## National Guard To Leave For Camp Sunday

Tank Company, 142nd Infantry Regiment, our local company of the Texas National Guard, will leave their home station on Sunday morning, June 17 at 8:00 o'clock for North Fort Hood, Texas, to participate in summer field training with the 36th Infantry Division. The summer training program will be for two weeks with the Guardsmen returning home on July 1.

Lt. Billy Joe Harvey, Commander of the company, stated that the training period this year promises to be a good one. The company has several new men that haven't been to summer camp before, and this field training period gives the company an opportunity to give the new men training it would be impossible to give them otherwise. The company will spend the first week of the encampment firing Calliber 30 Machine guns and the 90mm guns, both from tanks. On Saturday of the first week, the entire 36th Division will be on parade and will be reviewed by Gov. Allan Shivers. The second week of the encampment will be spent in the field, with the men living in simulated battle conditions. This year the company will participate in battle exercises with the entire regiment and the individual battalions of the regiment. The summer field training each year is the high point of the National Guard, training further qualifying National Guardsmen as "Guardians of the Peace".

**AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS**

Now that millions of people are taking their summer vacations and driving about the country, automobile accidents are occurring with increasing frequency. When involved in an accident, it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do.

It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. **Stop!** Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. **Render Aid.** If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) or an ambulance or both. (4) **Do Not** move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. **Protect the Scene from Further Damage.** You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. **Call an Officer.** Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. **Gather Information - Write it Down.** Don't trust your memory. Don't guess - be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver - and he must do the same.

6. **Be Careful What You Say.** Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. **See Your Doctor** if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.

8. **Consult Your Lawyer Immediately.** The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from witnesses while their memories are fresh, and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interviews or

statements to investigators or adjustors for the other side.

9. **Inform Your Insurance Company Promptly.** Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. **Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety.** This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceed \$25.00.

An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Dept., Highway Patrol, or State Department of Public Safety.

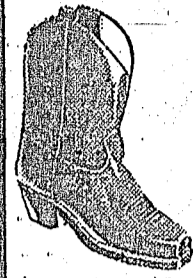

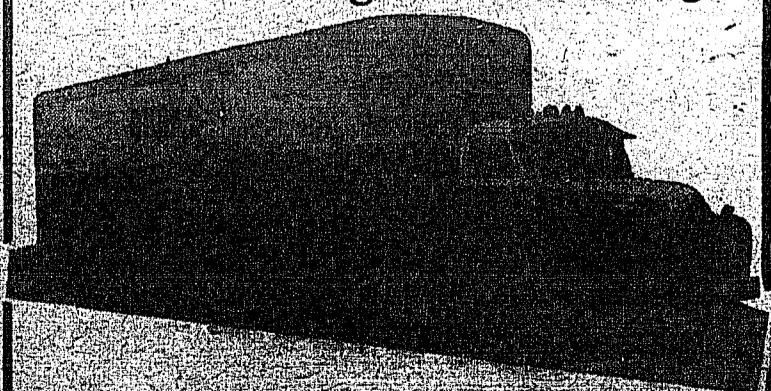

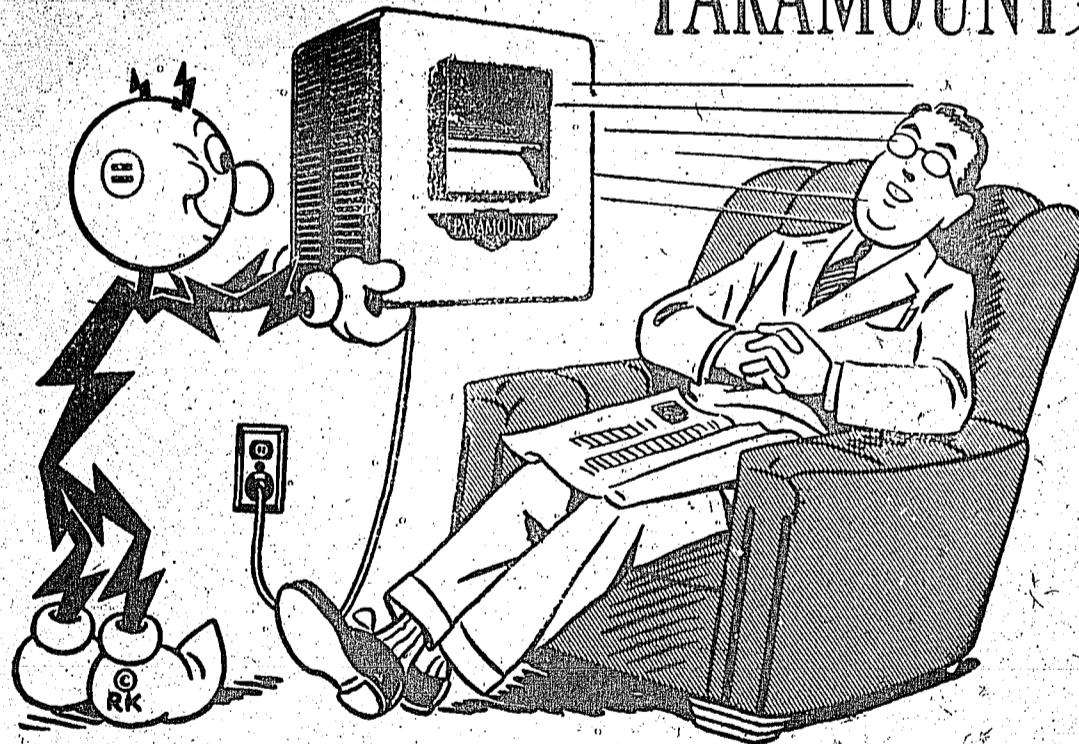

**Will Wilson Choice  
Of Dallas Attorneys  
For Attorney General**

An indication of how Texas lawyers feel about the race for attorney general is evident in a poll by the Dallas County Bar Association. There the attorneys gave Will Wilson 612 votes with the nearest competitor, Tom Moore, receiving 76.

Two other candidates, Ross Carlton and Curtis Hill, both of Dallas, received 47 and 45 votes respectively.

Wilson, a two-term district attorney of Dallas County, recently resigned as Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas to wage his campaign for Attorney General. While serving as District Attorney of Dallas County, Wilson gained national recognition as a racket-busting official. He was one of five district attorneys in the entire nation, invited to address the national conference on organized crime in Washington in 1950.

If elected, attorney general, Wilson has vowed to enforce the law, "without favor to any individual, organized political group or clique."

Following six years as supreme court justice, Wilson said he left the court "with reluctance." But he surprised few Capitol observers in responding to the challenge to serve as Texas' number-one law enforcement officer. Said Wilson, "Like the old cavalry general, I have always believed in riding straight for the sound of the guns."

Promising to run a clean campaign, Wilson added, "The need for good government in Austin has already been established, it's just a matter of who is going to do it."

**Hammond Says Wage  
And Hour Law Will  
Ruin Agriculture**

Expansion of the wage and hour law into agriculture would turn American farmers into peasants, the president of the Texas Farm Bureau has charged.

J. Waiter Hammond said proposed legislation in Washington is already "a foot in the door" and, if passed, will mean the ruin of free American agriculture.

The state farm leader said bills before the Senate Labor Subcommittee now propose to eliminate: (1) the agricultural exemption on large farms, (2) the agricultural processing exemption, and (3) the exemption for "outside salesmen" and buyers of farm products.

In addition, Hammond asserted, the proposed bill would provide for: (1) another hike in the minimum wage to \$1.25 per hour, (2) payment of time and a half after 35 hours of employment in one week, (3) and payment of overtime in excess of eight hours per day.

"This means," the Farm Bureau leader said, "an increase in the costs of farm labor as well as everything the farmer has to buy to grow his crops. The farmer is already caught in a cost-price squeeze. His prices are down and his costs are up."

Hammond said passage of the bills eliminating exemptions for processing concerns would mean ultimate ruin for farmers.

"The foot is already in the door," he declared. "The inclusion of farm operators under compulsory Social Security laws, is a good example of what can happen. Who knows how long it will be before every farmer, large and small, has to comply with minimum wage and hour laws? When that happens, it will mean that every American farmer will be reduced to peasantry."

Hammond asserted that farmers will not permit a further invasion of their rights by minimum wage and hour laws without a bitter fight.

"We have been pushed around enough," he said. "It's time for us to show the world that we can stand together to protect our rights as decent citizens."



**VA Does Not "Approve" Financing Under Loan Program**

Veterans should not misunderstand a commonly used statement that Veterans Administration "approves" houses to be financed under the GI loan program, VA cautioned today.

VA said use of the word "approves" causes some veterans to believe the home is "approved or guaranteed" by VA.

VA has only the legal authority to appraise the house to make sure the price the veteran pays is not excessive in the housing market prevailing at the time the appraisal is made.

VA makes available an inspection service in most cases on proposed new home to determine whether they conform to plans and specifications on which VA's appraisal is based.

The terms "VA or GI financing" are allowed by VA, but the agency frowns on "GI or VA approved" since it gives veterans an erroneous impression.

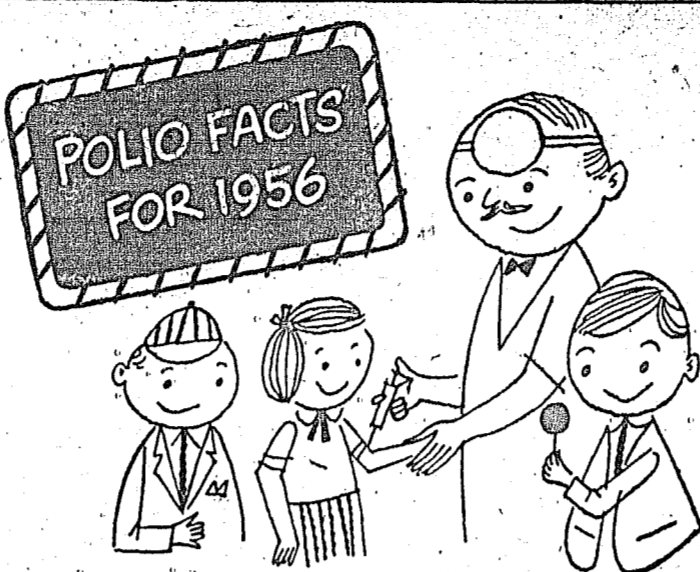

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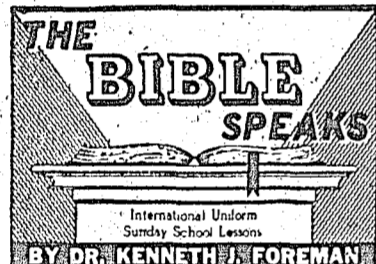

VERY few readers of this column have any chance of being appointed as the ambassador of the United States to any important foreign country. It isn't that you are not good enough. You are not rich enough. Ambassadors are expected to live in a high style. (Did you ever inquire what just one pair of striped pants, made to order, would cost you?) They are not expected to live on the salary the United States pays them. They have to live in mansions for which the mere housekeeping bill is enormous, they have to give parties and dinners costing more than you earn in a month.

### God's ill-housed ambassador

Strange as it seems, the ambassadors of God are not usually looked after in such sumptuous style. They always have housing, of a sort; but it is seldom palatial. Indeed one of them wrote, "If we have food and clothing, with these we shall be content." Nothing said about housing. One of the very greatest of God's ambassadors to this world suffered from something quite a bit worse than leaky roofs or lack of plumbing. If the Apostle Paul were to visit our town today, even people outside the church would want to have him put up at the best hotel in town, or entertained at the finest homes. Paul sometimes got this sort of treatment, but a great deal of the time, indeed for years on end, he would be actually in jail. Not only that, but he would have to wear chains on his arms and legs as if he were a member of a chain-gang. Strange to say, too, this did not make Paul unhappy or bitter. After two solid years of that sort of thing, some men might be willing to quit. But not Paul. Standing before a king, his hands weighted down so that it was hard to move, Paul said, "I would to

God you were just as I am—except for these chains." He would not wish his chains on anybody; but otherwise he knew he was better off than a king, for he was still the ambassador of God. There is no higher place.

### Spokesman for God

We must not blame God for the poor treatment his ambassadors receive. It is not his fault. But God's men understand this. Paul understood it, and went on speaking for God wherever he was. Some Christians might think that if Providence had dumped them in jail they could be expected to take a vacation from witnessing to their faith. But Paul knew that there never is a real vacation from being a Christian. There have been some peculiar characters appointed as ambassadors now and then by human governments; but no emperor, king or senate ever appointed a dumb man, to represent his country. There was a great convention of Christian business men in Louisville, Kentucky, last winter. Three of these men were on their way afterwards to the airport in a taxi. What would you have done in their places? The convention was over, business and families were expecting you home. No time, no place, for Christian work in a taxi, surely? But these men did see it that way. They talked to the driver, found he was not a Christian. Never mind the plane, they said, just drive us to your own home. There they talked with him, prayed with him, and he gave his heart to Christ. They missed the plane, but do you think they regretted it?

### The chains still rattle

Actual iron chains do still imprison some of God's people. There are parts of the world where it is almost a crime merely to be a Christian. But even where that is not true, the men and women who represent God have to work against many kinds of handicaps. Sometimes it is only being thought peculiar, or superstitious. Sometimes it is having to work under a government which is unfriendly to religion, as is the case in some mission fields. Sometimes it is some local "industry" which is vicious and powerful and will strike back at any person, or group, religious or otherwise, that threatens to cut down their profits. Sometimes these invisible chains muzzle the mouth of a minister whose people will not let him speak up for his own Christian ideals. Well, chains may hold back God's kingdom; but they will never stop it!
