## Santa Anna Wins Over Bangs; Play Here Fri.

Playing good defensive ball throughout the game Friday night, the Santa Anna Mountaineers took a 33-0 victory over the Bangs Dragons to win their first game in the past 15 starts, almost two years. The last win for the Mountaineers was a 32-12 victory over Early on October 22, 1954. All the games during that time have been lost with the exception of the tie with Clyde, the first game of this season.

There was never much doubt about the outcome of the game after the first few minutes. The Mountaineers kicked to Bangs to start the game and on their return fumbled and Santa Anna recovered on the Bangs 41-yard line. Six plays later the Mountaineers went over for the first TD. Most of the remainder of the quarter was played near mid-field with the Mountaineers receiving penalties and exchanging punts with Bangs.

The Mountaineers scored twice in the second period. The second TD of the game was set up on a blocked punt that was recovered by the Mountaineers on the Bangs 16-yard line. They carried the ball over in three attempts. Attempts at the extra point on both the first two TDs were bad due to high passes from the center. Late in the period the Mountaineers intercepted a Bangs pass on the Santa Anna 43-yard line and returned it to the Bangs 29-yard line. On a wide left end sweep, the Santa Anna boys went the remaining 29 yards for the TD in one attempt and made their extra point, making the half-time score 19-0 for the Mountaineers.

In the third period the Mountaineers had Bangs backed up to their 4-yard line and while attempting to run the ball out, Bangs fumbled and the Mountaineers recovered on the 4. After Bangs was penalized half the distance to the goal for being off-side, the Mountaineers went the remaining two yards in two tries and made the extra point. During this time and throughout the remaining part of the game, Coaches Van Breemen and Busse were attempting to keep the score down and also letting every man on the squad get some game experience. Every man but one got in the game. Bangs made a desperate effort to score late in the third period and early in the fourth, working their way down to the Santa Anna 11-yard line before losing about 5 yards and fumbling with the Mountaineers recovering. After this recovery, the Mountaineers worked their way down field to about the Bangs 23-yard line and received another 15-yard penalty and were held for downs, losing the ball on the Bangs 14-yard line. Bangs attempted to kick out and it was blocked and the Mountaineers recovered the

ball in the end-zone for their final TD and then made their extra point, making the final score 33-0 for the Mountaineers.

**TO PLAY ROBERT LEE**  
The Mountaineers will get their best test of the year thus far when they play hosts to the Robert Lee Steers on the local field Friday night. Game time is 8:00 p. m. and prices of admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 25 cents for students.

Robert Lee has played two games this season, winning their first game from Leuders by a 46-0 score and last week they won over a strong Class "B" school, Baird, by a 27-12 score. At this writing we have not received their line-up for Friday's game and thus we do not know what their weight is but feel that the Mountaineers will have as large a team if not larger, so far as weight is concerned, than the Robert Lee Steers.

The Mountaineers showed a lot of improvement Friday night over their game with Clyde, but there is still plenty of room for more improvement. There is no doubt but what the Mountaineers can win this game if they show as much improvement this week as they showed last. And they were without the services of two first string tackles last week. Both injured tackles are expected to be ready for service this week.

Robert Lee will be the third in a series of non-conference games

to be played before the conference season gets underway on October 5th.

## CHECK YOUR DECISIONS

For your convenience we reproduce below the wording which will appear on the ballot in November identifying nine proposed amendments of the Constitution of Texas. The first eight will be voted on at a separate election on November 6, 1956, and they will appear on the ballot in the order they are listed. The ninth will be voted on at a separate election on the following Tuesday, November 13.

On the printed ballot each proposition will be stated once beginning with the word "FOR" and a second time beginning with the word "AGAINST". The identifying resolution number shown in parenthesis will not appear on the ballot. You may want to use this article to check your own decisions.

(House Joint Resolution No. 31)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty.**

(House Joint Resolution No. 23)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations.**

(House Joint Resolution No. 15)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 17 and 18 thereof, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning; and by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 11a, providing for the improved support of The University of Texas System and the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College System by authorizing the investment of the Permanent University Fund in corporate bonds and stocks under certain conditions and limitations.**

(Senate Joint Resolution No. 5)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund.**

(Senate Joint Resolution No. 2)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.**

Benny has been undergoing treatment for poliomyelitis at the foundation since May 7, 1956. He first contracted polio on August 23, 1954.

While at the foundation, Benny served as an announcer for the disc-jockey radio program.

## Farmers Don't Have To Make Quarterly S. S. Reports

Farmers are no longer required to file Social Security returns on a quarterly basis, according to Mr. Sam Hamlett, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood Office. During 1955 farmers were required to file a quarterly Social Security return with the District Director of Internal Revenue. Due to a change in procedure, farmers now file one return in January covering all taxable wages paid to farm employees during the preceding calendar year.

A farmer must file a Social Security return during the year when he quits farming before the end of the year and has paid taxable wages during the year.

(House Joint Resolution No. 9)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies.**

**TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 13**  
(House Joint Resolution No. 30)  
**FOR (AGAINST) the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap.**

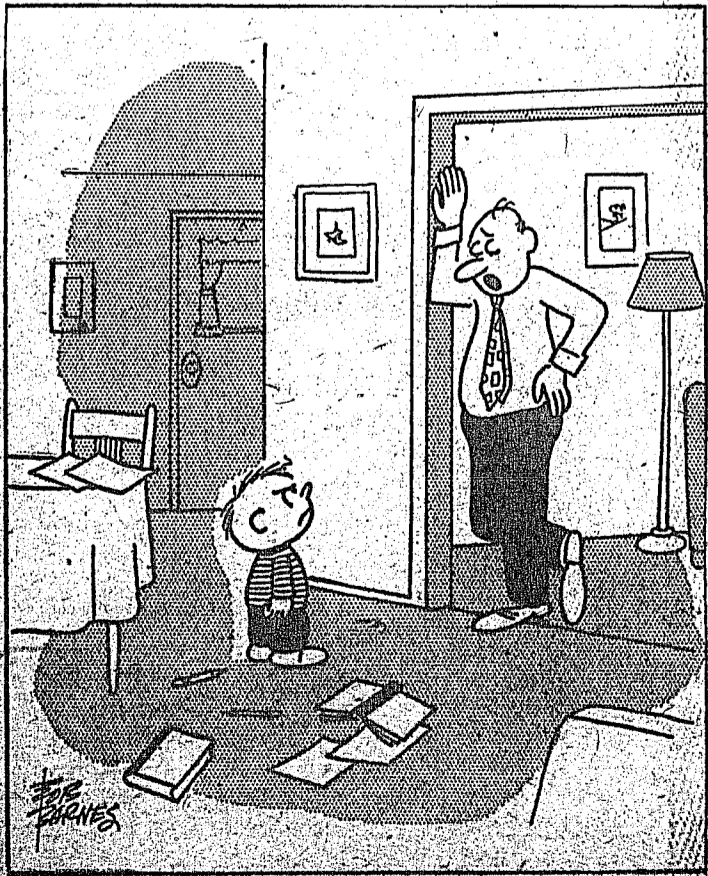

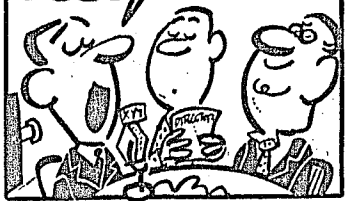

Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong and his band will give four free shows on Oct. 15, Negro Achievement Day, and Johnny Long and his orchestra will play free shows daily in the Automobile Building.

Free spectacles in the Cotton Bowl will include the "Fiesta Mexicana" on Mexico Day Oct. 8, and the colorful statewide Music Festival Oct. 9, in which over 4,000 high school musicians will take part. There'll be free aerial acts twice daily high over the Magnolia Midway stage, and Magician Mark Wilson will present free magic shows several

times daily in the Dr. Pepper Theater.

The Million-Dollar Midway will have its usual allure for carnival fun-seekers. 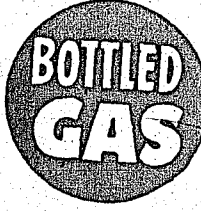

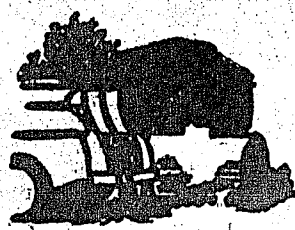

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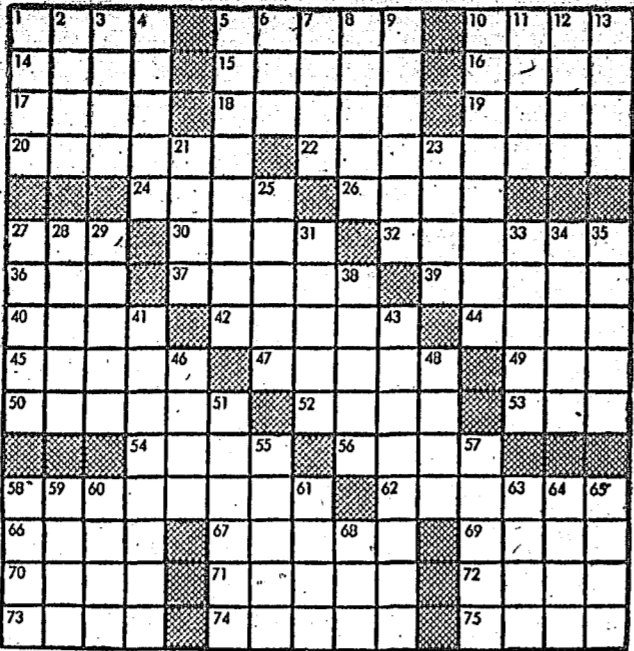

CROSSWORD PUZZLE



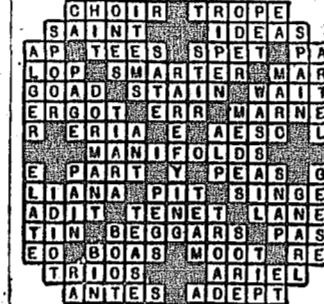

ARTICLE NO. 7

**1956 AMENDMENTS TO THE SOCIAL SECURITY LAWS**

Some changes were made in the 1956 Amendments to the Social Security law with respect to coverage of self-employed farmers and ranchers.

First, the former option of reporting on one-half of the gross income of \$800 to \$1800 has been liberalized. For taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1956, the farmer or rancher whose gross income is from \$600 to \$1800 may claim social security credit, even though he operated at a loss, at 2/3 of the gross figure instead of one-half.

Further optional provisions for the self-employed farmer or rancher who has gross income of more than \$1800 permit him to claim social security credit for \$1200 even if his net was less than that or even if he lost money that year. If the gross income is more than \$1800 and his actual net income is more than \$1200, he must report on the true net income figure.

These optional procedures are extended also to the members of farm partnerships, and to individual farm or ranch operators who could not previously use the option because their books were kept on an accrual basis.

The second big change permits the land owner who receives income from a share-farming arrangement to get social security credit for that income. If the land owner "materially participates" in the operation of the farm or ranch. In brief, "materially participates" means that land owner takes an important part in management decisions or in the actual production of crops or livestock.

As in the past, questions on social security taxes should be directed to the Internal Revenue Service; queries on social security cards or benefits should be sent to the Social Security Administration District Offices. Farm or ranch operators wishing a special booklet on these changes should write the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas, giving their names and mailing addresses. Their copies will be mailed to them as soon as a supply is received in the Abilene office.

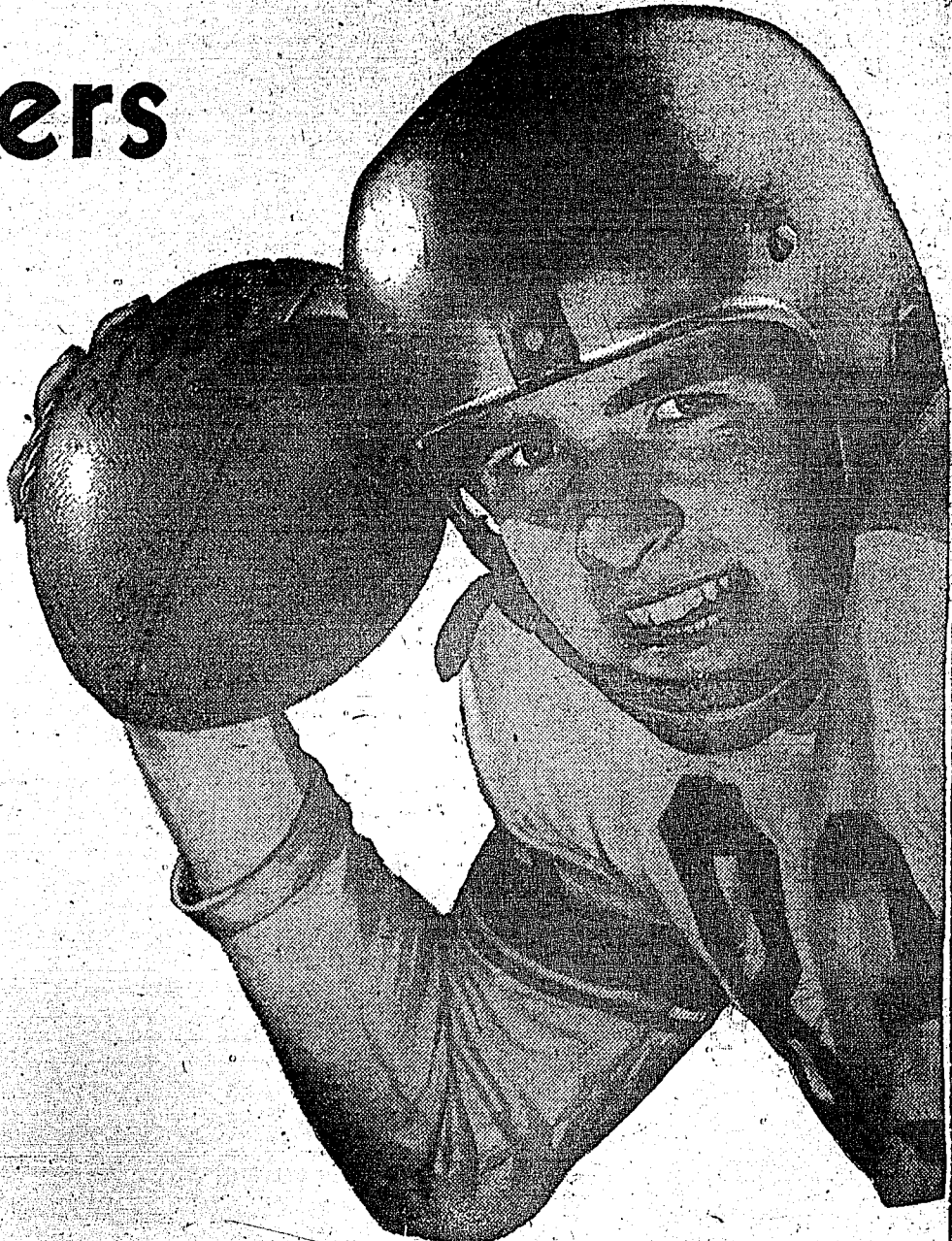

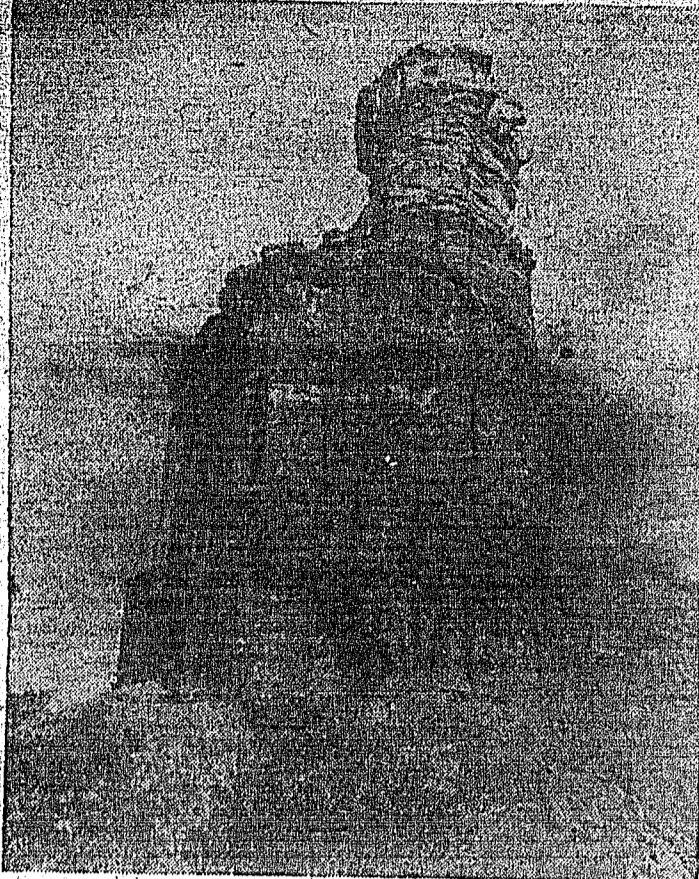

**PALO DURO CANYON** was famous for this massive rock formation at its edge long before the canyon became a 15,000-acre state park. It is known as "The Lighthouse," so named by the Spanish Explorer Francisco de Coronado. It is one of many strange formations. Entrance to the park is at the end of Texas Highway 217 which originates at Canvon, Texas.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park has inspired the wonder of men from the time Coronado's exploring expedition came upon it in 1541 A. D. and word was spread of this astounding gash in the high plains.

The state park's 15,103 acres offer unforgettable views of fantastic rock formations left as erosion carved through the crust of the Earth down to strata three hundred million years old.

Since becoming a state park, Palo Duro Canyon has been visited by more than a million and a half people, many of whom return again and again to explore its trails, fortress-like cliffs and colorful "Spanish skirts" under varying sky and light conditions.

A great number of marked trails and a stable of good riding horses makes it possible to go into all parts of the colorful wonderland. Some are content with the panoramic views that

can be seen from Coronado Lodge or from the paved road winding down 1120 feet from the plain to the bed of Prairie Dog Creek. Striking scenic and geologic formations can be enjoyed with ease from a narrow gauge railway that covers two and a half miles of the park.

In addition to natural wonders of Palo Duro Canyon, there is opportunity to follow a part of Coronado's Trail, explore Indian campsites and see the battleground of Smoky Rock Gardens and the dugout in which Col. Charles Goodnight made the first white man's home in the Texas Panhandle.

Dioramas of prehistoric life in Palo Duro Canyon and other informative exhibits can be seen at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on the campus of West Texas State College in Canyon.

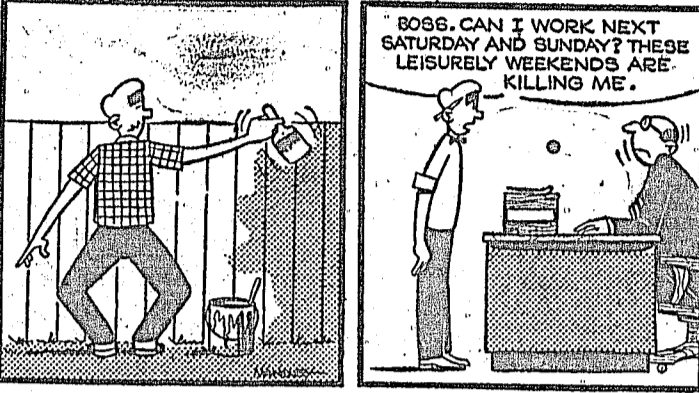
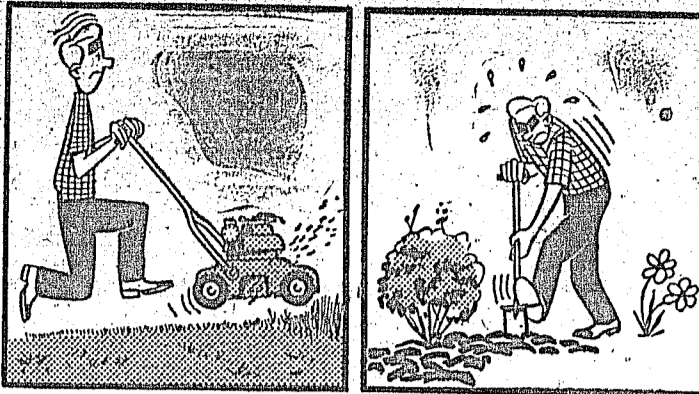

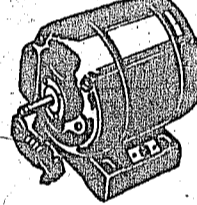
