

The new law also permits World War II veterans to have their GI loan entitlement restored up to January 31, 1965, if their umental agency for public use, was destroyed by a natural hazard, or was otherwise disposed of for compelling reasons without fault on the part of the veteran.

The law extended the World War II GI loan program ending date for one more year to July 25, 1958. Any loan application received by VA up to that time may be guaranteed by VA if it is completed by July 25, 1959. Another provision pomits the restoration of GI home loan entitlement to a veteran in military service who disposes of his home because of a transfer under military orders. Voters For 162.000

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drought disaster in our history.

Some Veterans Can **Reinstate Lost GI Term Insurance**

Dr. George T. McMahan, Man ager of the VA Center in Waco advised that thousands of World War 11 and post Korea veterans who lost their 5-year term GI insurance since July 23, 1953 because they had failed to pay either or both of the last two monthly premiums will be given an opportunity to reinstate their policies under a new law just signed by the President.

VA said it is searching its records for these cases, so it soon may send each former policyholder a reinstatement application with instructions on how to proceed.

The agency "strongly" requested the affected veterans not to write or otherwise make inquiries about their cases for at least a month so as not to delay the checking, process to the detriment of all veterans involved.



FOR ALL The lid is off on polio vaccin

ations State Health Commissioner Henry-Holle reports that federal allocation of Salk vaccine has ended. Shots are now available commercially for any person of any age. More-than-adequate supplies make the change-over possible.

For Dr. Holle it was the end of a several months' fight to get shots for persons 20 years of age and more.

Health Department statistics show that 16 per cent of all Texas' paralytic polio cases this year and 29 per cent of polio deaths hit persons over 19.

So far this year Texas has had 668 cases, 15 of them fatal. During the same period last year 701 cases were reported. Health officials credit vaccinations for the drop.

The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any Person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for a nof-fense for which he or she is not guilty." 


