Electric Typewriter For Benny Jack Garrett

Garrett received some training in the use of the machine during the time he was at Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation recently and will receive more training when he returns soon after the first of the year.

Although it takes considerable time, he can now write his own letters and his use of the machine is improving each day. He also expressed his appreciation to the sorority and the people of Santa Anna for supporting the sorority in their efforts to help him.

Mountaineers Lose 26-0 To Goldthwaite

The Mountaineers of Santa Anna lost their second conference game to Goldthwaite last Friday night. Goldthwaite scored in the first, second and third periods to make the score 26-0.

Fumbles and intercepted passes made a lot of the difference in the game, although the Eagles were a touchdown or two better team.

The Mountaineers kicked to the Eagles to start the game and nine plays later the Eagles scored from the 1-yard line, covering a distance of 89 yards. Extra point was missed. At the beginning of the second period the Eagles were on the Santa Anna 1-yard line with two downs to go, but the Mountaineers held for downs and took over the ball. The Mountaineers had fumbled and lost the ball on their 7-yard line just before the quarter ended. After making a first down and running one more play, the Mountaineers fumbled on their 16-yard line and the Eagles recovered and four plays later they scored their second TD and missed the extra point.

The Eagles kicked to Santa Anna to start the third period.

Willard Wilson Serving In Arizona FHA Office

Roy Willard Wilson, son of Roy Wilson of Coleman and formerly of Santa Anna, is serving as assistant supervisor to the Yuma, Arizona, County Farmers Home Administration supervisor, according to a recent article in the Yuma, Arizona, Sun. Wilson was born on a farm near Santa Anna and attended elementary and high school here. He graduated in 1940.

After graduation from high school Wilson entered the Armed Forces and was sent to New Mexico A & M College for an 18-month course in engineering, but did not get to attend but nine months because of the need for infantry men. He was sent to Camp Laguna, near Yuma. After getting out of the service in 1946, he decided to go back to New Mexico A & M, but took agriculture rather than engineering. He was graduated in 1949 with a degree in agriculture, majoring in animal husbandry.

Wilson operated his own farm and taught a veterans agriculture class in East Grand Plains, New Mexico until the program ended in June, 1953. He continued the operation of his 120 acre farm, raising cotton, alfalfa, dairy cattle and hogs. His farm is irrigated. At the end of 1953 he left the farm and went into the service station business in Roswell and continued there until he became associated with the Yuma FHA office in July of this year.

Juniors Win Close Game From Bangs Tues. Night

The Junior Mountaineers upset the Bangs Juniors Tuesday night by handing them their first defeat of the season, 21-18 in the first game of the second round in the junior league. Bangs won over Santa Anna before 19-0.

Santa Anna took the ball on the kick-off and drove better than half the length of the field for their first TD, and then made their extra point. They kicked off to Bangs and on the first play from scrimmage, the Junior Dragons went about 40 yards for their first TD, but did not make the extra point. The Mountaineers scored again in the second period and made the extra point, making the half-time score 14-6.

Bangs came back in the third period and drove all the way to score but failed in their attempt at the extra point. In the fourth period Santa Anna scored again and made their extra point, and in the closing minutes of the game Bangs started a passing attack and covered most of the field in three plays, then made their final counter just as the game ended. Their try for extra point failed again and the Mountaineers won 21-18.

Previous to Tuesday night's games, Bangs had a won-loss record of 4-0; Blanket's record was 3-1; Santa Anna's record was 2-2; Early's record was 2-2; and May's record was 0-4. If the Junior boys continue to play as they did Tuesday night they will make the two teams leading them "get up and hump" to keep their positions.

Tuesday night, October 23, the Juniors go to May for another game. If you enjoy seeing boys play football, this would be a good game to attend, and they will appreciate your attendance.

Good Rains Fall Here Sunday Night

The first moisture of any amount to fall in this section in many months fell late Sunday night and early Monday morning. The official gauge at the Coleman Gas Company office registered exactly one inch, with reports from other sections of the town indicating upwards of 1 1/2 inches. Some rural reports indicated as much as two inches fell, with most of our rural correspondents reporting about one inch rain. The best thing about the rain was that it was general over most of the state and since it fell, the air has continued to be damp and the early morning fogs have left a little moisture.

A large number of farmers and ranchers were getting very low on stock water, some already hauling and others getting prepared to haul water. A number had dry sowed (dusted-in) some winter grazing crops and it looked as if every farmer and rancher in this area was going to have to feed what few animals they retain every bite they would get through the winter. This rain has brought some hope of relief at least to a part of the feeding program, but unless more is forthcoming, this will not last long.

School Nurse Begins Program Of Immunization

For the first time in many years the Santa Anna schools have the facilities and personnel available for a health program. Mrs. Edna Wells, a graduate of Seton School of Nursing at Austin, is working in the local schools through a cooperative agreement with other Coleman County schools and the Texas Education Agency.

During her career as a nurse, Mrs. Wells has worked in the Scott and White Hospital at Temple, Veterans Hospital at San Marcos, Lockhart Hospital at Lockhart, Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene, and in surgery at the Overall Hospital in Coleman. She is a registered American Red Cross Nurse and is fully trained in all phases of her profession.

Mrs. Wells has completed records and histories of all students who have cooperated in the health program. It is regretted that some parents have ordered that no action concerning health be taken regarding their children. However, it is anticipated that within one year smallpox vaccinations will be required for all children who attend the Santa Anna schools.

There has been some misunderstanding concerning the immunization program. This situation was anticipated in the Santa Anna School District, since no program had been available in the past. The immunization program began this week with the smallpox vaccine being given first. Others are to follow.

No typhoid or diphtheria booster shots will be given unless the child has had his typhoid and diphtheria series, and these have been kept up each year. The reason for this is that the booster does not make any person immune and, for complete immunization, the booster must be given each year.

Mrs. Wells would welcome a conference with any parents who care to talk with her regarding the school health program. Her object is to help make the formative years of a child's life as free as possible from the ravages of disease and sickness.

Sen. Russell Long To Speak At Democratic Rally In Brownwood

Brownwood — The Stephenson-Kefauver campaign will receive a major boost in the Heart of Texas when U. S. Senator Russell Long of Louisiana addresses a Democratic rally Monday night, Oct. 22, on the Howard Payne College campus in Brownwood.

Congressman O. C. Fisher of San Angelo will introduce Sen. Long at 8 p. m.

A barbecue dinner preceding the address will be served at 6:30 p. m.

Tickets for the barbecue are selling at \$10 each, with revenue above actual expenses going into the "Dollars For Democrats" fund that is being raised on a state and nationwide basis.

The Brownwood rally was scheduled by Senator Lyndon Johnson and other Texas Democratic leaders for the northern half of the 16th State Senatorial District and nearby counties that are not in the 16th District.

"Senator Long is one of the most colorful and able speakers in the U. S. Senate and is rapidly gaining recognition as an outstanding leader in the Democratic Party and national affairs," said Dr. Sever L. Eubank, chairman of the Democratic presidential campaign in Brown County.

Texans Find Ike Stands For Same Things We Do

A fellow was in our town the other day selling men's suits. He was from St. Louis, and he said he was a manufacturer's representative. Grandpa would have called him a dry goods drummer, and Papa would have referred to him as a traveling salesman. This shows you how things change with time, but actually that fellow from St. Louis was doing just about what the earlier visitors did—trying to sell suits.

You might say that he stayed in the same place but the names went off and left him, reminding me of some of the political situation in Texas.

I was reading a letter in the daily newspaper last week, from a man who said he was going to vote for Eisenhower. "I am a Democrat," he wrote to the editor of the paper, "but I feel like the party has run off and left me."

Come to think of it, a lot of conservative Texas Democrats are in that shape today. They haven't changed their views much on such things as local control, government spending, bur-
 -caucratic red tape, and freedom of the individual, they still travel down the same road they did 20 or 30 years ago, even if they do it at 70 miles an hour instead of 20.

They grew up believing that a man could live down nearly any

thing except voting for a Republican. They always voted "or straight," until a good many of them jumped over the traces in '52 and went for Ike.

"I can't figure out what's happened," one of them told me. "Seems like Eisenhower talks like a Democrat and Stevenson talks like a college professor."

The other day this same fellow said: "I think I've got it figured out. Ike stands for the things us Texas Democrats have always stood for. Adlai is too thick with Walter Reuther and that crowd to suit me. I'm going for Ike again."

That's the way with most folks in our town. They decided to give Ike a try at it in '52, and they like the way he has gone about the job. There are some things they wished he'd done a little different, but by and large they think he has made us a fine President. At least all the hometown boys are back from Korea, and as far as we can tell the government is being run honestly.

Somebody asked that Missouri suit salesman how Mr. Truman was getting along, and he said he didn't know. "He isn't in the clothing business any more," he explained. "In fact, as far as I can tell, he is clear out of all kinds of business."

RESEEDING TEXAS' PARCHED RANGES

In the face of lingering drought which has left countless Texas ranges baked bare of grass, consideration must be given to re-establishing these pastures in the quickest way possible.

In recent tests to determine best methods and grass strains for re-establishing rangeland, significant findings have resulted which should prove valuable in all of Texas' widely-scattered range areas.

Treatments used in the re-grassing study include pitting (a tilled area 3-6 inches deep, 3-5 feet wide) without reseeded, pitting after seeding and pitting before seeding. Grasses used in the tests include strains of sideoats grama and VII mesquite.

In nearly all operations where pitting was used, moisture-holding capacity was improved and native growth was stimulated. Best results came from broadcast seeding following pitting, although operations involving pitting alone proved worthwhile when any significant growth existed. Native grasses that reseeded best on their own were sand mulch, purple threeawn and sideoats grama.

Solid pitting in every instance proved more valuable than skip-pitting done at 6 to 10 foot intervals, because of the greater moisture-storing capacity.

NEW REGRASSING SEED
In tests being held elsewhere, a new strain of sideoats grama grass called Colorado has proved to be probably the most desirable reseed for the bald range.

Among its best qualities are a high seeding vigor and ability to produce stands, a winter-hardness, and a high average protein content. The good seed strength of the new variety apparently is due to the fact that its seeds are considerably larger than those of other strains of sideoats grama.

The sideoats grama, as a species, are a "mid-grass". They cure on the stem better than tall grasses, but not as well as the short grasses. They are deep-rooted, drawing moisture from as far down as seven feet.

This last quality alone makes Colonado, which admittedly was developed in Oklahoma, a good neighbor to thirsty Texas rangelands.

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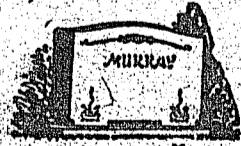
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Full Exemptions Can Be Obtained For Working Child

Parents of youngsters who are working during the summer vacation were reminded today by Jim Cheatham, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood Office of Internal Revenue Service, that under certain circumstances their children may still be claimed as full exemptions for Federal income tax purposes. And children themselves may be entitled to refunds in whole or part of income taxes withheld from their wages during their employment. The special exemption rule, Mr. Cheatham explained, applies to children who will still be under 19 years of age at the end of the year and to children who are full-time students, regardless of their age.

Exemptions may be claimed by the parents if they contribute more than half the child's support, regardless of the amount earned by the child. This new law was passed by Congress in 1954, Mr. Cheatham explained. Prior to 1954, no person earning \$600 or more could be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer. Inquiries received, however, indicate that many who are entitled to this benefit are not aware of it. And some parents continue to have their dependent children stop work before earning \$600.

Children 19 and over must be engaged in full-time study at a recognized educational institution for at least five months of the year or must be pursuing a full-time accredited on-farm training program.

Mr. Cheatham said that any questions regarding individual cases should be referred to the Brownwood office, phone 27639.

Motor Vehicle Inspections Running Very Short

Texas motorists are exercising the old American custom of putting off until tomorrow what ought to be done today and Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has expressed some concern that the practice is responsible for considerable lagging in the State's motor vehicle inspection program.

The first month of the new inspection period ended on October 15 and Garrison noted that only 4% of the registered vehicles have been inspected. The period runs through April 15, 1957.

"The inspection period embraces a full seven-months," Garrison said, "and that means that a minimum of 14% of the cars must be checked each month in order to avoid unnecessary rushes on the inspection stations in the final weeks of

the period." Meanwhile, George W. Busby, DPS Motor Vehicle Inspection Division Chief, reported that a total of 3,863,000 cars were inspected during the year which ended last September 14. Of these, slightly more than 1 1/2 million, or 43% needed some adjustment or repair before meeting the approved standards. Average cost for such services was eighty-eight cents.

The most common defect found by the State's more than 4,200 licensed inspection stations during the year was in 29% of the cars which needed headlights adjusted or repaired, Busby announced.

He said that the second most frequent mechanical deficiency was the 10% of cars which required adjustment or repairs of foot brakes.


