Ernest Wright, Jr. Killed In Auto Crash at El Paso

Ernest Wright, Jr., 25, son of Mrs. Bessie Ingram, formerly of Santa Anna, was killed instantly about midnight Wednesday, June 13, when the car in which he was riding crashed into the rear of a large truck, smashed into a utility pole and turned over.

Wright was riding in a car with another Ft. Bliss soldier, James H. Teague, of Kilgore.

An eye witness account of the accident said Teague's car was traveling about 90 miles per hour when it struck the rear wheels of a truck-tractor, traveled 56 feet before hitting the utility pole, turned over and skidded 87 feet before coming to rest near Hondo Pass, north of Restlawn Cemetery in El Paso. The truck was not damaged but the car was a complete loss.

Wright was taken to an El Paso hospital and pronounced dead on arrival. Teague died 2 hours and 45 minutes later.

Wright enlisted in the Army when he was 17 years of age and had served in Germany and Korea. He had been stationed at El Paso since April of this year. He is a grandson of John Simmons. Immediate survivors are his mother, Mrs. Ingram of San Angelo, his father, Ernest Wright, thought to live in San Antonio, and one sister, Mrs. Doris Carlson of San Angelo.

He was buried in Local Saturday afternoon. San Angelo relatives attending the services were Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Cullins and family, their daughter, Mrs. Elmer Ralstin of Fort Worth, Mrs. Maurice Gassiot of Gouldbusk, and Mr. John Simmons.

Wading Pool Opens Monday With Good Attendance

The third of the projects of the Santa Anna Recreation Program got underway Monday with the opening of the municipal wading pool, which is located one block east of the Presbyterian Church, directly behind the Santa Anna Church of Christ.

About 40 splashing youngsters enjoyed the water and nearly as many adults were on hand to look on and plan improvements for the area.

Mrs. Olin Horton is chairman of the project, with Mrs. Billy Joe Harvey as co-chairman. A huge amount of work has been necessary to clean and repair the pool and to clear the lot of weeds and trash.

Among those contributing labor and materials have been Jay McCoy, E. E. McClintock, Bill French, Billy Joe Harvey, Olin Horton, Earl Irick, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Cullen Perry, Mrs. John Gregg, Freddie Walker, Eugene White, Bobby Bible, Cliff Herndon, Mr. and Mrs. Kirby Barton, Claude Hodges and others.

The committee especially wishes to thank J. Y. Brannan, who lent his equipment and donated sand and labor. The pool will be open each Monday and Friday this summer, from 4 to 6 p. m. A supervisor named by the committee will be on hand at all times the pool is open. Mrs. Harvey being in charge for this week. Teen-age girls also will be in the pool to help with the children; those assisting Monday were Ellen Lewis, Janice Smith and Darlene Mercer.

Dr. William Tryon, city health officer, has ruled that each child must step into a mild disinfectant before entering the pool and that children with a scratch or skin injury should not be in the water. The committee has ruled that no child may enter the pool unless an adult responsible for them is present. Age limits for the pool are from the Fourth Grade students and under.

The wading pool was built about 1936, by a committee of civic-minded women, headed by the late Mrs. John R. Banister. The city donated the land and is donating the water, which will be fresh on each day of use. Plans were discussed for the erection of an awning over a part of the pool and seating space, if money is available. The other projects of the Recreation Committee are the two supervised playgrounds, where ball games, jacks, badminton, rope-jumping, checkers and other activities may be enjoyed, and the swimming class at the Coleman Swimming Pool, which currently has nearly 50 boys enrolled.

It is hoped that these, with the Quarterback Club program will provide entertainment and recreation for all children in the Santa Anna area. Contributions to the program have been received during the past week from Ray Owen Service Station, Talley Service Station, Abernathy Service Station, Truck Harbor and Charlie Evans.

Two Units Need Men For Tour Of Duty In Europe

Two Army "Gyroscope" units, scheduled for future service in Europe, will accept direct enlistments of young men from this area who have not had prior military service, it was announced by M/Sgt. Willis Carlton.

The 498th Engineer Battalion, now stationed at Fort Ord, California, and the 534th Field Artillery Battalion, now at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, are the new "Gyroscope" units named under the Army's rotation plan of replacing units overseas with like units from the United States.

Departure date for Europe for the 534th Field Artillery Battalion will be February 1957, when it replaces the 290th Field Artillery Battalion. In April 1957, the 498th Engineer Battalion will fill the vacancy of the 54th Engineer Battalion.

"This is an excellent opportunity to see Europe and choose your branch of service, as well as being assured of serving in the same unit with friends and buddies throughout a complete enlistment," Sgt. Carlton pointed out.

Applications for enlistment in the 534th Field Artillery Battalion must be completed before July 15, while openings in the 498th Engineer Battalion will be accepted until September 15.

College Station — Feature foods for the month of July are listed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as broilers and ice cream. Production of both is expected to reach record highs during the month.

The total list includes more than a dozen foods. Cantaloupes and watermelons are expected to dominate the fresh produce markets along with fresh summer vegetables. Movement from the area of heavy production is stepping up and supplies increasing, say the marketing experts.

Fresh and processed lemons and limes are the only fruits listed on the July plentiful list.

Milk production is still running far ahead of last year and all dairy products are just about as abundant this month as last.

Turkeys, canned cranberry sauce, peanut butter, canned tuna in oil and pinto beans round out the list for the Southwestern area.

For family picnics and weekend outings, you can't beat a menu made up of foods which are now in heavy supply — fried or barbecued chicken, fresh vegetables, iced watermelon or cantaloupes plus dairy products.

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

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

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
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Allene Jones Marries In Austin Saturday

Hammond Asks Texas Senators To Check On Gas Increase

Waco — (Sp1) — The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has asked Texas Senators Johnson and Daniel to investigate the possibility of collusion on the part of oil companies in a recent gasoline price increase to farmers.

In messages to the Senators, J. Walter Hammond said discriminatory gasoline price increase to farmers could eliminate the benefits of the federal tax exemption recently passed by Congress. The state farm leader said oil companies have recently hiked the price of gasoline one-half cent per gallon to the farm and ranch trade only. Heretofore, the "tank wagon" delivery price had been the same to all, he said.

"Farmers are of the opinion," Hammond said, "that this increase is a flagrant discrimination against the farm and ranch trade and appears to be a deliberate attempt to take away some of the benefits farmers would receive from the recent tax refund law."

Hammond asked the Texas Senators to "Please investigate the possibility of collusion on the part of oil companies to divert all or part of this refund into their own treasuries." He said that if there is collusion, it "could completely nullify the intention of Congress to refund federal taxes paid on gasoline used in tractors and stationary engines on the farm."

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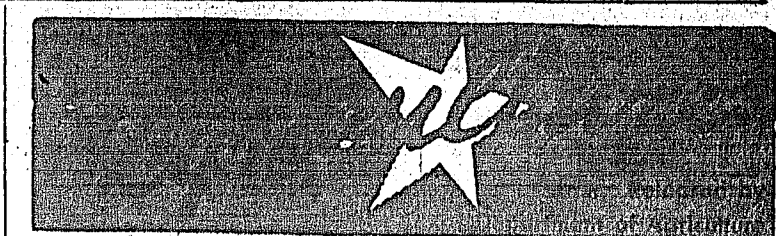

SEVEN STEPS TO INSECT CONTROL

Texas farmers may be living in the modern era, but many of his problems are as old as history.

And about this time each year, the farmer starts his ageless battle with a familiar enemy—crop pests.

Fortunately, the chemical industry can furnish effective implements in this unending war. But their real utility is no better than the way they are used.

Chemical control of insects—and weeds—can be a boom or a bust, depending upon methods and time of application. Just as irrigation can be wasteful or beneficial, so can crop spraying or dusting.

It will be to the Texas farmer's advantage to follow an organized method of crop treatment for the best insect control. The best plan will be to contact your county agent and study the seven-step program as set up by the Texas Extension Service.

Much effectiveness of spraying or dusting is nullified by poor timing. Treatment on a "Guess Basis" often catches harmful insects in the pupa stage when insecticides and pesticides have little or no effect. It may also do away with some of the useful type insects.

The seven-step program varies over the state but each area of Texas has a definite plan set up according to local climatic and insect conditions. This type of spraying assures the farmer of getting the most benefit out of money spent for insect control.

Although most insect infestations are expected to be approximately "normal" this year, one pest stands out as a threat in near plague proportions—the grasshopper. This spring the state and federal governments are carrying out an all-out fight against hoppers on range lands of the Panhandle and West Texas. But cultivated land is the farmer's own battlefield. Quick control of this pest can save many thousands of dollars in crops this year.

A word of caution about chemical preparations! Although the chemical industry has taken every precaution to make them safe as possible, some of them can be harmful if misused.

Read and study the manufacturers' recommended measures of use. They are printed on every container—and are meant to be followed.

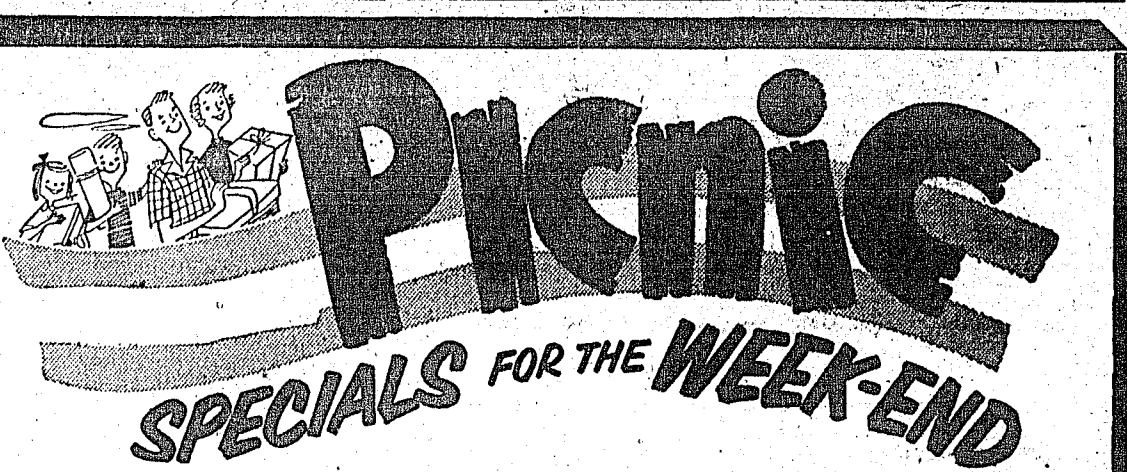

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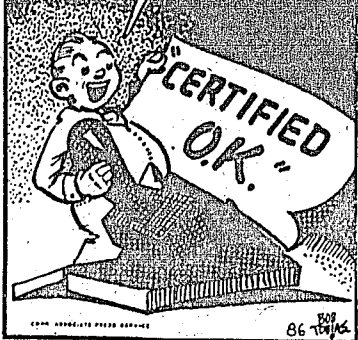

Citizens Urged To Use Common Sense During Summer

When school is out — watch out!

That was the watchword directed to vacationers today by Martin M. Ricker, executive director of the Texas Society for Crippled Children.

Ricker urged "common sense" precautions in a plea to keep the state's children safe while they're out of the classroom and into the out-of-doors.

"Safety rules might be repeated a thousand times over, but every summer hundreds of children become unwilling statistics in the records of those who are crippled," Ricker said. "Perhaps the only way to strike back lies in the hope that repetition will make everyone safety conscious."

"The Texas Society, our state's Easter Seal Society, is vitally concerned with the lasting effects of accidents. Because Easter Seal dollars are spent to rehabilitate handicapped children and adults, and two-fifths of the patients seen in our treatment centers are crippled as the results of accidents, the Society thoroughly believes in the 'ounce of prevention' to reduce the crippling toll."

Ricker's precautions were directed to parents, children and the entire community and included safety measures to be observed in the home, on the highway and out-of-doors.

FOR PARENTS
—Set an example for children. Take advantage of any opportunity to teach safety measures.
—Guard youngest children from crippling or fatal injuries by using common sense protection: Keep guards around stairs, windows and backyard ponds, pools, cisterns or wells.
—Don't let garages become storehouses of death for children. Store poisons such as insecticides, paint removers and thinners safely out of reach. Do the same with fireworks, firearms and other explosives.
—Clean up backyards, removing nails, broken boxes, boards and glass. Make sure clotheslines are strung high. Keep playground equipment in good repair.
—Supervise burning of rubbish and do it on a windless

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

Background Scripture: Acts 17-28.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 67.

Widening Circles
Lesson for June 24, 1956

THE doctor who wrote what we call the book of Acts must have known that his story was not the whole story. He throws his spotlight first on one leader, then on another; occasionally on a whole church. During more than half his book he follows one man, Paul. Luke could not have supposed - for his friend Paul would not have let him make - that a mistake - that the story of Paul was the whole story of the church. But he knew that it is men who make history. Paul was both outstanding, and typical. He was outstanding in that there is no record in the New Testament of any leader as great as he. He was typical in that for him as for others, Christianity is not a quiet stand-still religion; it must move.



est Ecuador. It is safe to say that most of the readers of Life had not heard of the Aucas before. Indeed most American church members had never heard of them. But the point is, some Christians had, and to hear was to want to go and tell them the story of Jesus. Now there are five dead missionaries, and five widows . . . but it is safe to predict that some of these will go back, and others will follow, and one day it will be as safe to live among the Aucas as it is on your own street. You cannot stop the pioneers.

A world religion

Why has the Bible been translated into so many hundreds of languages? Not for fun. They don't first translate the Bible into (say) Mayan, and then start looking for some Mayans to try it on. It is the other way around. First some missionaries go to the Mayans, and they win some to Christ. And then both the missionaries and the new Christians want a Bible in the language of the land, so some one starts to translate it into Mayan, and after some years of hard work there appears a Mayan New Testament. Some day the Old will appear too. Every translation of the Bible is evidence, that missionaries have been at work. If the Christian religion had stayed where it started (it would have died, but let's suppose it lived) there would be no English Bibles, no Latin, no French, only some obscure dialect of Hebrew. The existence of Bibles in English points to the work of missionaries centuries ago who brought not only culture but religion to our wild ancestors.

We talk about the spread of Christianity, and indeed it has spread around the world. But it never spreads any farther at one time than from one person to one person. Drop a stone into a pond and presently the ripples reach every shore. But the first ripple is hardly bigger than the stone. Every road, no matter how long, is made up of very short stretches. Every mile is made of yards, yards are made of inches. You can't cover ten thousand miles without covering every inch of all that distance. A plain church member calling on a neighbor and saying a good word for Jesus Christ may not feel like a "world Christian"; but that is what he is. If the world is ever won for Christ it must be man by man. No less a person than Billy Graham has said that the most effective kind of evangelism in the world is visitation evangelism: one plus one plus one.

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Our WASHINGTON Letter

Political uncertainties, hot weather, explosive legislation, and another step toward adjournment, featured the Washington scene last week.

Those uncertainties grew out of the President's recent illness, giving rise to another round of cloakroom speculation and furnishing a field-day for the political analysts who make a living trying to dress-up their reasoning and make it sound plausible.

One Republican hopeful was heard to say: "Now, after this, if he even has a tooth ache the stockmarket will drop, and so will our chances in November." A discouraged Democrat took a dim political view by observing: "He'll be playing golf in August, wooing the voters in September, getting a clear bill of health in October — and I reckon he'll be racking up the votes in November."

That "explosive" legislation that is brewing includes the housing bill, civil rights, postal increase, school construction aid and a few others. All are before the Rules Committee, the "clearing house" for bills that are permitted to reach the floor of the House. Our nation is blest with a chairman of that Committee, Howard Smith of Va., who has his feet on the ground and is trying to hold the line against crackpot schemes which clamor for programming, separating the good from the bad. But he can do just so much. Too many of our moderates and conservatives jump the traces when the chips are down and go off in every direction.

The housing bill includes \$11 billion worth of socialized housing units, a politically-inspired program whereby Uncle Sam builds houses, rents them at less than half price. It serves as a political bonanza for many big city politicians. Public housing has long since served any legitimate and useful purpose it ever had.

But experience shows that many so-called conservatives are want to throw in the sponge at the last minute and respond supinely to the whip-lash of party leadership. The result: more and more socialized housing, and increased public debt, less chance for tax relief.

You should read Stanley Walker's new book "Home To Texas". I bought a copy the other day and enjoyed it. Walker, a native and present resident of Lampasas County, is a brilliant writer, one of the Nation's best. Every Texan should read this book.
