Local Boy Saves Jet Fighter And Pilot In Hair Raising Experience Near London, Eng.

(Editor's note: The following article is copied from the Argus, dated Sept. 14, 1956. This publication is an army publication, published by the Moleworth RAF Station, about 40 miles out from London, England, where Sgt. Stewart is stationed. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Radle, now of Santa Anna.)

A Moleworth AACs control tower shift supervisor was credited last week with saving an aircraft and possibly the life of an F-86 fighter pilot.

S/Sgt. Bob R. Stewart gave direction finding (DF) steers by radio to Maj. William M. Menaker when the pilot became lost near Moleworth due to communication difficulties.

Through Sgt. Stewart's coaching, Major Menaker placed his sleek but fuel-low Sabrejet safely onto Moleworth's runway. The aircraft's fuel supply ran out as the major taxied the plane from the runway to the parking ramp.

The sergeant first learned of the lost fighter when he heard the pilot calling "PAM," an emergency call code, to Manston, stating he was low on fuel and needed help in locating his position because of communications difficulties.

Normally the Lakenheath fixer network for DF steers handles such traffic troubles, but the major could not switch to the DF fixer net's frequency because of radio troubles. Sgt. Stewart then called the stranded pilot and proceeded to direct him to Moleworth.

At the same time, the field was experiencing another emergency, so contact with the pilot proved difficult, Stewart said. However, by Stewart plotting the pilot's course and turning the landing lights up to maximum intensity, the pilot was able to see through the rain and

With only minutes in fuel left, Major Menaker landed the F-86 downwind from east to west instead of west to east. Visibility was three miles. The entire hair-raising episode took place within a quarter of an hour.

Sgt. Stewart said this was his first experience in DF steers since he came to Moleworth in February, 1955. He came here from Grey, AFB, Texas.

A former resident of Whon, Texas, the sergeant joined the Air Force in August, 1952, soon after graduating from Santa Anna High School. He attended basic air traffic control school and completed the advanced course in July, 1954.

Sgt. Stewart and his wife, Sylvia, of Kettering, presently reside in Kettering.

A letter from Capt. David C. Evans, Commander of the Airways and Air Communications Service at the Moleworth Base, to Mr. and Mrs. Radle, states in part:

"I am enclosing a photograph (above) of your son and an Air Force Major, who possibly owes his life to Sergeant Stewart.

"One night last week this Major got lost while flying in the United Kingdom and Sergeant Stewart, hearing calls of distress demonstrated his outstanding ability as an Air Traffic Controller. The Major's jet fighter was practically out of fuel and he told Bobbie he was going to bail out if he didn't sight an airport soon.

"The most important point of this letter is to bring to your attention that this job wasn't done by an average tower operator. It was done by a man of the caliber the Air Force can't afford to lose. It takes men like Sergeant Stewart to keep the USAF the best and I encourage you to help me in my efforts to keep him."

Ray Owen Station Robbed 8th Time Sunday Night

The Ray Owen Service Station, located in the west part of town, was broken into Sunday night and between \$300 and \$400 worth of merchandise was taken. This is the eighth time this station has been robbed during the year since the war that Ray has been operating the station.

Taken in the loot were 15 new tires, one second-hand tire and tube and wheel and a .22 rifle with telescopic sight, valued at about \$30.00. The Sheriff's office also reports about the same kind of robbery in Brady the same night, but thus far the two have not been definitely connected.

No trace has been found of the tires and very few clues were left for the officers to work with. No damage was done to the building. The lock from the front door completely disappeared and it is not known whether it was picked or cut off. The ones who took the merchandise apparently wore leather gloves, as indicated by a close check for finger prints.

Two news tires and one second hand tire was left in the station.

Mr. Owen expressed his appreciation to the Sheriff's Department for their diligent and rapid work on the case. The robbery was discovered about 12:30 a. m. and the station had been checked by the night watchman at 11:30 p. m. The Sheriff's Department had road blocks set up throughout this area but failed to contact the Brady department and did not set a road block set up in that area.

Mountaineers Tie Robert Lee 14-14; Travel To Rochelle Friday Night

The underdog Santa Anna Mountaineers came from behind on two occasions last Friday night to tie up the score with the Robert Lee Steers in a thrilled-packed football game, before a good crowd from Santa Anna and a fair attendance from Robert Lee. The final score was 14-14. The game was marred by several costly fumbles and a large number of penalties for both teams.

The game got underway with the Steers kicking to the Mountaineers, then recovering a Mountaineer fumble on the 29-yard line. Two plays later the Steers fumbled and the Mountaineers recovered on the 30-yard line. The Mountaineers drove to the Steer 20-yard line and fumbled with the Steers recovering. At the end of the first period, the Steers had worked their way back to the Mountaineer 32-yard line. Six plays in the second period, the Steers passed for 30 yards for the first score of the game and then made their extra point. The Mountaineers took the kick-off on their 18-yard line and drove to the Steer 47-yard line before having to kick. The Steers took the ball on their 12-yard line and two plays later drove to their 29, where they fumbled a completed pass and the Mountaineers recovered. Two more plays and the Mountaineers recovered their own fumble in the end zone for their first TD, and then made the extra point, making the half-time score 7-7.

Beginning the third period, the Steers took the kick-off on their 15-yard line and drove all the way to score in eight plays, then made their extra point. The remainder of the quarter was used up near mid-field exchanging fumbles and the Steers having to kick twice. In the 4th period, the Steers failed to make the necessary 10 yards in four downs and the Mountaineers took over on the Steer 44-yard line. Eight plays later the Mountaineers crossed the Steer goal line from one yard out and made their extra point, to tie the score a second time at 14-14. On the next series of downs, the Steers were penalized for unnecessary roughness and again on a personal foul, then their coach apparently ordered his boys off the field and they were penalized to their one-yard line and told to get back on the field or forfeit the game. Several penalties were assessed both teams in the remaining few minutes of the game.

The Mountaineers were picked as a three-touchdown underdog at the beginning of the game by so-called predictors. Thus, the Mountaineers won a moral victory even though they only tied the score. They played a good brand of football except where offensive blocking was concerned, and that we saw very little of. There is room for lots of improvement in this department.

The Mountaineers had 16 first downs to 14 for the Steers and run 57 plays while the Steers run 46 plays. The Mountaineers completed only two of seven passes and the Steers completed eight of 16 passes. Santa Anna lost the ball four times on fumbles and the Steers lost it three times. The Mountaineers punted one time for 35 yards and the Steers punted two times for 57 yards. In the penalty department, the Mountaineers received five for 53 yards and the Steers received 12 for 112 yards.

Gary Floyd, right end, received an injury to his knee and is on crutches this week. The injury does not appear to be serious and he is expected to be back in the line-up in about two weeks.

Coach Van Breemen said he was pretty well pleased with the team except for their clicking of plays and offensive blocking. He said the boys were going to spend most of this week working on these major faults. We hope to see some decided improvement in the next few games.

"B" TEAM WINS OVER GOLDTHWAITE
On last Thursday night, the Mountaineer "B" team journeyed to Goldthwaite for their first game of the season. The local boys won the game 12-0 in a scrap that lasted the entire game. The first score came in the second period on a quick pitch-out play that covered 7 yards, completing a drive covering about 40 yards. The second score came in the final period with the quarter-back sneak

covering the final yard on a drive that covered some 35 yards. Goldthwaite never really threatened and did not cross the Mountaineer 20-yard line.

TO ROCHELLE THIS WEEK

This week the Mountaineers will journey to Rochelle for the last non-conference game before the conference season begins on October 5. So far as we have been able to find out, Rochelle has played only one game this season and they tied with Lometa 6-6 two weeks ago. Not much is known about the team and their experience. The game is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p. m. at the Rochelle High School football field. We would like to see a good crowd from Santa Anna there to help cheer the Mountaineers on to victory.

Homecoming Set For Sat., Nov. 3rd

Plans for the annual Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming are about complete. The date for the annual affair has been set for Saturday, November 3 and plans are for a full day of activity.

Registration will begin at 8:00 a. m. in the high school building and will continue throughout most of the day. A coffee will be held in the school lunchroom from 10:00 to 11:00 a. m. and the business meeting and a variety program will be held in the high school auditorium at 2:00 p. m. At 5:30 p. m. a barbecue supper will be served and plans are being made to serve baked ham to those who do not care for the barbecue. The Santa Anna-Bronte football game will be played at 7:30 p. m. Saturday night. Plans for the Homecoming dance are incomplete, but if the dance is held, it will start after the ball game and end at 12:00 p. m. or earlier. Announcement will be made at a later date concerning the dance.

There will be plenty of free time for former classmates to have individual class meetings and just plain visiting.

Postal cards announcing the Homecoming were mailed early this week, but were not mailed to all local former students. Most of the cards went to out of town former students.

The officials of the Homecoming would like to see the biggest crowd ever here this year and are depending on local former students helping. They ask that every former student communicate with all former students you know and try to get them here for the one-day affair.

Texas Roughage Program To Be Re-appraised

The volume of approved applications for assistance under the Texas Emergency Roughage program has exceeded the estimates of demand made when this program was negotiated so it is necessary to re-appraise the actual cash requirements.

The agreement between Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and Governor Allan Shivers provides for an allocation of One Million Dollars of Federal funds for the roughage program. Funds available to the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance roughage programs must be allocated among all disaster designated states where such a program is needed.

Mr. Walter T. McKay, Texas State Director of Farmers Home Administration, has been instructed by K. L. Scott, Director of Credit Services, U. S. Department of Agriculture, to immediately instruct all FHA County Offices in the designated areas to withhold further approvals of roughage purchase certificates.

The County Offices are authorized to continue to accept and hold on file applications for assistance under this roughage program, but are instructed to take no action on these applications and to make daily reports on the tonnage requirements covered by such applications to Mr. McKay's office.

Mr. McKay has been asked to solicit the assistance of the Texas USDA Drought Committee and the Office of the Governor in making a careful re-appraisal of the demand for assistance under this Emergency Roughage program including financial requirements.

Mr. Scott stated that in keeping with the policies and the desires of Secretary Benson, the Department will continue to work closely with Governor Shivers and leaders in the State and give all assistance possible within the authority and funds available to the Department in providing assistance to drought stricken farmers and ranchers in Texas.

Allyn W. Gill, manager of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, said this week that a contract has been awarded to the Almer B. Jackson Construction Company of Abilene, in the amount of \$193,248.21, for the construction of the co-op's dial telephone lines to cover ten communities in the southern part of Coleman County. This contract is subject to approval by the REA board in Washington. Four bids were received, three of them within close estimates of each other. However, all were higher than expected due to a big increase in material cost during recent months, and Gill said the bid would receive close study of the Washington board before it was definitely awarded. He expects to hear from Washington in approximately three weeks.

The contract calls for clearing of the right-of-way, construction of lines and furnishing all materials, labor and supplies for the job. The construction company will have 30 days after the approval from Washington is received, to get equipment on site to begin construction and then 150 working days to complete all construction. The contractor will run dial telephone lines to all applications for membership homes, but this contract does not include the telephone in the home. The 292.12 miles of lines will include Valera, Voss, Leaday, Mozelle, Rockwood, Trickham, Gouldbusk, Whon and Shields and exchanges will be located at Trickham, Rockwood and Mozelle.

If approval is received from Washington within three weeks, the new system should be in operation by late spring of 1957.

There remains to be let a contract for the construction of buildings at the three places where exchanges will be located and floor plans are being studied for them now. Gill said he expects these contracts to be offered for bids in about a month.

Tom Hays House Struck By Lightning Wed.

Lightening struck the electric meter on the west side of the Tom Hays house about 7 a. m. Wednesday and burned all the wiring off on the outside of the house. No fire got inside the house and the amount of damage had not been determined Wednesday morning. There was a possibility that several electric appliances may have sustained some damage.

Mrs. Hays said they did not know the lightning had struck, but the fire alarm was turned in by someone at the hospital. She did not know it was her home until the fire department arrived. She said no water was used, as Mr. House cut all the wiring from the main line and the fire soon went out. This was during the heaviest rain fall.

Mrs. Hays expressed sincere appreciation to the quick action of the fire department. The damage could have been extensive in a very short time.

She said they did not feel the shock of the lightning in the house, but did hear the loud thunder at the time it struck.

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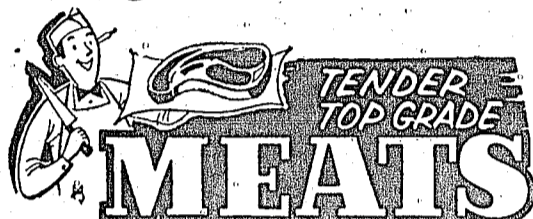

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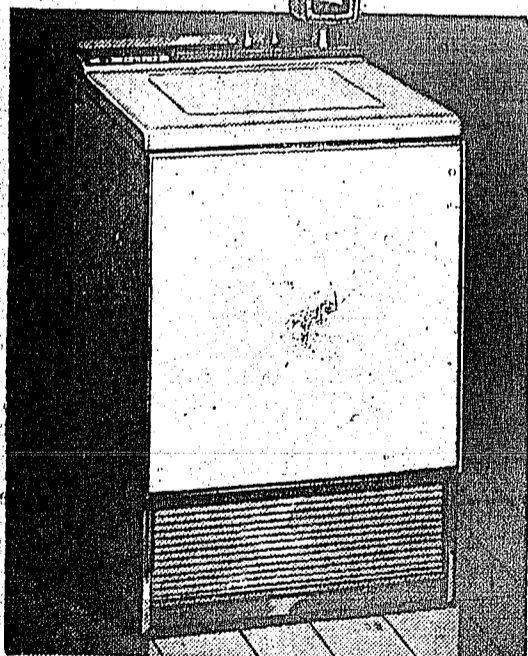

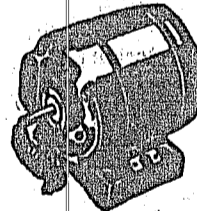

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THE PARK OF THE WEEK

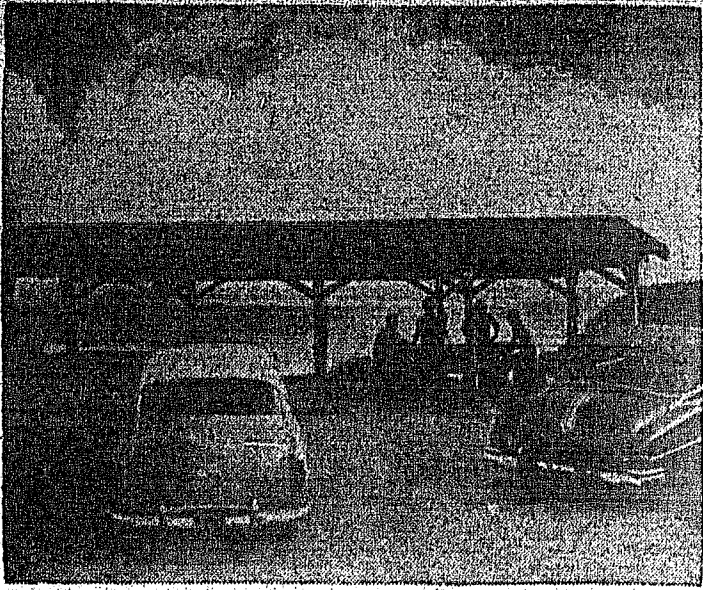

GOOSE ISLAND STATE PARK's camp shelters overlook salt water at vantage points on the island which is a favorite haven of wild geese. Most of the park is on the mainland touching three coastal bodies of water—Aransas, Copano and St. Charles bays. The park is 10 miles north of Rockport, Texas, on State Highway 35 at the Copano Bay causeway.

Goose Island State Park is the only salt water Texas state park. Situated north of Rockport on Aransas, Copano and St. Charles Bays, it furnishes access from its boat docks to a large area. The name comes from the island portion of the park which has long been a favored haven for wild geese. The mainland portion of the park is larger than the island and occupies much of the Lamar peninsula. Perhaps the best known physical feature of Goose Island State Park is its big liveoak tree. It is tree number eleven among the chartered members of the Liveoak Society of America, which ranks the trees by specific measurements. Statistically, the tree has a girth of 32 feet and one inch, measured at a height of four feet above the ground. It has a crown spread

of 140 feet and its height is 80 feet. It is estimated to be more than 2,000 years old. Many legends have been woven about the tree. It is said to have been the council place for the Karankawa Indians; pirate treasure is reputed to be buried with the tree as the landmark for finding it; it is known variously as Hangman's Tree for executions and as the Bishop's Oak because of nearness of a Bishop's residence. Fishing, boating and picnicking are the park's chief recreational attractions. Many dances are held at its stone refectory. In season the park's wildflower display is unusual, as is the bird life on all the Lamar peninsula. Entrance to the park is at the Copano Bay causeway on State Highway 35 about 10 miles north of Rockport.

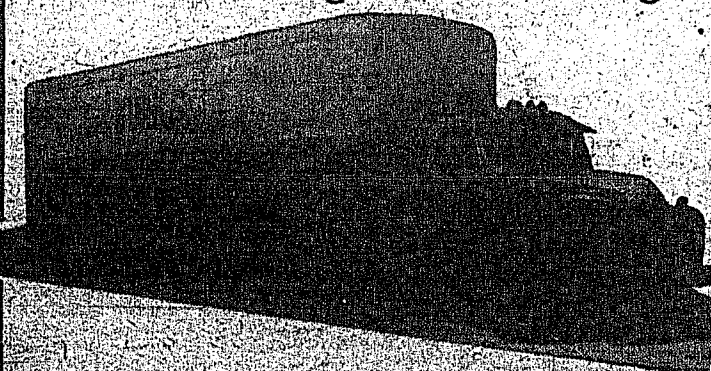

**ARTICLE NO. 8
1956 AMENDMENTS
TO THE SOCIAL
SECURITY LAWS**

The 1956 Amendments to the Social Security law also made some changes that affect the coverage of farm and ranch employees, beginning with the calendar year of 1957.

For the year 1955 and 1956, ranch and farm employees got social security credit if the farm or ranch operator paid them \$100 or more in cash wages during one of those years.

Under the new law, beginning with January 1, 1957, earnings for work done on a farm or ranch will count for social security coverage under either of these two conditions:

(a) If the farm employer pays you \$150 or more in cash during the year, your cash pay from that employer is covered by the law, OR

(b) If you do farm or ranch work for an employer on 20 or more days during a year for cash pay figured on a time basis (rather than a piece-rate or per-acre basis), your cash pay for such employer is covered by the law, regardless of the amount.

For the \$150-a-year test, both piece-rate and time-rate cash pay count. The total number of days worked does not matter so long as you are paid \$150 in cash by the employer in the year.

For the 20-day test, the total amount of your cash pay does not matter so long as you work for one employer on 20 days or more for cash pay based in some unit of time such as an hour, day or a week.

Wages paid to members of a labor crew such as those used to pick cotton may be covered by the social security law, but in the past it was sometimes not easy to tell whether the employer was the farm operator or the crewleader (or labor contractor or row boss). Beginning on 1957,

crew members are employees of the crew leader unless there is a written agreement between the crew leader and the farmer showing that the crew leader is an employee of the farmer. If such agreement exists, then both the crew leader and members of the crew are employees of the farmer.

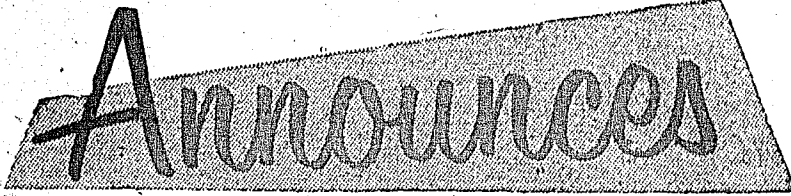

Candidates for the Air Force Academy must be able to pass the medical examination for flying training and a pilot aptitude test.

Persons interested in taking the competitive examination on November 20 are advised to write Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C., not later than October 15th.

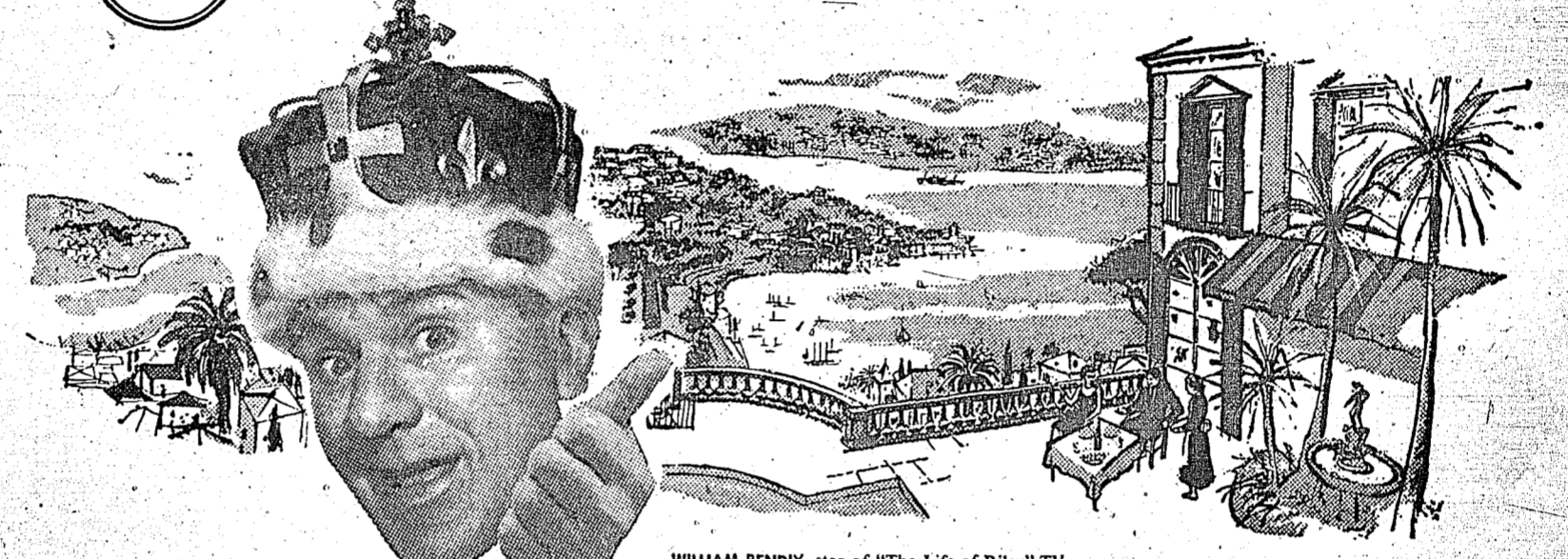

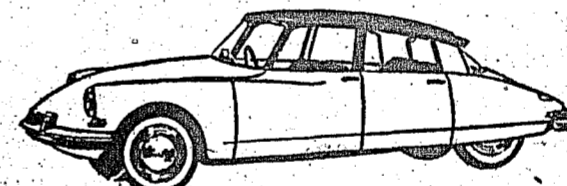

Central Colorado Soil Conservation District News

The annual Soil Conservation District supervisors election is for Zone Three this year. The election will be held in the conference room of the County Agriculture Building in Coleman at 7:30 p. m. October 2, 1956.

Zone Three includes all the area in Coleman County between the Brownwood and Baird highways. Qualified voters residing in the county who own land in Zone Three are eligible to vote in the election and are urged to be present.

Local seed dealers report that over 5000 pounds of winter peas to be planted as cover crops have been sold to farmers and ranchers in the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District.

Winter peas may be planted in rows at the rate of six to 12 pounds per acre or drilled with oats at the rate of 20 pounds of peas to one bushel of oats per acre.

Winter peas planted in rows may be clipped loose at the surface with a buzzard wing sweep after the peas have attained sufficient growth. The peas can be clipped loose without opening up the bed thus saving valuable moisture. The following crop can then be planted in the same row where the peas have conditioned the soil. If necessary the peas can be plowed out and the crop planted in one operation.
