Up to last January 1, our district alone had received \$91/2 million in disaster loans. Topped by hard-hit Val Verde County, the total there was \$216 million, with Uvalde next with loans totaling \$1.2 million. Figures up to June 30 will be available within a few days.

On the feed side, the Government now assures \$1 per hundred on cost of certain feed sold by feed houses — later replacing the \$1 credit in governmentowned feed to the dealers. Many feed users, however, feel the \$1 is not enough because they feel much of that is lost in a trend toward higher retail prices. Despite these pleas for a more realistic feed program, the Department reports that "for the present the \$1 subsidy level will be continued:






