### Sample Ballot Published This Week

Elsewhere in this issue of The News you will find a sample ballot, containing all the offices and candidates for these offices from Governor of Texas on down to the Precinct Chairman in each voting box.

All the names listed on the sample ballot are exactly the same as they will be listed on the Official Ballot you will receive when you go to the polls on Saturday, July 28. The spelling and position of the names in each race are the same as they will be on your Official Ballot.

We urge you to keep this sample ballot and study it closely. Give each candidate due consideration and know who you want to vote for when you go to the polls. Good government can only come when the people of Texas know the qualifications of the people they elect to offices and it is your duty to know the qualifications of each candidate and to vote for the ones you think are the best qualified for the offices they seek.

At the bottom of the ballot you will find three questions concerning the racial questions that have caused considerable controversy during the past two years. These questions are put on this ballot to find out what the opinion of the average citizen of Texas is concerning segregation in public schools, in termarriage by whites and Negroes and the use of interposition to stop the illegal federal encroachment on state's rights.

It is our opinion that most everyone has set opinions on these questions but we ask you to give each of them careful consideration before marking out one of them on the ballot. If the voter is not careful, the wording of the referendum questions might be a little misleading. So, be sure the FOR or AGAINST statement you favor is the one you leave on the ballot.

### Wheat Rates Announced Under Price Support

Farmers voting in the wheat marketing quota referendum on July 20 will have all the basic information they need in making their decision, according to W. Forrest Deal, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Wheat price supports have recently been announced at an average of \$2 a bushel for 1957 production, to be available for those who comply with farm allotments in all commercial wheat States if marketing quotas are approved in the July 20 referendum, the Chairman explained.

This announcement was followed on July 6, by an announcement of the "unit" rate for determining payments under the wheat Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank in 1957. This unit rate has been set at 60 percent of the national average price-support level.

The actual payments which farmers may earn for taking part in the 1957 wheat Acreage Reserve will be determined by multiplying the base unit rate for the local county by a yield figure which will be established for the farm by the County ASC Committee.

If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the July 20 referendum the wheat unit rate under the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve in 1957 will be 60 percent of the \$2 national average, or \$1.20 a bushel, as an approximate national average, with the usual differentials for local areas.

If quotas are disapproved by more than one-third of the growers voting in the referendum, price support on the 1957 wheat crop will drop to 50 percent of parity, as directed by law; in that case, the wheat unit rate under the Soil Bank Acreage Reserve would be 60 percent of the price-support level then in effect.

The comparable price-support level for 1956-crop wheat is also at \$2 a bushel and the unit rate for determining Acreage Reserve payments is at a national average of \$1.20 a bushel. Therefore, both the price-support figure and the Acreage Reserve unit rate are being continued for 1957 at the levels in effect for this year's production.

The public is welcome to attend all services and members of the cooperating churches are urged to attend all the services.

### 14,000 Tax Refund Checks Being Held For Audit Purposes

There are approximately 14,000 North Texans who are having their Federal tax refund checks held up and will not receive them for a while yet, according to Mr. Sam Hamlett, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood office. The Internal Revenue Service has already notified these taxpayers that their tax returns have been selected for audit before their tax refunds are paid. Thousands of other tax payers have already had their 1955 tax returns audited in the pre-refund audit program. Regular tax refunds that are not being audited have been completed.

Mr. Hamlett requested taxpayers who have been notified that their returns are being held for pre-audit to be patient. The Internal Revenue Service will contact them and request them to furnish information concerning their tax returns in due course. Internal Revenue is required by law to conduct an audit program over a period of several months. This audit program is going at high speed at the present time and has been for several months. Several thousand cases are being cleared each month. Taxpayers with cases pending will only delay the process of their tax audit by calling or writing the Revenue Service, since employees will lose time from making audits to answer the calls or correspondence.

### Local Hospital Receives \$10,000 Grant From The Ford Foundation This Week

W. Tilden Jones, Administrator of the Santa Anna Hospital, announced this week that the hospital has received a \$10,000 grant from the Ford Foundation and one-half of the money has already been received. The other \$5,000 will be received about the middle of March, 1957.

When grants became available, Mr. Jones and other directors of the hospital began making preparations to request the grant and after considerable effort the grant was approved on July 11 and the first part of the grant was sent immediately. The grant was made to the Texas Conference Association of Seventh-day Adventists, operating the Santa Anna Hospital.

Expenditure of this money must meet requirements set forth with the terms of the grant by the Ford Foundation and the Board of Directors of the hospital. Jones said the first expenditure would be for new floors throughout the hospital and several items of surgical equipment.

Quoting in part the letter received by Mr. Jones from the Ford Foundation, explains the grant:

"The purpose of the grant is to assist your hospital in improving or extending its services to the community. While your preliminary description of possible uses for the grant does not preclude you from considering other appropriate purposes in accordance with the Terms of Grant, the possible uses you have outlined appear to us to fall within the general spirit and intent of the program.

"We hope this grant will assist your hospital in meeting some of the needs of your community, and that it may be helpful in stimulating continued support by your community for improvement and extension of your hospital's services."

Under the Terms of Grant, three purposes for expenditure of grant funds are listed, as follows: (1) improvement of, or additions to physical facilities,

equipment or services; (2) additions to or training of personnel; and (3) conducting research.

Another condition of the Terms of Grant is that the hospital will advise the Ford Foundation of its plans for expending the grant within three months of the receipt of the first payment. Within two years of the date of the final payment of the grant, the hospital will furnish the foundation with a report on its use of the grant funds, to the extent expended and its projected use of any unexpended balance of the grant, if any.

Jones said the directors of the hospital considered themselves fortunate to receive the grant and the money would go a long way toward numerous improvements that have been planned for the hospital for the past several months.

It is expected that work will get underway in the near future on putting the new floors in the hospital.



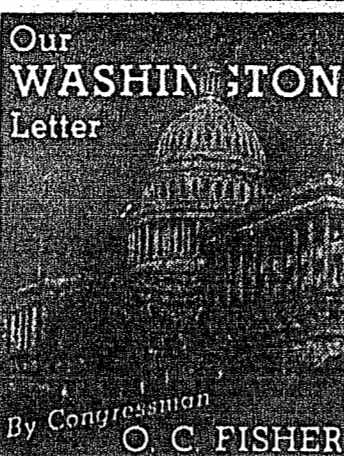
**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE  
LESSON-SERMON**

The ever-availability of the healing power of the Christ, Truth, will be set forth at Christian Science services Sunday.

Christ Jesus' healing of the centurion's servant, as recorded in Luke's Gospel (chap. 7), will be among the Scriptural passages to be read in the Lesson-Sermon entitled "Truth".

Selections from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy will include the following (142:31): "Truth is God's remedy for error of every kind, and Truth destroys only what is untrue. Hence the fact that, today, as yesterday, Christ casts out evils and heals the sick."

The Golden Text is from Psalms (88:11): "Teach me thy way, O Lord; I will walk in thy truth; unite my heart to fear thy name."



After exhausting hopes of getting the Secretary of Agriculture to reverse a ruling which, in effect, penalizes our drought-stricken cotton farmers for planting cotton this year, I introduced a bill which in effect requires him to change the ruling. My bill, which was like one on the subject by Congressman Poage of Waco, would require full payment under the soil bank plan if the farmer plowed under or otherwise prevented maturing of a crop and did so not less than 30 days before normal maturity of the crop.

An Agriculture committee hearing was held on the proposals and Assistant Agriculture Secretary McLain appeared to defend the Department's interpretation. He persisted in prior ruling. That means that if a farmer planted, as advised to do in order to protect his allotment, but the crop did not come up or would not grow, he can receive only \$6 per acre for agreeing to keep the acreage out of production the rest of the year. But if he did not plant at all, he can draw the benefits for a normal yield, which in Texas amounts to about \$17.60 per acre.

Eth Poage and I maintained this ruling is contrary to the intent of Congress because the law called for putting the program into effect in 1956. And at the time the law was put into effect the farmer should be allowed to choose, then, whether to go into the program, and the question of whether he had previously planted should not make the difference.

The most recent crop production report from USDA shows a map of pasture feed conditions in the U. S. as of July 1 that tells a depressing story for Texas and much of the middle west. More than half of our State, including all of the 21st Congressional district, is colored black, meaning "extreme drought". Crop prospects follow about the same pattern. The Big Bend and El Paso area looks better on the map than any other part of the State.

Do not underrate the Russians, about sums up the advice from General Twining following his official look-see trip to the Soviet Union recently. The General appeared before an executive session of our Armed Services Committee last week and gave us all the inside information he could on what he saw and heard. With their scientific talent, there's a danger of a "break-through" in techniques—meaning they may stumble onto something new and significant. We're still ahead in airpower, but we must push hard to keep it that way. That calls for ever more emphasis on research and development.

**TENDERNESS IN MEAT  
MAY BE INHERITED**

There is some evidence from research with rabbits and in studies of sheep and beef cattle that tenderness in meat is an inherited quality, according to R. W. Snyder, extension meats specialist.

To produce more lean meat of good quality and tenderness, we need a better understanding of what makes tenderness and desirable flavor, says Snyder.

Enough research has been done to show there is no direct relation between tenderness in meat and outside fat. But tenderness and flavor may be influenced by the particles of fat within the meat cells. It is also possible that there may be a relationship between tenderness and the size and elasticity of different muscle fibers.

Once the chemical nature of tenderness and good flavor are clearly understood, it may become possible to add these qualities to any meat.

STATE PARK OF THE WEEK

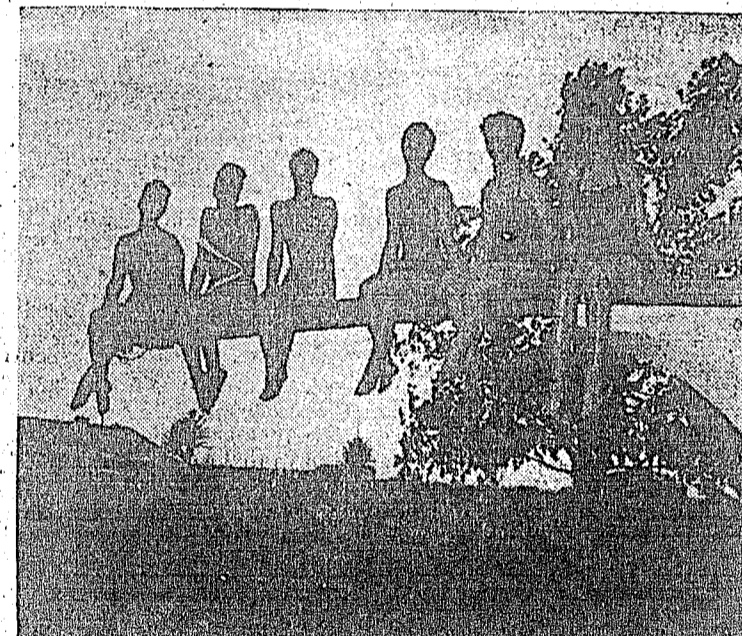

Balmorhea State Park in Reeves County is built around San Solomon Springs. The park is between the Davis and Barilla Mountains at an elevation of about 3,345 feet above sea level which assures cool nights.

San Solomon Springs are remarkable in that there has been no sign of decrease in their flow since the early days when they watered buffalo herds. Even through the state's long drought the springs have steadily delivered 26 million gallons of crystal clear water daily into the world's largest walled swimming pool.

Park facilities include 18 air-cooled, Spanish type, stucco cabins with red tiled roofs, and a camping area with twelve units along the cool stream flowing from the springs. Each camping unit is concrete floored with a sheltering roof, and is supplied with an outdoor cooking place, electric lights and water. For cabin occupants and campers who do not wish to cook, there is a large dining room with well prepared meals.

Balmorhea State Park is on U. S. Highway 290 at Toyahvale. It is reached easily from Midland, Odessa, Monahans, Pecos

and other cities on U. S. Highway 80 by turning south on State Highway 17 at Pecos. Farther west turn off at Kent.

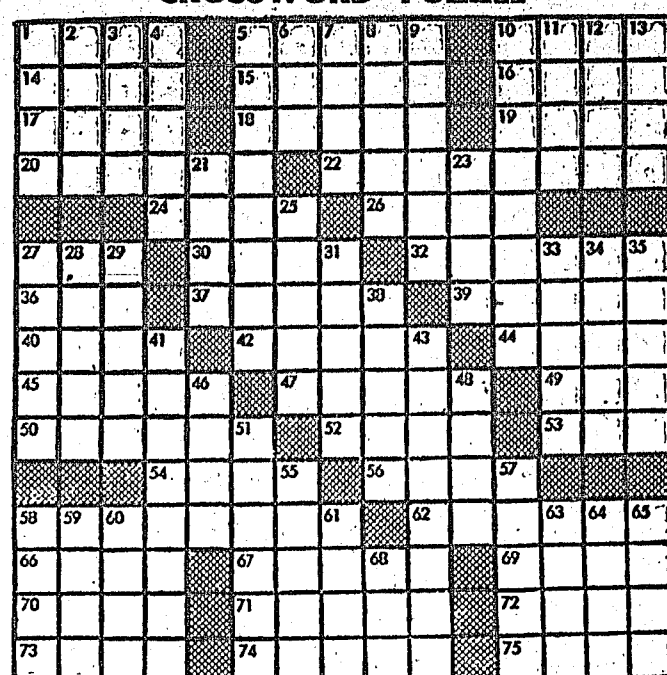

**Great Company**

Lesson for July 22, 1956

MAN is not made for loneliness. He not only feels incomplete when circumstances force him, for a time to live alone; he is actually incomplete. It is only through existence with others that we arrive at our true selves. People who have never thought this through know it by a kind of instinct. That is why there are so many organizations and societies and fraternities and groups of innumerable sorts in the world. Even when an organization has no very important reason for its existence, its members just like to get together.



**The Great Company**

Of all groups of human beings, the greatest is the "great company" we call the Church. Belonging to it is more than joining another organization. It is more than any denomination, more than any existing list of members, even if you put all the members of all the churches into one master-list. The writer to the Hebrews, thinking of the heroes of faith, does not think of them as past-and-gone saints. They live now; they are the great "cloud of witnesses"—the cheering grandstand, we may dare to say—in whose presence our own race is being run. They are living members of the Fraternity of Faith. All those who have dreamed God's dreams after him, all who have looked beyond their times to the heavenly city yet to be, all who have tolled to make this world a bit more like the world of God's intention, who have by faith seen what God promised and greeted it from afar; these make up the company to which every man and woman is invited; these are the light-bearers, the builders, to whose fellowship every Christian belongs. Men of faith often have to live lonely lives; they can be misunderstood, imprisoned, tortured and killed; but they take heart, knowing that they do not

stand alone.

#### Marching With the Heroes

For some persons, precise accuracy of belief is what makes a good Christian. Surely accuracy of belief is a good thing. To say the least of it, there is no point in believing what isn't so, or not believing what is so. But from the standpoint of this letter to the Hebrews, indeed from the standpoint of Jesus himself, accuracy of belief and completeness of understanding are not the last word in what makes a Christian. Faith, in the way the word meets us in the famous 11th chapter of Hebrews, is not voting "aye" to a set of propositions. Faith is doing something for man and God. It can be expressed in the slogan, "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God." Faith of this rousing, robust kind is more than thinking, it is doing. It is thinking too; faith certainly is no substitute for thought. Reading the stories of the men and women the writer to the Hebrews lists in his roll-call of faith, one finds them planning ahead, working, fighting, never blindly but with the determination that comes from a thinking faith. Heroes think, plan, believe; but also heroes DO. It is the doing that makes them heroic. So the Great Company is a marching, fighting company, marching at God's orders, fighting God's war.

#### Supermen?

Thinking about such things, and such men, has put iron into the blood of many weaker men and women, struggling through their own battles on this earth. But it has a discouraging side, too. These men—Abraham, Moses, all the rest, and all the others that Christian history can name—these heroes of faith were supermen, we feel. Quite out of our class. In such a company, many a humble Christian feels like a boy who can't do simple arithmetic being elected by accident to a Mathematical Society, or a boy twelve years old suddenly finding himself in the middle of a football game between Notre Dame and Texas. It's embarrassing. But no—that is a mistake. The men named to that Roll-Call of Faith were not really supermen. Indeed some of them felt so small that they tried to resign before God elected them. By themselves they would have been no more remarkable than ourselves. For after all, it was not their faith, or their character, or their power, that made them; it was the God in whom they had that faith, who made them. And God still makes men!


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**Aikin Pledges Continuance of Farm Road Program**

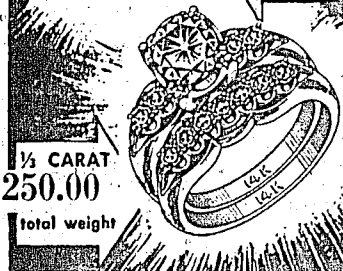
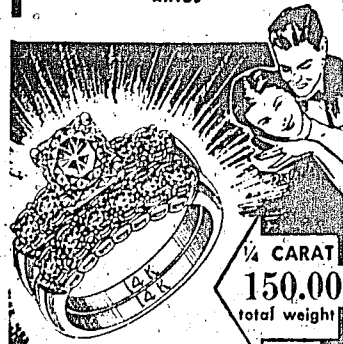

## John C. White Proposes New Farm Legislation

Austin, Texas — New legislation to provide greater protection for the Texas farm industry is being planned by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White is conducting a series of conferences with farmers and agricultural industry men over the state, mapping out proposals for submission to the Texas Legislature next year.

"My purpose is to let the farmers set up their own future goals and outline their needs", White said. "The Department of Agriculture will inaugurate programs on a self-supporting basis, eliminating the need for additional tax money from the state."

A major part of Commissioner White's departmental expenses are self-provided by fees for service rendered.

"This is the only practical way to adequately cover the increased demand for new services to agriculture in the state", said White.

The Commissioner, who is seeking re-election to the top agricultural job in Texas, pointed out that activities of his department have been expanded 400 percent since he first took office five years ago. Yet by putting the costs on a self-supporting plan, the burden of expense is kept from the shoulders of the taxpayers.

"My major concern is to improve our farmers' and ranchmen's economic outlook in these critical, drought years", White added. "Our farm industry must have every opportunity to help itself pull out of the current slump."

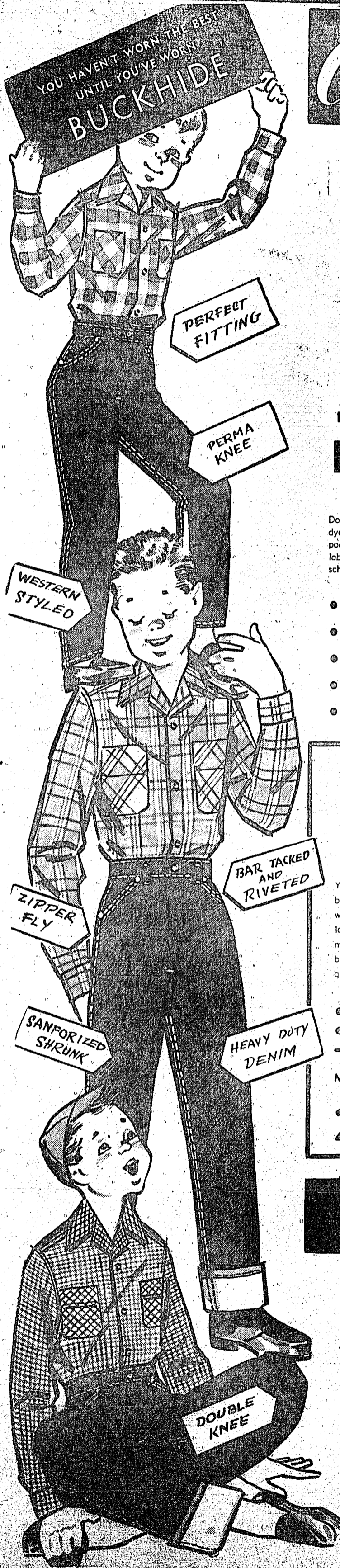
