Elsewhere in this issue is an axplanation of how to vote a split ticket, if that is what you plan to do. The article also explains how to vote a straight ticket and the write-in ticket.

Also on the ballot will be eight proposed changes in the state constitution. On Tuesday, Nov 13, a ninth proposed change will be submitted to the voters of Texas. Below are the PROS and CONS of each of the proposals.

Early Auto Safety **Inspection May** Save Your Life

Getting early automobile safe ty inspections may mean the difference between life and death, according to G. C. Morris, executive secretary of the Highway Safety Council.

During the first month of the current inspection period, which will run through April 15, only 4 percent of the registered vehicles in Texas had been inspected.


"The importance of inspec tions has been proven by Depart ment of Public Safety statistice, Morris said. "In 1951, before the inspection law went into effect, mechanical defects were a caus ative factor in 19 percent of the fatal accidents in Texas. Last


"These figures show beyond a doubt that a person whose car is in good mechanical condition is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident," Morris said. "A person who waits until the last minute to get his car inspected is taking a dangerous

gamble with his own life." Last year, 43 per cent of the vehicles inspected in Texas need-ed some adjustments or repair, and the average cost for such services was only eighty-eight. cents, according to the Depart-ment of Public Safety.
