's late hold on the game that A&M was held to no first downs in the third period. Meanwhile Bentley and Frisbie carried the major portion of the offensive load. Frisbie got the Raiders started with a beautiful 72-yard touchdown gallop in the second quarter. Bentley bulled his way for the second tally late in the same period.

Several promising Raider drives in that last half were stopped short on fumbles and a 15-yard holding penalty. Tech lost the ball four times on fumbles.

Oklahoma scored early. They kicked-off and after an exchange of fumbles, Williams punted to the Aggie's Duane Wood on the Tech 48. Wood hesitated, then followed a wave of blockers down the sideline all the way for a score and a 6-0 lead.

Later in the quarter Frisbie fumbled on the Tech 33 and guard Tom Wilson recovered for the Ags. Six plays later and 45 seconds deep in the second quarter Johnny Allen plunged over from the one and Mc Odell converted making it 13-0. The score was set up on a 14-yard pass from quarterback Keith Kashner to Wood on the one.

On the second play following the next kick-off Frisbie circled right end faking a pass, cut inside, weaved his way to the far sideline, and dashed 72 yards for the score. Williams converted to

make it 13-7.

Later A&M punted to the Tech 40 where Williams returned to the 47. One play gained nothing and Williams was roughed on the next play and had to leave the game.

Hill came in and on the first play hit halfback M. C. Northam on the Aggie 20. Northam mad a clear field but slipped and fell on the 11.

Bentley carried for nine yards and Hill's sneak set up first down on the one. Then the "Bull" crashed over left tackle to tie the score. On the conversion attempt the pass from center was fumbled and Frisbie's late attempt was wide, leaving it at 13-all.

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Baseball Drills Continue This Week

Informal workouts for Raider and Picador baseball prospects will continue this week according to Bill Nance, graduate student serving as assistant coach to Beattie Feathers.

The workouts are being conducted at Hubber Park every weekday afternoon at 3 p.m. Feathers will join Nance in directing the teams after the football season ends.

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Burnetts, Subs Take Victories

Only two games were played yesterday in the Independent League of the Intramural football program. The Burnetts defeated Wesley 6-0, while the Subs downed Phi Mu Alpha by the same score.

Shutouts were the feature in the Fraternity League Sunday. Sigma Chi blanked Sigma Nu 13-0; Kappa Sigma stopped Phi Gamma 20-0; Phi Delta squeezed past Alpha Tau Omega 6-0 and Sigma Alpha Epsilon romped past Phi Kappa Alpha 16-0.
