DANIEL, WILSON AND BISHOP WIN IN RUN-OFF ELECTIONS SAT.

From reports as they stand at the present, it appears that Senator Price Daniel has won his bid for the Democratic nomination for Governor of the State of Texas by a slim majority of about 3,000 votes. The final tabulation of votes will not be until sometime in September when the state committee meets and canvasses the vote. Daniel apparently received 698,125 votes to 694,578 votes for Ralph Yarborough, a difference of 3,547 votes.

Yarborough carried a large portion of the Central Texas counties. However, Coleman and Runnels counties gave Daniel a majority vote.

In the two boxes in Santa Anna Yarborough carried both boxes. The north side vote was 86 for Yarborough and 83 for Daniel; the south side vote was 119 for Yarborough and 95 for Daniel, making a total for Yarborough of 205 votes to 178 for Daniel out of a total of 384 votes cast.

In the first primary 487 votes were cast and 384 votes were cast in the second primary, a difference of 103 votes.

Will Wilson won the Attorney General's race, by a wide majority with Tom Moore conceding to Wilson soon after the majority of votes started coming in Saturday night.

A. J. Bishop of Winters won the nomination as State Representative of the 77th District by 132 votes in the four county area. Bishop is now serving in his second term. Grindstaff carried Santa Anna by a 206 to 171 vote with the north side giving Grindstaff 100 votes and the southside

giving him 106 votes. Bishop got 68 votes on the northside and 103 on the southside.

Ben Ramsey got 362 votes in Santa Anna for Lt. Governor.

Bids on Telephone Line Construction Being Accepted

Allyn Gill, manager of the Coleman County Telephone Co-operative, said this week that bids were now being accepted on the construction of telephone lines for the co-op in the southern part of the county. Bids will be accepted until 10:00 a. m. September 20, 1956 at the home office in Santa Anna, Texas. The bids will be opened and read aloud when the time has expired.

This bid will be for the construction, labor and materials to construct approximately 292.12 miles of dial telephone lines, including approximately 1.65 miles of plastic insulated plastic cheated cable. The project will be the lines connecting the exchanges to be built at Mozelle, Trickham and Rockwood with connecting toll lines to Santa Anna.

Emergency Feed Grain Program Extended to Oct. 31

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, today advised John H. Curry, County Supervisor, of the extension of the Emergency Feed Grain Program in Coleman and Runnels Counties. Farmers Home Administration county committees may now take applications from farmers and ranchers through October 1, 1956 to provide feed for basic livestock herds through October 31, 1956.

The emergency feed grain program is now authorized in 185 counties in Texas. Mr. McKay advised.

County Included In Hay & Roughage Program In Texas

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, today advised John H. Curry, FHA County Supervisor, of the designation of Coleman County under the Hay and Roughage Program for Texas.

Applications to participate in the Hay and Roughage Program will be received by county Farmers Home Administration committees immediately at the Farmers Home Administration office located at Room 414, County State Bank Bldg., Coleman, Texas.

The Hay and Roughage Program was worked out between the Governor and the Secretary of Agriculture to provide emergency assistance to farmers and ranchers in the State's designated disaster counties. Under the program the local county FHA committee will determine each applicant's eligibility and will issue a certificate good for \$7.50 per ton on roughage actually purchased. The applicant will then apply the certificate on the purchase price of roughage from any dealer he chooses. The dealer endorses the certificate and draws a draft on the Emergency Drought Committee's account.

Applications may be filed through December 3, 1956 for a supply of roughage needed to last through December 31, 1956. Roughage under the program includes hay either baled or loose, cotton seed hulls, peanut hulls, corncocks, sorghum bundles or ensilage.

Dove Season Opens Saturday

The Mourning Dove season in the North Zone of Texas, which includes Coleman County, will open at 12 o'clock noon Saturday, Sept. 1st and continue through Wednesday, October 17. Shooting hours are from 12 noon until sunset.

Bag limit is not more than 10 birds per day and not more than 10 in possession. Guns must be permanently plugged to a three shell capacity and must not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with a rifle is prohibited.

High School To Register On Saturday; School To Start On Tuesday, Sept. 4th

Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent of the Santa Anna Schools announces the local schools will open for regular classes on Tuesday, September 4, which will be a regular day of school. Buses will run and the lunchroom will operate in the usual manner. A General Assembly will be held in the high school auditorium at 8:30 a. m. and all students and parents are urged to be there on time. After the assembly, students will go to their regular class rooms.

Perry said all high school students are to register sometime during the day Saturday, September 1st. Teachers will be on hand to counsel with the student and help them get the subjects they want. All high school books will be issued as the students register on Saturday.

All elementary school students will register on the first day of school, Tuesday, Sept. 4. Parents of students to be in the first grade are advised to bring birth certificates or other proof of the new student's age, as no underage students will be accepted. In order to be eligible to enter the public school, a child must be 6 years of age on or before September 1 of the year he starts to school.

All school buses will operate on the first day of school at the same schedules as followed last year and along the same routes. After the first few days of school some changes will possibly be made in order to more conveniently serve more homes on the routes. Some changes in time and routes are already contemplated and others will be made as the need arises.

Roy Mathews To Serve As High School Principal

Roy Mathews, for the past several years head of the Science Department of the Santa Anna High School, this week has accepted the position as Principal of the high school, after the resignation of J. W. Simpson last Saturday morning. Simpson resigned to go to Stamford to fill the same position he has filled here for the past year. Stamford is a much larger school than Santa Anna and it is a promotion for Mr. Simpson.

In action by Supt. Cullen N. Perry and the school board, Mathews was qualified by the State Board of Education on Tuesday and he will accept the position. Perry said he would likely have to help out in the Science Department, but the complete schedule would have to be worked out after school gets underway. Simpson's resignation coming at so near the time for school to start has disrupted some of the schedule that had already been worked out.

Other teachers in the high school are: Herbert Busse, Math and History; Mrs. Mary Helen Baxter, Commercial and other assignments not yet made; Mrs. Maud Evans, English and Math; Mrs. Helen Hunter, Homemaking; James A. Mallow, Band Director and Instrumental Music; Page Mays, English and Speech; A. D. Pettit, Vocational Agriculture; and Joe Van Breemen, Coach, shop and American History.

Mrs. Minnie Alexander will teach the Colored School again this year. She has attended the Texas Southern University this summer.

Tuesday, Sept. 4 will be a full day of school. Buses are scheduled to arrive at school at 8:30 a. m. and will leave the schools at 3:50 p. m. The lunchroom will operate the same as last year with lunches priced at 25 cents. If the cost of operating the lunchroom can be met at this figure, there will be no change this year.

A meeting of the faculty will be held at the high school Monday morning and the remainder of the day will be used for the teachers to get ready for the opening day of school.

A lot of work has been done on the schools this summer. All the buildings were damaged in the heavy rain and hail in the spring. All rooms except four in the high school have been refinished and the others are to be refinished soon. Roof repairs have been extensive on all buildings with the gym requiring a completely new roof. Sixteen new window sashes and other exterior wall repair was necessary for the high school. In the elementary school, repairs are still underway on the roof and the doors. The outside of the building has been trimmed with new paint.

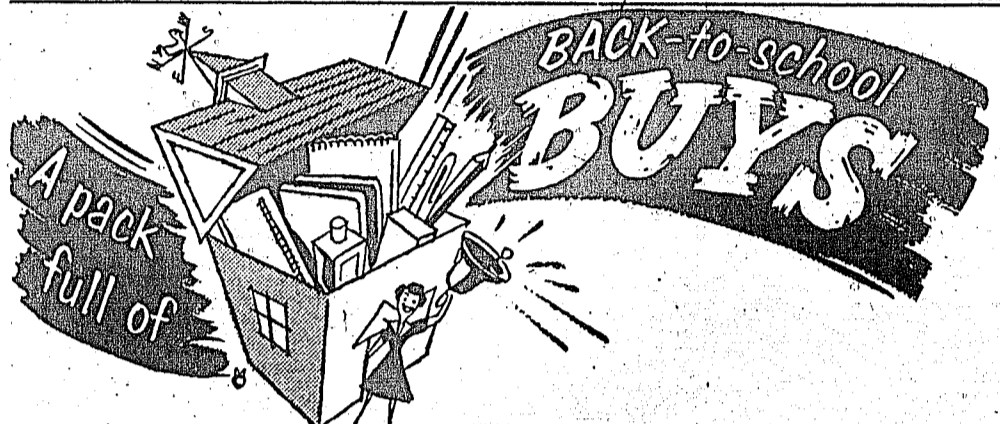

with January of 1957. If an application is filed with a district office of the Social Security Administration before February 1, 1958. Later filing will permit payments no further back than twelve months before the month in which the application is filed. In retirement cases, the parent need only show that the support requirements and the disability standards are met.

Another example might be where Jim Doe died in 1943, survived by a dependent, disabled, unmarried son older than 18. Payments can now be made beginning with January of 1957, upon a showing of actual support of the child by Jim at the time of Jim's death, and a finding of a disability condition that began before the son was 18 and

is still present.

Anyone wishing more detailed information on this provision should write the Social Security Administration, District Office, Abilene, Texas, and furnish the name, social security account number and date of death of the deceased parent, or the name and account number of the retired parent, name and date of birth of the disabled child. Arrangements will then be made

for a personal interview and the taking of formal applications in plenty of time to avoid any possible loss of benefits.

**ARTICLE NO. 4
1956 AMENDMENTS
TO THE SOCIAL
SECURITY LAWS**

Effective with the month of January 1957, monthly benefits are payable to certain unmarried "children" of retired or deceased insured parent(s), provided the children are now disabled, and have been so disabled since before they were 18 years of age.

The disability must be of such severity that the "child" is unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity. In death cases, even though the parents may have died as long ago as January 1, 1940, if the "child" meets the disability definitions, payments can start in January of 1957. No new showing of support is required where child's benefits were paid for any months before the child reached age 18. For example, at the time of John Doe's death in 1940, monthly benefits were made to his daughter, Jane, until she reached age 18 in 1952. If Jane is still disabled, and is unmarried, payments can be resumed



Tax Relief Provided For Drouth Stricken Livestock Farmers

Drought stricken farmers have been provided income tax relief on the sale of livestock by Public Law 629 approved June 29, 1956. When a farmer has to sell his livestock, in excess of the number that he usually sells in his ordinary business, due to a drought, he can consider the sale as an involuntary conversion. The tax relief provisions relating to involuntary conversions have in the past applied to such things as the burning of your house, losses by flood, etc. on which insurance is collected. No tax is due on the sale of property due to an involuntary conversion if the property is replaced with like kind within a specified period, generally before the end of the following year.

Mr. Cheatham, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood office stated that farmers who are having to sell livestock due to drought conditions will qualify. He pointed out that the Farmers Tax Guide for 1955, Internal Revenue Service Publication 225, sets out the procedure the farmers should follow in Chapter 13. Publication 225 is available at Internal Revenue Service offices and at county agent's offices. Thousands of farmers used this publication in preparing their 1955 tax returns.

SEPTEMBER PLENTIFUL FOODS LIST TOPPED BY TURKEYS AND RICE

College Station — A record turkey crop is expected this fall, about 10 million head more than a year ago.

Heaviest increases in farm marketing over a year ago are due in September, placing turkeys at the top of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list for the month.

Rice is another top feature on the list. While this year's crop is estimated to be about 13 percent less than last, carryover supplies are still heavy.

With the drouth forcing more cattle to market than last fall, beef also makes the September plentiful list. Since most of the cattle are off grass, supplies of intermediate and lower grades of beef will be especially heavy.

Good catches of tuna coupled with a heavy carryover from last year have put canned tuna in oil on the list.

Too, broilers and fryers, milk and other dairy products, fresh Bartlett pears, summer vegetables and peanut butter complete the list.

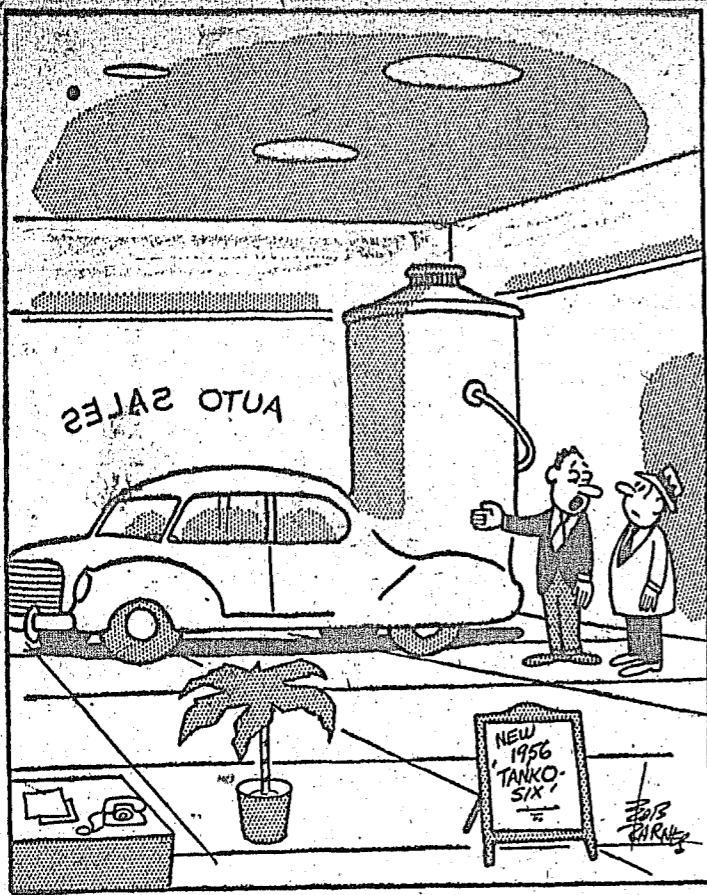

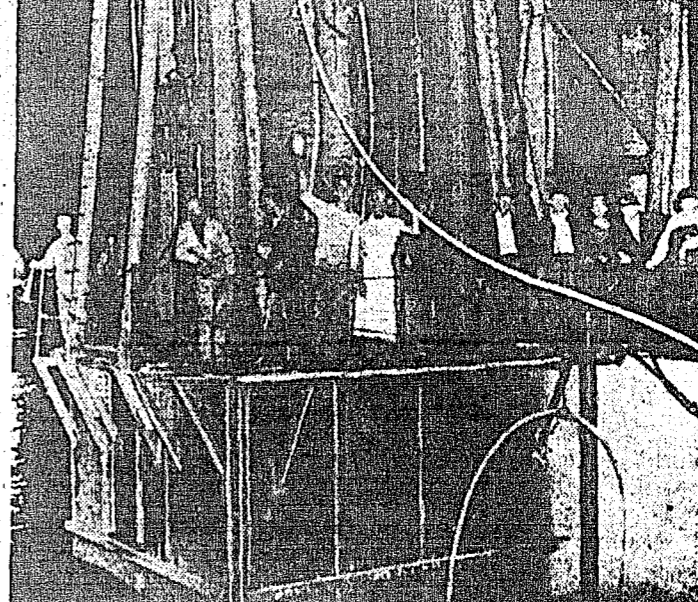

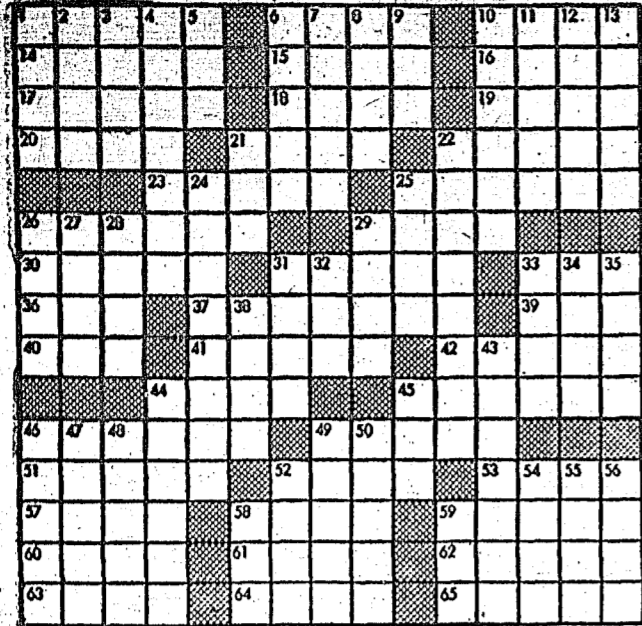

East Texas tall trees growing right down to the lake shore make Daingerfield State Park one of Texas beauty spots, beside furnishing inviting shade for picnics, large or small.

Daingerfield State Park in Morris County preserves one of Texas prettiest lakes in the heart of a highly developed industrial area needing recreational facilities.

Visitors get an introduction to the beauty on a winding tree lined road as they enter the park from State Highway 49 about midway between Hughes Springs and Daingerfield.

The setting of the 80-acre lake is superb. Large pine trees mixed with other growths, rim the shores on all sides, and are reflected in the water. A cleared peninsular tract is the site for the park recreation building, the boat house, large car parking circle, bath houses and a mall leading to the swimming beach.

The lake is well stocked with bass, crappie and white perch.

It has been cared for and fertilized under supervision of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Limited cabin facilities make the park chiefly a day-use area. All of the cabins have evaporative coolers, showers with hot and cold water, butane cooking stoves and ice boxes. Linens and blankets are furnished, but not utensils.

Swimming season at Daingerfield State Park runs through Labor Day. If weather is favorable, it is extended through the 15th of September. The swimming beach is fenced and has a tree-shaded lounging area within the enclosure. A large diving platform with aluminum diving board, slides and other equipment is anchored off shore. There is Lifeguard service.
