Mrs. Minnie Alexander, teacher for the Santa Anna Colored School, announced this week they would hold open house Sunday, March 25 between the hours of 3 and 5 p. m. in honor of their new school, which was completed recently. The 15 students moved into the school on Thursday, March 8 and they seem well pleased with their new building.

No Connection With Safety Inspection And License Plates

There is no connection between the purchase of automobile license tags and the safety inspection of passenger vehicles, Executive Director G. C. Morris of the Highway Safety Council of Texas reminded motorists today.

"One reported reason for the delay of some motorists in having their automobiles inspected this year seems to be a misunderstanding about new license plates and safety inspection stickers, being issued together," Morris said. "There is no connection whatsoever."

Deadline for purchase of 1956 license plates is April 1, Morris pointed out, and the inspection deadline is April 15.

"It is not necessary," he added, "to show any certificate of inspection to secure license plates."

Morris reported that the Highway Safety Council's continuing check of authorized inspection stations indicated that inspections had increased rapidly during the first two weeks of March but, he added, "any motorist who waits until April for the safety inspection will face a long waiting line."

Local Sorority To Contribute To Handicapped Home

On January 8, 1956 District VII of Texas State Epsilon Sigma Alpha voted to contribute to the Handicapped Children's Treatment Center for their District Project. District VII is composed of two chapters in San Angelo, two in Stephenville, two in Brownwood and one each in Santa Anna, Coleman, DeLeon, Brady, Ozona and Comanche.

The Handicapped Children's Treatment Center is located in San Angelo and was opened on January 1, 1952, after several years of careful study as to the needs and type.

The staff of the center is composed of all the needed specialists along with a number of volunteer workers. Since the beginning 141 children have been examined by the staff. All children needing treatment are referred to the center by medical doctors in this area. At present there are 52 children under treatment. Approximately 62 physical therapy treatments are given per week and 22 speech therapy treatments are given weekly. It is to be noted that only pre-school speech therapy is given unless the public school does not offer this. The center is open five full days a week for physical therapy and three mornings a week for speech therapy.

The committee appointed by District VII, president, Margaret Pautler, is composed of Neil Starnes of Coleman, Margaret Green and Aileen Kent of San Angelo. This committee thoroughly checked the needs of the center and after their report asked that each chapter in the district contribute \$100.00 to the center by January, 1957.

Final On March of Dimes Is \$1224.56

Final tabulation on the Santa Anna March of Dimes drive shows a total of \$1224.56 raised here. The fund was increased \$8.80 over the weekend when the Delta Omicron Sorority turned in this amount that was raised among its members.

One-half of this amount will be sent to the National Headquarters in New York City, for research and the other one-half will remain in the local bank for treatment of local patients.

Measles Reach Epidemic Stage

Dr. William Tryon, City Health Officer, said Wednesday the measles in Santa Anna had reached the epidemic stage and he advised all parents to be especially watchful of their children.

Dr. Tryon said parents should keep their children at home any time they discovered the children had red or watery eyes or the least bit of fever. That is a good sign they may be taking the measles.

The doctor also said parents should keep the children at home for seven (7) days after all the rash has disappeared.

When an epidemic is declared because of contagious diseases, the students absent from school because of this disease, are not counted off the Average Daily Attendance, which is so vital in the Santa Anna Schools.

Dr. Tryon urged parents to be especially watchful of their children and advised them to be sure and keep them at home seven days after the rash is gone.

Background Scripture: Luke 23:1-56
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 53

Christ Suffered

Lesson for March 25, 1954

WHENEVER we ask, Why? about anything that happens, we can mean the question in either one of two ways. Sometimes we mean both. Perhaps we mean to ask, "What were the events that led up to this one? What were the causes or forces back of this event, pushing it, so to speak, out of the Not-Yet into the Now-and-Here?" Or perhaps we mean to ask, "For what purpose did this event take place? If it was a means to an end, what was the end? Did any man, or did God, have a purpose in bringing this event to pass?"

If we ask, Why did Christ suffer? We can mean it in the first way mentioned just now. In that case, the answer is very easy to see, or the answers rather, for there was no one reason why he was crucified. Jesus suffered because Pilate was a coward; if the governor had stood up for what he knew was right, Jesus might have been saved from an unjust sentence. Jesus suffered because the Pharisees were jealous and had found no other way of getting rid of their most troublesome critic. He suffered because he was courageous; if Christ himself had been timid, he could have avoided Calvary simply by keeping quiet and leaving the country.

He Died for Our Sins
All such reasons it is the business of history to ferret out, and it is of some importance to know them. But the other question is not so easy. No historian, as a historian, can see it. Only the eye of faith, (which may indeed belong to historians too) can see the great pattern into which this dreadful event fits, this dreadful event of the death by torture of the best person who ever walked this earth. We could not have guessed it. We need God's Word to tell us what

it means. What purpose did God have in mind? What was Jesus' own intention? We know what Jesus said the night before, to his disciples as he gave them the cup: This, he said, was the cup of the New Covenant, "in my blood," poured out "for you." We know what he had said months before (Mark 10:45), that he came to "give his life a ransom for many." Now the Bible tells of a Christ who was totally, from his soul's core, at one with God the Father. What Christ intended, God intended. Christ's death was for a purpose which God had had (as the Bible expresses it) from before the foundation of the world. It was not for his own sake, it was for the sake of his friends. Even more, it was for many who were not his friends. "While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us," Paul says (Rom. 5:8). "He is the expiation for our sins, and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world," John says (1 John 2:2).

How Can This Be?

Many people fight shy of this great truth. Sometimes they are slow to believe it just because it seems too much to believe. Here I am, a single human being on a small planet. Would the Creator of the Universe actually go - not to trouble only, but to agony and defeat, for my sake? Well, if a person thinks that way, we must admit to him that it is indeed a miracle, the greatest conceivable. But there is another reason why people are shy about believing that Christ could have died for our sins, for anybody's sin. How can one man's suffering atone for another man's sins? There are two answers to that, which are part of one answer. One is that Christ was not just a man, he was the Godman, "God-made-man." The other is that he identified himself with sinners, with the worst and weakest, the race of man.

His Death Was in Character

Jesus' death at Calvary was not out of line with his life. If there he "took the rap for sinners" as Dr. Hordern puts it, this was not a new and sudden shift in his life-purpose. From the beginning of his service in this world he had been so closely identified with sinning men that he was called in scorn "friend of sinners" and indeed at last executed as a criminal. No wonder Paul can say, "He who knew no sin was made to be sin for us." Yet this remains all over our heads unless we too identify our own selves with him. To say, "He is the Savior of the world" is not enough. The final step is to discover, "He is my Savior. For He took my place."

New Highway Travel Map Is Ready

Austin — The new 1956 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map is now available. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced in Austin today.

The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information on Texas, Greer said. Most of the topographical relief was removed from the map last year so that more essential information can be read easily and quickly. The growth of the Texas Highway System at the rate of about 3,000 miles a year has made it necessary to gradually remove some of the less important information to make room for the increased mileage, he said.

In addition to the highways and the mileages between various points, the Travel Map shows state parks with recreational facilities, historical state parks, roadside parks, altitudes, and the Highway Travel Information Bureaus. The pictorial side of the map features scenes of general interest both to Texans and out-of-state tourists, with every section of the state represented.

The Austin office of the Highway Department, the 25 district offices, and the seven Travel In-

formation Bureaus near the state's borders all have maps available for distribution. Special map cards for requesting a map may be obtained at the tax collector's office when license plates are purchased.
