## Valedictorian



WESS WISE

President and Valedictorian of the Senior Class is Wess Wise, pictured above holding a statuette presented him by the Santa Anna Lions Club last week for his accomplishments this year. During his four years of high school Wess has brought lots of honors to himself and to the Santa Anna schools.

His most recent accomplishment is the winning of the Star Lone Star Farmer Degree of Area IV, Texas FFA, which was presented him last Friday in Stephenville. Wess missed a part of the Senior Trip in order to participate in this area contest. This degree is based on a supervised farm program while taking Vocational Agriculture for three years and four years in FFA work. He will go to the state meet at Austin June 4, 5, 6, and 7 to compete for the Star Lone Star Farmer of Texas. If he wins here, it will mean he has the best records of any FFA member in the state and his chances are excellent for this degree.

An average grade of 95.43 for four years in high school is excellent, but Wess has also served his class as president all four years, participated in a large number of activities other than his actual school work. Following as an article appearing in the current issue of the Progressive Farmer, concerning young Mr. Wise:

Hottest young lamb feeder to hit the Texas show circuit in many years is Wess Wise, 18, of Rockwood in Coleman County. He has racked up championship records probably never equaled in the state.

In his four years as a member of the Santa Anna FFA Chapter, he has won 22 championship banners, 13 reserves, and 220 place ribbons—most of them in the last two years.

Wess is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wise and was brought up on the family stock farm. He fed nine lambs his first year, 25 the second, 35 the third, and 50 the fourth. Prize money won by this farm boy's lambs has totaled \$2,371. Sale of lambs has totaled \$9,393.27.

Biggest single price was \$2,000 at Houston this year for his grand champion lamb. What he hasn't paid out in expenses or invested in his flock of 55 breeding ewes, he still has in the bank.

Four-H and FFA feeders all over Texas have marveled at him and asked how he does it. Some of his success, no doubt, is due to a natural way with livestock. But most of it comes from hard, steady work; planning; and careful attention to details.

Wess boils it down to four major points: regularity in time schedule, exercise, good sanitation, and good feed.

With help of his vocational agriculture teacher, A. D. Pettit, he chooses good lambs to begin with. They pick lambs with good conformation and an alert look—no "deadhead" lambs. They like to know the fleshing qualities of the sire and dam, where possible. Wess raises many of his own lambs and also buys some.

He works out his lambs like he worked out for the football team while he was captain. He has a fenced, 350-yard alley around a small grain patch. The

lamb walk a lap around it before the morning feeding and again before afternoon feeding. Exercise hardens the flesh, makes for a bigger leg, gives better appetite, and prevents early loss of bloom. It puts lambs in good condition to stand long hours in big classes.

After exercise, the lambs go into their feeding pens. Wess gives them just 30 minutes to clean up the feed. Then he turns them in to the milk goats.

Some boys let their lambs take milk before they go to the feed. Wess believes in feeding them first.

Average is two lambs or more per milk goat. He had rather short them than let them have too much milk, for it puts a soft finish on them.

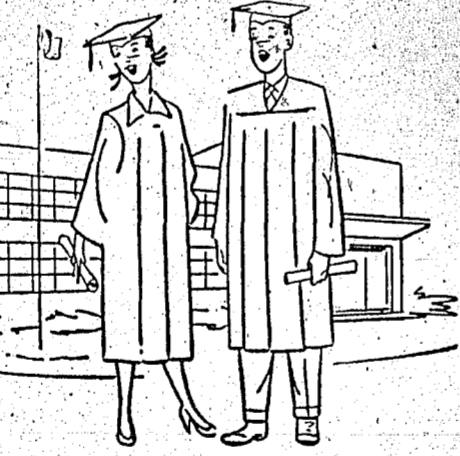

**CHECKING THE MEDITERRANEAN FRUIT FLY**

The Texas citrus industry recently had a big scare when it was learned a new citrus pest, the Mediterranean Fruit Fly, had left its European home and arrived in Florida.

The insect was first discovered in backyard orchards around the Miami, Florida airport in April.

However, commercial fruit growing areas in Florida are believed still to be free of infection. And what's more important, the Mediterranean Fruit Fly hasn't found its way westward to Texas citrus regions.

Protective measures are already underway to prevent the citrus pest from getting a foothold in America. Some 2,500 fruit fly traps have been shipped from

Texas to Florida in the past few weeks. In addition eight insect specialists from the Rio Grande Valley will aid entomologists in stamping out the Florida infestation.

A federal quarantine on the Mediterranean Fruit Fly became effective May 1 and all Florida citrus coming to Texas will be carefully checked to safeguard Valley growers.

This new-found citrus foe is probably the most serious insect ever to threaten our citrus industry. Its consequences are much more harmful even than those of the black fly now being combatted in the Rio Grande Valley.

No official quarantine action has been taken to date by the Texas Department of Agriculture. However, should some difficulty arise in the federal eradication program, it is likely that some restriction on interstate movement might be established.

**USDA LISTS JUNE PLENTIFUL FOODS**

College Station — Milk and other dairy products top the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list for June.

Beef is the only red meat on the list in contrast to recent months when meats dominated the plentiful listings.

High protein-content foods in heavy supply for June include canned tuna in oil, peanuts, peanut butter, and dry beans.

With stocks more than double a year ago, canned red cherries are still in heavy supply. Also, frozen cherry stocks are large.

Fresh grapefruit of excellent quality remains plentiful, since movement in recent months was less than expected. Latest survey shows that 10.6 million boxes are still to be sold—about 2 million boxes in excess of last year.

Onion supplies will be exceptionally heavy in June, since marketing of the early spring crop overlaps that of the late spring crop.

More rice is available than expected because exports ran lower than estimated.





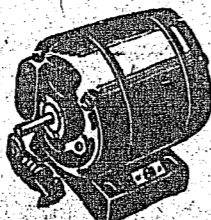

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**AGENT'S ACTS  
BIND PRINCIPAL**

Suppose that you hire your neighbor's teen age son, Jimmy, to cut your grass, and he runs your new mower into another neighbor's hedge. The hedge is ruined. Are you responsible for the damages? Quite likely you are.

Or let us suppose that you find you need a loaf of bread for the evening meal. You ask a friend to take your car and run to the store for it. On the way, he runs down old Mr. Peabody, seriously injuring him. Can you be held responsible? It is possible that you can.

In both instances, an "agent" was acting for you. His acts while performing those duties are, in the eyes of the law, your acts. In legal terms, you are the "principal".

You may be liable despite the fact that you may have cautioned him to be extremely careful.

The average individual expects to answer for his own actions. He does not usually consider that he may be responsible for the actions of other persons. That, however, is frequently the case.

Suppose you ask another person to do something for you, that is, to act as your agent. You may pay him, or he may be doing it without compensation.

You may ask him to buy or sell property for you. Or, his responsibility may be to negotiate an agreement for you with a third person.

If representations or warranties are made by your agent in performing the task which you

assigned to him, you are responsible.

In a like manner, you are responsible for the contracts made by him while he was acting for you.

You may be held responsible for the acts of a person who customarily represents you even though he entered into a contract for you without your consent or approval.

For example, you may have a partner in a business, and you and he have agreed that certain contracts shall be made only upon the signature of both of you.

Unknown to you and without your consent, your partner signs such a contract with a third person involving partnership business. If the person with whom this contract is made has no knowledge of the terms of your partnership agreement, you are responsible for the contract which your partner has made.

You may have agreed between you that neither of you would buy, without the other's consent, any items of merchandise costing more than \$50. You did not give this information to salesmen who called on you. In your absence on a Thursday afternoon, your partner ordered merchandise for your store costing more than the \$50 limit.

When the merchandise is delivered, you can not refuse to accept it because you can be bound by the contract of your partner. This is true in many situations, and the salesman is not bound by your partnership agreement because you did not advise him of the \$50 limitation.

As the actions of your agent are considered to be your actions, you assume the responsibility of his doing them correctly.

Background Scripture: Acts 12:23-16:35  
Devotional Reading: Isaiah 40:7-12

**Sending Spirit**

Lesson for May 27, 1956

IF THE Descending Spirit is the story of the second chapter of Acts, the thirteenth tells part of the story of the Sending Spirit. People may be very much interested in the Descending Spirit but not enough in the Sending Spirit. People today like Simon of Samaria in golden times, want the Holy Spirit to descend into their hearts—but for the wrong reasons, sometimes.

We want the Spirit to help us do what we want to do, to accomplish our plans, to Dr. Foreman make us persuasive and popular personalities. But the Spirit of God, although everybody's aid, is nobody's aide. The aide to a general is just the General's right arm, his tongue—whatever the General wants done, the aide is there, to see it done. The Holy Spirit is no aide!

**God Can Break Up Good Plans**  
The church at Antioch was going strong when the Holy Spirit broke into their plans. We don't know how the Spirit spoke to them, nor how they were sure it was the Spirit. But one thing is pretty certain; they must have had plans which the Sending Spirit broke up. Barnabas and Saul were what we would call today Associate Pastors of that big city congregation. They had been together there only a year, and that is a short pastorate. Very likely Saul and Barnabas both, along with the church, had plans of one kind and another about—good plans, evangelistic, sacrificial. But the Spirit said No. The Spirit had other plans. The church must set aside Barnabas and Saul, cut them off from their growing, successful work in the First Church of Antioch, and send them out as missionaries. They must go to parts unknown, to places not nearly so important as Antioch, to the backwoods per-



haps. They must go out and endanger their lives, far from the peaceful busy streets of Antioch. The Holy Spirit has often come to men in disturbing ways. He often breaks up our best plans. The thing to remember is, that God knows better than we do. God's Spirit never breaks up a good plan unless it is for the sake of his better one.

**The Spirit Through the Church**

The way the Spirit operated there in Antioch is instructive. The Spirit called Saul and Barnabas; also the Spirit spoke to the church. The command was given: Separate Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them. And the church obediently "laid its hands on" these two leaders and sent them out. The Sending Spirit often works in this way. Most missionaries today are selected and sent out by mission boards of some kind. The boards will not, if they know it, send any one to a mission field who has no sense of being called by the Spirit. But on the other hand, even if a young man feels the Spirit has called him, if in the Board's judgment he will not make a good missionary, they will not accept and send him. This is all in the wisdom of God. It gives a missionary today, and it gave Saul and Barnabas back yonder, a strong "lift" to know that the church is backing them up, praying for them, wishing them well, ready to send reinforcements if they fall by the way-side. Sometimes the only way a call of the Spirit comes to a man or woman is through the church. Older Christians ought to realize their responsibilities here.

**The Church Through Men**

God does not call all men to be missionaries. But he does call every Christian man, woman and child to be missionary. That is, missionary in heart and purpose. The church that is not sending and supporting missionaries, directly or indirectly, by themselves or through a board of missions, the church that is not out there on the firing line through its representatives, the church that doesn't even know there is a firing line, the church that spends all its money and all its interest on itself—such a church is not even a cousin of the kind of church we read of in the early days, like the Church at Antioch. The selfish congregation is contributing to the death of the church; the sending church is contributing to its life—its own and the life of the Christian fellowship around the world.

Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that state-wide examinations would be given late in June and that successful candidates will be selected to begin training in September to fill the remaining original vacancies authorized by the last Legislature when the Patrol strength was increased by 200 men.

The Public Safety Director invited all young men who are interested in a career of law enforcement to make application as early as possible. He pointed out that they must be between 21 and 35 years of age, inclusive; have a high school education, or equivalent; be at least 5 feet 8 inches in height; and weight must be in proportion to height.

Garrison also emphasized that applicants must have been residents of Texas for at least a year prior to the date of examination and they must be of good moral character and in perfect physical condition and able to withstand a rigid character investigation.

Rookie patrolmen are paid during training, Garrison said. Also provided is two weeks paid vacation annually; sick leave, if necessary; and the benefits of both the State Retirement Act and Federal Social Security. Applications may be obtained by writing to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin; or by visiting the nearest Patrol District Office.

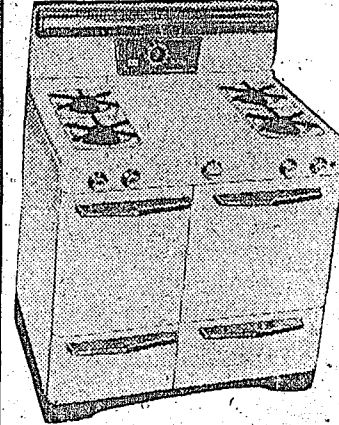

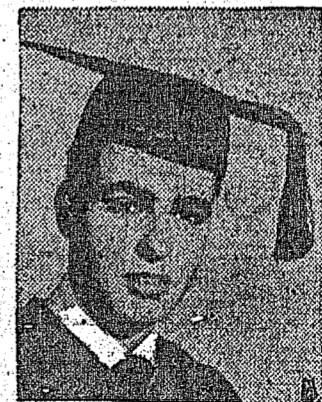

### State Health Dept. Recommends Three Polio Vaccine Shots

Austin — Many inquiries are received each day by the Texas State Department of Health regarding Salk polio vaccine. One injection is of some value but should be followed in four weeks with the second shot and the third seven months to a year later.

Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health, says the second shot is important and definitely increases the immunity. Even though the second cannot be given for several months, the delay does not lessen the value of the first. Maximum immunity does not develop until after the third shot.

It is advisable to immunize children who have had poliomyelitis because an attack confers immunity only against the one virus type involved and gives no protection against the other two types.

The Salk vaccine is of no value in treating the disease. It should not be used for prophylaxis in family contacts of diagnosed cases, the reason for this being that the remaining members of the family usually are infected with the virus by the time the original case develops symptoms of the disease. The vaccine should not be given to individuals during a major illness or to those with symptoms that may represent early polio, such as fever, sore throat or stomach upset.

Dr. Holle says that immunization should be given before the peak of the season if possible but can be given throughout the summer. Second injections can be given even when incidence is rising with very little risk. The risk, if any, is less than the risk of acquiring the disease in un-

### Fisher Says Outlook For Mohair Excellent This Year

Mohair is taking no back seat in the agricultural picture these days. Congressman O. C. Fisher reports that for the third year in a row mohair production has increased. And last year saw the price go up by 14 percent over 1954.

The total clip last year was 16.9 million pounds, which was 16 percent above 1954. That accounted for a recovery of about half of the 45 percent decline from the high of 1945.

A total of 2,983,000 were shorn last year, and the average weight per fleece was 2.7 pounds, a tenth of a pound more than the previous year, according to a Department of Agriculture release.

Texas production, which accounted for 91 percent of the goats clipped and 97 percent of mohair produced, increased by 17 percent.

Price-wise, growers averaged 82.2 cents per pound, 9.8 cents above the 1954 clip. The increase probably reflects stronger world demand, according to the Department.

Thus, with both production and price looking up, the value of mohair sales last year totaled \$13.9 million, an increase of nearly one-third from 1954.

"A lot of ranchmen in the Hill Country look to mohair as their most dependable cash crop these days", Congressman Fisher commented, "and 1956 looks like another good year."

They will serve free ice cream to all who visit the store on Saturday. All the specials they advertised last week in The News will be good on Saturday and all through next week.

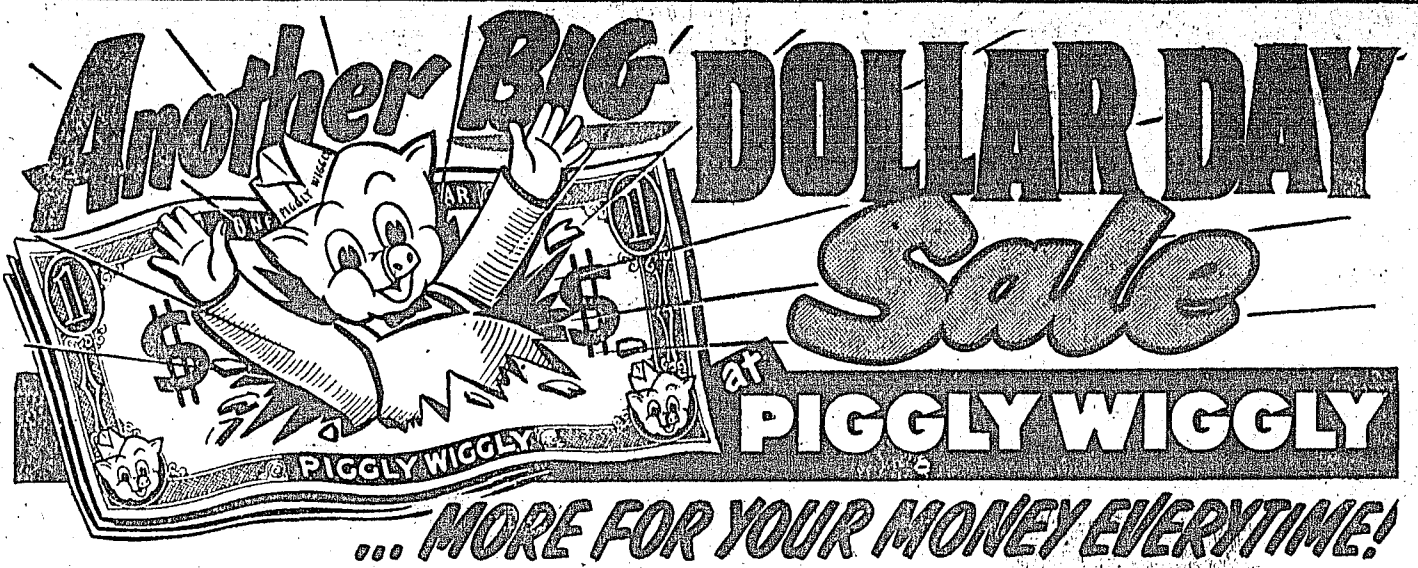
### Two Names Add To Political List

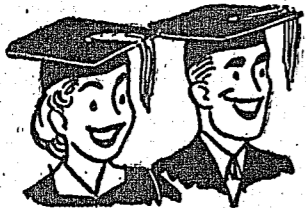

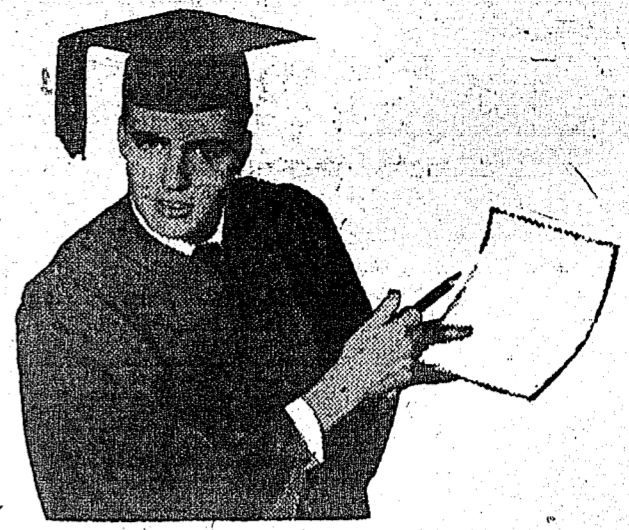

Recently he was married to Lois Ware of Menard, Texas. He plans to attend Howard Payne College after graduation and also plans to work in San Angelo while attending college.

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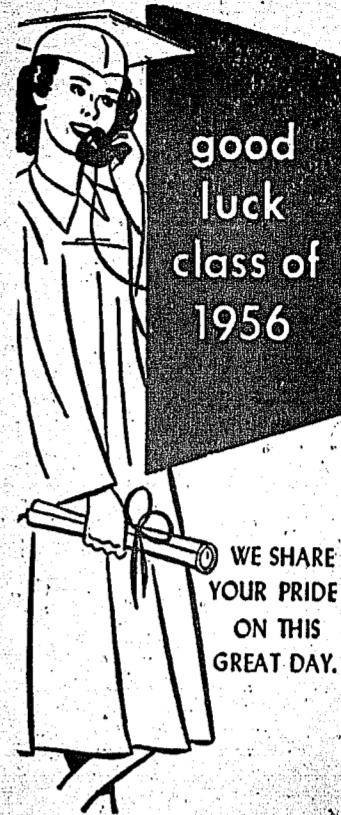

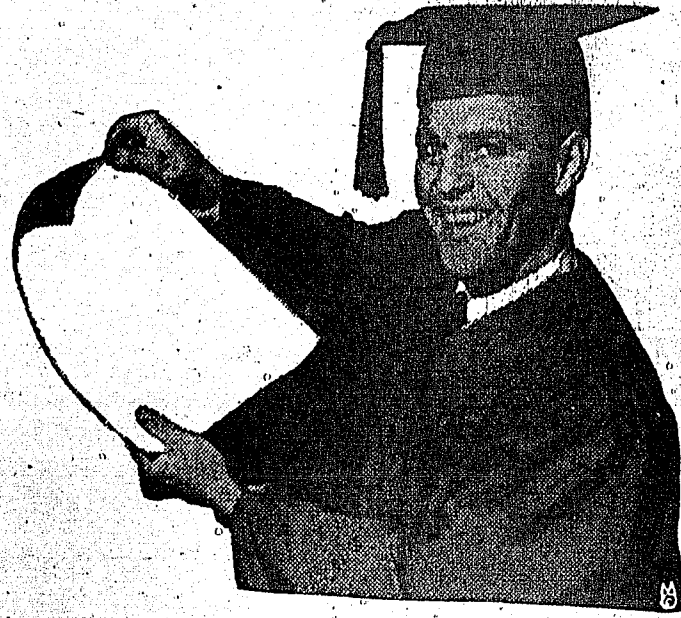
As yet she doesn't have any

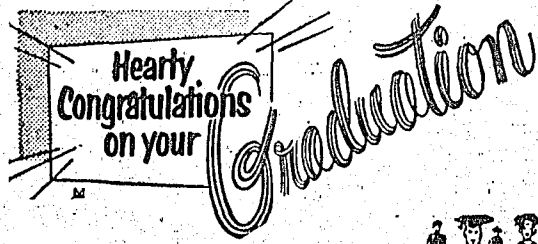
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### Individual Histories Of Senior Class

Willene has lived in Santa Anna and attended school here all her life.

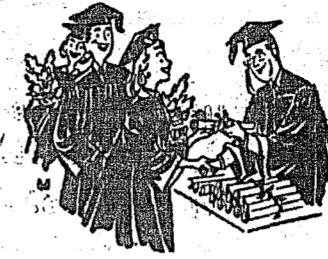

Superior, Huron, Michigan, Erie and Ontario are the five Great Lakes.



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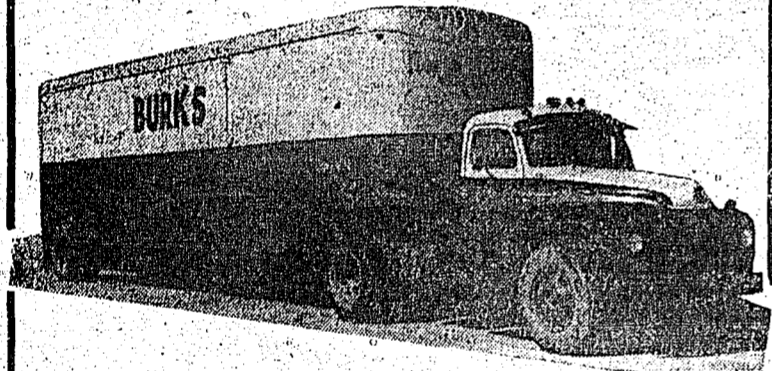

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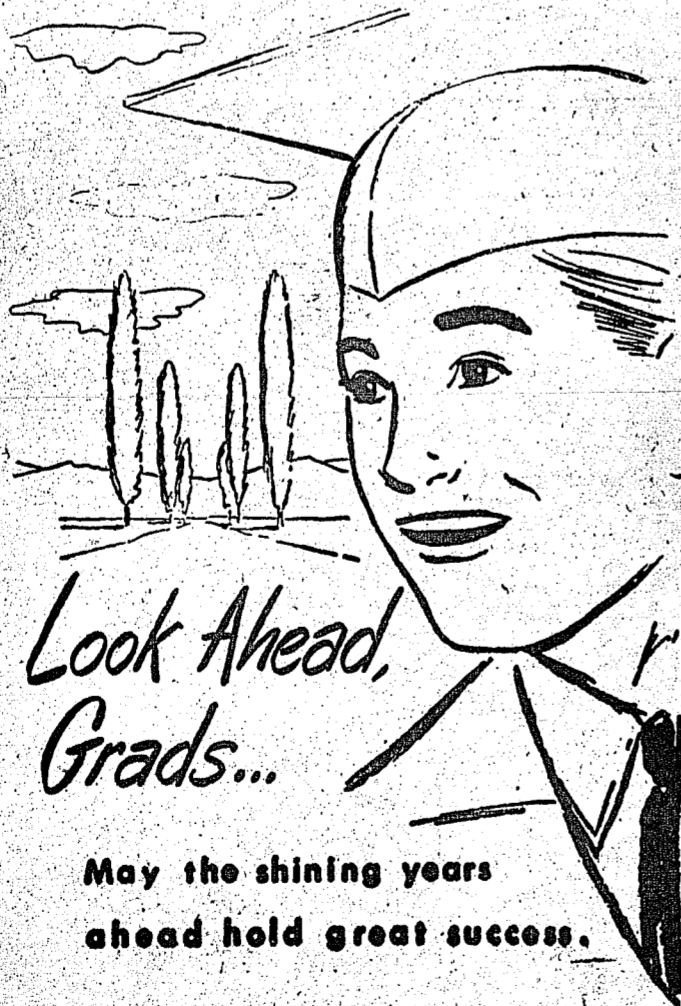
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
