Brazen Texas Gunman Slips Through Net

MEMPHIS, Tenn., (AP)—Raymond Hamilton, brazen Texas gunman, eluded capture Saturday as practically every federal and police officer in the south sought him in the government's latest shoot-to-kill manhunt.

Department of justice agents kept their movements secret, but police thought the desperado and a badly wounded gangster confederate had left but a cold trail to follow since they disappeared from here Friday after dumping two terrorized hostages in the heart of downtown Memphis.

Memphis police believe the desperado pair headed into Arkansas-Friday morning, possibly hoping to reach the Arkansas-Oklahoma hill country without further brushes with the law, such as marked their wild ride through Memphis Thursday night following the looting of a bank of \$1,100 at Prentiss.

Two women, booked as Dorothy and Estell Davis, Houston sisters, and said by officers to have been companions of Hamilton and his confederates in the Prentiss robbery, were questioned at Jackson, Miss., Saturday by federal agents.

Cotton Again Occupies Center Of National Economic Picture

AUSTIN—Cotton occupies the center of the national economic picture again in the space of two months, this time by staging a spectacular fall in price on March 11 of nearly 200 points, or from 12.10 cents for May New York to 10.25 cents for the same delivery, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research and internationally known cotton economist.

"Cotton has again demonstrated its strongly international characteristics by taking a drop of about 100 points below the loan value placed on it by the United States government," he said. "Decline in the price of American cotton so far below the government loan value has virtually priced cotton out of the market for the time being."

"According to the New York Cotton Exchange Service, the total stocks of American cotton in the United States was about 10,500,000 bales on March 14. Mill stocks amounted to a little over 1,000,000 bales. According to trade sources,

the United States government controls about 5,300,000 bales now, and there are about 500,000 additional bales subject to the 12-cent loan, which at present prices means that the government will either own or control 6,000,000 bales of cotton. This leaves only about 2,500,000 bales for export and consumption in the United States until the new crop comes. Moreover, stocks in European ports and afloat to Europe are only 92,000 bales, or 97,000 bales less than on March 7 last year. Stocks of American cotton in and afloat to the Orient are about 50,000 more than last year.

"If the government is to hold its cotton for 12 months or better, there must inevitably be a strong advance in prices of all growths of cotton or else very drastic curtailment of the consumption of American cotton, which might conceivably result in a carryover of cotton on August 1 in the United States equal almost to that of 1934 in spite of the 9,534,000-bale crop.

Prices of both cotton and yarn hardened during February which resulted in yarn advancing about an eighth and cotton about a twelfth of a cent, Dr. Cox said. The net result was an advance of one point in the spinnings ratio margin to 155 during February from 154 during January. The pence margin advanced from 3.57d in January to 3.90d in February. During February 1934, the ratio margin was 162 and the pence margin 4.09d. These figures indicate a weak demand and partly forecast the drastic break which occurred in cotton prices March 11, he explained.

In his monthly cotton balance sheet, Dr. Cox said: "Total supplies of cotton in the United States March 1 were 10,871,000 bales compared with 11,949,000 last year, 12,834,000 two years ago, an all-time high of 14,337,000 three years ago, and a normal of between seven and eight million. The net decline in supply this year from last in the supplies in the United States of American cotton in and afloat to European ports has been 2,045,000 bales.

"Calculated prices based on average demand and supply-price relations prevailing during the past seven years indicate that the index price calculated on the Bureau of Labor Statistics wholesale index number should be about 252 points above the price on this date last year, calculated on the supply of American cotton only. As a matter of fact on March 14 it was 237 points under last year's price. The calculated price of Middling 7-8 inch spot cotton in New Orleans based on changes in supply and

Texas Oil, Gas Statutes To Be Strengthened

AUSTIN—Efforts will be made in the senate next week to pass the house bill which would re-state and strengthen the Texas oil and gas conservation statutes, senate leaders declared Saturday.

The senate's committee on state affairs, chaired by Senator Will Pace of Tyler, will meet Tuesday to consider the anti-waste oil bill which extends for two years permission to the railroad commission for use of reasonable "market demand" requirements in prorating oil production to prevent physical waste.

The bill also provides reclassification of control laws in order to assure nation of strict conservation in this state, according to proponents.

Senator Clint Small of Amarillo, is sponsoring the bill in the upper house. "It should be passed in the senate as speedily as possible," Senator Small said. "An effort will be made to pass it during the week."

Sponsors pointed out that they had heard of no organized opposition to be presented against the bill at Tuesday's committee hearing. If reported favorably out of committee on that day, the bill will be placed on the senate's calendar the following morning for action.

Wednesday and Thursday of each week are set aside in the senate for consideration of house bills. The measure's position on the calendar will improve materially the chances

At Austin

AUSTIN, (UP)—University of Texas professors may do some out-of-the-way research work but Rep. W. E. Pope of Corpus Christi opposes lump sum appropriation for the university until he knows how much each teacher gets and what for.

Pope said he started the fight when he heard reports that four professors were traveling abroad while on the university payroll.

"One," he said, "was reported to be receiving \$7,000 a year investigating the contents of King Tut's tomb; another getting \$6,000 trying to determine whether or not hair could be made to grow on an armadillo's tail; one was getting \$3,000 a year trying to determine if he could grow another leg on a house fly and still another was getting \$4,000 to find out whether green turtles came to the United States through Greenland or the Isthmus of Panama."

The office of the Attorney General of Texas may have a high-sounding title, but it did not impress a British airplane gadget manufacturer, Attorney General William McCraw discovered this week.

McCraw is a veteran pilot. He read the advertisement of a jigger to compute wind drift while flying and wrote to the English manufacturer ordering one. He suggested it be sent C. O. D.

Instead of the jigger, McCraw received a letter advising him that the firm "has had unfortunate experiences with even very distinguished gentlemen." McCraw decided a post office money order might be distinguished enough to get recognition.

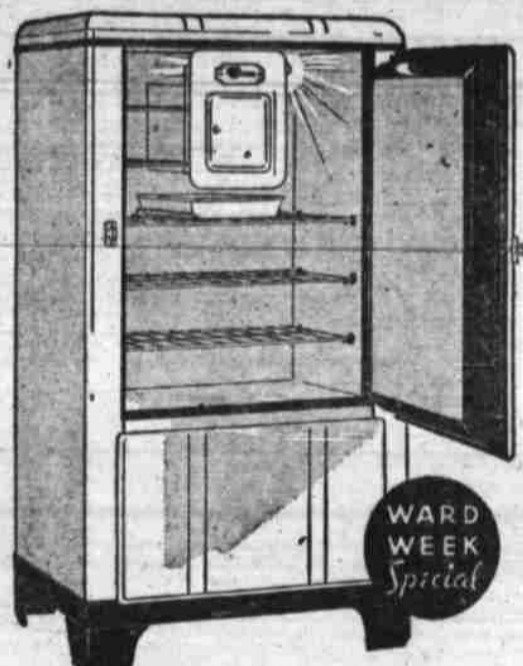

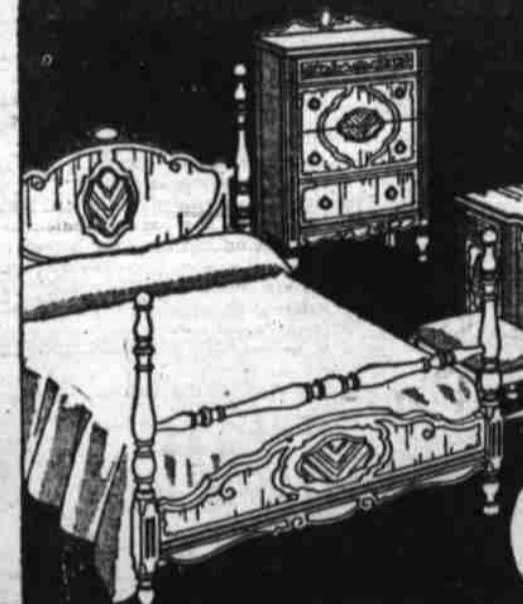

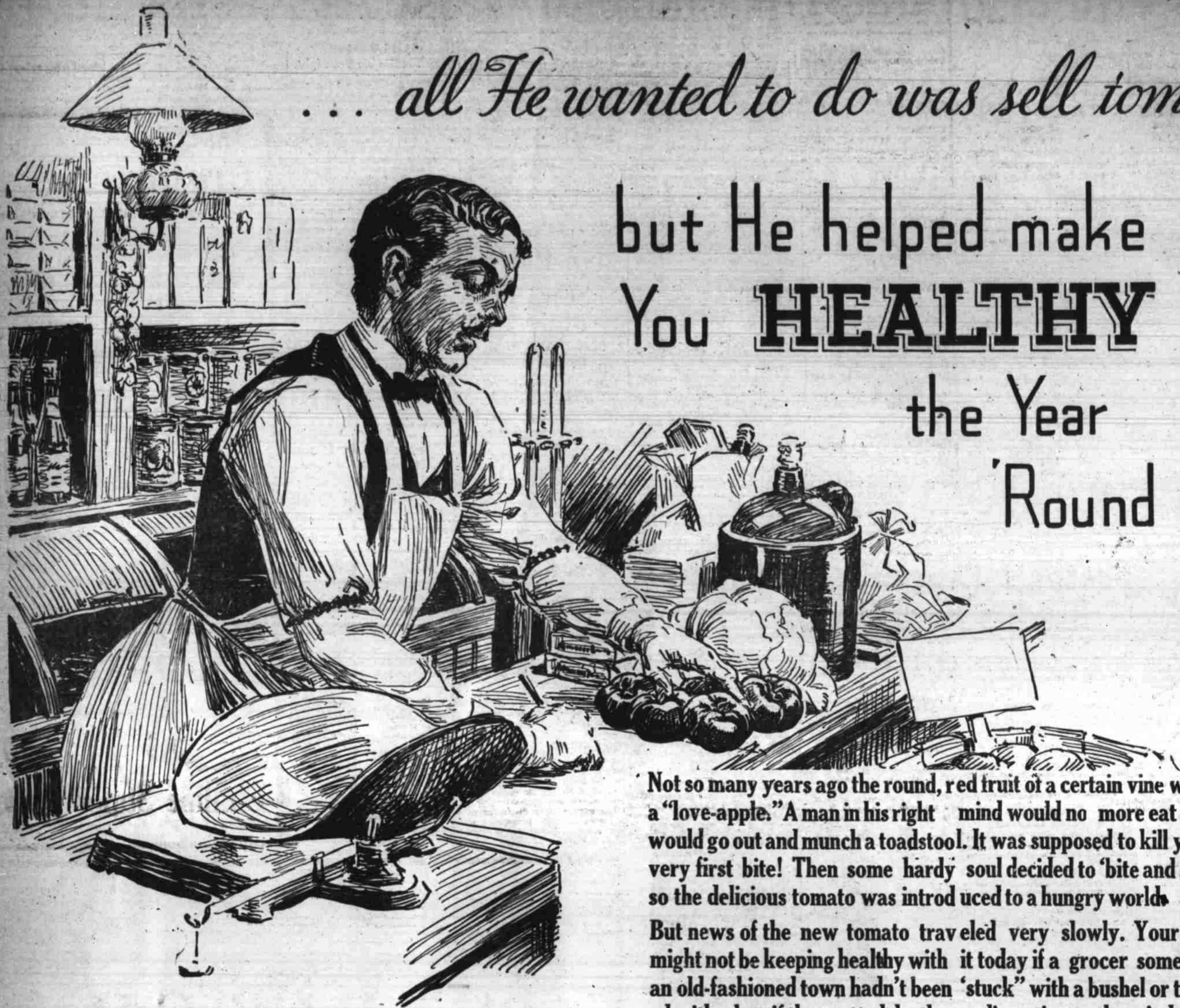

"THE CHURCH," DR. RAYBURN'S SUBJECT AT REVIVAL FRIDAY

Sunday morning Dr. Rayburn's subject will be "The Church."

Sunday afternoon at 2:30 he will talk to everybody on "The Science of Spiritual Life."

Then Sunday evening he will tell us about the "Second Coming of Our Lord."

"Confessing Christ" was Dr. James Rayburn's subject Friday night. He said in part: Scripture: John 9:1-38. Text: Matt. 10:32.

"I like to preach the gospel because it is so big. It is a 'who-soever' gospel for a 'who-soever' sinner; and if you stick to Christ, it does not matter whether you talk to a group of college students, the mechanics in a roundhouse, or a group in the slums, you have always got the message that fits; the gospel for hungry souls."

"Whoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven." The church today needs witnesses in the hotel lobby, on the streets, down on the farm. What are you going to do with Jesus the Christ? Salvation is a personal matter, a personal relationship between you and your Saviour.

"The Scripture says, 'Confess Him before men,' not in a sick room, but right out in the open. A religion that is not strong enough to walk down the street is a pretty poor thing. The Lord says, 'confess Him before men,' and He says, 'now is the accepted time.'

"Second, you need to confess Him because the world needs to know Him worse than anything else. I believe that Jesus is the only solution to this sin-cursed world's problems. If Jesus Christ was known by Capital and Labor, neither would ever be unjust or unfair. If we could have put ten thousand evangelists into Russia a few years ago, what a blessing Russia would have had. With all her great resources, if she had Jesus Christ, what a tremendous nation she would be."

"Five hundred thousand dollars a year is spent to advertise Shaffer pens, ninety thousand a month to advertise Post's products; and we have people in our churches who think that it is money wasted when the whole church body spends a few million dollars to tell the world about the Bread of Life."

"Next, how do we confess Him? By word of mouth. If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."

Did you ever consider what an incomprehensible gift God gave to man when He gave him the power of speech. He gave it to no other creature to cross before it comes animal. Here is another gift for to me. 'And God formed man out of the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life.' So I am God-breathed and not monkey born. No professor who says he came from a tadpole will get an argument out of me. He ought to know his own family.

"Language is worth millions of dollars today. The salesman who can go out and sell his product is worth more in commissions and salary than the man that can not talk. So language is worth millions in the market place. Now wouldn't it be queer if God gave man speech to use for every other subject in the world and did not expect him to use it in his highest relation, his spiritual relation? So we should confess him."

"What do men and women talk about? The things that interest them. We are not very much in love with anybody, not very much interested in somebody we never mention. We talk about Mrs. Ferguson, Bill Murray, President Roosevelt and never, never mention the name of Jesus Christ to anybody. If you have serious illness in your family and a certain doctor brings you through, you do not hesitate to recommend that doctor to a neighbor who has the same calamity. We will recommend our friends our family physician. Do you ever recommend your personal Saviour?"

"I believe that if we lived as close to this Book as we ought to live, had the passion for souls that we ought to have, kept on our knees as much as we should, and lived as close to God as we ought to live, God would give us the power to lead at least one soul to Christ each year. Think what that would mean to our church membership. O Church of Christ, confess our Lord. Introduce Him to folks. Make Him known."

"And lastly, confess Him by living His life. You may be able to speak eloquently but you can live eloquently. You may not be able to speak convincingly, but you can live convincingly. And that is the strongest argument possible. Unbelievers may be able to debate with your arguments, but not so with your life. The highest compliment I ever heard given a minister was this 'I never see that man but what he makes me think of Jesus Christ.' When a Christian is just as grouchy and touchy and impatient as anybody else, does the world see Christ in them? Some people are mighty poor advertisements for Christ. If a man lives what he preaches, the world may not always love him, but they will respect him."

(See II Tim. 3:1-3) "Young folks, did you ever say, because your parents made you go to church. 'When I get to be my own boss I am not going to church'.... It would be just as logical to say that when you get to be your own boss you are not going to wash your feet any more because your parents made you do it in your childhood. (Story of the mother who asked Dr. Rayburn to help her get her thirteen-year old child to the tabernacle. I would hate to let anybody know that I was such a colossal failure as a method."

MARS, Master Scientist

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor)

NEW YORK (AP)—The real, new scientific weapons for chemical warfare have remained hidden from the public, behind a smoke-screen of reports on dreadful new gases, bacteria and superexplosives. These "new" substances are just a drop in the real ocean of chemical science. The size of that ocean is shown by the historical, though seldom reported fact, that 3,000 chemicals were tested for gas warfare before and during the World war.

Of these only 30 were selected for trial and finally those used for fighting narrowed to about a dozen. Sixteen years since has added new chemical combinations, a few dozen at most, but the real progress has continued with the World war, particularly one of them, mustard gas.

No New Gases
Inquiry among U. S. war department officers and leading American chemists substantiates this. The war department's chemical warfare bulletin No. 4 quotes Harrison E. Howe, editor of Industrial and Engineering Chemistry: "I think it is fair to say that to the best of our knowledge and belief, research since the war has failed to disclose any gases for field use that are any more advantageous than those known and used during the World war."

On one side is the fact that mustard's effectiveness has been improved about 20 per cent; that under the right conditions the new gas may be expected to remain active on a large area for weeks, making the territory untenable.

Can Not Be Detected
On the other side is the record that attempts to nullify the effectiveness of this gas have failed. Describing this, Dr. Ulrich Mueller Kiel, recognized as the foremost German gas authority, says in Die Chemische Waffe:

"Due to the great clinging nature of mustard gas, its so-called 'persistence' on the terrain, it is naturally very important to possess a detector for that substance."

"Efforts to find such a detector have not been lacking, and in 1929 the Geneva commission of the Red Cross offered a prize of 10,000 gold francs for the discovery of a detector. To win the prize the detector had to be above all extraordinarily sensitive (it had to react to concentrations of 70 milligrams per cubic meter) and it had to react to mustard gas alone."

"All the proposals submitted, however, proved to be useless and the prize could not be awarded. In this respect also mustard gas proved to be the most resistant of all substances yet known."

"Dew Of Death" Abandoned
The lack of this insidious approach is one reason why the American "dew of death," Lewisite, has been dropped from the list of effective war gases. Lewisite was not used in the war. But it was said 12 bombs of it dropped from planes could destroy a city the size of Berlin.

But the "dew of death" causes an itching sensation on the skin the moment it touches. It also advertises its presence by a strong odor. A superexplosive. The new gases so frequently reported are as deadly as claimed, but they won't work except under special circumstances, which seldom or never obtain in warfare.

One superexplosive, credited to Germany, is a liquid, nitrogenchloride. 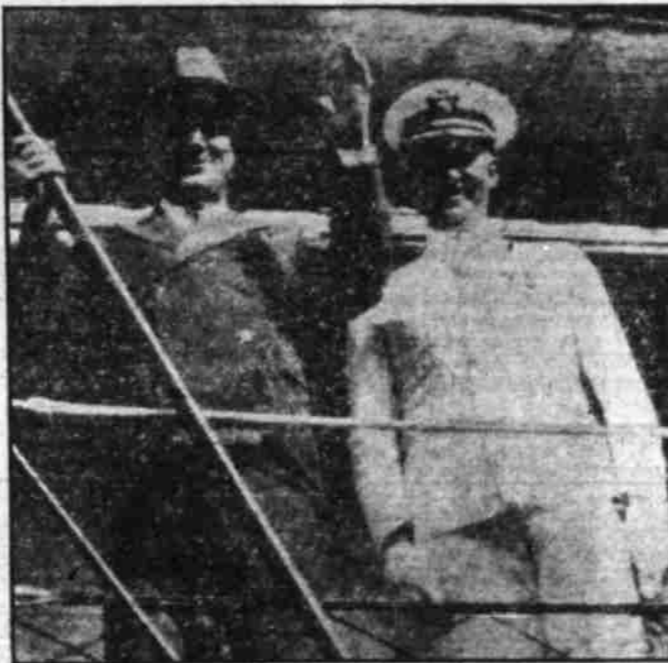

Department Of Commerce Contracts For Autogyro Capable Of Operating On Roads Prior To Takeoff And After Landing

As a further step in its program to bring about the development of airplanes particularly suited for private flying, the Bureau of Air Commerce of the Department of Commerce has awarded a contract to the Autogyro Company of America, of Willow Grove, Pa., for one two-place cabin autogyro having several new features which, if their application proves successful, should appeal to the prospective private owner, Eugene L. Vidal, director of Air Commerce, announced today. "One of the greatest handicaps to the material expansion of private flying," John H. Gelase, chief of the aeronautics development section of the bureau, explained, "is the difficulty of getting to and from the airports, which, in most cases, are inaccessible. One of the principal features of the rotor plane type has always been its ability to land and take off from small areas. Fields more accessible than the airports but not suitable for the operation of most airplanes can, in many cases, be used satisfactorily by the rotor plane; but the lack of transportation and airplane housing facilities at such fields is, of course, still more pronounced than at the established airports." "In an effort to overcome this obstacle, the autogyro being purchased will be designed for operation on the highways after it has made its landing or prior to its take off. This will be accomplished by providing rotor wings which can be readily folded back over the fuselage, a clutch between the engine and a power drive from the engine to the wheels so that the rotor plane becomes practically an automobile for ground operation. It should therefore be quite possible to house this rotor plane at home and drive it to the nearest suitable field for take off, or land on a field near one's point of destination and then proceed there over the highway. "The engine will be placed back of the pilot and passenger to afford the greatest of comfort and the rotor will be of the direct con-
