H. F. Fenton Jr., candidate for re-election as Sheriff of Coleman County has authorized this newspaper to publish his formal statement as follows:





The Good Samaritan

The story of the Good Samaritan is familiar to all readers of the New Testament and it should teach us to be good neighbors. For the story was told by the Master in answer to the Lawyer's question, "And who is my neighbor?"

The usual thought of a neighbor is that of one who lives next door or in one's section of a city, or in the nearest home in a small community. And oftentimes we may be ready to help a neighbor as thus thought of, while the man of another race or of another land across the sea may not be the object of one's purpose of helpfulness.

The lawyer readily agreed that Jesus spoke truly about the first and great commandment, but affected to be uncertain about the range and scope of his responsibility. "And who is my neighbor?" he asked.

The story of the Good Samaritan, told in answer to the lawyer's question, shows that our neighbor is the man in need, whom we must love and whom we must serve, whether he lives next door or beyond the sea. And he who helps the man in need is a good neighbor. Let us each try to be this good neighbor.

Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman C. FISHER

The Drouth Situation in our area is worse now than it has ever been. From all over our district come reports of liquidation of herds, exhaustion of credit and difficulties in getting feed at prices people can afford to pay and stay in business.

Recently a number of us have been conferring with Department of Agriculture officials in an effort to get more adequate relief measures put into effect. This deals mainly with feed and credit.

On the loan side, the Congress last year directed the Farmers Home Administration to make emergency loans to qualified disaster victims at 3% interest, with other types at 5%. In talks with Agriculture officials we have pleaded for longer term loan arrangements. We have been assured the government will "lean over backward" in giving drought victims ample time to try to work

out payment. Up to last January 1, our district alone had received \$9 1/2 million in disaster loans. Topped by hard-hit Val Verde County, the total there was \$21 1/2 million, with Uvalde next with loans totaling \$1.2 million. Figures up to June 30 will be available within a few days.

On the feed side, the Government now assures \$1 per hundred on cost of certain feed sold by feed houses — later replacing the \$1 credit in government-owned feed to the dealers. Many feed users, however, feel the \$1 is not enough because they feel much of that is lost in a trend toward higher retail prices. Despite these pleas for a more realistic feed program, the Department reports that "for the present the \$1 subsidy level will be continued."

There is need for protein feed and for hay. The Government owns no protein feed to speak of, and, of course, owns no hay. We are urging a protein program be worked out, however, by some sort of a swap-of-feed the Government does own for the \$1 credit slips that are traded in as part of the feed price paid to feed dealers, if something better cannot be worked out.

There is talk of a possible hay program by this Fall, with possibly the Government buying the hay and shipping it into the drought areas at cost, with the States and Uncle Sam sharing in the freight cost.

In the meantime, we are continuing to explore every possible means of stepping up emergency relief — and we are praying for rain.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Background Scripture: John 4:39-42, Hebrews 2:9-11
Devotional Reading: John 3:11-21

Savior of Men

Lesson for July 15, 1956

"THE Bible does not say that Jesus saves men from hell. It does say that he saves men from their sins. This is much more important, for suppose a man were saved from hell but not from his sin? He would carry his own hell with him even through the gates of heaven. Christ is the Saviour of men here and now, not in the future alone, but in the living present. In the Bible the word "save" means, first of all, to rescue. Christ as Dr. Foreman Saviour comes to the rescue of men who are chained and beaten, men who are the victims of their worst selves, bondsmen of the devil. Your worst self hates your best self. Left alone, your best self has a very slim chance, if any. You need to be rescued from yourself, and Christ is the rescuer every man needs.

Sin-bearer

How does Christ rescue men? The Bible suggests, and the church echoes, many answers. Let us look at three. Christ rescues men by taking their sins on himself. As a modern Christian writer (Hordern) puts it, he "took the rap" for mankind. As St. Paul put it, "He who knew no sin was made to be sin, for us . . ." In a long-ago battle for Swiss independence, the story is that one of the front-line soldiers seized as many of the enemy's spears as he could gather in his arms, and forced himself on them, thus making by his death a gap through which his fellow-soldiers poured to victory. In North Carolina, when the United States government was about to punish the Cherokee Indians for an alleged crime, their chief Jemalaska offered to give his own life if the government would let his people go. He was killed, and his people were free. These are imperfect illustrations of what Jesus Christ

did as sin-bearer, as self-giving Sacrifice. He "tasted death for every one." That does not have to be done twice.

Example

Another way in which Christ saves is by just being himself. Once there was a school-room in which the small boys and girls seemed to learn a courtesy, a graciousness of manner, which children in other rooms did not learn. Some one who wondered how the teacher did it, and who knew how hard it is to teach some children even the ABC's or of politeness, asked one of the boys how the teacher did it. "She don't teach us at all," the small boy said. "She just walks around, and we feel as polite as anything." A well-known "spiritual" sings, "I want to be like Jesus, in my heart." Jesus saves men from their sins by so inspiring them that they know there is nothing better than to be like Him. If you are learning to play the piano, you don't learn best by listening to poor pianos poorly played. You learn by listening to a master-pianist, a real artist. Now there is an easy way of misunderstanding this matter of Jesus saving us by his example: it is to suppose that we must every day compare him with ourselves, keeping (so to speak) a chart on which our "spiritual progress" is charted every day—20% like Jesus in 1955, 25% in 1956, and so on. That is absolutely the wrong way to do it; all you become is a Pharisee. The right way is to keep our mind fixed on Christ, so to love him in sincere earnest, that we shall grow more and more like him, one may say almost without knowing it. True saints are not self-conscious.

Unseen Guest

Once Jesus invited himself to dinner at the house of a very shady character named Zacchaeus. After dinner Jesus said, "Salvation has come to this house," and we know that Zacchaeus began to be a different man from that afternoon. In the last book of the New Testament a picture is drawn of Christ standing outside a closed door. "If any one hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in . . ." So Christ saves men by being their permanent unseen Guest, by being the Inner Companion whose very presence is a saving power. Christ is Saviour, not alone by what he does for men, but by what he does in men. Being "saved" is more than knowing or believing; being saved is becoming, by his invitation, host to the Lord of all.
