## Swimming Classes To Be Completed This Week

Seven weeks of swimming instructions for boys and girls of Santa Anna will be completed this week. During the first three weeks of the instructions the boys were taken to The Pool, 2 miles west of Coleman, where they were instructed in how to swim by Charlie Owen, Red Cross Instructor and Life Guard at The Pool. Owen contributed his services along with a number of others from Santa Anna and Coleman who worked under Mr. Owen's instructions in teaching the children to swim.

During the second three weeks the girls of the community were taken to The Pool and given the same instructions. Over 100 boys and girls participated in the program and all but a very few learned to swim at least a short distance. Some learned to swim a good distance.

During the final week the boys and girls are going together and all are still under the supervision of Mr. Owen, who volunteered his services for the seventh week. During the week he is teaching the children to dive and swim as far as possible. On Thursday night of this week there will be a Family Night at the pool and all parents of children participating in this weeks program are requested to be at The Pool at 7:30 p. m. to watch their children and see what they have learned during their instruction period.

A number of Santa Anna women have taken an active interest in this program and have spent a large number of hours working on it. The same has been true for the women that has been working with the wading pool for the smaller children.

The News joins others in expressing our appreciation to these local ladies, Mrs. M. L. Marrs, owner and operator of The Pool, and Charlie Owen for his tireless efforts in teaching our children to swim. We all owe each of them a big vote of thanks.

## Ollie E. Shelton Named To County FHA Committee

Ollie E. Shelton, Star Route, Santa Anna, Texas, was appointed to the Farmers Home Administration committee for Coleman County this week. John H. Curry local supervisor for the agency, announced today. The appointment was made by Walter McKay, State Director at Dallas.

The new committeeman operates a livestock farm in the Shields Community. Mr. Shelton succeeds Mr. Ozro Eubank, Route One, Santa Anna, Texas, whose term expired this year.

The other two members are Mr. Oscar L. Cheaney, Santa Anna Banker, and Mr. Everett E. Evans, farmer and rancher of Talpa, Texas.

The committee determines the eligibility of local farmers who apply for Farmers Home Administration loans. They also certify as to the value of farms being purchased or improved through Farmers Home Administration loans, and make recommendations on loan approvals and loan servicing actions. Advice of the committeemen is sought on good farm management and on the refinancing of Farmers Home Administration loans when borrowers build up enough equity in their property to get credit from local banks or other lenders.

The county supervisor relies upon the advice of the committee in connection with all types of loans. These include farm operating loans, loans to buy, improve, or enlarge efficient family-type farms in this area, and loans to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices, including improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion measures, farmstead water systems, irrigation, drainage, and may other conservation practices.

**James R. Norvell Seeks Place On Supreme Court**

As the campaign for Place 3, Supreme Court of Texas, entered its last week, Judge James R. Norvell stopped in his travels long enough to ask news editors everywhere to point out the importance of their Supreme Court to the people of Texas.

Said Norvell, "My travels have pointed out that lawyers know of this race, and are interested, but the average voter doesn't realize its importance to him. Every case that comes up in a

local court may some day go to the state Supreme Court. This, in turn, means that every single person needs to be interested in the men he has elected to his Supreme Court.

Judge Norvell won the June State Bar poll of Texas lawyers by almost a four-to-one margin over his opponent, indicative of the confidence he has earned in his sixteen years on the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio.

When asked the best way to find out about all court races, Judge Norvell replied, "Ask your own attorney; he knows the qualifications of the men in the judicial races." Judge Norvell

summed up his campaign aim as a faster and more efficient administration of justice for all the people of Texas.

**Firms Subject To New Tax Must Get Revenue Form 2265**

Business firms subject to the new floor stocks tax on products included in the recently passed Highway Act may now obtain copies of Form 2265 from the Internal Revenue Office at Brownwood, E. C. Wentrock said today. Returns, with payments, are due by October 15.

Increased taxes are levied on floor stocks of the following items on hand as of last July 1: gasoline; tires of the type used on highway vehicles; truck, bus and trailer chassis and bodies, and tractors. A new tax was imposed on tread rubber of three cents a pound.

An instruction sheet accompanies the new form, Mr. Wentrock said. It explains and defines inclusions and exemptions in the products listed as taxable on the form itself. Continuing taxes called for under the Highway Act will be paid as part of regular quarterly excise tax returns. A 16-year road-building program to cost about 33 billion dollars will be financed by the taxes set forth in the new act.

Two million copies of the form were printed to meet the needs of affected businesses. Of these about one-third are being distributed directly by the trade associations and manufacturers, with the remaining two-thirds to be available through district revenue offices.

Returns and payments should be sent to the district office, and checks or money orders should be made payable to the Internal Revenue Service, Mr. Wentrock reminded business firms.

**AUGUST PLENTIFUL FOODS ANNOUNCED**

College Station — Supplies of broilers and fryers are making prices which should prove popular with consumers. August supplies are expected to be 20 percent above a year ago with an average of nearly 29 million birds going to market weekly. Prices are running 20 to 22 percent below last year.

Too, the USDA announced that the turkey crop is at least a third larger than a year ago with heavy breed hens and toms making up most of the excess.

Food shoppers will also find plenty of beef available. Large quantities of all grades are expected for August.

Fresh plums and Bartlett pears are two plentiful fruits listed. The plum market has its peak supply in August and prices break.

Other plentiful listed for August include fresh and processed lemons, peanuts, peanut butter, rice and hens.

The USDA suggests that menus featuring broilers and fryers or even turkeys be used during the coming month because of the supplies and favorable prices of these food products.

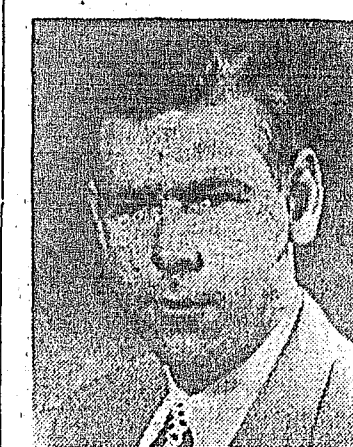

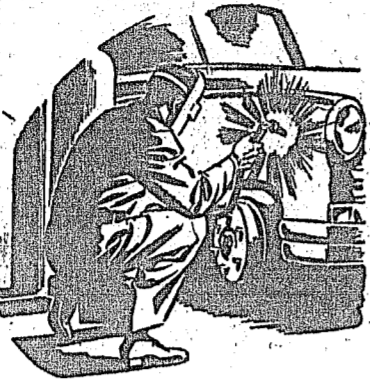

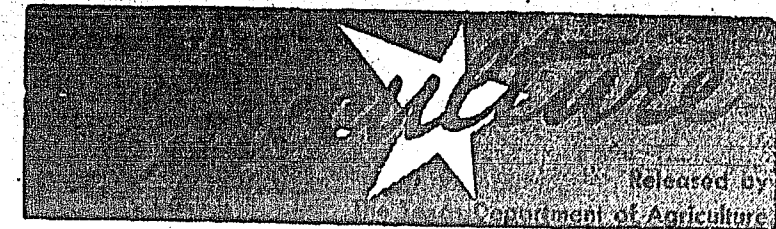

**FARM SAFETY WEEK**  
Farming is a dangerous job. So dangerous that nation-wide attention is being focused on the problem by declaring July 22 through 28 as National Farm Safety Week.

The risks of the farm are both physical and financial. In one year about 15,000 U. S. Farm residents are killed in agricultural accidents. Another 1,300,000 or more are injured. Each farm is a separate sphere

of management and operation which involves a wide variety of activities and working conditions. The heavy toll of accidents caused each year by these different farm tasks wipes out some 17 million man days of labor.

In some areas, Texas farmers may face one of the major accident creating situations — labor shortages. When hired help is scarce, the farmer takes on more of the work load. He tolls

longer hours and becomes tired long before the job is done. As a result, he is tempted to take risky short cuts or postpone needed repairs on machinery and buildings. This sets the stage for crippling accidents.

Farm machinery is the big killer. Careless handling causes many mishaps but even a careful operator may be hurt if he is running broken or worn machines. A good maintenance program for machinery could do much to keep down farm tragedies.

Another common cause of injury is farm animals. Some accidents with animals are unavoidable. Still, many result from impatience in the farmer's part or an under-estimation of

the animal's dangerous traits.

Fires are a greater hazard on the farm than in the city. They cause some 3,500 of the 15,000 farm deaths each year. These fires occur at the rate of 300 per day, and most can be traced to defective heating units, flammable roofing materials, overloaded electrical wires and lack of protection from lightning.

But the farmer and the city dweller share equal risks right in the home. Four thousand farm residents die each year from accidents inside the house. Thus, home safety is a prime starting point in eliminating accidents which rob families of their livelihood.

Now that another crop season is underway, a little more caution and advance planning may help assure you of being around when the time comes to reap the harvest from seeds you are planting today.

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**

In a last minute desperate appeal for the Negro vote in November, the politicians forced the House to spend all of last week on a civil rights bill which would have taken away more civil rights than it even pretended to protect.

The philosophy behind the measure was that the white folks against whom most of its provisions were aimed, would not be offended (since it will not become law, anyhow) and the Negroes would be "set on fire" at election time by the vote-catching ingredients which sets them up into a sort of privileged class of Americans.

In fact, Congressman Joe Martin, Republican leader in the House, frankly admitted during debate that the measure was political and he mentioned the November election. Both, Northern Democrats and Republicans, were running over each other trying to claim credit for what was in the bill.

As expected — and intended — the bill will die in the Senate.

**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons  
BY DR. KENNETH FOREMAN

Background Scripture: Acts 12:1-5; 1 Peter 4:12-5:14  
Devotional Reading: 2 Timothy 2:1-13

**Of Suffering**  
Lesson for July 29, 1956

WHAT they did in ancient times without the mimeograph machine it is hard to imagine. If a modern church executive said to his secretary, "Miss Jones, take a letter; get it out to all the Christians in Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia and Bithynia," Miss Jones would hardly know what to do without a typewriter and carbon paper at the least. She might wonder, too, what Christians in places as out-of-the-way as Bithynia might have in common with Christians in Asia. However, when Simon Peter wrote his letter, he knew what all those Christians had in common. "Now for a little while (he meant, to the end of their lives) you may have to suffer various trials..." Trouble, trials, affliction, suffering—how many words there are for it, how many different kinds of it! St. Peter's letter, written so long ago in Greek, now in English has a fresh contemporary look about it. For trials and troubles are very ancient, but they are as new as the morning paper, they are as universal as the human race.



**Suffering and Prayer**  
Christians in particular are bothered, when they think about suffering—especially their own or that of other Christians—in two ways. What is the use of suffering? and, Why should Christians suffer? These are the problems which Peter rolls into one problem: What use is it to Christians, to suffer? He brushes off one kind of suffering—when one gets into trouble on account of one's own wrongdoing. That is no puzzle. The puzzle comes when the good man, the Christian suffers perhaps because he is a Christian and for no other reason. One use of suffering Peter remembered from his own experience. When he was in jail in Jerusalem the church held a

prayer-meeting for him. Somewhat to their astonishment, their prayer was answered. Can we suppose that Peter himself had not been praying? His trouble, in short, had brought both himself and his friends to their knees; it had made them acutely aware of their need of God, and God in turn had made them know his power. Some people make fun of "fox-hole religion"; but isn't it better than none?

**Genuine Faith**

Faith that has never been tested can be real; but only God knows it. Faith tested by suffering, when it endures, demonstrates how real it is. A missionary in India was trying to talk to an Indian about Christ. The Indian, who had just lost a wife he deeply loved, cried, "You lead a happy life, everything comes your way. If you had to go through what I go through, you'd not talk about faith!" Within a few months the missionary too lost his wife by death. At the funeral, he stood by the casket and said: "If the man is here who told me I had never been through what he went through, I want to talk with him after this. Now maybe he will believe me." To make the story short, the Indian did come to believe as a Christian.

**Everybody Has a Heartache**

Another use for suffering is that it can open the heart wide. It does not always do this. Suffering by itself has no magic. It is only when the sufferer reaches up in trust to God that anything like "magic" comes to pass. But when one who is afflicted trusts in God even then, he may not have his pain—physical, mental or spiritual, whatever it be—removed; but he will find that he has joined the great fraternity of pain. His heart, hitherto in-turned, now turns outward. He knows the password to every human heart. For every one has his own heartache, and those unacquainted with grief find no entrance. Your own heartache is the key to the hearts of all men everywhere. Suffering "as a Christian"; this above all, as Peter says, is a mark of brotherhood throughout the world. The minister in Mississippi who loses his pastorate because he says a word of sympathy for wronged Negroes; the Indian who is stoned from the village well because he has turned from Mohammed to Christ; the Spanish Christian who is not allowed to worship except in forms approved by the government; the Chinese, Christian who is forced to march in a parade at the hour of church worship; do we not suffer with them? For they are our own.

## HOW TO VOTE ON REFERENDUMS

A check of voters who cast absentee ballots reveals much confusion about how to vote properly on the three referendums. Robert Cargill, chairman of the Texas Referendum Committee,

puts it simply in these words: "If you are opposed to mixed schools, mixed marriages and illegal federal interference, vote FOR all three propositions."

Due to the wording of the referendums, it is necessary for one to vote for the measures if he is against the subjects that each covers.

For example, the first proposition reads "FOR (or against) specific legislation exempting any child from compulsory attendance at integrated schools attended by white persons and negroes."

Proposition number two reads "FOR (or against) specific legislation perfecting state laws against intermarriage between white persons and negroes."

The third proposition says "FOR (or against) the use of interposition to halt illegal Federal encroachment."

The use of double-negatives is most confusing.

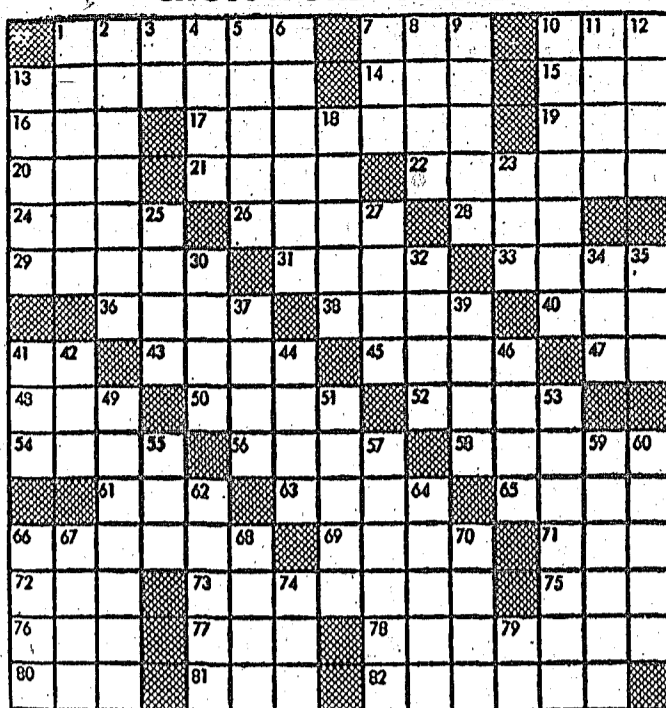
Voters also should remember that they may split their votes on the referendums, if they wish. For example, if the voter were opposed to mixed marriages and illegal federal interference, but not opposed to mixed schools, he would vote FOR the two propositions and against the later.

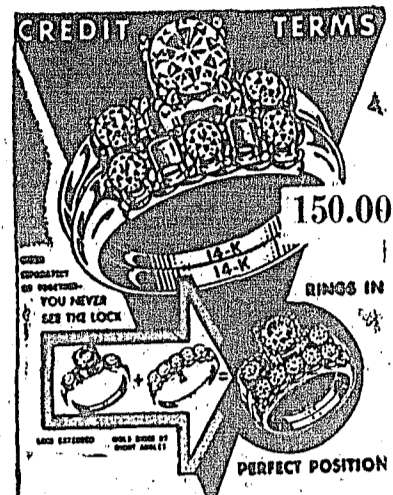

**All FHA Employees Asked To Help In Farm Safety Program**

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, has asked that all FHA employees do everything they can to help promote farm safety

and encourage greater effort in helping to reduce the tragedies and losses caused by needless accidents, John H. Curry, County Supervisor advised today.

The President has proclaimed the week beginning July 22, 1956, as National Farm Safety Week. In urging full participation in this campaign, Mr. McKay stated that in one year the farm accident toll was 14,500 people killed, 1,250,000 injured. In addition, the money loss represented by

farm accidents and also by fires probably runs around a billion dollars a year — the human misery can't even be measured, McKay said.

"It is the policy of Farmers Home Administration to promote safety among its borrowers as part of its services to farm families," McKay stated. "We don't think of safety as separate and distinct but as an inseparable part of our entire program. Our three safety aims are:

"First, to improve the health and welfare of families by eliminating safety hazards on farms and in homes; second, to reduce families' financial losses caused by accidents and fires; and third, to make farm production more efficient by reducing or minimizing accidental injuries and illness."

In summary Mr. McKay advised that Farmers Home Administration is interested in every borrower making his farm a safe

place to live and work, while he improves his family's economic condition. The two go together, and the lack of one can be the undoing of the other.

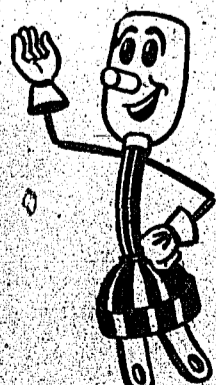

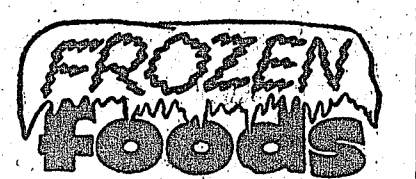
