Mountaineers Open Conference Season Here Friday Night; Beat Rochelle 27-0

The 9-A conference season will get underway Friday night with four of the conference teams playing in the first games. The Mountaineers will pit their undefeated but twice tied record against the undefeated and untied record of the Rising Star Wildcats on the local field at 8:00 p. m. Mason will pit their undefeated and untied record against the twice defeated Llano Yellow Jackets at Llano.

Rising Star has won three games in three starts this year, winning over May 7-6, Wylie 13-6 and Early 34-0. They did not play the past weekend but most of the team scouted Santa Anna while they were beating Rochelle on Friday night. The Wildcats are being coached by a former coach under whom the team took two district championships and were considered one of the top teams in this part of the state, several years ago. However, they do not have the power they had at that time.

The Mountaineers have tied Clyde 0-0, won over Bangs 33-0, tied the powerful Robert Lee Steers 14-14, and last week won over Rochelle 27-0. Few small schools produce a team with as much power and speed as the Robert Lee team has this year and we give the Mountaineers a lot of credit for the tie with them. On the basis of this game, we pick the Mountaineers to be the winners Friday night.

Juniors Win Over Early Tuesday Nite

The Junior Mountaineers of the Santa Anna Ward School won a close ball game from the Junior Longhorns of Early Tuesday night, by a score of 25-20.

Most of the scoring was in the first half, with Early leading at half-time by a 20-19 score.

The Mountaineers took the kick-off and fumbled on the first play. Early took the ball and went on the score immediately. Early scored again in the first period and then in the second period, the Mountaineers recovered an Early fumble and went on to score. Santa Anna scored three times in the second period and Early once.

Most of the game was played in a light rain, but it did not seem to affect either team much, other than to make the ball a little slick. Coach Donham said he did not think this was what caused the fumbles though.

All the scores were made on long runs by both teams. The Mountaineers went in front in the fourth period and during the last three minutes of the game held the Longhorns on the 1-foot line, to save the game. This was the only time either team got close to the goal line other than on the long runs for the TDs.

Next week the Juniors will have an open date and then on Tuesday night, October 16, they will play Bangs on the local field.

"B" Team Games Get Cancelled

Coach Joe Van Breemen has run into considerable difficulties in keeping the schedule for the "B" team going. Last week, the Mountaineers "B" team was scheduled to play Cross Plains "B" and the game was cancelled because the Buffalos had so many injuries they did not have enough boys to play the "B" team game and then play their regular schedule on Friday.

Football players are not allowed to play in more than one game per week.

The Cross Plains game was rescheduled for Thursday night, October 11, and if nothing else happens, the Mountaineers will go to Cross Plains that night.

Because of a shortage of players, Early has dropped out of the schedule altogether. Make-up games were scheduled with Bangs for at least one "B" game and then cancelled because of a shortage of players.

Thus, according to the present schedule as we go to press, the next "B" team game will be played on Thursday night, October 11 at Cross Plains.

Coach Van Breemen is interested in getting two or three more games for the "B" team and would appreciate contact from any school interested

GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY

United Fund Goal Set At \$17,389.78

The Board of Directors of the Coleman County United Fund met at the Coleman BCD office Monday night and adopted the budget for the year of \$17,389.78 for the entire county. Quotas for individual areas will be announced later.

The Coleman County United Fund was organized for the purpose of making one county-wide drive for funds to take care of all the numerous fund raising drives the county has experienced during the past several years. All major drives will come under the one heading with the exception of the March of Dimes drive, which will be held in January.

Drives coming under the heading of the Coleman County United Fund is the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts, Heart Fund, Cancer Fund, Girl Scouts, and the Contingency Fund.

Broken down, the county quotas for each division is as follows: Red Cross, \$5,371.02; Salvation Army, \$2,118.15; Boy Scouts, \$3,412.86; Heart Fund, \$200.00; Cancer Fund, \$2,064.45; Girl Scouts, \$1,325.00; and the Contingency Fund, \$2,898.30.

The county will be divided into two parts. County Precincts 1, 3 and 4 will have headquarters in Coleman and County Precinct 2 will have headquarters in Santa Anna. As there is no Girl Scouts in Precinct 2, no money will be asked for that purpose here. The directors are to meet in the near future and set the quotas for each area for each division of the amount asked.

There may be some question concerning the Contingency Fund. A simple explanation is the fund is to be used for any other need that might arise during the course of a year that no definite funds have been raised for, and for the purpose of carrying on the drive from year to year.

Dates Set For Overseas Mailing Of Xmas Packages

The period from October 15 to November 15 has again been designated for the acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of our forces overseas, announces the Post Office Department, and the following instructions are given for the guidance of mailers by Mrs. Leona B. Bruce, Acting Postmaster.

The earlier the better in mailing—no assurance can be given that surface parcels mailed after November 15 or air mail parcel post mailed after December 1, will be delivered in time for Christmas.

Air parcel post is limited in size to 30 inches in length and girth combined and two pounds in weight. The maximum size and weight limits for domestic surface parcel post are applicable to Christmas parcels for the Armed Forces except that there is a limit of 50 pounds to certain APOs.

Boxes for overseas must be of strong construction, of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, and all must be tied with strong cord. They must be tightly packed with plenty of cushioning material. Addresses must be legible and should be prepared in typewriting or ink and should be directly on the wrapper rather than on a label pasted to the wrapper. Enclosed in each parcel should be the names and addresses of sender and addressee, with a list of the contents of the package to provide identification in case the parcel becomes broken or the address illegible. Letters may be enclosed provided that postage at the first class rate is paid for each letter.

The Post Office Department recommends the use of Postal Money Orders to send gifts of money to the Armed Forces overseas, but reminds the public that including currency in letters overseas is prohibited in most cases.

All efforts should be made to get Christmas packages in the mail soon so that the boys in the Armed Forces will receive them before the big day.

The Pledge Card is designed in such a manner that the donor can pledge a certain amount of money and the entire pledge may be paid in cash; by bank draft on an annual, semi-annual, quarterly or monthly basis; or by the donor making payments semi-annually, quarterly or monthly to the treasurer of the United Fund. The first part of the card is to be filed with the treasurer and a record of all transactions will be kept on the back of the card. The second part of the card is a bank draft authorization, and if you prefer to have the treasurer draw on you for the contribution, you will fill out and sign the bank draft, which will be filed with your bank. The last part of the card is a receipt for the amount of money you pledge to the Coleman County United Fund drive, which is deductible from your income tax at the end of the year.

He was married in 1933 to Iola McCamlin in Albany, who sur-

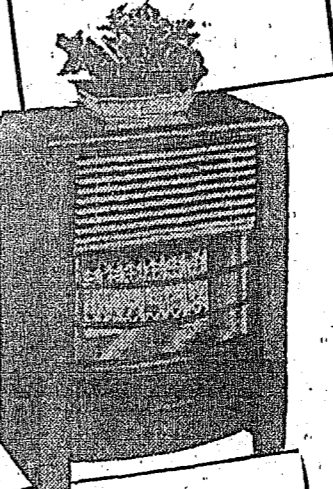
vives him. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

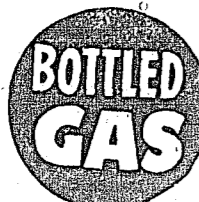

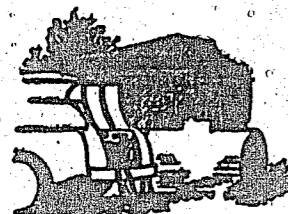
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Ike Better Democrat Than Adlai, Says Supporter

A bunch of us were standing around talking the other day, and the talk got around to politics like it usually does. Some of the boys said they'd voted for Ike in '52 and were going to do it again; some of them said they'd always voted the Democratic ticket straight and always expected to—you know how it goes around a little Texas town.

One fellow said something that made the rest of us stop and think. He said he was a Democrat, sure—always had been, and his father and grandfather before him. And he always felt like he had to vote for the best Democrat in the race, which he was going to do this year.

But the American people are smarter than some politicians give them credit for being, and before they vote they're going to sit down and ask themselves this question:

"Remembering 1952, when our boys were dying in Korea and the newspapers were full of talk about mink coats and Communists and corruption in Washington—now, be honest about it: If you could, would you go back to 1952 and start over with Adlai Stevenson instead of Dwight D. Eisenhower?"

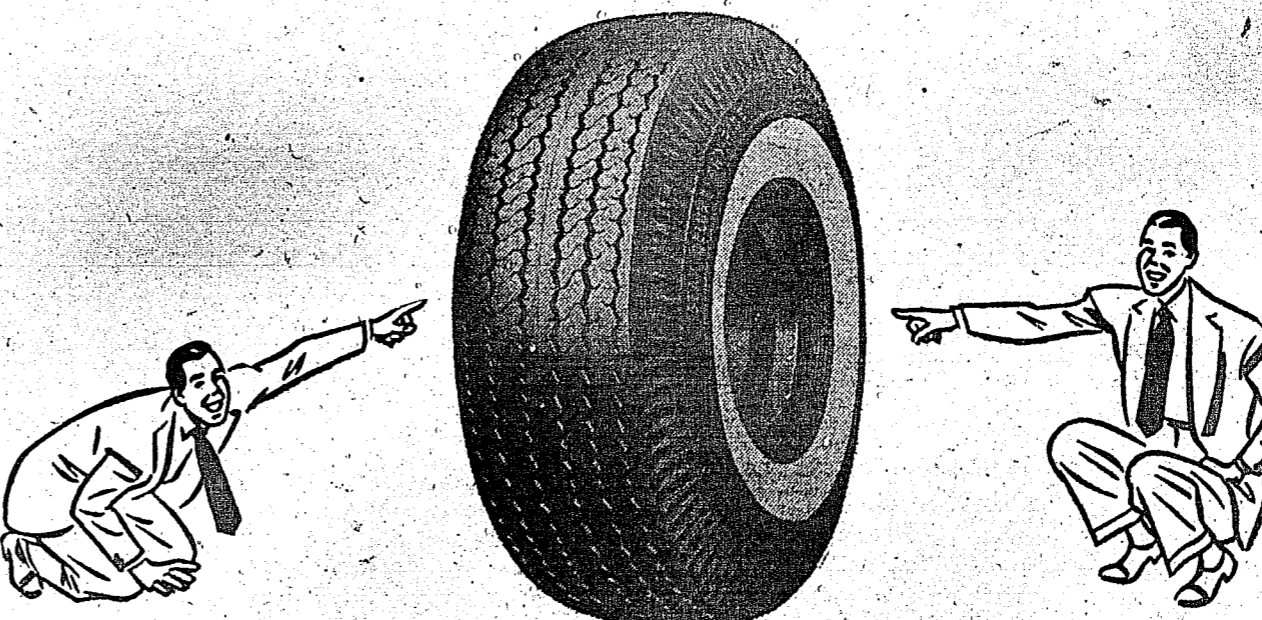

**ARTICLE NO. 9
 1956 AMENDMENTS
 TO THE SOCIAL
 SECURITY LAWS**

In addition to the changes in

the Social Security law by the 1956 Amendments which have been treated in separate articles in this series, there are a number of other changes which are summarized below. Persons desiring more detailed information on any of these changes are invited to write the Social Security Administration, Abilene,

Texas.
 1. The new law serves to increase somewhat the rate of interest creditable to the Social Security Trust Fund.

2. A new Trust Fund, the Disability Insurance Trust Fund, is established, and definite amounts, based on total social security tax collections, are to be deposited therein. Disability insurance payments will be made from this special Trust Fund.

3. In computing benefits for new claims, five years of low or no earnings may now be dropped even though the insured worker had fewer than 20 quarters of coverage to his credit. This will permit newly covered self-employed persons to get full benefits by disregarding the years 1951-1955 when they were excluded from coverage, and will also benefit some others filing their claims now or in the future.

4. Remarriage will still terminate a widow's benefits. However, if the remarriage is ended by the death of the new husband before the new marriage has been in effect less than a year, her rights to benefits on the earlier husband's record are restored. A marriage of such short duration does not give her rights to benefits on the later husband's record, so it seemed equitable to restore her previous rights in such cases.

5. Federal courts, in imposing sentences for convictions for treason, sedition, subversion, espionage, sabotage, may bar social security payments to the convicted person otherwise due on his own or someone else's social security record. Such penalty would not, however, affect the social security rights of the convicted person's dependents or survivors.

6. Social security coverage is denied for service after June 1956 in the employ of any organization required to register, under the Internal Security Act of 1950, as a Communist-front, Communist-action, or Communist-infiltrated organization.

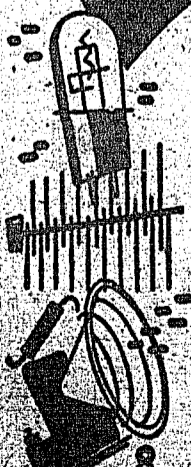

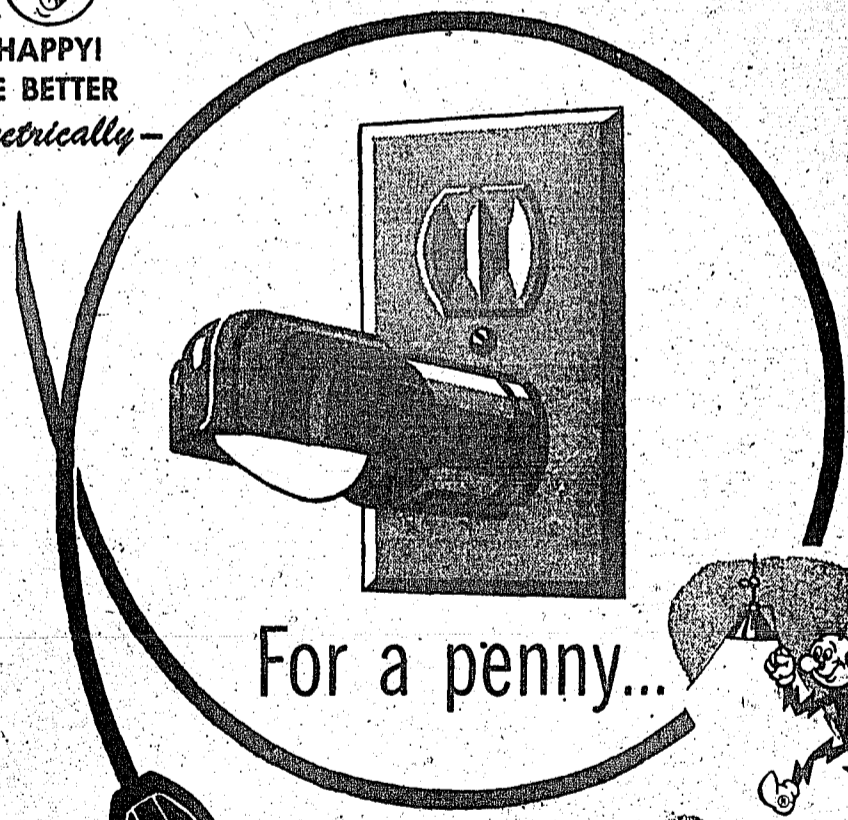
