2 Million Autos Have Not Received Safety Inspection

Austin — Two million Texas auto owners were handed a word of warning today by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Safety Director pointed out that that number of the State's registered vehicles have not yet secured safety inspections for 1956.

"Some two million autos in the State," said Garrison, "have not been inspected. That represents about half of the total number of motor vehicles registered in Texas and there remains but six weeks in the current inspection period during which these cars must be taken to licensed inspection stations for their annual safety check."

The DPS head also cautioned that many of the more than 4,000 inspection stations are likely to experience last minute traffic jams at their doors just prior to the April 15 deadline unless car owners move without delay to secure inspections.

"Under the provisions of the law," Garrison added, "Texas Highway Patrolmen will be instructed to begin issuing tickets on April 16 to operators of vehicles which do not bear a 1956 inspection sticker."

John Will Vance Owns Mystery Farm No. 47

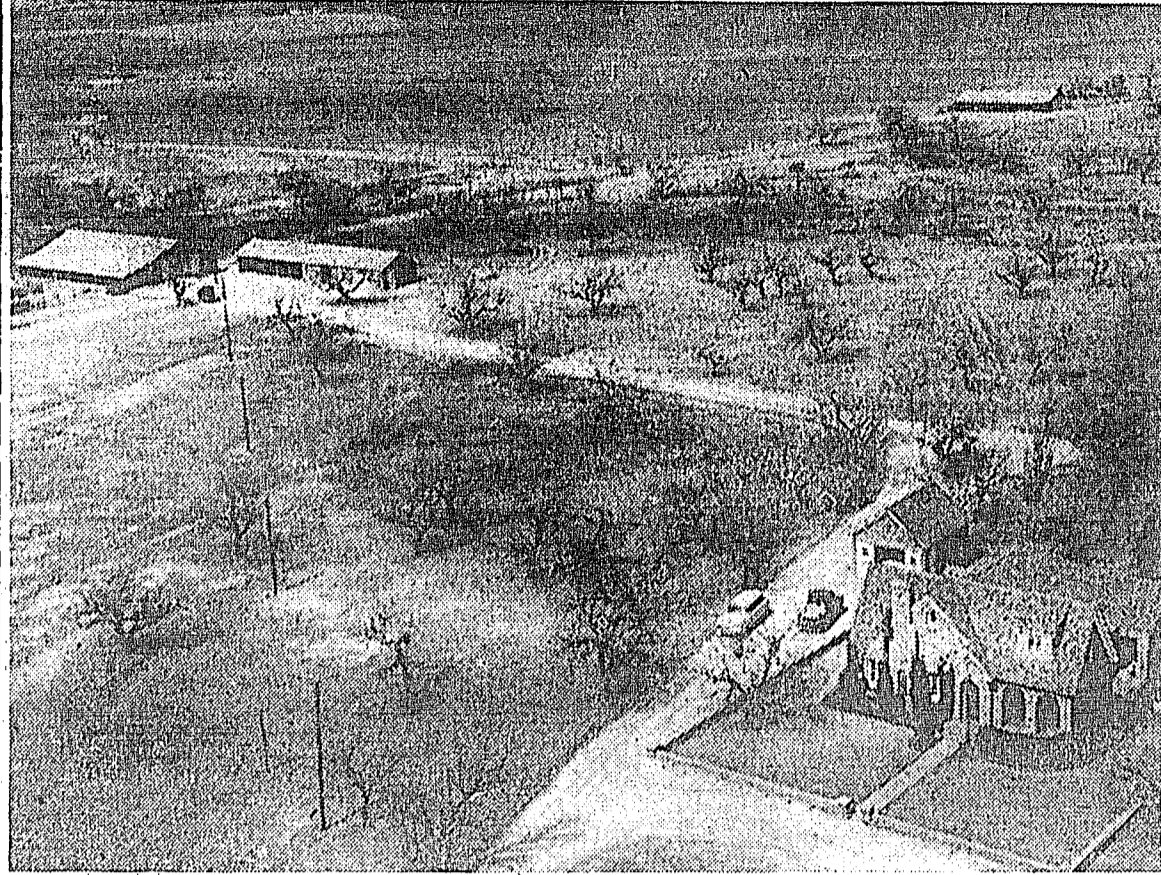
Mr. and Mrs. John Will Vance own and operate Mystery Farm No. 47, as appeared in The Santa Anna News last week. The farm, known as the Vance Golden Hoof Farm, is located about 12 miles southwest of Santa Anna.

Mr. Vance has owned the farm since 1925 and has lived on the farm since 1929. He and his father, M. W. Vance, leased the land long before it was fenced and he has worked on and with land since that time. Starting in about 1916 they started putting land in cultivation and now he is working about 800 acres of cultivated land and about 350 acres of pasture land. The farm was purchased from the M. W. John Estate.

Vance built his present home in 1937 and his barns were rebuilt in 1945 out of brick tile. He has eight large stock tanks on the place. He was one of the first in the county to do any terracing and all his cultivated land is terraced and he practices contouring on his pasture land. Mr. Vance said he had complied with most all farm programs since they began back in the early thirties.

Mr. Vance has a long record of dealing in the Hereford Cattle business. He said he started in 1921 and has enjoyed it all through the years. His start was with 10 Horned Herefords and he raised them until he purchased his first Polled Hereford from Jim and Faye Gill in 1949. Since that time no Horned Herefords have been born on his place. Soon after he got in the business he started to raising his own replacements and has been doing it every since. He said he had about eight head of Horned Hereford cows and would replace them within the next year or two. All his cattle are registered stock and he has a

ready market for all he can produce. At present he runs a herd of 50 mother cows. He owns a half-interest in one well-known registered bull with the Gills now and recently sold a half-interest in another bull to the president of the Texas Polled Hereford Association, Henry Arledge of Seymour, Texas. This bull, known as VGHF Domestic Mischief 97th, took first place in the senior bull class at both the Fort Worth and San Antonio livestock shows this year. A number of other Vance Golden Hoof Farm bulls have taken high places in major shows over the country during recent years.

Mr. Vance's father got the community of Shields started. In 1906 he built a gin there and was instrumental in getting a post office, blacksmith shop and general store there. Later he helped in getting the school

system and churches started. L. L. Shield of Santa Anna put in the general mercantile store and the post office was located in his store, hence the origin of the name of the town. The post office was closed and later it was re-applied for and was granted, this time under the name of Shields. The post office there has been closed again.

In 1944 the Vances conducted a sort of contest among a large number of their friends, asking them to suggest a name for their farm. The name "Vance Golden Hoof Farm" was suggested by two parties and after considering all the names very carefully, Mr. and Mrs. Vance selected this name. When the name was selected, they held open house for all their friends and some 300 attended.

Mr. and Mrs. Vance were married in Coleman in 1940. Mrs. Vance is the former Miss Chrystene Trowbridge and was raised in Floyd County. At the time of their marriage she was the Home Demonstration Agent for the county. Mr. Vance has a son, by a previous marriage, Kenneth is now living in New Mexico and ranching there. He graduated from Tarleton State College and attended Southwest State Teachers College, but left school to go into military service. After leaving the service he married last April and moved to New

Mexico. The Vances also run about 300 head of purebred Corriedale sheep. He said they do not run as many sheep now as they had in the past.

Last month Mr. Vance sold seven head of registered cows in Ontario, Canada. This was the first he had ever sold outside the United States, although he has sold cattle in most every state in the union. These were sold as a result of some of his entries in the Fort Worth show and they were purchased sight unseen. He said this does not happen very often.

In discussing his farming operations, Mr. Vance said he raises crops that will furnish grazing and feed for his cattle. At present he has about 300 acres in grain, 125 acres in sudan and is putting 100 acres in clover this week. He has some cotton allotment and rents this land out each year. So far as he is personally concerned, he has not raised any cotton in the past several years.

Mr. Vance prefers wheat and oats and under normal conditions plants early in the fall in order to have winter grazing for his Herefords. He attempts to keep grazing the year round. He usually keeps some of his Herefords on feed all the time, getting them ready for sale and for shows. He keeps his lamb

crop each year and feeds them out in the winter for the spring market.

Mr. Vance plans to put about 200 acres of cultivated land in blue panic this year for temporary pasture.

He mixes his own rations by purchasing his proteins and mixing with oats and milo he raises.

Asked about quoting him on something, he said for a long range farm program the proposed Soil Bank Program sounds good to him, from what he knows about it at the present time. As stated before, he attempts to comply with all farm legislation and keeps well posted on all matters pertaining to farmers.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Background Scripture: Luke 17:20-21; 21:25-36

Devotional Reading: Romans 8:28-30

Jesus on History

Lesson for March 11, 1956

HALF way through a movie you may see people getting up and walking out. That does not necessarily mean they are disgusted with the picture. It's just that they came in right there in the first show. "This is where we came in," they say, and they don't care to see the second half of the film twice. (Query, by the way: Is a movie, or a book, that isn't worth seeing or reading twice, worth seeing at all?) In ancient times, the learned Greeks thought that history was like a motion picture, shown over and over again. Dr. Foreman, if a man lived long enough he could see history repeat itself, they thought. The diagram which to the Greek mind best represented history would be a circle. Fly, moth or man, going around in circles will never get anywhere. History, the Greeks thought, is like that. It moves, but it never gets anywhere.

History Goes Somewhere

The Bible's view of history is a different one. History is more like a straight line than a circle. "Straight" line is too simple. If you will read the book of Judges in the Old Testament you will find a line of history that goes uphill and down in dizzy succession. But crooked or straight, it is a line going somewhere. On a circle, you pass a given point. Now, after you have passed that point, are you getting farther away from it as you move, or are you getting nearer? The answer is both, of course. Now if history is a kind of circle, then if you ask the question: Are we getting farther away from barbarism, is the world getting better at all? The answer will have to be: It doesn't make any difference. We are farther from that period of barbarism through which we last passed; but we are getting closer to the next period

of barbarism. History, bad and good, will repeat itself. Now the Bible, and Jesus especially, have a different view. The world is moving away from a past that will never happen again. It is moving, we are moving, toward a future that has not yet happened and will happen only once. The course of history is not like a toy airplane that buzzes around and around, captive on a wire; but like a real plane that soars swiftly to its distant port.

History Keeps Going

Human history will have an end, so far as this earth is concerned, some day. (Of course no human being's final destiny would be ended even if the whole human race were destroyed by H-bombs. But we are talking about history on this green planet.) But it is a mistake, as Jesus pointed out, to jump to the conclusion that we are living in history's last chapter. "The end will not be at once," he said. Many times men and women have been sure they knew the end of the world was at hand; but they have always been mistaken. There is a theological seminary which was built by contributions from the churches which it serves. But there were some churches back when the seminary was built, that would not contribute. The end of the world is too close, they said, to be wasting money on brick buildings. It is never wise to refuse to build for tomorrow, for it is never wise to assume there isn't going to be a tomorrow. History is going somewhere; but it will not reach its destination "in nothing flat."

The Goal of History

Where is history going? The Christian answer is: Toward the reign of the Lord Jesus over all mankind. Jesus taught his disciples to look forward to one event above all others: his coming again. Now the Christian church from earliest times has had various ideas about how and when Christ's Coming will be, and what it will mean in detail. But surely no Christian can accept seriously the idea that history just goes on and on, a line that has no direction and no end. God and evil are in conflict; must we believe that this war will never end? On the contrary, Christians are united in believing that what Christ bade us hope for will come true, and indeed many Christians believe that it is beginning to come true now; namely, that God in his own time will bring our time to an end, that soon or late as we count it, but surely, the Son of Man, in power and glory, will be Lord of all.

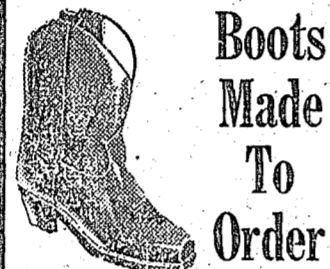
