J. W. Tabor Dies After Long Illness; Buried July 4th

J. W. Tabor died at his home one mile south of Santa Anna at 5:10 p. m. Monday, July 2nd. He had been in failing health for about three years and had recently been in the hospital for 33 days.

Funeral services were held at the North Side Church of Christ on Wednesday, July 4th, at 2 p. m., with Paul Wallace of Coleman, officiating.

He was born near Springfield, Mo., April 23, 1878, being 78 years 2 months and 9 days old at the time of death.

He and his family later moved to what was then the Indian Territory and later they moved from Oklahoma to Coleman County in 1906 and settled on the Starkweather Ranch near Gouldbusk.

He was married to Miss Ethel Ford on December 28, 1910.

To this union three sons were born. One son, Horace Tabor, died at Kilgore June 19, 1955.

His wife and two sons survive him. They are Mrs. J. W. Tabor and Bert of Santa Anna and Eldon Tabor of Brownwood. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Jewel Forgy of Pauls Valley, Okla., and Mrs. Alice Riley of Tishomingo, Okla. and two half brothers, Edd Green and Floyd Brewer of Kilgore. Three grandchildren also survive.

Farmers May Get Refund On Federal Tax On Gasoline

Santa Anna farmers may obtain a refund of the Federal excise tax on gasoline which is used for farming purposes by filing a claim at any time after June 30 and before October 1, 1956, Sam Hamlett, Internal Revenue Service Representative, announced today.

Claims for the present Federal tax rate of 2-cents a gallon are to be made on Form 2240 and should be filed with the U. S. District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. Forms are available in the Brownwood area at the Internal Revenue office, from county agricultural agents, and at some banks and post offices.

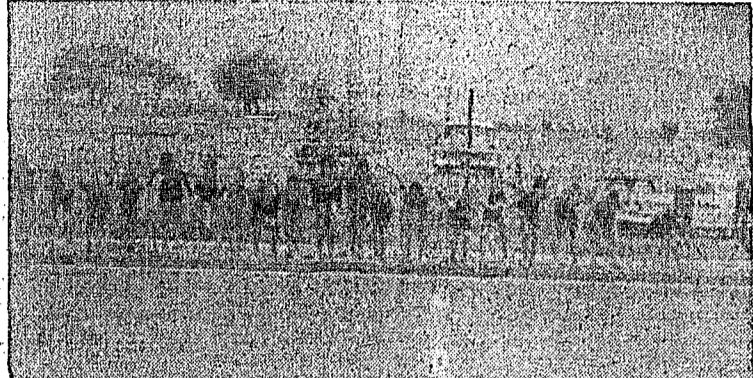
Initial refund payments will concern gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of 1956, according to Hamlett. Refunds will be limited to Federal tax on gasoline which is used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying on a trade or business, on a farm located in the U. S. A. A farmer may also request a refund of tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising any agricultural or horticultural commodity.

Mr. Hamlett cautions, "farmers expecting to file claims should keep ample records to enable Internal Revenue to verify accuracy of the amount claimed."

BOYS COMPLETE SWIMMING LESSONS

More than 40 boys completed their three weeks swimming lessons last Friday. Some of them became good swimmers and some of the younger ones did not advance as rapidly, but all reached the point to where they could swim some.

Accuracy Essential In Social Security Reports or Returns

Employers, employees, and self-employed persons should not overstate or understate income for social security purposes. That caution comes from R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for the Abilene area for the Social Security Administration.

"Because of the increased benefits provided by the 1954 Amendments to the law, there could be a temptation to misrepresent earnings," Tuley said.

"For one thing, because larger wages or net profits could mean larger benefit payments, some people might be tempted to overstate their income in order to build up higher social security benefits. A self-employed person, for example, might want to omit allowable business expenses so that his net would be larger than the correct figure.

"On the other hand, someone already receiving benefits might be tempted to understate earnings so that receipt of such benefits would not be suspended.

Anyone making a false statement or misrepresenting a situation in connection with Federal old-age and survivors insurance (social security) is actually committing a crime punishable under Federal laws," Tuley added.

In some cases recently, according to records in the Abilene office, it was necessary to adjust income earning figures as shown on tax returns and advise the Internal Revenue Service of the misstatements discovered. To avoid possible embarrassment in the future, persons making reports or returns of income or earnings for social security purposes should make every effort to be accurate.

Water Main From Lake To Storage Tanks Cleaned Sunday Without Mishap

City officials want to express their thanks to the citizens of Santa Anna for their cooperation over the weekend in the conservation of water while the main line from the lakes to the reservoirs on the mountain were being cleaned Sunday. The only time there was a shortage of water was for a while Saturday afternoon when a great number of people were drawing water to use over the weekend. That was around 2:00 p. m. and by 4 p. m. most everyone had drawn up all the water they needed.

Clifford Stephenson, City Superintendent, said plans for the weekend cleaning went off without a hitch and all the city officials were well pleased with the cooperation received from the water users in the city.

Both storage tanks on the east

mountain were full at 6 a. m. Sunday when the mains were disconnected and work started on cleaning the lines. Actually the work progressed more rapidly than had been expected and the job was completed and the lines back in working order by shortly after noon. When the lines were put back in operation the storage tanks were over half full, indicating almost full cooperation in using as little water as possible.

Stephenson said the amount of water in the storage tanks would last about three hours under normal usage at that time of day. As it was, the water had lasted more than six hours and over half of the reserve was still there when the lines were put back in operation.

For some reason, a large number of persons got the idea that the water was to be cut off at 4 p. m. on Saturday, but that was the time you were requested to begin saving as much water as possible. There was a misunderstanding somewhere.

Stephenson said early this week they had not been able to get an accurate check on just how much water was being put through the lines and into the storage tanks but he was sure it was 500 gallons per minute or more, which is an ample supply of water for use in Santa Anna. No one should be short of water now, and we have plenty of good clean water. So use it — and that is something a lot of towns in West Texas cannot say.

Fire Department Makes Third Call In Week Sat. Morn.

The Santa Anna Fire Department was called out for the third time in less than a week when just before eight a. m. on Saturday morning they answered a call to the Joe Swindell house, located west of the West Texas Utilities Co., when a fire broke out in the kitchen. The house is occupied by a Holland family, who had moved in about the middle of last week.

Very little damage was done to the house, as most of the fire was confined to the kitchen stove.

On Monday night before, the fire department had been called to the Buffalo Community for a small fire and then on Tuesday morning they were called to the Carl Ray home where considerable damage resulted from a fire.

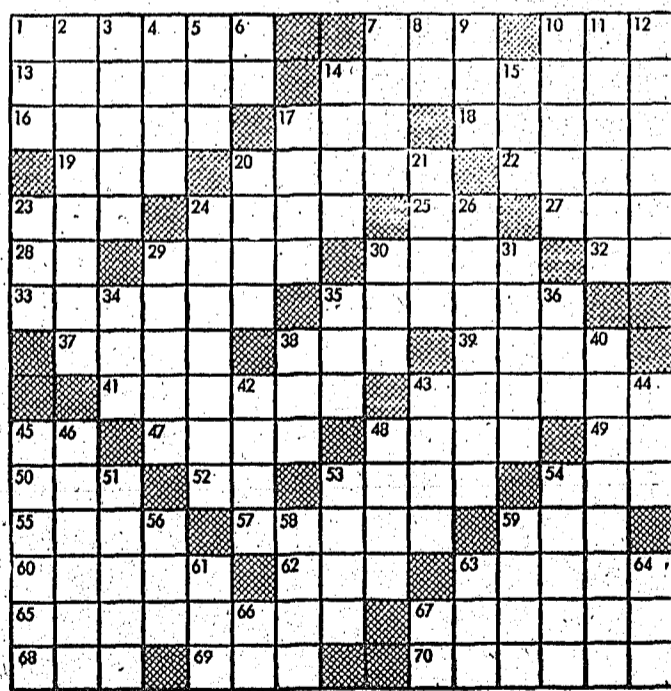

New Schedule For Seeing Social Security Man Given

Due to the heavy increase in the number of persons calling to see the social security representative at most of the contact stations operated by the Abilene district office, the travel schedule for the July-September quarter has been revised somewhat from that formerly followed, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager.

"Some trips have been changed as to time and frequency, and one new contact station (DeLeon) has been added," Tuley stated, "reflecting an ever-increasing interest in the public regarding old-age and survivors insurance."

Self-employed farm or ranch operators past age 65 are urged to check the following schedule and arrange to meet a representative of the Abilene office, Tuley went on, provided (1) the tax return for 1955 has been filed and the social security tax paid, and (2) the individual has already had a gross income of at least \$800 in 1956. He adds that such persons should bring to the interview a copy of the 1955 tax return that can be turned over to the field man, the cancelled

check or money order stub showing the tax payment, and some evidence that the 65th birthday has come and gone.

"Depending on the amount of the expected net income for 1956, it is often possible to start monthly benefit checks to these older farm and ranch operators without waiting for the final and exact figures on 1956 earnings," Tuley reported.

Ralph Fisher, assistant manager, normally will be the person visiting this area. He will be at the Department of Public Welfare in Coleman at 1:00 p. m. July 10, 24; August 7, 21; September 4, 18; and at the Commissioners Court Room in Brownwood at 1:00 p. m. July 5, 11, 18, 25; August 1, 8, 15, 22, 29; September 5, 12, 19, 26.

When Abraham was told of the Lord's purpose to destroy the city of Sodom because of the great wickedness of the people, he began to plead with God to spare the city if such and such a number of people were found there. He began with fifty and kept on reducing the number, hoping to bring the number down to one that would include Lot and his family. Lot was his nephew who had come to Sodom several years after the separation between him and Abraham.

Uncle and nephew had not seen each other for perhaps fifteen years and they may not have heard from each other. So Abraham must have thought that Lot and his family would number at least ten and when God promised to spare Sodom if ten righteous persons were found therein, he thought his prayer had been successful and he ceased pleading. And in so doing he fell into great error, for the family of Lot did not number ten, even including the sons-in-law who were men of Sodom.

This Abraham failed utterly in his prayer by stopping short. Had he persevered, had he continued to exercise faith, his plea might have been granted to spare Sodom, and thus save Lot and his small family. But ruin fell upon the city and Lot, his wife, and two daughters were forced to flee. Let us learn to persevere in all good things.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Matthew 3:13-17; Hebrews 1:1, 2-3; 6:1-3; Devotional Reading: John 14:1-11.

Son of God

Lesson for July 8, 1956

ONE thing the Christian church has believed from the beginning, Jesus is divine. Now the Bible says that in those words, "A more vivid and personal way of expression it is the Bible way. There, he is called Son of God. Theologians have written volumes on top of volumes to explain what it means to call Jesus the Son of God, and some of these volumes are pretty hard to understand. It is important to look into the Bible itself and see what is said there. The



Dr. Foreman letter to the Hebrews (one of those nine letters at the end of the New Testament), in the very first sentence, gives Jesus the title of Son; but does not finish the sentence before beginning to explain a little what is meant by this.

God Speaks by a Son

The first thing we are told here is that God, who has been speaking to men for thousands of years, in various ways, has at last spoken to us by a Son. Jesus Christ is God's answer to man's questions, he is the answer to man's call for help, he is God calling to us. Men have long wished the sky were not so silent. They wish they could read the inscrutable mind of the most high God. Well, God has spoken, he has given us his last and best Word. And this Word is not in the form of a textbook, not in the form of an answer-book for all the riddles of existence. God's message to man is not a creed, however good it may be. His message is in a Person, a Life. We want to know what God thinks. We wish he would say something. Well, God has said... and what he says is Jesus Christ.

Through Him, the World

The line that divides all things that exist into two different kinds of things, the first and most important line, is not the line divid-

ing spirit from matter. The real dividing line is that which runs between Creator and Created, or to put it in another way, the line between God and everything else that is. When you take time to think about it, you can see that only God can be on the creator-side of creation. God alone, of all that exists, is because he is and not because something or somebody else made him be. Every man must say to himself, "If it were not for such and such a person, or such and such an event, I would not be here." But God could not truly say a thing like that. He does not depend on something or some one else for his very existence, as we do. It is by his good will that we are in the universe at all; it is by his will that the universe is here for us to be in. Now the letter to the Hebrews declares that Christ is God's active agent in creation. In the simple words of the writer, we read that through the Son, God created the world. No wonder the early church soon saw that this puts Jesus on the God-side of that line dividing Creator from Created. This is part of what we mean when we say that Jesus Christ is divine.

Reflection and Stamp

Another part of what we mean is expressed in those two words "reflection" and "stamp." The old Greeks had a story about a creature called a Gorgon, with snakes for hair, so horrible that the very sight of her turned the beholder to stone. Only when a brave man thought of going up to her, not looking directly at her but into a mirror, was any one able to enter her presence and live. In quite the opposite way, God is not too horrible, but too holy, for mere men to gaze at. We too need a mirror to reflect the unbearable glory of God; Christ is that reflection. He is likewise the "stamp" of God's nature. He is as it were God's signature, his handwriting, his personal seal.

"Therefore . . . Glosor Attention"

The divinity of Christ, of which these sentences in Hebrew are only a few of the New Testament testimonies, was never thought of, in those clear early days of the church, as a mere doctrine in a book. It meant and means something intensely practical. If Jesus is really divine, then, we cannot just take him or leave him. If he is God's Son he is no more optional than God is. Deciding for or against him is the most important decision in life. What he tells and teaches is not "one man's opinion," it is not even the voice of genius; it is the Voice of God.

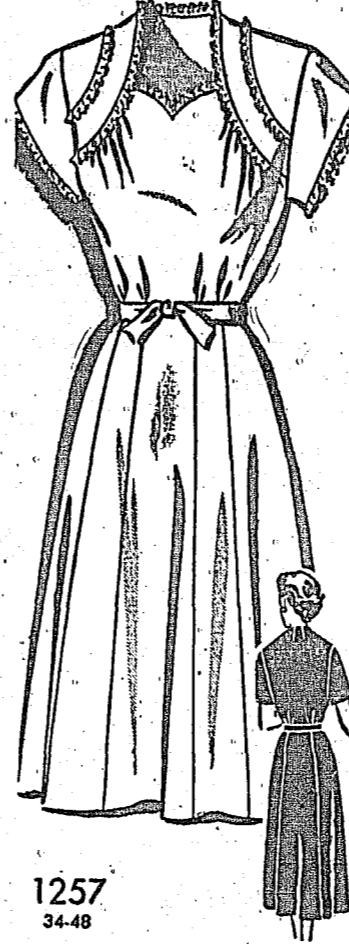

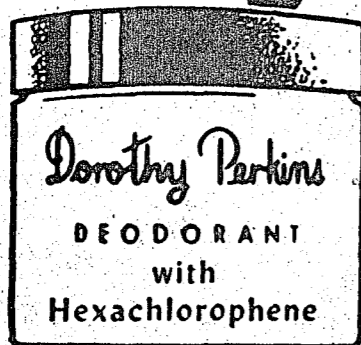
