R. E. Kennedy Heads New WTU Department

Ablene — R. E. Kennedy has been selected to head West Texas Utilities Company's new Public Service Department, according to an announcement made today by Cal Young, WTU President.

The new department was formed by the consolidation of the Advertising and Industrial Departments following the retirement of R. M. Fielder October 1. Mr. Fielder had served as head of the Company's Industrial Department since 1946.

"One of the principal functions of the new department," Young said, "will be to assist and cooperate with local and area organizations and agencies in achieving the fullest development and utilization of the tremendous resources of the area served by this Company."

Kennedy has been employed by WTU for the past 23 years, has worked in the Advertising Department since 1943, and was made Advertising Manager in 1946 following his return from service with the Armed Forces. Previously he served in the Treasury and Purchasing Departments.

Born in Abilene, Kennedy is a graduate of Abilene High School and Hardin-Simmons University where he majored in Business Administration and served as President of the Student Council in his senior year.

He is well known in Abilene as an outstanding civic leader and is prominent in state advertising and public relations circles. He is now serving as Public Relations and Publicity Chairman for the current United Fund Campaign in Abilene; is a Director of the Abilene Advertising Club; a member of the Abilene Library Board; a Director of The Taylor County Society for Crippled Children; and a trustee of the Abilene Y. M. C. A.

The most recent recognition to come to Mr. Kennedy in the advertising and public relations field was his election as President of the Texas Public Relations Association at its annual meeting in Dallas last month. He is also a Director of the Texas Manufacturers Association.

Under his direction and supervision, West Texas Utilities Co. has been a consistent winner in national advertising competition. During the past seven years, the WTU Advertising Department has received six national awards.

Mrs. Kennedy is the former Elizabeth Faucett of Abilene. They have one daughter, Lenda, who is a fourth grade student at Alta Vista Elementary School. The Kennedys are members of the Episcopal Church, where he has served as a lay reader for the past 17 years. They reside at 886 Highland.

The Post Office Department is urging the public to plan now to do Christmas shopping early and to mail early, in a Postal Service News release to all Post Offices this week.

Worn-out, exhausted shoppers, crowded stores, hasty purchases, careless wrapping, and Post Offices buried in Christmas mail, can all be avoided by planning and acting now. Just eight weeks from today will be too late to assure that your mailings will reach those loved ones in time for the big day; just two months from today will be after Christmas.

The local Post Office has posters advising mailers the proper way to wrap and address their packages, as well as free labels to mark bundles of Christmas cards "Local" or "Out-of-Town".

Santa Anna people last year cooperated with the Post Office staff in early mailings so commendable that there was little congestion and no delays of any mail. The new bulletin recommends that all Christmas cards be posted not later than December 14 and all parcels as soon as possible.

And Doc Brown walked on off, shaking his head. Of course, the Stevenson man caught on that Doc was hurrahing him, and he didn't like it much, but he'll still have to call him the next time one of the kids gets the croup, because like I said he's the only doctor in town.

THE FARMER: POLITICAL STORMCENTER

With the 1956 presidential election campaigns currently reaching their peak, the farm issue has graduated to an all-time high in political debate.

The farm problem is a living campaign issue — more than a political football to be booted around and more than an interesting debate to be observed by the voting public. And the point in question is not whether something should be done, but rather exactly what must be done.

No one will fail to recognize that American farmers are living in a state of depression completely out of keeping with the overall picture. However, few people really understand why the problem is so acute with farmers, and even fewer know how seriously the farm problem could affect other areas of American economy.

Principle of Parity

Everyday questions of "Why can't the farmers take their own chances like I do in my business?" and "What's with this parity stuff?" come from those who have a warped picture of the greedy farmer who wants everything for nothing.

That just isn't so. Necessity of government control in agriculture economy can be explained through its unique position as an individual, dependent economic segment.

In nearly all phases of economy there are checks and bal-

ances which will keep the costs of labor, living, production, and marketing in near-balance because of their strict inter-dependence.

Unhappily with the farmer, his dependence on other areas of trade is not reciprocal except where his purchasing power is concerned. And this is very important.

But the farmer's supply has grown to a point of almost constantly exceeding consumer demand. Yet, he must market his crop somehow or else be ruined. And when he gets to the market place, the farmer must be able to sell his goods at a rate which will be in line with his buying power.

And that's exactly what parity prices are — dollars-and-cents prices that give to farm commodities the same purchasing power the commodities had in a selected base period when prices received and paid by farmers were considered in good balance.

By this reasoning, the farmer's parity ratio now should range at least up to 100 percent because everything he buys, plus his taxes and interest rates, are at an all-time high.

But under present "flexible" price supports, parity ratio has plummeted while farm costs have skyrocketed. The parity formula has been completely cockeyed.

In any other business this could never work; increased costs would be passed on to the next in line and so-on down to the consumer. Why should the farmer have to suffer the brunt of economic shock?

He can not prosper under present controls, nor can he survive without proper controls.

The issue must be resolved. And it will be, one way or another, on election day, November 6.

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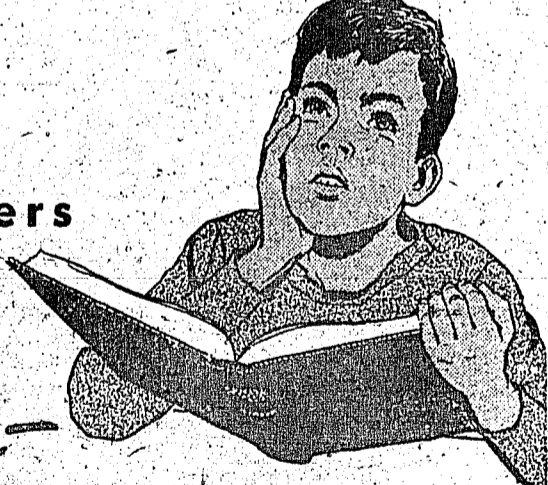

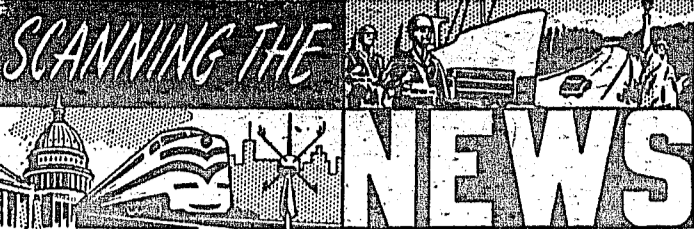

THE result of the presidential election Nov. 6th may very well be determined in the agricultural mid-west, the nation's breadbasket, with both presidential candidates bidding for the farm vote as the prize which may turn the victory one way or another.

President Eisenhower's strategy in selecting Peoria, Ill., for his major farm speech, rather than the annual plowing contest in Iowa, as originally scheduled, may backfire, or again it may prove to have been a smart move on his part. Only time will tell. There is no question but that the huge farm audience which gathered at the plowing contest to hear the president make a farm speech, was "let down" when the President announced that he would make his farm speech later, and his audience was given a speech on generalities. In selecting Peoria, the President chose a very rich farming community, a trading center for a prosperous and diversified farm area.

Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic standard bearer, chose to make his agricultural pitch in an open field, and in an area where drought, hail and insects, had added to the woes of the unhappy farmers on top of falling prices. Both candidates avoided specifics. Mr. Stevenson vigorously attacked the record of the Eisenhower administration and Secretary Ezra Taft Benson on administration of the farm program, and the promises made by the President at Kasson, Minn., four years ago. Stevenson contented himself with promising 90% support of parity; that he would find a way to assure

the farmers income parity as well as price parity; that he would work for a food stamp plan, a stepped-up school lunch program, a world food bank to get rid of food surpluses, and he attacked the administration on the soil bank program, declaring the administration was subsidizing the farmer in an election year and that the soil bank program was a Democratic program anyway. He failed to go into specifics on any of these programs, saying he would draw up a bill of particulars later in the campaign.

President Eisenhower at Peoria, declared he stood on his record, that farm prices were on the up-grade, that he was sure that farmers, as Americans, were interested in something beside farm prices; that farmers were making progress, but there were penalties to be paid for this progress. He spoke of a "free" Agriculture, and assailed Democratic "regimentation", but he hailed the soil bank program which requires and depends upon government controls. He placed blame for agricultural woes on Democrats and said that his administration inherited these woes; he claimed credit for what he termed the brighter side of the picture — increased value of land, higher farm assets, fewer farm mortgages. He blamed the Democrats for fall of farm prices after the Korean war, but at the same time blamed Democrats for persistence in keeping price supports on, which were preventing farm prices from falling sooner and further. Mr. Eisenhower also failed to be specific about a new farm program.

Dress In Light Color For Halloween Haunting Parties

"See and be seen on Halloween!"

That prescription for safe haunting" was given to youngsters and their parents today by E. C. McFadden, President of the Texas Safety Association, who urged support of the safety after dark program of TSA and the National Safety Council.

"Make-believe spooks and other pranksters who venture out in traffic at night wearing dark costumes are running a risk of becoming honest-to-goodness ghosts," McFadden said. "Dark objects blend with the dark background and cannot be seen by passing motorists."

He appealed to parents to see that their children's halloween costumes are made of light colored material or are trimmed with light colored or reflectorized strips. Since such costumes are usually more dramatic than dark ones, he said youngsters will probably find them more attractive.

McFadden also warned against the dangerous practice of wearing masks.

"A mask cuts down the wearer's vision and a child wearing one will have difficulty seeing approaching cars," he said. "If youngsters insist on hiding their faces, they can do it with makeup — which is more exciting anyway."

McFadden believes that the best Halloween traffic accident prevention is to keep children off the street at night. He admits this is no easy matter, but says some communities have accomplished it by organizing indoor parties at school halls or community centers. If this can't be arranged, he suggests that individual parents give parties for the youngsters in their homes.

McFadden also called upon motorists to do their share to make this a safe Halloween. He urged them to drive slowly and carefully, keeping a constant lookout for youngsters — especially near schools, parks, and in residential districts.

"Don't make a fatal Halloween mistake that will haunt you for the rest of your life," McFadden warned. "Be your little brother's keeper!"

Some Texas Farmers Support Eisenhower

Texas farmers endorsed President Eisenhower and his soil bank plan this week in statewide radio broadcasts, sponsored by the Texas Democrats for Eisenhower.

Frank Hamm of Lancaster, who describes himself as a dirt farmer who farms for a living, said the President is "the best friend the farmer ever had."

W. A. Porter, a Terrell farmer, said the President's soil bank plan will lead the farmers forward into an era of peace-time prosperity.

Hamm reviewed the Truman-Stevenson farm plan which, he said, created bigger and bigger surpluses, forcing farm prices lower and lower while government red tape got thicker and thicker.

"That's the kind of mess President Eisenhower found when he took over from Truman in 1952 — the surpluses getting higher and prices falling," he said.

President Eisenhower took first things first, Hamm said, and he went to work moving the big surplus road-block Truman had created.

"In three years, President Eisenhower disposed of \$5.5 Billion worth of surplus," Hamm said. "Then, based on the farmer's advice and recommendations, he set up the soil bank plan."

"The advantage of the soil bank plan is that it gives us government help but does it in such a way that the soil is conserved instead of used to create a surplus," he said.

"A larger percentage of farmers own their farms today than ever before. In fact there is no

mortgage debt whatsoever on seven out of ten farms."

Porter said both President Eisenhower and Mr. Stephenson have farm plans and the farmers will choose one on November 6.

"What is the difference between the two plans?" he asked. "The Eisenhower soil bank will lead us forward out of the wilderness, lead us forward to more and more peace-time prosperity," he said.

"The Stephenson big surplus plan will lead us back into the Truman mess," he said. "It's just that simple."

Porter said that under the Truman-Stephenson plan, the corporation farmer got the biggest acreage allotment, produced the most per acre and, in turn, buried the family farmer under a landslide of surpluses.

"I don't want any more of that and I don't want any more of their red tape which robbed the farmer of his cherished freedom and independence," Porter said.

"I like the way President Eisenhower refunded the federal gasoline tax to the farmer, expanded farm research, provided drought assistance, disposed of the surpluses in an orderly manner, regained lost markets and, most of all, the way he turned prices back up—without a war," Porter said.

"I'm a Democrat," he said. "I intend to remain one, but in my opinion President Eisenhower is a better Democrat than Stephenson or Kefauver."
