The Coleman County 4-H Clubs, assisted by the County Home Demonstration Clubs are sponsoring a "Friendship For Korea" drive in the county. All money and other items contributed will be loaded on a ship at Houston and Jack Sloan, a Texas A & M College student, will accompany the ship to Korea.

Farm Housing Program Reactivated

Walter T. McKay, State Director of Farmers Home Administration announced today that eligible farmers in Texas may obtain farm housing loans from the Agency. Funds for the loans were recently made available by a supplemental appropriation.

Applications for these loans may be made immediately at any of the 135 county offices of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas, Mr. McKay said. Regulations for processing the loans have been distributed to all field offices.

Farm housing loans may be made for the construction and repair of farm houses and other farm buildings, including farmstead water supplies. Interest on the loans will be 4 percent on the unpaid principal. Repayments may be scheduled over periods up to 33 years. The loans will be secured by a mortgage on the borrower's farm.

Building plans and specifications for the improvement to be financed with the farm housing loan will be obtained by the applicant. Farmers Home Administration will review the plans and inspect construction as it progresses to assist the borrower in obtaining construction that meets generally accepted standards of soundness.

The local county FHA committee determines the eligibility of applicants for farm housing loans. To be eligible, Mr. McKay explained, an applicant must be the owner of a farm, be unable to obtain suitable credit for dwellings and other buildings from other lenders, and have enough farm income or income from the farm and other sources to meet family living and farm operating expenses and repay his debts.

The farm housing loans are made under the authority of Title V of the Housing Act of 1949, as amended. In Texas 1,165 farm housing loans have been made for a total of \$6,726,135; \$1,996,299 of this amount has been repaid. In addition, interest collected through December 31, 1955 totalled \$864,030.

The supplemental appropriation Act which was signed by President Eisenhower May 19 made \$5,000,000 available for farm housing loans. At present no additional funds are authorized after June 30, 1956. Mr. McKay stated that the Farmers Home Administration also extends credit for farm housing under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, as amended.

Watson Held Sunday

Funeral services were held at the Northside Church of Christ on Sunday, May 27, at 2:00 p. m. for C. F. Watson, who died in the Coleman Old Folks Home at 11:30 on Friday night, May 25th.

Mr. Watson had been in the home about three years and had been bedfast for four months.

Services were conducted by Bill Talley, minister of the church.

Mr. Watson was born in Grayson County on February 24, 1872, being 84 years, three months and one day old at the time of death. He had been a resident of Coleman County for 53 years, living most of the time in the Shields Community, where he was a farmer.

In 1895 he was married to Stella Roberta Erving, who predeceased him in death.

Mr. Watson, because of a crippled condition and poor eye sight, had not been very active for a number of years.

He is survived by three sons, Elmer and Jimmy of Santa Anna and Leonard of Ft. Stockton. Eleven grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren also survive. One daughter predeceased him in death.

Grandsons were pallbearers. Burial was in the Rockwood Cemetery, beside his wife, with Wright's Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

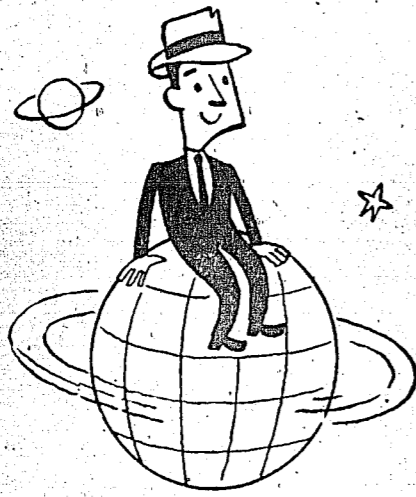

Highway Contract Goes To Brownwood Concern On FM Road.

A contract for the construction of bridges and approaches on Farm to Market Roads 585, 586 and 581 in Brown, Coleman and Lampasas Counties was awarded in Austin this week, Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood, has announced. The firm of Holland Page, submitted the low bid of \$69,398.37 on the project which runs from between US 67 and FM Road 1850 near Brownwood, at 0.6 mile south of US 67 near Valera and at 1.8 miles southwest of Lometa.

Resident Engineer B. R. Russell of Brownwood will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 75 days to complete.

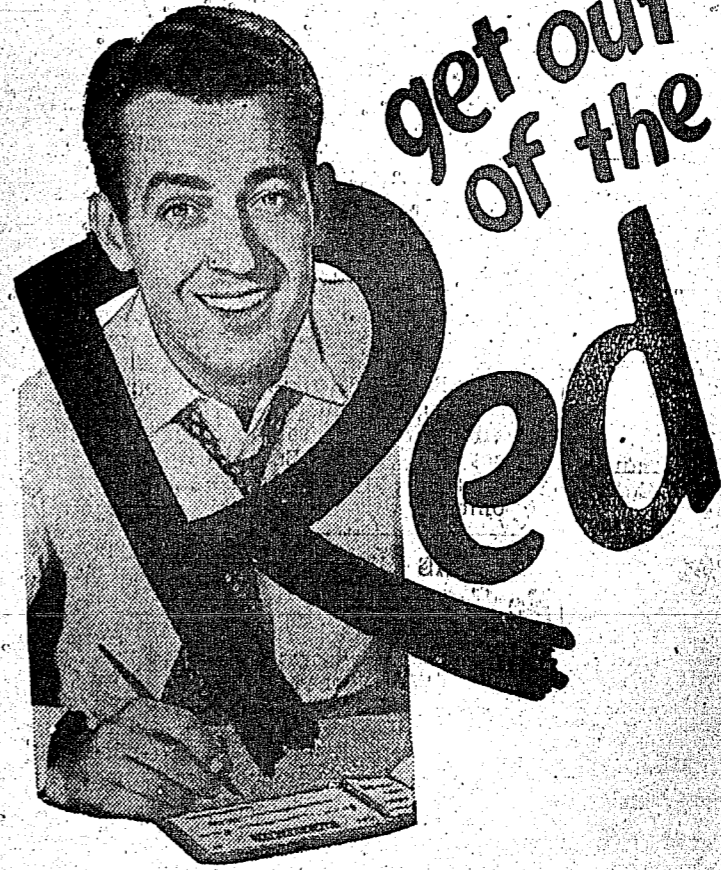

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Will Wilson Making Campaign For State Attorney General



WILL WILSON

Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson has resigned his post on the State's highest tribunal to launch a fighting campaign for Attorney General of Texas. His resignation was made effective June 1.

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duty for me today is to serve the people of Texas as their Attorney General," Wilson said.

"With a career as Dallas' racket-busting district attorney, followed by six years on the Supreme Court, Wilson said he left the court "with reluctance." However he surprised few Capitol observers in responding to the challenge to serve as Texas' number one law enforcement officer.

"I have been asked why I am willing to leave the Supreme Court," Wilson commented. "Like the old cavalry general, I've always believed in riding straight for the sound of the guns.

"Certainly I know that I am deliberately turning my back on the security of a quiet harbor and certainly the course we will steer lies through troubled waters. But that's where the need is greatest.

"Texas' greatest need today is vigorous enforcement of our Texas laws. I believe I can serve Texas best in filling that need."

Most seasoned observers agree that Judge Wilson would have been re-elected without opposition to the Supreme Court. Both of his colleagues up for re-election are unopposed.

"I cannot remain on the Supreme Court while I campaign for Attorney General," he said.

On the issue of corruption in Texas government, Wilson's statement was quick and clear-cut.

"We're way past that as an issue. The only issue today is who is best qualified to clean it up."

I believe my record as two-time assistant attorney general, prosecuting district attorney and supreme court associate justice qualify me to do the job."

Wilson was elected to the Court in 1950 by a heavy majority. He is one of the youngest men ever to serve on the high bench. While District Attorney he gained national recognition in stamping out organized crime in Dallas.

Selected by U. S. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath as one of the five district attorneys in the United States to speak before the Department of Justice's Conference on Organized Crime in Washington, in 1950, Wilson was commended as one of the outstanding prosecutors of crime in the nation.

As assistant Attorney General

of Texas under Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers in 1941-42, Wilson successfully prosecuted cases involving millions of dollars for Texas school children.

Wilson served in World War II in combat throughout the South Pacific in army campaigns ranging from New Guinea to Luzon and was decorated for patrol activity behind enemy lines.

Born forty-four years ago in Dallas, Wilson received a Bachelor of Science degree in geology in 1934 and was graduated from Southern Methodist University Law School with the top record in his class.

Married and the father of two children, he and Mrs. Wilson live at 2201 Stamford Lane in Austin.



Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

A Kerrville Housewife inquires: "Just what is meant by 'interposition', is it legal, and has it ever been practiced before?"

Interposition is a form of orderly, lawful resistance to encroachment upon basic rights; is usually employed by states in opposition to federal encroachment upon rights and sovereignty reserved to them by the Constitution.

Regardless of whether its employment at a given time is desirable or illadvised, the fact remains that interposition is a legitimate democratic process.

It is nothing new. Indeed, it was strongly advocated by Jefferson, who joined with Madison in 1798 in preparing resolutions for the legislatures of Kentucky and Virginia which declared that the Federal Government exceeded its constitutional authority.

It was the duty of the states to "interpose their authority".

Interposition was first — and successfully — asserted by the State of Georgia against a decision rendered by the Supreme Court in 1793. The result was the adoption of the 11th amendment to the Constitution, which established the right that the Georgia interposition had contended for.

This Doctrine of Resistance to abuses and encroachments has been given new life and meaning in recent years because of a succession of rather strange decisions handed down by the Supreme Court gnawing at the rights reserved to the states in the 10th amendment. Were Jefferson alive today he would undoubtedly be a fiery defender of the right on the part of states to invoke interposition.

Indeed, it is said that in the last 20 years the Supreme Court has reversed more established Constitutional constructions than were changed by that Court in all the preceding years of its history. And mostly at the expense of Constitutional states' rights.

A recent Supreme Court doctrine of pre-emption — holding that a state law is invalid if there is a different federal law on the same subject (even though the states have a constitutional right to legislate on the matter), is giving rise to deep concern on the part of Jeffersonian states' righters.

Just last week Idaho's attorney general, Grayson W. Smith, speaking for the National Association of Attorneys General, called for legislation to outlaw that theory of pre-emption, ex-

cept when expressly stated in the law. Thus, he and his associates are employing a form of interposition in resistance to that line of alleged judicial abuses.

"If the theory of pre-emption is not curtailed by Congress", warned Graydon, "local and state government activities and jurisdiction may become so limited that all laws and all enforcement of laws, whether criminal or civil in nature, will emanate from Washington."

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union
Society School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Acts 15:36-41
Devotional Reading: Acts 17:22-31

To the West
Lesson for June 3, 1956

IN PAUL'S vision at Troas, his night visitor did not say, "Come over into Europe and help us." He only said, "Macedonia." In fact, the word Europe does not occur in the story at all. Paul and his contemporaries were not conscious of moving from one continent to another when they set sail for Macedonia. Nevertheless it was a notable move. The Christian church was moving west, and it has never stopped permanently at any frontier. The little party that took Dr. Foreman



ship for Samothracia was only one of countless groups of Christians westward bound. This was the first step in a great march. The Gospel was carried into every country in Europe, then into the Americas. Here in North America, as the settlers moved inland, westward and ever westward, as the frontier moved across the land the church moved with it. Sometimes the church itself did the pioneering, as the Roman church did in California or the Protestants in Oregon.

Moving and Changing
Pea vines and people often change when transplanted to a different soil and climate. So it is with the church. The church at Antioch was different from the church in Jerusalem, and the church at Corinth was still different and by the time the church reached Rome and settled there, more changes could be seen. Churches in Northern Britain were not just like those of southern Italy. When the church came to America, there were further changes. To this day, a Presbyterian church in this country will be in many ways unlike the church of the same name in Scotland. English Methodists and American Methodists can easily be told apart. A distinguished English Baptist who is now serving in the largest

American Baptist denomination has said in public how hard it was at first for him to feel at home here. Even in the Roman Catholic church priests who have been in America all their lives find some features of European Catholic churches rather strange, and vice versa. In America, too, as the church moved west it changed its ways.

Always the Same

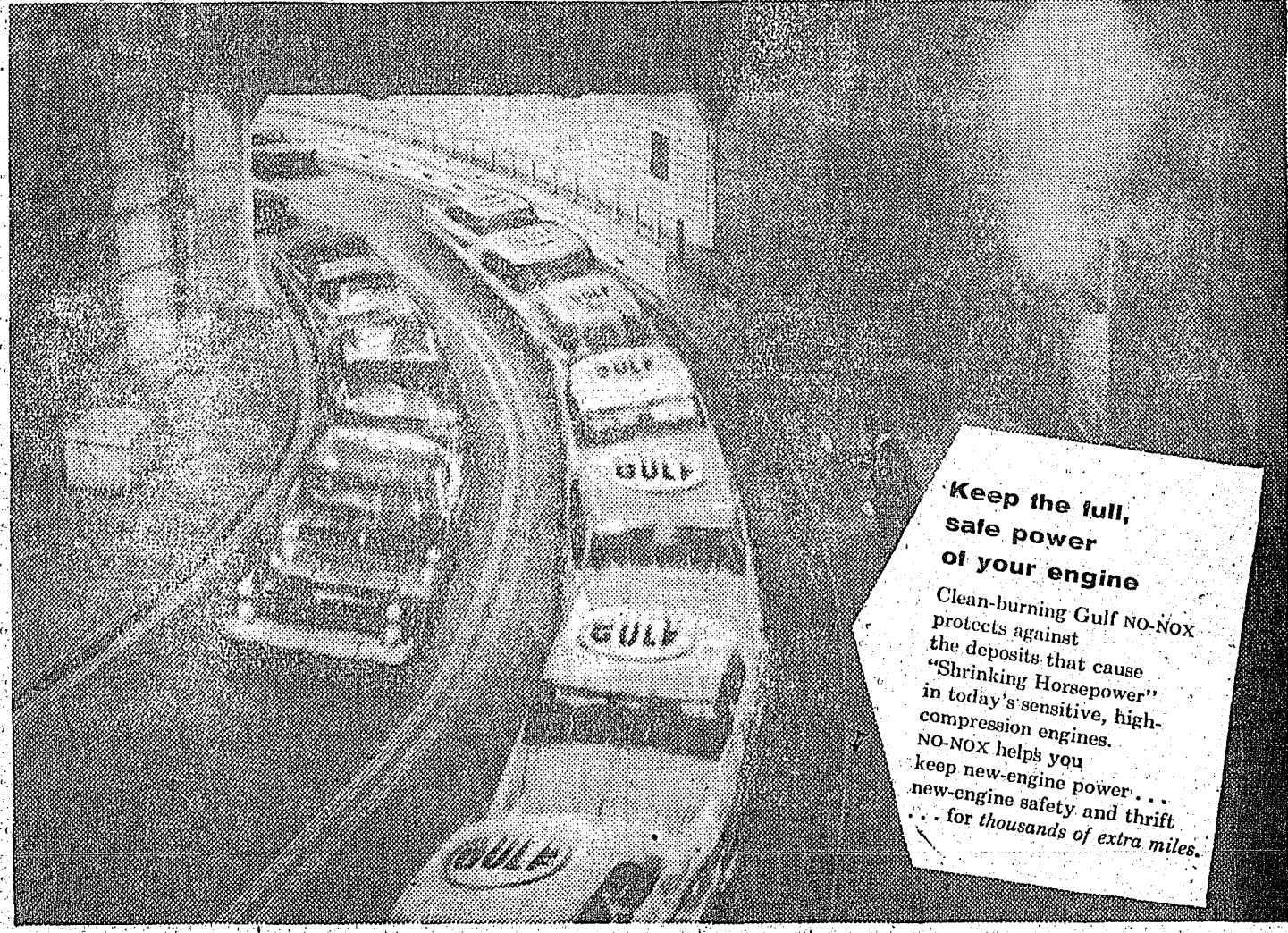
"The more it changes, the more it stays the same," is a French proverb, which might well describe the church of God. It is quite true, the church has gone through many changes as it has moved westward with the years, but at heart, when it has had a heart, it has always been the same. (We say "when it has had a heart," because some churches have lost heart, or lost their heart, grown cold and died.) It would be quite a shock for a member of any American church east or west to walk into a meeting of the church at Corinth in St. Paul's time. It would be just as puzzling for a Corinthian to enter any American church—a great cathedral in New York or a country church forty miles from anywhere; neither one would be like his Corinthian meeting. But the heart of the church is the same. In Corinth, Kansas City or the Kentucky hills, wherever people are gathered together who love the Lord Jesus, who adore Him as Son of God and know Him as their Saviour, wherever those who love Christ are united to serve mankind in His name, there is the Christian church at worship and at work. Languages and forms differ, but the spirit of Christ is always the same.

Frontiers of the Future

When the church reached the eastern edge of the Pacific Ocean, had it come to the last frontier? Is there anywhere else to go? Of course there is. Beyond the Pacific are two vast continents. The Christian church has been so busy stretching westward that it has all but forgotten the "East"—which now is literally our Far West, Asia, Africa and the islands of the seas are our Christian frontiers, the frontiers of the future, and the church is (if yet only dimly) aware of them. The churches along these frontiers will be different from the churches "back home" as ours are different from Corinth and Jerusalem. But the Spirit will be there; for wherever there are true churches, there Christ lives and works again.

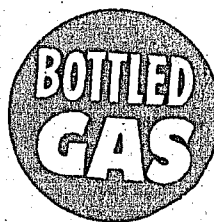

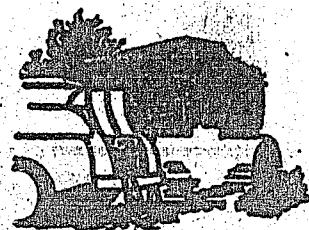

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Farmers To Get Gas Tax Refund Soon

Farmers will soon be able to obtain a refund of the Federal excise tax on gasoline which is used on a farm for farming purposes under a new law. Present Federal tax is 2 cents a gallon.

Sam Hamlett, Internal Revenue Representative, announced today that under the new law first refund payments will be made after June 30 on gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956. Thereafter, refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

To get his refund, a farmer will have to file his claim after June 30 and before October 1. Claims are to be made on Form 2240 and are to be filed with the United States District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. Forms will be available after June 1 at Internal Revenue offices, county agricultural agents, and at some

banks and post offices. Refunds will be limited to the Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business, on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

Hamlett explains that gasoline shall be considered used for farming purposes if it is used:

(1) By the farmer or any other person in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity, including the raising of livestock, poultry, etc., on the farmer's own farm.

(2) By the farmer in the operation, management, conservation, improvement, or maintenance of his farm or its tools or equipment.

(3) By the farmer in handling, drying, packing, grading or storing any agricultural or horticultural commodity in its unmanufactured state, but only if the farmer produced more than one-half of the commodity which he so treated during the period for which the claim is filed.

(4) By the farmer in connection with the planting, cultivating, caring for, or cutting of trees, or the preparation (other than sawing into lumber, chipping or other milling) of trees for market, but only if the planting, etc., is incidental to his farming operation.

No refunds of tax are allowed on gasoline used off the farm, such as gasoline used on public roads or highways in transporting family members or workmen, equipment, livestock, crops, feed, etc. Also, no refunds are allowed for tax on gasoline used in processing, packing, freezing, or canning operations.

Farmers are also given special relief from the Federal excise tax on diesel fuel and special motor fuels used on a farm for farming purposes.

"Farmers who expect to file claims should keep sufficient records to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed," Hamlett cautioned.
