## Mrs. Evans Honored At Homecoming Game

Mrs. Maud Evans, now in her 35th year as a teacher in the Santa Anna schools, was honored at the Homecoming Game Saturday night. The following is the script read during the ceremony honoring Mrs. Evans:

"Ladies and gentlemen, in 1922 the Board of the Santa Anna Independent School District was comprised of Mrs. J. R. Gipson, G. W. Faulkner, Mrs. Clinton Lowe, Will Mills, S. M. Polk, Jr., Dr. T. R. Sealy and J. L. McCaughan. Mr. B. T. Withers was Superintendent at that time. On November 13, 1922, this board held a meeting to discuss the crowded conditions in the schools and Superintendent Withers recommended that the Board determine if two more teachers could be obtained to correct the condition. A committee was appointed to determine if the finances would permit such a move. On November 15, 1922, two days later, the Board met again, the committee reported, and in a move that was to be duplicated for the next 34 years, Mrs. Charles Evans was elected to the faculty of the Santa Anna Schools.

"During this half-time, when so many of her former students of the past 34 years are present, we would like to pay honor to this beloved teacher of the Santa Anna Schools. At this time we would ask that Student Council members Robert Perry and Carolee Campbell escort Mrs. Maud Evans to the center of the circle (formed by the band).

"Mrs. Evans began her teaching career in the Elementary School. She was here to see the construction of the present high

school building in 1926-1929 and the new elementary school building in 1952. During the school years of 1944-1945 and 1945-1946 Mrs. Evans proved her versatility by serving as high school principal. Since that time she has been a teacher of Mathematics and English in the high school. She has been the faculty sponsor of the Student Council through its entire existence in Santa Anna High School, has helped maintain the library, and has been, at one time or another, sponsor of each of the four classes. Mrs. Evans is an able member of the Baptist Church and has contributed much to her church and community through these 34 and this her 35th year in the Santa Anna Schools.

"To Maud Evans, old age is always 15 or 20 years older than she is, and many are the students who have found that the best way to reason with her is not to argue with her. During her years her very trusted friend has always been at her side, that trusted friend, ladies and gentlemen, is a 2-foot length of ancient truck brake lining. "Old Ironsides" to her students. It's a woeful tale old Ironsides could tell. That instrument, ladies and gentlemen, can encourage learning through posterior indignation.

"Mrs. Evans holds the Bachelor of Arts degree from Howard Payne College, and the Master of Arts degree from Hardin-Simmons University. Mrs. Evans has served with six Superintendents here in the Santa Anna Schools: B. T. Withers, J. C. Scarborough, D. D. Byrne, B. A.

## Rites For E. S. Jones Held At Shields Nov. First

Funeral services were held on Thursday, November 1, at 2 p. m. in the Shields Baptist Church for E. S. Jones, a longtime citizen of that community.

He died at his home at 6:45 p. m. Tuesday, Oct. 30, after an affliction of several months. He was bedfast for several months. Ministers officiating were Rev. Frank L. Turner, Jr., of Santa Anna, Rev. S. C. Parker of Abilene and Rev. Paul Smith of Coleman.

Mr. Jones was born October 30, 1885 at Wheeler, Texas, being 71 years, and nine days old at the time of death. He had been a resident of Coleman County since 1906.

He was married to Miss Ida Perry in 1915, who survives him, and who cared for him devotedly during his long illness.

The deceased was a retired farmer and had been a member of the Baptist Church for many years.

Survivors besides the wife are: one son, Elton Jones of Santa Anna, one daughter, Mrs. Mary Tom Watson of Santa Anna, three grandchildren, Karen Jones and Tommie and Bill Watson, two brothers, Allen S. Jones of Rising Star and E. D. Jones of San Angelo, two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Dalton of Gouldbusk and Mrs. Mollie Dillingham of Albany. Many other relatives and friends also survive to mourn his passing.

Pallbearers were nephews, Weldon Jones, Sam Jones, William Jones, Leland Martin, Frank Dillingham and T. J. Dalton.

branded the Bronte Longhorns with a 20-13 defeat. They were a team named "Desire" and not to be denied. To each of them who played so gallantly we tip our hats for bringing us our first homecoming victory. Their glorious triumph put the lid on our best and most successful homecoming.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower swept the nation Tuesday in a landslide vote for a second term as President of the United States. With most of the counting complete, he had a lead of 457 electoral votes to 74 for the Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson. Eisenhower received more than 55% of the popular vote throughout the nation.

Coleman County gave the President an overwhelming vote in the Tuesday election. On the basis of incomplete, unofficial returns, Eisenhower received 2,240 votes while Stevenson received 1,824.

In the Governor's race, Price Daniel sailed to an easy victory in every county in Texas. W. Lee O'Daniel's effort to get write-in votes didn't produce much of a threat to Daniel, but O'Daniel did get more votes than the Republican nominee for Governor.

Daniel received 2,869 votes in Coleman County, Bryant got 211 votes and W. Lee O'Daniel got 598 write-in votes. All other Democratic nominees in this section of the state won without any trouble.

The proposed changes in the Constitution of the State of Texas all carried by large majorities.

Santa Anna voting was heavier in the North Ward than in the South Ward, in comparison to the paid polls. A total of 522 votes were cast in Santa Anna with 279 in the South Ward and 243 in the North Ward. Both wards voted about the same as the nation did. Eisenhower got 176 votes in the North Ward and 170 in the South Ward. Stevenson got 64 in the North Ward and 107 in the South Ward. Daniel got 185 votes in the South Ward and 180 in the North Ward. O'Daniel got 69 in the South and 42 in the North Ward. Most of the other candidates received more than 240 votes in the South and 225 votes in the North Ward.

Another election will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 13, for a vote on the 9th proposed change in the Constitution of the State of Texas.

## Mountaineers Win Homecoming Game

The Santa Anna Mountaineers played their best game of the season last Saturday night, defeating the Bronte Longhorns 20-13. This was the first time in the four years of the Homecoming the Mountaineers have won that particular game. Our hat is off to you Mountaineers. We hope you will continue in the same spirit in your next two games.

Statistics show the Mountaineers led in most every department. They acquired 7 first downs to 4 for Bronte, gained 202 yards to 169 for Bronte, completed 2 of 4 passes for 22 yards while Bronte attempted 6 passes and did not complete any, had 1 intercepted, the Mountaineers punted 5 times for an average of 21 yards, Bronte 2 times for a 28 yard average, Santa Anna was penalized 8 times for 80 yards and Bronte 5 times for 55 yards. The Mountaineers fumbled and lost the ball 3 times and Bronte fumbled and lost the ball 5 times.

Bronte kicked to Santa Anna to start the game. The Mountaineers took the ball on the 10-yard line and returned it to their 31-yard line, failed to gain on two downs and kicked to the Bronte 46-yard line. Eight plays later the Longhorns went over for their first TD and run the extra point over. Bronte kicked out of the end zone and the Mountaineers took the ball on their 20-yard line. In 9 plays they had moved to the Bronte 10-yard line, but lost 11 yards on a penalty and two plays before fumbling and losing the ball to Bronte on the 21-yard line. Bronte run one play just as the quarter ended. On the first play in the second quarter Bronte received a 15-yard penalty and on the next play fumbled and lost the ball to the Mountaineers on their 8-yard line. Donald Ray went wide around left end for the 8 yards and the first TD for the Mountaineers. Larry Donham run the extra point over. James Curtis recovered the fumble.

The Mountaineers kicked to the Bronte 1-yard line and they returned it to their 21-yard line. Failing to gain, Bronte kicked to their 43-yard line and the Mountaineers drove to the Bronte 21-yard line before giving the ball up on downs. Bronte gained 7 yards in 8 tries then lost 7 on the kick attempt and the Mountaineers took over on the Bronte 21. They run 2 plays and fumbled on the Bronte 15 with Bronte recovering and on the next play received a 5-yard penalty, leaving Bronte with the

ball on their 20-yard line. Bronte fumbled on the next play and the Mountaineers recovered on the Bronte 16. On the next play the Mountaineers drove to the Bronte 5 but received a 15-yard penalty from the 14-yard line, the point of the foul, which put the ball back on the Bronte 29-yard line. The Mountaineers gained 8 yards then lost 5 on a penalty, putting the ball on the 26 for the last play of the first half. Not to be denied, the local boys took the ball and Eugene White dropped back until Daniel Gilbert was in the open and dropped a nice pass in his arms and Gilbert went the remaining distance to the goal. Gilbert run the extra point over to make the halftime score 14-7 for the local boys.

The Mountaineers kicked to Bronte 12 yard line to start the second half. Bronte returned to their 35-yard line. On the next play they gained 2 yards, then on the next play the fans saw something very seldom seen in football: Bill Wrinkle, Bronte fullback took the handoff from the QB on their 37 yard line and behind excellent blocking gained to the Santa Anna 36-yard line and only Donald Ray was between him and the goal line. Either in an attempt to hand-off to one of his team-mates that was right behind him, or in an effort to change the ball from one hand to the other, Wrinkle pitched the ball to Ray, which apparently surprised Ray as much as it did anyone else. This rambled around over the field, down to about his own 20 yard line and finally got his bearings and got back to his 39-yard line before being brought down. This writer has seen something like this happen only one time before and that was in a Joe E. Brown picture many years ago. The Mountaineers gained 6 yards on 3 plays, then received a 15-yard penalty and kicked to the Bronte 35-yard line. Bronte run two plays and fumbled on their 41-yard line. On the second play Gilbert went through the center of the Bronte line and broke into the clear and went the entire remaining 37 yards for the TD. The try for extra point was missed. The Mountaineers kicked to the Bronte 15-yard line, they returned to their 20 and received a 15-yard penalty, putting them on their 5. On the next play the Mountaineers received a 15-yard penalty, putting the ball out on the Bronte 38-yard line. Johnson intercepted a Bronte pass in the next play and returned the ball to the Bronte 28. On the

next play the Mountaineers completed a pass for a 4-yard loss and failed to gain on two plays and kicked out of the end zone. Bronte took the ball on their 20 and failed to gain and kicked to their 43 yard line. The Mountaineers gained 5 in two plays, got a 15-yard penalty, then on two plays lost ground back to their 19-yard line with the ball going over as the quarter ended.

Bronte fumbled on the first play and Santa Anna recovered, then Santa Anna fumbled and Bronte recovered, then Bronte was penalized 15 yards and tried 3 passes, all incomplete, then made 7 yards on their fourth down attempt. The Mountaineers gained four yards and kicked to the Bronte 39. After three tries, Bronte had gained 1 yard and kicked to the Mountaineer 19, and the local boys returned the ball to their 34-yard line. Three plays had gained two yards and the Mountaineers kicked, losing 1 yard. It took Bronte 9 plays and 2 first downs to drive over from the 35 for their final TD. The game ended two plays later with the Mountaineers in possession on their 46-yard line.

### DISTRICT PLAY

Cross Plains pasted the Llano Yellowjackets 43-13 last Friday night and Goldthwaite won over Rising Star 19-14. Mason had an open date. This week the Llano eleven comes to Santa Anna, Mason goes to Cross Plains and Rising Star goes to Gorman for a non-conference tilt. Goldthwaite has an open date.

### THE LLANO GAME

Coach Joe Van Breemen scouted the Llano team last week while they were playing Cross Plains. He said he feels the local boys should be on an even basis with Llano and our chances for winning the game could be very good. Cross Plains beat Llano 30 points and Cross Plains beat the Mountaineers 26 points.

USE OF COTTON BURS ON THE SOIL

New research by the cotton industry indicates farmers should think twice before allowing that by-product of the harvest — cotton burs — go to waste. Some areas of Texas cannot return burs to the soil without special treatment to kill pink bollworms. But once protective procedures are observed, the burs can be a real boon in stretching benefits of rain and maintaining fertilization.

Preliminary studies show that on bur-treated soil, wind erosion is lessened because of the better condition of the soil. It is also known that burs mellow the soil and make it spongy and easier to work. Water penetration from rainfall is greater and evaporation is minimized.

Crop yields and their relationship to burs is being studied. On one test farm, five tons of Composted burs increased the yield of cotton lint by 65 pounds per acre; 10 tons of composted burs increased the yield of lint per acre by 275 pounds.

Cost of the bur usage varies but the general figure is about \$2.50 per ton. The burs themselves usually are free, with the farmer paying only for the

spreading. When this spreading is done by the individual, the cost figure is less.

Effects of burs on the land remain for an extended period. Increased yields from one application of burs has been noted for a three or four-year period. Increased yields made by farmers using burs in an area usually spurs others to action. The increased water holding capacity is most attractive to irrigation farmers who are confronted with annual underground water level declines.
