Cross Plains To Come Here For "B" Team Game Thursday

The Cross Plains Buffaloes will visit Santa Anna Thursday night of this week for a "B" team game that was first scheduled to be played at Cross Plains. The game is now scheduled to begin at 7:30 p. m. at Mountaineer Stadium.

In the Football Advertisement elsewhere in this issue of The News, it states the game will be played in Cross Plains, but the change in schedule was not made until after this section of The News was printed.

This will be the first home game for the "B" team. They have played one other game, with Goldthwaite, and beat them 12-0.

Rising Star Humiliates Mountaineers

The Rising Star Wildcats handed the Santa Anna Mountaineers their first defeat of the season last Friday night in the first conference game for both teams. The score was 20-7.

It was a humiliating defeat for the Mountaineers, who should have won the game going away. Had the Mountaineers played the same brand of ball they did against Robert Lee, they would have won the game by a very comfortable margin, or, if they had played against Robert Lee like they did against the Wildcats, there is not much telling how much Robert Lee would have beat them.

There is little explanation for the loss and no excuse, other than to say the Wildcats out-charged, out-fought, out-blocked, out-scored and out-played the Mountaineers until it was pitiful. The Mountaineers have a much better team than they showed Friday night.

All week the school spirit had been high at the school and when the boys left school on Friday afternoon, prospects were good for them to win the game easily. However, Coach Van Breemen said that when they came back that evening to suit out, it seemed all their spirit was gone, and that is just the way they played that night. The coach said part of it possibly could have been laid to the fact that a number of them were planning to attend the State Fair the next day and they were thinking about that more than about playing football. However, most every school in Texas sent a number of students to the Fair the same as they do every year.

The first period was scoreless, with the Mountaineers making a total of 13 yards and losing 2 yards while the Wildcats gained enough yardage for 6 first downs and then making their first score early in the second period. The Mountaineers made 2 first downs in the second period and Rising Star made one. Fumbles were numerous, especially for the Mountaineers who were being charged so fast while on offense, they seldom had an opportunity to get the ball under control.

In the third period the Wildcats did just about what they wanted to, scoring two times and making one extra point. During the 4th period, one Mountaineer finally got loose and ran 64 yards toward the goal line only to be overtaken and brought down from behind on the 1-yard line. It took all four downs for the Mountaineers to make the last one yard.

TO GOLDTHWAITE

This week the Mountaineers go to Goldthwaite to battle with a much more powerful team than the Wildcats, the Goldthwaite Eagles. The Eagles have won three games this season from Class AA teams while losing one to a Class AA team. In the first game of the season the Eagles lost to Hamilton 0-12, then won over San Saba 20-0, Burnet 7-0 and last week won over McGregor 21-0. There is little doubt but what they will be the favorites by a big majority in their game with the local eleven this week.

Coach Van Breemen said he was giving the boys some hard work-outs this week and was going to make a number of changes in the line-up. Some of the boys who have been sitting the games out will be in the starting line-up and some starters will be warming the bench. Some changes are also to be made in the position some of the boys

Check From NFIP Headquarters Helps Local Fund

A check for \$3,225.00 has been received by the Coleman County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to provide financial aid for local polio patients. It was announced recently by Mrs. J. A. B. Miller, Chapter Chairman. The above sum is not near enough to cover two months expenses.

Mrs. Miller said that this county is one of a number in the nation where local March of Dimes funds are insufficient to cover polio-fighting needs. Mrs. Miller said that the Chapter's present financial plight is the result of the assistance it has given in the past to five patients of 1955-1956 who have required — and still require — costly care to give them a chance to recover their fullest capacities: 1955, Benny Jack Garrett, who is completely paralyzed; 1951, Frances Casey, No-vice, partial paralysis; 1955, Morris Brown and Danny Elred of Coleman.

"In the Salk vaccine we now have the means of bringing about the eventual control of new polio," Mrs. Miller said. "But to us of the March of Dimes this is not enough. Our job in the conquest of polio will not be finished until polio is finished as a crippler of human beings and until further mass appeals to the American public are no longer necessary to insure the care of those who have been stricken. "Until that day comes, it is reassuring to know that the whole organization of the National Foundation stands behind our chapter, ready to give financial assistance in case we must have it. The resolve of the National Foundation has always been to see to it that no one in our country need go without necessary care in the treatment of polio for lack of funds."

Frances Casey has been taken to Scott and White Hospital in Temple, for one or more operations to enable her to be able to walk. Benny Jack Garrett just recently returned home from Gonzales and will likely return for further treatment after the first of the year.

Jr. Mountaineers Play Bangs Here Tuesday Night

The Junior Mountaineers enjoyed an open date the past Tuesday night and will get back in the harness again the night of October 16, when they play hosts to the Junior Bangs Dragons. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

Bangs handed the local Juniors a 19-0 defeat in the first game of the season and the boys are working hard to get in shape to even this score up on Tuesday night.

It seems they have a good opportunity and a good crowd will help the local boys out.

The Mountaineers have about as heavy a team as any in the district and their defense usually is as good as any small high school could expect. However, it slipped last week and the offensive has been weak all year. The coaches hope to help this matter some this week.

C. K. Hunter Observes 91st Birthday

C. K. Hunter observed his 91st birthday October 9 in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arthur Turner. He is one of the few remaining pioneers of Coleman County, having come to Santa Anna in 1892.

Two of his brothers, the late L. W. Hunter and W. J. Hunter, came in 1880 and settled in the Trickham Community, later moving to Santa Anna, where both were engaged in business for many years. He has one surviving brother, Thaddeus Warsaw Hunter, 86, of Ponca City, Oklahoma. He formerly operated a newspaper in Santa Anna.

Mr. C. K. Hunter was a druggist for over 20 years here, but has been retired several years.

He is in excellent health, takes an interest in current happenings and reads his newspaper daily without the aid of glasses. He has been a regular attendant at Sunday school and church throughout the years.

His father, Capt. T. W. Hunter, was the first male white child born at Morgan's Point, Texas, near Galveston, September 29, 1822. His grandfather, Dr. John Hunter, also an early settler, and his family was one of the first of Stephen F. Austin's colonists.

Mr. Hunter has two daughters, Mrs. Ross Kelley and Mrs. Arthur Turner of Santa Anna; two sons, Jesse E. Hunter of New London, Texas and John Hunter of Philadelphia, Pa.

Precinct 2 Quota \$2127.50 In United Fund Drive

Community chairmen will contact other workers in their area for help, and their helpers will contact every citizen in the area to get their contributions.

Merchants and other citizens in the area are requested to give the United Fund some serious consideration before the workers call on them. You are asked to remember that you are contributing to all the drives that usually are held in Coleman County, with the exception of the March of Dimes, when you contribute to the Coleman United Fund. This will save you considerable time and will save the workers considerable time and effort by combining all the drives under one head.

All managers or owners of business establishments are requested to act as chairmen of their concerns and contact their employees for their contributions. Every salaried worker is requested to contribute one day's work, or the salary for one day's work, to the United Fund Drive. This can be contributed by pledge and paid all at one time or by installments, whichever you prefer. However, if possible, it is suggested that all who can pay their entire pledge at one time. All contributions to the United Fund are deductible from your income tax at the end of the year.

Supt. Cullen N. Perry has accepted the job as chairman of the entire school system, covering all the teachers, bus drivers and other employees of the school system. Heads of other organizations are requested to volunteer their services in a similar manner.

Funds contributed to the Precinct 2 part of the Coleman County United Fund drive will go to five major campaigns: Salvation Army, Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Heart Fund and Cancer Fund. A portion will go into the Contingency Fund, which will be used to finance the drive and to take care of unexpected requests for funds that might arise during the course of a year's time.

Two A & M Students To Practice Teaching In Ag. Department

The Vocational Agriculture Department of Santa Anna High School has been selected by the Agricultural Education Department of Texas A & M College for use as a student teaching center during October 15-26, according to Mr. Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent of schools. Mr. Donald E. Smalley and Mr. Howard R. Yeargan will serve as student teachers in the vocational agriculture department during this period.

Mr. Smalley and Mr. Yeargan are students at Texas A & M College preparing to become teachers of vocational agriculture after they graduate. In preparation for this profession, they are spending two weeks of this semester doing student teaching. This student teaching, made possible by the cooperation of the local agriculture department and Texas A & M, permits them to gain direct teaching experience under the supervision of an experienced teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. E. V. Walton, Head of the Agricultural Education Department at A & M College, said that the local vocational agriculture department, with Mr. A. D. Pettit as teacher, was considered one of the outstanding departments in Texas. He also said that he felt confident the student teachers would gain some valuable experience while at Santa Anna High School.

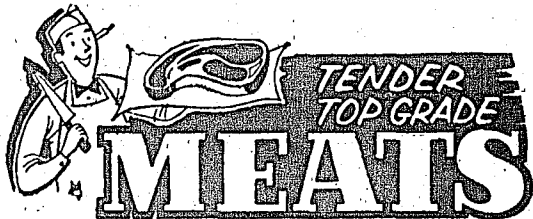

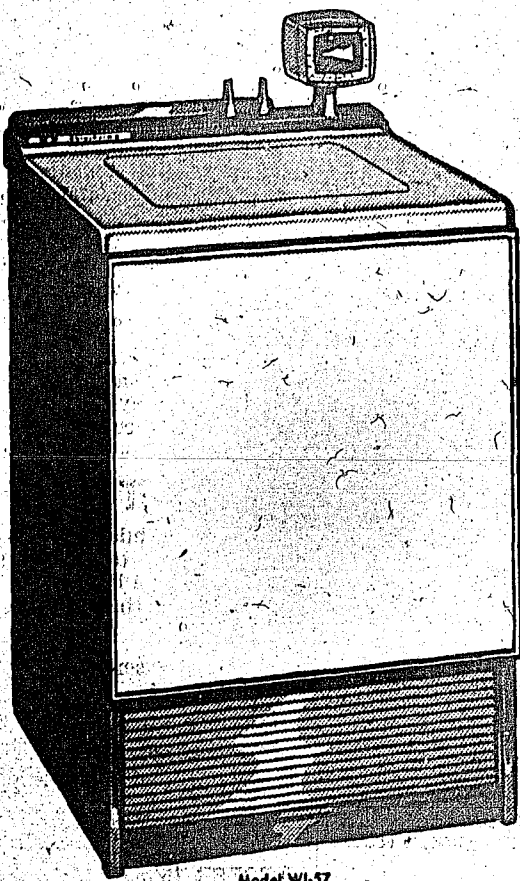

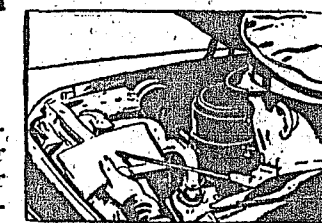

SOIL - GRASS STORY TOLD AT STATE FAIR

All State Fair-going Texans whether they farm or not, should make an honest effort to attend one special feature of this year's Agriculture Show — The Story of Soil.

For anyone who has been confused on the matter of soil conservation and land mismanagement, the fair has a program designed to increase soil concern as well as educate its visitors.

Introduction to the soil story is told through the relation of grass to soil. Grass is the prime factor in bringing the soil into balance with the forces of nature.

In this connection, thirty of the more useful species of Southwestern grasses will be predominant display among the Agriculture Show's other exhibits. A few of the grasses are: little and big bluestems, switchgrass, four flower trichloris, mars hay cord, Lindheimer mully, can bluestem, curly mesquite, green sprangletop, sideoat grama, vince mesquite, buffalo, plains bristle, sand love and tall dropseed.

These and other grasses will be displayed alive and growing in metal containers against pictorial backgrounds illustrating development of soil from rocks. Major crops produced on various Texas soils will also be represented.

Technicians will be present daily during the fair to answer questions concerning the grasses and soil conservation in general.

In connection with soil conservation practices, the Agriculture Show will include a model farm showing misuse of the land and rebuilding and conserving the soil. A small watershed is included with a compilation of practices summarizing beneficial results from overall soil, water and plant conservation.

GRASS MACHINE HAS 6-DAY GROWING SEASON

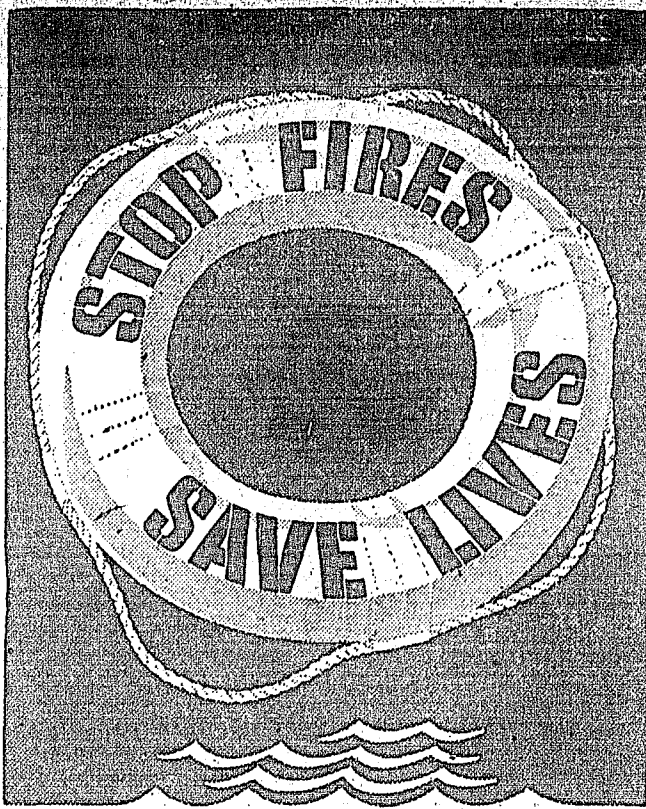

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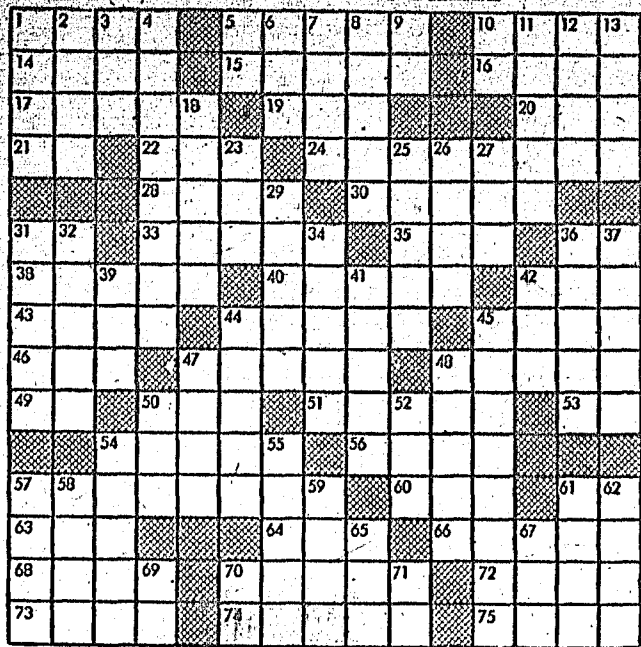

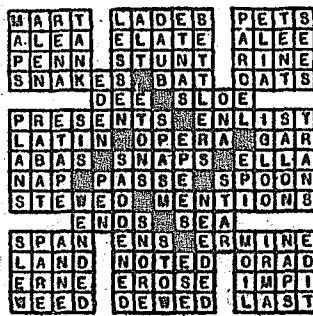

More and more farmers—who badly need hired help sometimes, but can't afford a full-time hand—are making deals with young town workers and the employers they work for. For instance, young Hap Hooper now lives rent-free on Easy Roberts' farm. In return he works about 100 days a year for Easy—for a farmhand's pay. The rest of the year Hap works for his "regular" boss... Buzz Ellis, the electrician. Buzz just speeds up his business when Hap's on hand—slows it down when he isn't and, like Easy, pockets healthy savings in wages. From where I sit, it's great how people with different backgrounds—and different viewpoints—can co-operate. How about more of us trying that? I live in a town—maybe you're a farmer. I'm partial to a good glass of beer—you may prefer coffee or milk. But we can make things pleasant by ignoring differences and giving each other a "hand."

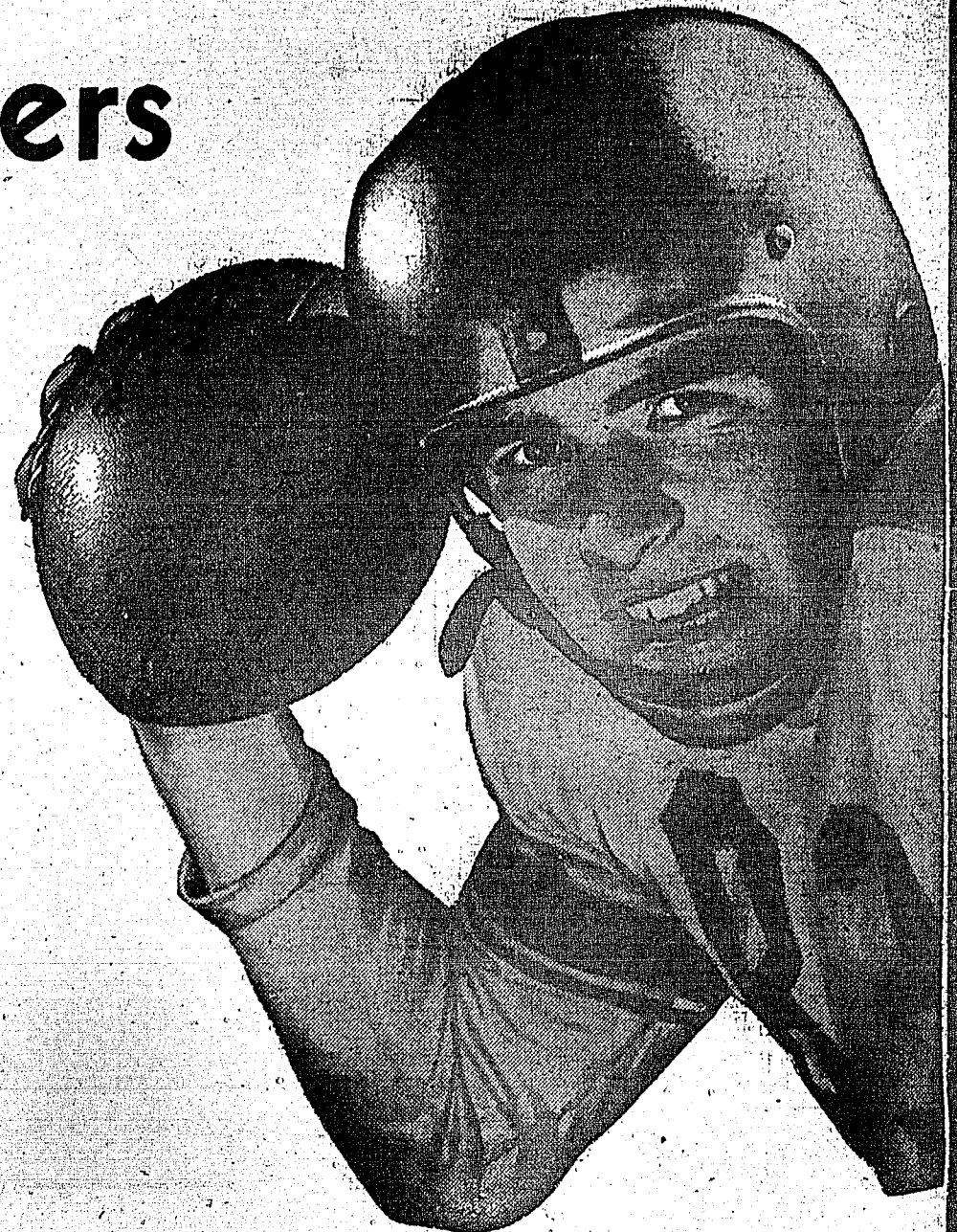

Ike Can't Make It Rain, But He's Still Best Man

The other day I asked a farmer if it was dry out his way. He said it sure was. "Looks like we just can't get any rain," he said. "Why, when Noah had his 40-day flood, we didn't get over half an inch."

There's no mistake about it, Texas is having itself a real drought. Some of the farmers and ranchers in our county are in such bad shape that they may vote for Stevenson.

Old Man Jones, from across the river, said he wasn't going to go to any such extreme. He said he needed rain as bad as anybody else. He claimed water was so scarce in his community that the preacher was baptizing new members with a wet handkerchief. But he was holding out awhile longer, anyway.

"I may be stubborn," said Old Man Jones, "but I just ain't been convinced that President Eisenhower is keeping it from raining."

He said he knew that Stevenson and Kefauver acted like they thought so, and they had a right to their opinion. Lyndon Johnson, he figured, knew better, but he was sticking with Adlai and Estes for the sake of unity. He said he didn't figure Mr. Sam Rayburn had known whether it was raining or not for the last 25 years.

"I hate not to go along with such a widely known crowd of weather observers," Old Man Jones said. "If there's anybody

who keeps up with which way the wind is blowing, generally speaking, it's Stevenson, Kefauver and Johnson."

Then he went on to say that he realized the national farm program hadn't pleased everybody—including him. If he was in the White House, he would do things different, at least in our county. He allowed that the \$61,000,000 spent by the Eisenhower administration for drought relief in Texas could have been doubled and still not made all the farmers happy and prosperous.

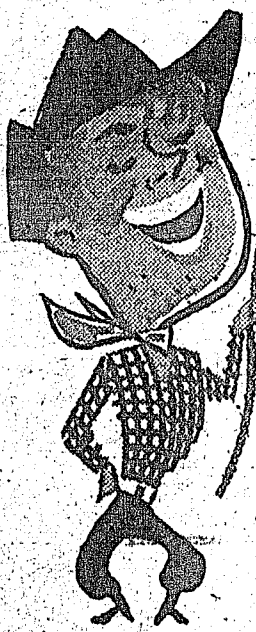
"But," said Old Man Jones, "I keep remembering that the main reason for our troubles, besides the drought, is the fact that we are not at war. Now, if Adlai and Estes really want to jump on President Eisenhower, there is a real issue. They've sure got the goods on Ike in that respect. If he hadn't stopped that Korean War, farm prices would be higher, no doubt. I wonder why they never mention that."

Old Man Jones was kidding a little, of course, in his usual way, but I think he had something there. We have got to adjust to peace-time, which is taking awhile but President Eisenhower is working at it. And meanwhile our boys aren't fighting and dying on foreign soil. It's worth thinking about.

THE PARK OF THE WEEK

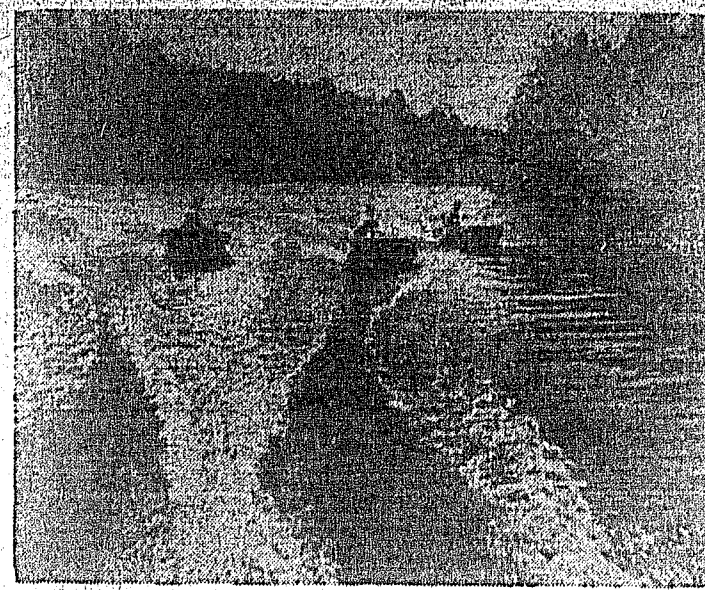

CADDO LAKE STATE PARK's bayou affords thrilling but safe boating, on Caddo Lake's broad water separating Texas and Louisiana, native guides are needed to thread many of the passages among cypress trees and knees. The park at Karnack, Texas, is popular with campers and fishermen.

Caddo Lake State Park at Karnack traces its name to one of the most unusual earth disturbances in recent times. On December 16, 1811, an earthquake affecting two million square miles, with its epicenter in Missouri, caused topographical changes that temporarily reversed the flow of the Mississippi River and did other strange things. Among them, it caused the sinking of a Caddo Indian village near the Texas-Louisiana border. Fleeing to higher ground the Caddoes established their new village on what is now a part of Caddo Lake State Park.

The strange antic of Nature left an eminence which is wooded with tall pines and other trees, while the lake is studded with cypress trees and cypress knees. Indian Village has proved a boon to sportsmen. It created a large, shallow lake with perhaps more variety of fish than any other equal body of water. It The disaster visited upon the

provided one of the greatest havens for ducks, geese and other waterfowl.

The park has sleeping and meal facilities that can care for group gatherings of a hundred people, and individual cabins for families and smaller groups. Its trailer camp, conveniently located near the park canteen, has water, light and sewerage connections.

The cypress growth of Caddo Lake is painted by famous artists. Many of the trees growing in the water are festooned with heavy Spanish moss. Except for dredged channels the lake has an average depth of about 10 feet. It is noted for its black bass and white perch. The saw grass and lily pads form lurking spots for bream, small mouth bass and big black bass. The deeper water is well populated with crappie, channel cat, yellow cat, willow cat and mud cat. Loggerhead turtles over 200 pounds have been caught.
