## United Fund Drive Making Progress

A number of merchants in Santa Anna have not made their contributions as yet, and the final outcome depends upon a lot upon these final reports and contributions.

Over all, the drive is going fine and it is hoped all reports will be in by the middle of next week.

Cleveland, Plainview, Liberty, Mayo and Shields have all reported in complete and all of them went over their quota. Leedy is the only rural community that has reported in that did not reach their quota and they lacked only \$4.00.

Rockwood, Whon, Trickham and Buffalo has not reported.

Ford Barnes, general chairman for Precinct 2, said it looks like

we will reach our quota when all the Santa Anna and rural areas get their reports in. The local merchants and zone chairmen who have not reported in are requested to do so as soon as possible.

## Freight Rate On Hay Program Available

Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director, was advised today of the designation of Farmers Home Administration to execute certification forms in connection with reduced freight rates recently worked out between the President and railroad representatives to further assist farmers and stockmen in drought stricken areas. This revised tariff provides for a reduction of 50 percent in the freight rate of hay forwarded to destination due to the drought, and applies only in connection with hay purchases of individuals who are entitled to assistance under the Hay and Roughage program.

Farmers Home Administration is authorized to execute certificates in behalf of farmers and ranchers only. Details of the program and forms required may be obtained from local county Farmers Home Administration offices.

## General Election To Be Held Tuesday, Nov. 6th

The General Election will be held Tuesday, November 6th with voting places in every precinct over the nation being open throughout the day. Principal interest in Texas is the candidates for President of the United States. We won't attempt to tell you how to vote, but regardless of how you vote, be sure you vote for the ones you want to lead the nation for the next four years. Elsewhere in this issue is an explanation of how to vote a split ticket, if that is what you plan to do. The article also explains how to vote a straight ticket and the write-in ticket.

Also on the ballot will be eight proposed changes in the state constitution. On Tuesday, Nov. 13, a ninth proposed change will be submitted to the voters of Texas. Below are the PROS and CONS of each of the proposals. Study them closely and vote your convictions.

We think all of the proposals have some good intentions, but the manner in which some of them are stated, we do not feel they should be passed. It is our opinion that Proposals Nos. 4, 6 and 8 are the only ones that should be passed. The others involve too much risk to the state for them to be passed in the form as they are presented.

Gist of the amendments and arguments pro and con are:

1. Authorizes the legislature to compensate persons fined or imprisoned for crimes they did not commit. PRO: Would make amendments for hardships unjustly imposed on the innocent. CON: Might open the door to numerous fraudulent claims.

2. Allows county commissioners courts to vary allocations of tax money without special elections. PRO: Greater flexibility would make for greater efficiency in county financial management. CON: Commissioners courts would have too much authority.

3. Adds other colleges to the building program financed by the University of Texas Permanent Fund and authorizes investment of the fund in corporate stocks and bonds as well as government bonds. PRO: Would provide an increase in college building money without new taxes. CON: Risk involved in wider investments is not worth the possible return.

4. Increases the benefits of the teacher retirement system. PRO: Would attract more persons to the dwindling profession. CON: Would increase taxpayer obligations by \$4,500,000, take a larger nick out of teachers' salaries.

5. Authorizes another \$100,000,000 bond issue for veterans land buying. PRO: Program has been put in order, and additional money is needed to enable more veterans to participate. CON: Program does not merit public confidence; only about one percent of Texas veterans have benefited.

6. Provides a different oath of office for elective and appointive officials. PRO: Would clarify present inconsistencies. CON: Clutters constitution with minor details.

7. Requires competent medical or psychiatric testimony before commitment of a person to a mental institution and allows waiver of jury trial, except in

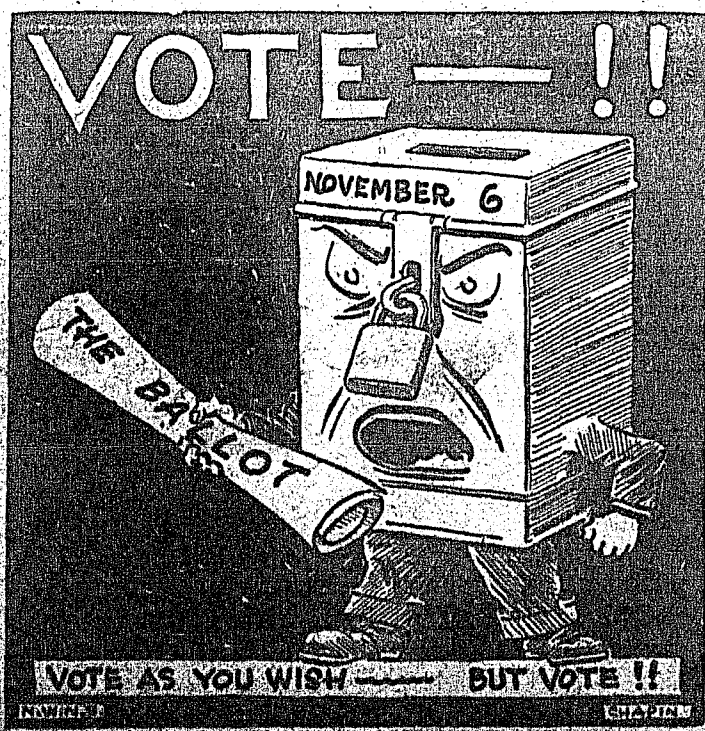

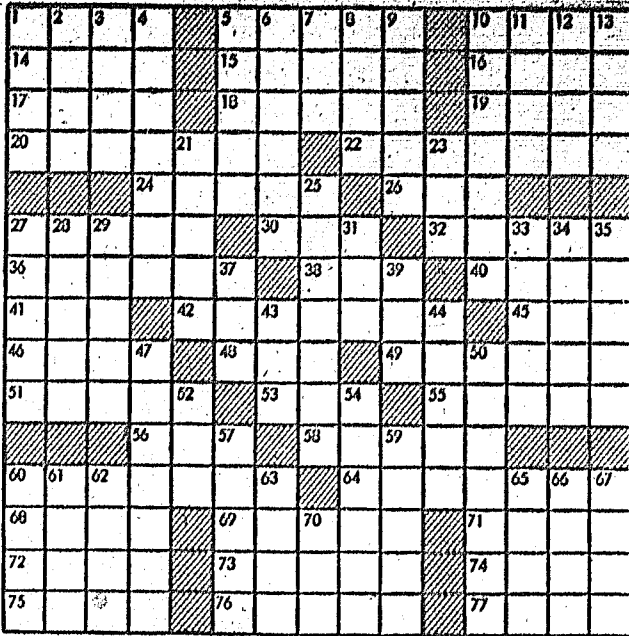

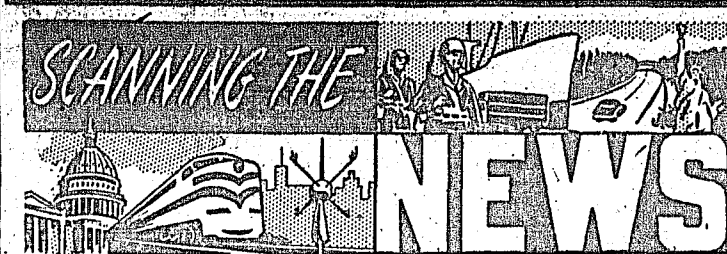

**AMERICAN** consumers are having to meet debt payments totalling approximately \$3 billion a month on installment purchases, or something like \$230 million more a month than a year ago, according to figures recently released by the Federal Reserve Board.

This not only is adding to the increased cost of living, but is also preventing the average family from taking on more installment purchases at this time, which is one reason why the Board has clamped down on installment purchases before now. In the meantime, the total installment debt reached a new high of \$29,427 billion at the end of August. To this figure add such consumer debts as charge accounts and single-payment loans, and the total consumer debt soars to \$37,503 billion, some \$3,676 billion more than a year ago, and also a new high.

Another reason for the new high cost of living is now showing up in the nine-month bank statements which are being filed on call from the Federal Board. This is the increased cost of interest. The bank statements are showing that the banks are collecting from eight to 17% increases in net profits on these interest rates, and at the same time are showing that bank deposits are on the downgrade from five to 10%. As an example the nation's second largest bank, the Chase Manhattan in New York reported net operation earnings for the nine-month period of \$35,400 millions, up from \$31,563 millions for the same period last year; total loans of \$3,554,909 billion, up from \$3,230,918 a year ago; and total de-

**Explanation On How To Vote A Split Ticket Tuesday**

As a Texan and free American citizen, you can vote any way you please.

Some people are trying to raise legal technicalities about the ballot, and to tell you that unless you vote in a certain way, your ballot will not be counted. That is simply not true.

Your knowledge of our system of government tells you truly that the purpose of an election is to give you the opportunity to express yourself.

That's your right and your privilege as a citizen of the United States of America.

You can vote the Democratic ticket straight.

You can vote the Republican ticket straight.

Or you can split your ticket.

Any way you vote, your ballot will be counted.

The law that governs the way for you to vote is simple and clear.

Whatever your preference may be, if you vote as suggested below, your ballot will be counted.

If your voting precinct does not have voting machines, and if you want to vote for Eisenhower and Nixon on a split ticket, for example, this is what you

says: "The last name of the candidates is sufficient, and the names do not need to be spelled correctly, if the intention of the voter can be ascertained from the names as they are written on the ballot. For instance ... a vote for 'Eisenhower and Nixon' should be counted for Dwight David Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon." (Attorney General's Opinion No. V-1531.)

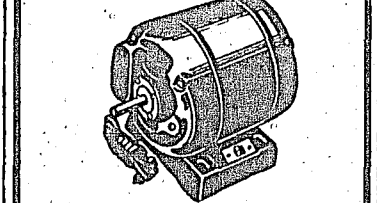
If you vote where there are voting machines, this is what you do if you want to vote a split ticket for Eisenhower and Nixon:

First, pull the lever by the names of Eisenhower and Nixon in the Republican column, and then pull the other levers in the Democratic column or such other columns as you desire. (Article 7.14; Section 8, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes.)

Again, the opposite is true; to vote a split ticket for Stevenson and Kefauver:

Pull the lever by the names of Stevenson and Kefauver in the Democratic column, then pull the other levers in the Republican column or such other col-

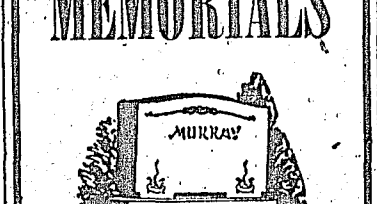

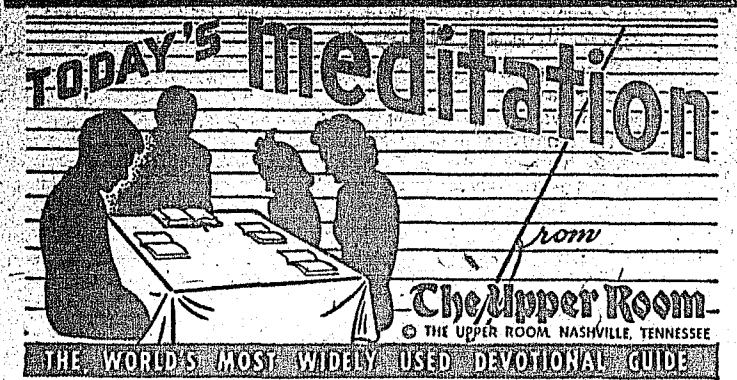

Dallas, Oct. 30 — "If Price Daniel wants a special election held immediately, he can get one," W. Lee O'Daniel, write-in candidate for Governor, said today. "All he has to do is submit a resignation effective immediately. It's just that simple."

O'Daniel, Democratic nominee for Governor, has criticized Governor Shivers for not calling an immediate election to fill Daniel's Senate Post. Shivers replied that, since Daniel's resignation was not made effective until January 15, there is no vacancy at this time. There is doubt, according to Shivers, that he can

legally call an election to fill a vacancy which does not exist.

"Price Daniel had a choice between (1) resigning as U. S. Senator immediately after his nomination as Governor, as he said he would, or (2) delaying the effective date of his resignation until he takes office next January 15th.

"Daniel chose the January date.

"Price Daniel has set a record," O'Daniel added, "in offending the most people in the shortest time."

"He offended the liberals of Texas by slandering and defeating their candidate, Judge Yarborough.

"He offended the conservatives by coming out against President Eisenhower after having tricked them into voting for him as a conservative for Governor.

"He now insults the intelligence of all Texans by resigning effective January 15, and then complaining because a special

election is not called now.

"If the mess Price Daniel is making as a nominee is any indication, Texas government will have two years of unequalled confusion if he is elected Governor."

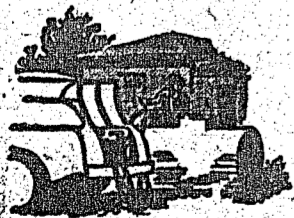

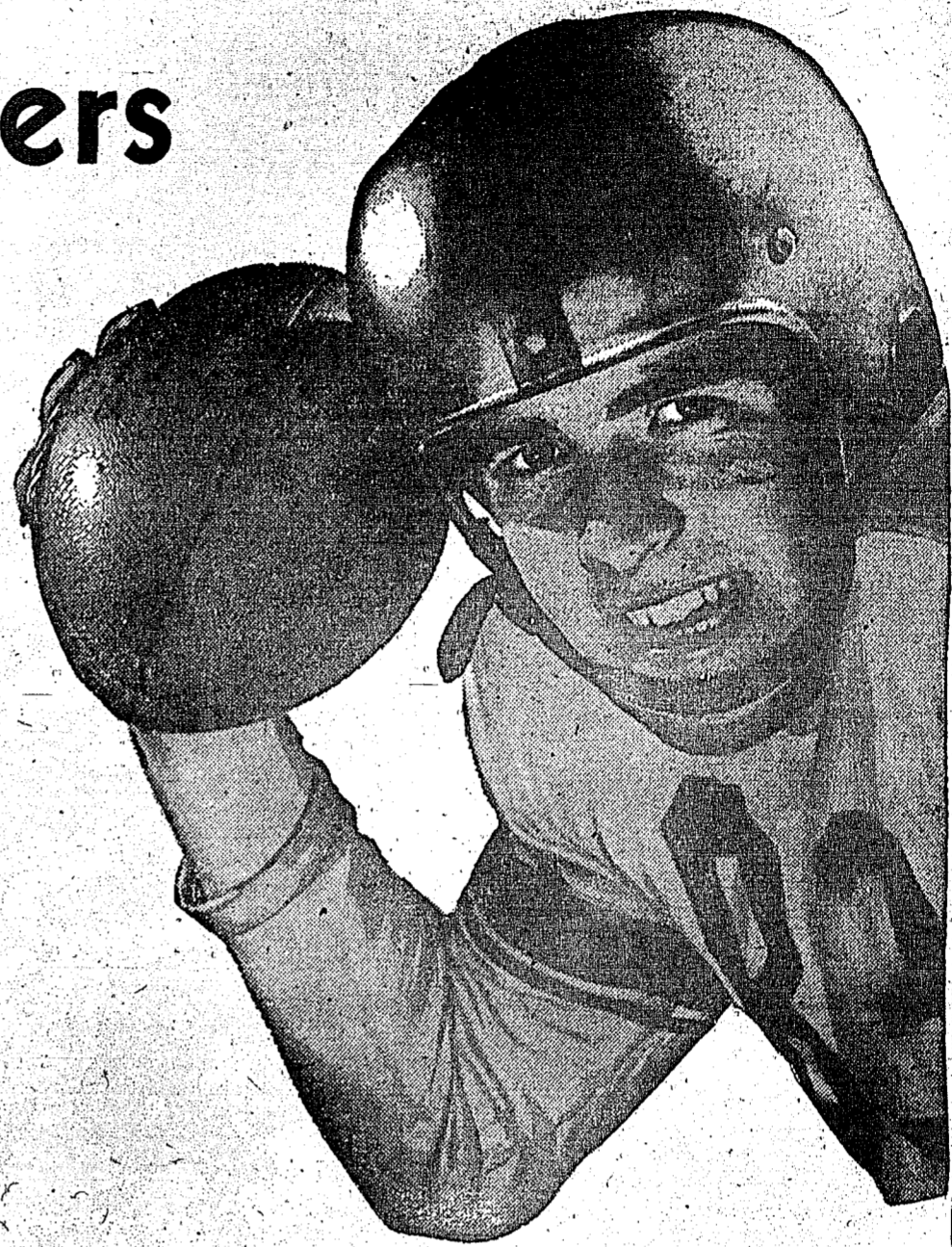

He and Mrs. Davis put on a panel discussion and she answered his questions in a way that made you feel that she is in good mental health.

There was a good attendance at the meeting. When the meeting was over, all waited to get acquainted with the doctor and his family and Mrs. Davis.

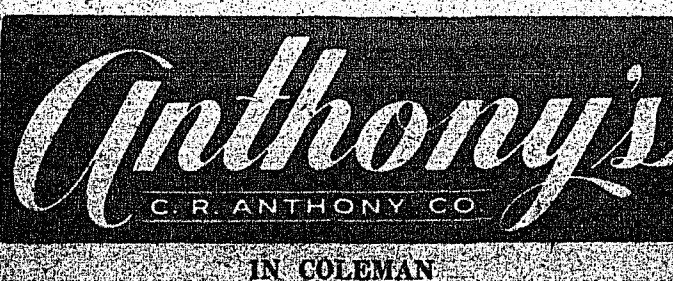

**Date For Filing S. S. Claim Vital Factor For Farmers Past 65**

"Every self-employed farm operator past the age of 65 should find out from his social security office whether it would be better for him to file his claim now or wait until after January 1, 1957," says R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

In brief, according to Tuley, if the amount of farm income creditable for social security purposes in 1956 is going to be less than was the 1955 amount, filing a claim for benefits now will result in a higher benefit figure than would be true after January 1, 1957, outside of min-

imum benefit situations where neither year's income is much over \$500.

Such differences could range from 10 cents to several dollars, and comes about because a claim filed in 1956 may have the benefit computed on the 1955 income plus half of the 1956 income averaged over 18 months. On the other hand, a claim filed in 1957 will take into account the 1955 income and all of the 1956 income averaged over a 24 month period. This latter course would result in a lower monthly earnings figure when 1956 income is not as large as was the 1955 income. All benefit amounts stem from the insured person's average monthly wages or earnings.

Tuley added that women farm operators should remember that the age figure for them to keep in mind is age 62, rather than age 65.

Since a brief article such as this cannot give all possibilities, he urges readers of this newspaper to get in touch with a

representative of his office when he makes his next visit to this part of the sixteen county district serviced by the Abilene office.

**Early Auto Safety Inspection May Save Your Life**

Getting early automobile safety inspections may mean the difference between life and death, according to G. C. Morris, executive secretary of the Highway Safety Council.

During the first month of the current inspection period, which will run through April 15, only 4 percent of the registered vehicles in Texas had been inspected.

"The importance of inspections has been proven by Department of Public Safety statistics," Morris said. "In 1951, before the inspection law went into effect, mechanical defects were a causative factor in 19 percent of the fatal accidents in Texas. Last year, that figure had been re-

duced to 5 per cent. "These figures show beyond a doubt that a person whose car is in good mechanical condition is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident," Morris said. "A person who waits until the last minute to get his car inspected is taking a dangerous gamble with his own life."

Last year, 43 per cent of the vehicles inspected in Texas needed some adjustments or repair, and the average cost for such services was only eighty-eight cents, according to the Department of Public Safety.
