Oil Rig Accident Takes Boy's Life

Kenneth Bouchillon, 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Bouchillon of the Buffalo community, was apparently killed instantly about 1:30 Tuesday morning when hit by a heavy piece of pipe while working on a drilling rig near Hamlin. He was struck in the head. He was employed by the Birdwell Drilling Co.

Young Bouchillon was born in Santa Anna July 30, 1938 and had lived in this vicinity all his life. He attended the Santa Anna schools and was a member of the Methodist Church.

Funeral services were held in Coleman Wednesday afternoon with burial in the Coleman Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, two brothers, Willie and Lonnie Bouchillon and one sister, Jean Bouchillon, all of Santa Anna.

Rites For Raymond Huggins Here Wed.

Funeral services were held at the Hosch Funeral Chapel on Wednesday, May 16, at 4 p. m. for Raymond Huggins, former longtime resident of Santa Anna.

Mr. Huggins died at 6 a. m. Tuesday in the Veterans Hospital at Big Spring, of a heart attack. He had been ill a long time. He had made his home at San Angelo for several years. He would have been 55 years of age May 21st.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Iva Huggins of San Angelo; one daughter, Mrs. Evan Brock of San Marcos; two brothers, T. L. Huggins of Santa Anna and Ganie Huggins of Jacksonville; one sister, Mrs. Roy Bledsoe of Shields. Mrs. John Perry is a niece.

Burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery with Hosch Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

County HDC To Sponsor Friendship For Korea

The American-Korean Foundation invited Coleman County Home Demonstration Clubs to participate again this year in the "Friendship For Korea" campaign.

Mrs. Ruth Ransberger was appointed county chairman by Mrs. W. C. Watson, Home Demonstration Council Chairman, at the regular monthly meeting on Thursday, May 10.

About a year ago a campaign was launched to send a "Texas Friendship For Korea" to help the 4-H Clubs in that war torn country. As the result of this shipment there was established an agricultural extension program similar to ours. Texas is not alone in this undertaking however, this year. There are five other states cooperating through extension colleges to help with this shipment.

This is an opportunity for all farm organizations, civic clubs, Sunday school classes, and other organized groups to take part in this type of Christian approach to the problems in Korea, where 100,000 children are orphans and 300,000 families are fatherless.

Acceptable supplies include materials such as pinwale corduroy, plain and printed cotton, Dan River Gingham, cotton flannel, denim, broadcloth, percale, batiste, unbleached muslin, cotton velveteen, and printed feed sacks; sewing equipment; knitting supplies; linens; leathercraft supplies; food preservation equipment; and carpenter tools.

Cash contributions are needed to purchase or to assist in the building of a Korean 4-H Club camp. Each contributor will be helping Korean boys and girls to become better farmers, better homemakers and better citizens.

All contributions must be in the H. D. Agent's office by Thursday noon, June 14.

Prison System Needs Guards

Austin, Tex. (Spl.) — O. B. Ellis, general manager of the Texas Prison System, has asked the Texas Press Association for help in locating 40 urgently needed guards.

"Mounted guards for the Texas Prison System are desperately needed," said Ellis. "At this time of the year, when prisoners should be in the field at work, we only have 609 guards available. Our regular staff totals 649.

"The Texas press can render a wonderful service to the State by publicizing our needs — and our problem is serious," Ellis emphasized. "No previous guard experience is necessary as we train our own men. Therefore we will be happy to interview all physically sound men who are interested in joining our staff."

Men with good names and who want to work are especially desired. Preferred age is 40. But men from 21 to 55 are acceptable. Room, board, laundry and uniforms are furnished, along with a \$2,700 annual salary.

"There is not a unit in the Texas Prison System that is not short of guards at the present time," Ellis said.

Greatest need at the moment is primarily at the farm units. Here all guards ride horseback.

Schools Suffer Heavy Damage In Recent Storm

Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent of schools, reports both buildings and the gym suffered heavy damage in the hail storm and flood the night of April 30, when almost 10 inches of rain fell in this area.

Perry said insurance adjusters have tentatively set damages as follows: Gymnasium, including roof, paint and glass, \$1,061.35; elementary school, including roof, paint, glass, glazing, screens, spread and felt, \$1,831.54; high school, including roof, glass, labor on glass, paint, glazing and interior damage, \$2,023.11, making a total of \$4,916 damage. The insurance carried on the school has the \$100 deductible clause.

Perry said the insurance claims are being processed at this time.

Students Should Get Security Cards For Summer Jobs

Now is the time for high school students and others to get their social security cards if they plan to work during the holidays, according to Raleigh R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Abilene Social Security office.

Tuley said there are few jobs which do not require a social security card. He also suggests that any prospective holiday worker who has lost his card should also file at once for a duplicate card from the Abilene social security office. Applications for cards are stocked at all post offices.

Women who have changed their names by marriage should also apply at once for a replacement card with their new names on it, he added.

Tuley pointed out that individuals should be careful of their social security cards and be sure to show the card to their employers when taking new jobs. They will then be sure their records are correct in the accounting operations of the Social Security Administration. That record can be checked by asking the Abilene office for the post card prepared for that purpose.

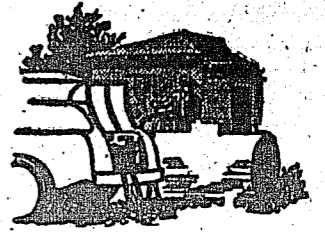

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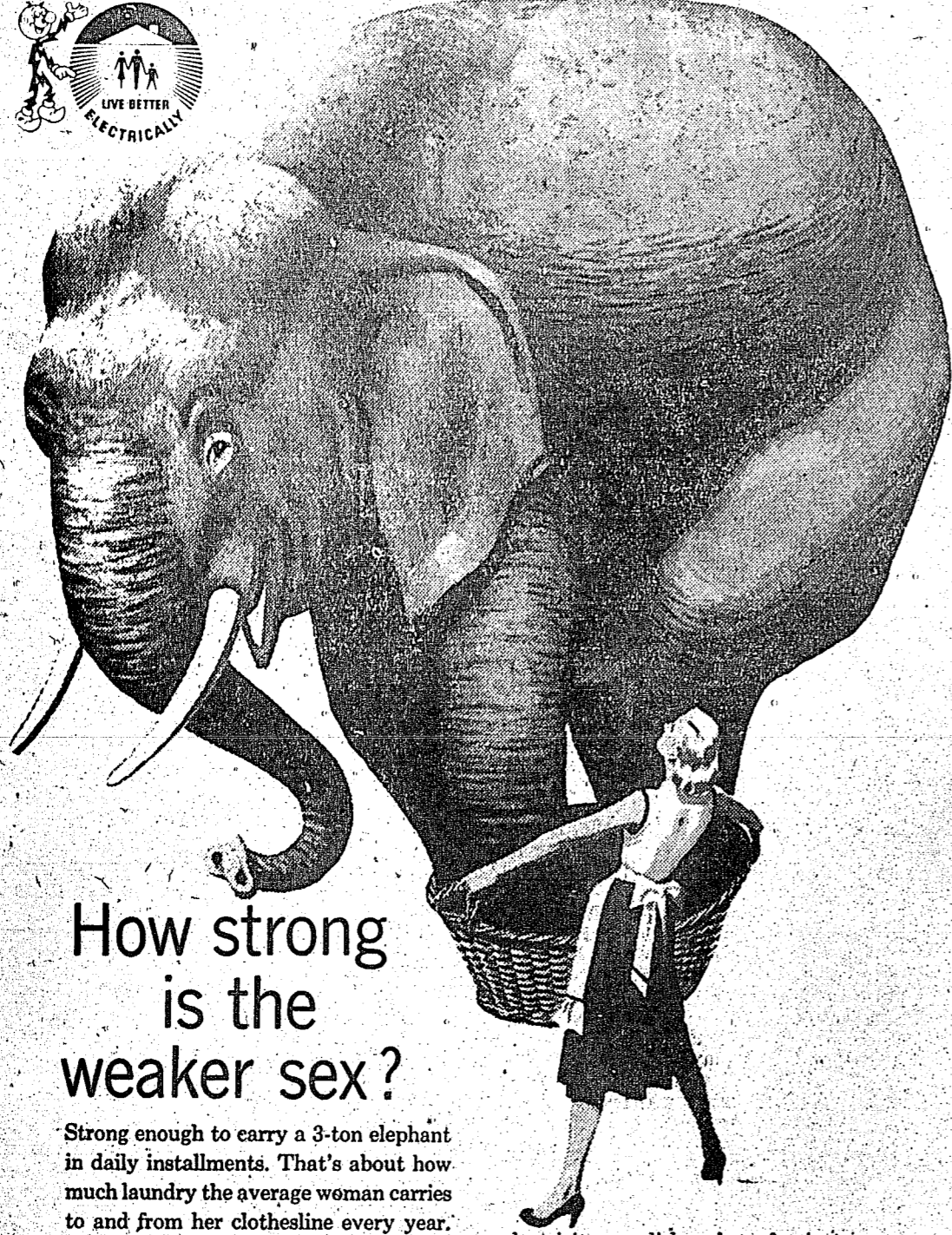

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

Our WASHINGTON Letter

ity, the atmosphere of Antioch seemed more than likely to smother it. Religion in that city was what it is for some cities today—not by any means the most important interest. Antioch was a big business town, a central city for trade and transportation. People were much more interested in getting rich than they were in religion.

Uncongenial People

One of the problems, new at Antioch, was whether it would be possible to include in the same church groups of persons so different as the Greeks and the Jews. That had not bothered the Palestine church, because there the various races and nationalities kept to themselves. The Jerusalem church was all Jewish, the Samaritan church all Samaritan, and so on. But in big cities people mix and mingle pretty freely, and so it was in Antioch. Would different races, backgrounds, and so on, mix in one church? Somewhat to Barnabas' surprise, maybe, they did. When Christians are really what they aim and claim to be, the church becomes the "fellowship of the uncongenial." People who ordinarily have nothing in common, discover that if they have Christ in common, they are bound by a tie stronger than any other in the world.

Leadership

When Barnabas went up there to Antioch, commissioned by the church in Jerusalem to look around and use his judgment about what to do, we read that he "saw the grace of God and was glad." But the grace of God, in man or church, does not iron out all the problems. We have to think. And Barnabas must have thought long and hard about one problem which concerns every church large or small: leadership. Barnabas could easily have taken on a smaller church; but that one at Antioch was just too big for one man, any one man. He could have picked up some assistants there, no doubt, and stayed as top man; or he could have invited in one of the Jerusalem leaders. But he needed more than raw "chaplain's assistants." And the Jerusalem leaders would have felt pretty strange in an inter-racial church. So Barnabas took a rather difficult trip, all the way to Tarsus in Cilicia, just to get a man he had never forgotten; the then unknown (or, if known, suspected) Saul. The future of a church depends on its leadership. Blessed is the church with a pulp committee as wise and far-seeing as Barnabas!

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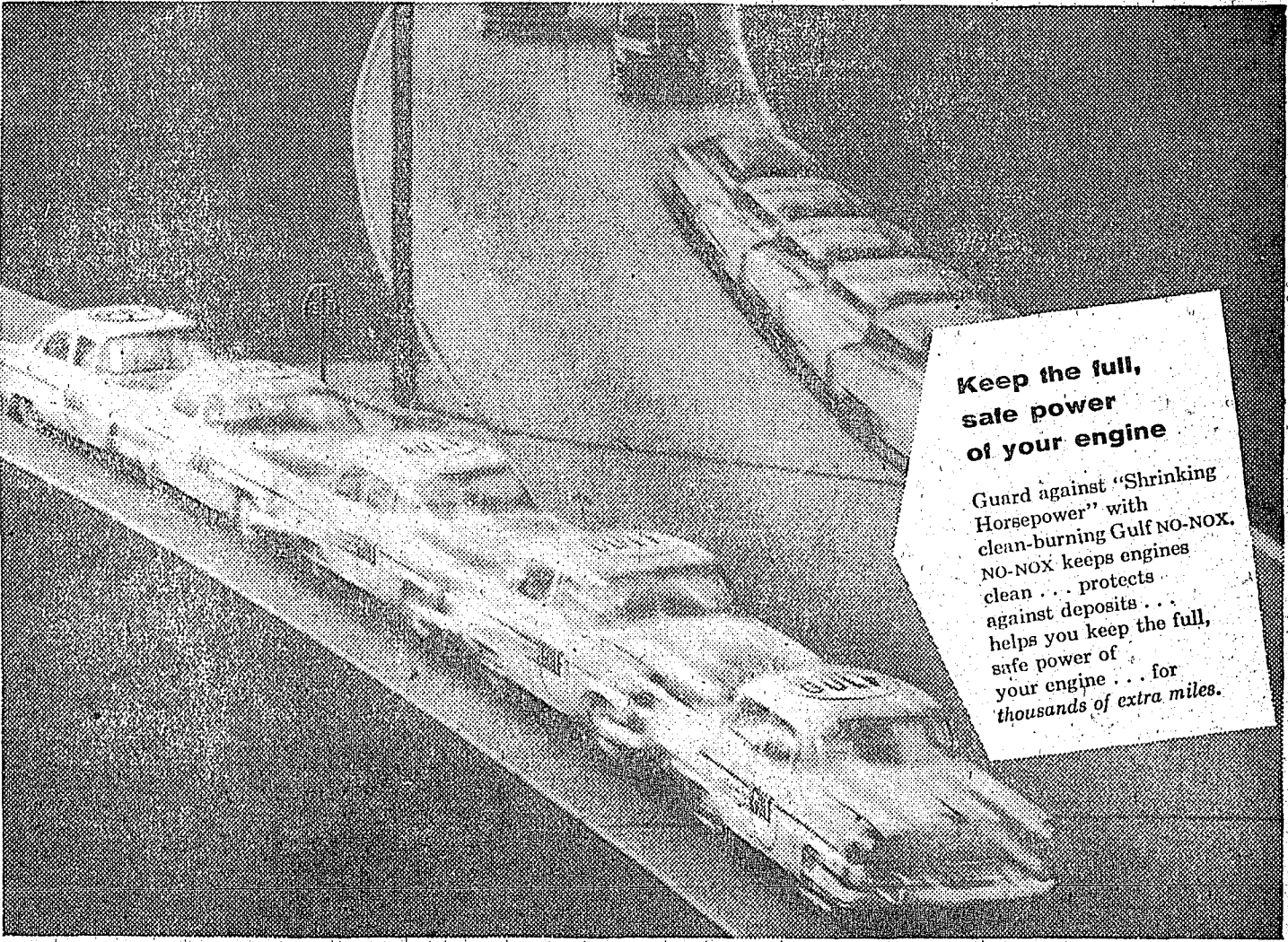
THERE are two different kinds of problems with children, as every father and mother know. One is the kind of problem you have with a sickly child, who has allergies, won't eat, play or sleep the way a healthy child should; perhaps a retarded child. The other is the kind of problem you have with a child who seems sometimes to be altogether too healthy; growing too fast to keep up with noisy and hungry; perhaps ahead of his grade in school. The problems of growth may be even more difficult than the problems of illness; but all the same, the problems of development are more to be desired than the problems of decay.

Will the World Swallow the Church?

The Christian church at Antioch, one of the great cities of the world at that time, had its problems; but they were all the kind of problem that goes with growth. Dr. C. R. Erdman in his book on Acts points out that in this church we meet with four new things: a new name for the believers (Christians), a new kind of church (of which more presently), a new leadership, and a new center of missionary activity. Another new thing, which indeed was the mother of the others, was the new kind of city in which the church there found itself. Up to the time the church began in Antioch, the largest city where there were sizable groups of Christians was Jerusalem. That was a city which, so to speak, made religion a specialty. The long-time religion of Jerusalem led right up to Christianity. But what about Antioch. That was a pagan city, religions of many kinds flourished there, and none of them led up to Christianity at all. If the environment at Jerusalem was partly favorable to Christian-

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**HOW TO CHANGE OR
REVOKE A WILL**

Changing and revoking will has involved many an estate in litigation because the proper legal methods were not used and the statutes were not followed.

Take the case of Mr. S. Some-time ago he went into his lawyer's office and laid in front of his attorney a will which had been prepared for him about a year previously. He said that he had made a few changes in it and wanted to know whether his

attorney thought the changes were all right.

Mr. S. was attempting to change two items of his will by drawing lines through certain words in these items and interlining, in his own handwriting, the changes he wanted. He was not attempting to revoke his entire will but merely trying to change these two items.

If Mr. S. were to die with his will in that condition, the probate court would not recognize the changes that he made, but would probably probate the will at it was originally written. Mr. S. was surprised to learn this and immediately requested that a new will be prepared.

After the will has once been executed, changes cannot be made legally by crossing out parts of a will and interlining corrections or additions. To change a will, an entirely new will must be written and properly executed or an addition by way of a codicil should be executed.

But suppose you want to revoke your will entirely. Here, again, the surest and most effective method is to execute a new will or codicil.

Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a modification of the will. It is very easy to postpone doing a thing of this kind, but failure to do so may result in the intentions of the maker of the will being thwarted to a certain extent.

There are many changing circumstances which would be brought to his attention if a person would review his will at least once a year in the light of circumstances at the time.

Such things as deaths among the legatees or devisees named in his will, births, marriages or divorces in the family, accidents or sickness among the close relatives which make it desirable to increase or decrease the amount given certain ones, substantial increases or decreases in the value of the estate of the person making the will, death of all witnesses to the will, and many other factors, may cause a person to want to execute a new will or add a codicil to his old one.

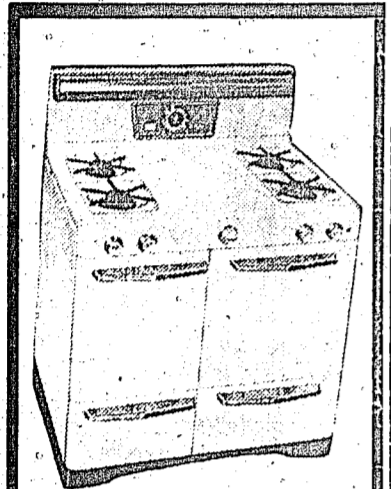
