Football Season Ends For The Mountaineers

The Santa Anna Mountaineers completed their 1956 football season last Friday night by losing to Mason by a score of 27-7. The Mason passing offense proved to be a little too much for the Mountaineers. All four Mason touchdowns were on pass completions.

Cross Plains won the district title with no district losses and only one loss in the entire season. Goldthwaite ended the season in second place in the season and district standing. Llano took third place in the district and fourth in season standing. Mason ended in fourth place in the district and third place in season standings. Rising Star was fifth in season and district standing and Santa Anna was on the bottom in district and season standings.

Construction of Telephone Lines Gets Approval

Approval of the construction of the rural telephone lines throughout the southern part of Coleman County was received this week from Washington, D. C. authorities. The low bid, submitted by the Almer B. Jackson Construction Company of Abilene, of \$192,244.51 was subject to Washington approval. This bid was about \$42,000 above the budget and thus had to be gone over completely before the approval could be granted. Cause of the bid being so much higher than expected was due to a large increase in the cost of steel, poles, labor and other materials necessary in the construction.

An increase in rates of 50 cents per month had to be approved before Washington authorities would accept the bid. This will make the rates for telephone service in the areas served by the new system \$4.25 per month, and this rate is still the lowest rate of any telephone cooperative operating in Texas. Washington officials requested a \$1.00 per month rate increase but after reviewing all the contract with local authorities, agreed on the 50-cent increase. This rate does not effect rates of the present Santa Anna Exchange, just the rates on the new lines being installed.

The contractor has 30 days from the time of receiving notice of acceptance of his bid to get machinery, materials and crews on location and begin work. Plans are being made to use considerable local labor on the project and an announcement will be made later as to where and when to make application for employment. The job is due to be completed in 150 working days, which will be in April, 1957.

About 292 miles of telephone lines will be put up, giving dial telephone service to Valera, Voss, Leaday, Gouldbusk, Mozelle, Cantennial, Fisk, Shields, Rockwood, Trickham and Whon.

Allyn Gill, manager of the Coleman County Telephone Cooperative said a contract would be let on Wednesday, November 28, for the construction of three buildings to house switchboard equipment. These buildings will be located at Mozelle, Rockwood and Trickham. They will be of brick-tile construction and all will be identical. They are expected to be completed by about February 1, 1957. It is hoped the new telephone system will be in operation by the last of April.

FHA Has Helped Large Number of Farmers Get Feed

During the four months period through October 31, 1956, Texas farmers and ranchers eligible under the emergency feed grain and roughage programs, received assistance in the purchase of 1,443,646 pounds of grain and 1,374,170 tons of roughage, Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director at Dallas, announced today. 91,787 applications for grain assistance and 37,405 applications under the roughage program were processed during this period.

The emergency feed grain and roughage programs are meant to help establish farmers and ranchers, who are primarily engaged in farming and ranching, to maintain their basic herds of cattle, sheep and goats, if their circumstances are such that this assistance is needed, McKay advised. The local Farmers Home Administration committees have the responsibilities to determine the eligibility of individual applicants and to approve the amount of feed each applicant may purchase under the program.

233 counties in Texas are designated under the emergency feed grain and roughage programs. In these counties, eligible applicants are helped in buying corn, oats, barley and grain sorghums, or approved feed mixtures containing either 60 or 75 percent of these grains through a Government subsidy of \$1.50 per hundred weight. The Federal Government bears the full amount of this subsidy. In addition to the emergency feed grain assistance, eligible applicants are helped to buy hay or other approved roughage to maintain their basic herds. Under this program applicants receive a Federal subsidy of \$7.50 per ton of roughage actually bought.

Regulations that guide FHA county committees in the review of applications provide that applicants will not be certified if they are financially able to obtain the necessary feed for their basic herds without difficulty and can continue their normal farming and livestock operations. It is not expected that applicants will exhaust their total resources, including credit, before they can be certified for this assistance, McKay advised.

"However," McKay added, "the fact that the purchase of feed at regular prices may not be profitable to the applicant is not sufficient to qualify him for assistance. It must be determined in every instance that an applicant is primarily engaged in farming or ranching and that is his main source of income. A nominal portion of his income from other sources would not necessarily disqualify the applicant. The overriding factor in determining the eligibility of any applicant is his financial ability to obtain the feed necessary to maintain his basic herds and continue his normal operations. An applicant whose financial circumstances are such that he can provide necessary feed for his basic herds and carry on his operations without serious difficulty is not eligible for this assistance."

Under the present designation applications may be filed through December 3, 1956 for a supply of feed grain and roughage to carry basic livestock herds through December 31, 1956.

November 29 To Be Observed As Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving, one of the six holidays during the year to be observed by the Santa Anna Merchants, will be observed on Thursday, November 29. All the local stores and the bank will be closed throughout the day.

The Post Office will observe Thursday, November 22 as their Thanksgiving Day because of the National Holiday being set on that day. However, local mail will be handled the same as any other holiday but no rural mail will be delivered. On Thursday, November 29, all mail will be put up and rural mail will run, but it is likely that the office will not be open more than a short while Thursday morning.

The Santa Anna schools will observe Thanksgiving on Thursday and Friday, November 29 and 30. Most of the local teachers plan to attend the annual State Teachers convention, to be held that weekend.

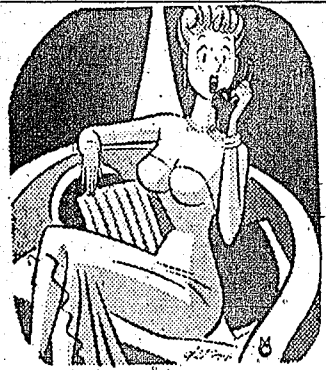

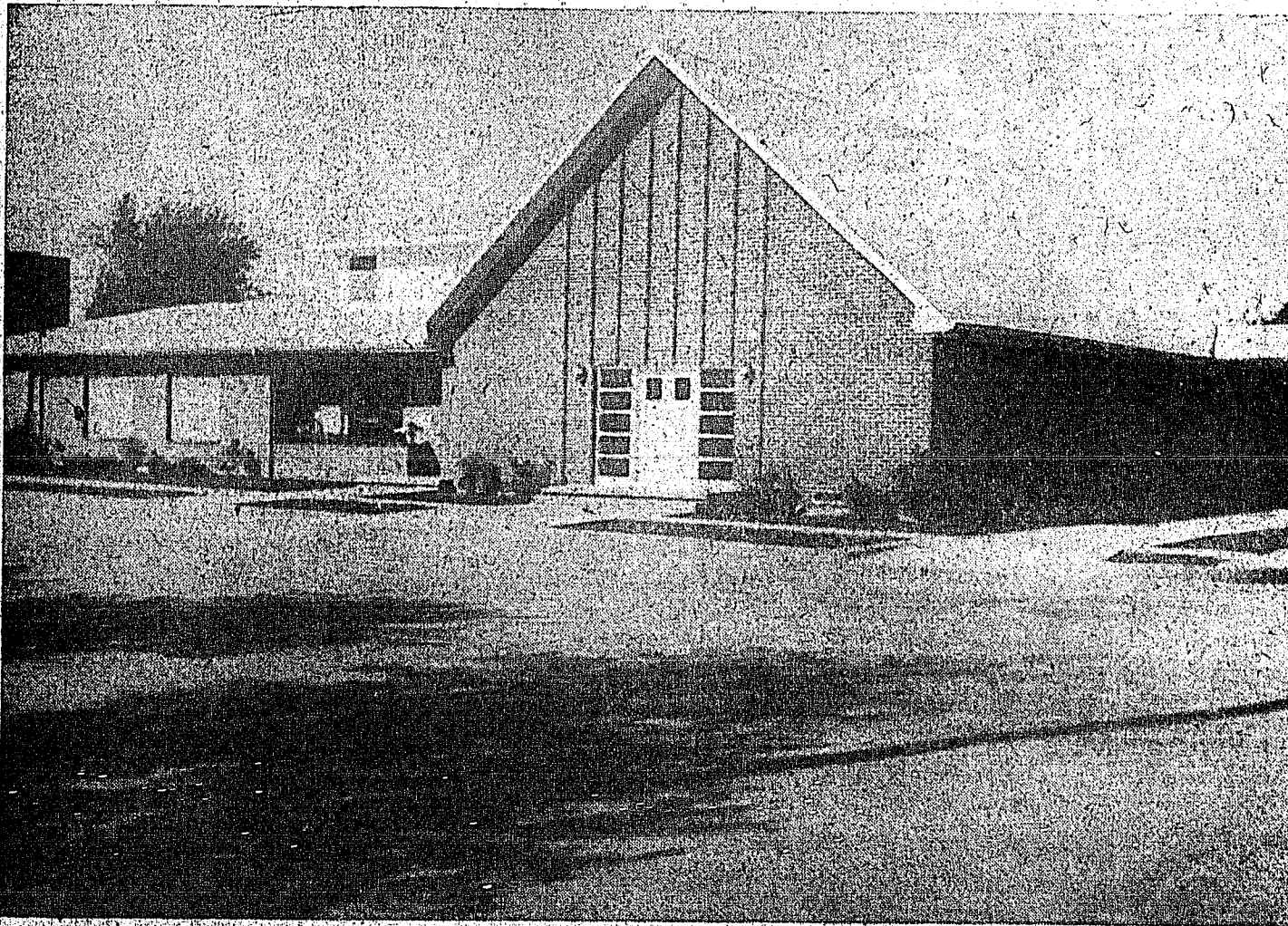

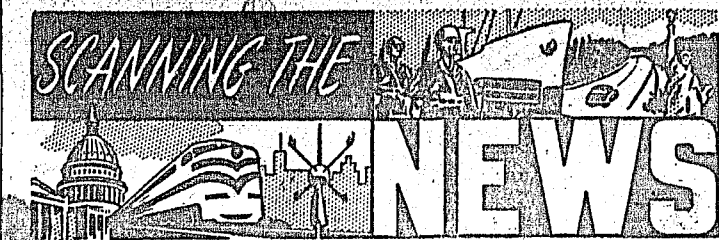

LAST June at the National Academy of Science Building in Washington a committee of scientists composed of geneticists, Pathologists, Physicists, Meteorologists, Oceanographers, Agriculturalists and Biologists issued their now controversial report on the Biological Effects of Atomic Radiation, as a result of bomb fallout, peace-time uses of atomic energy from nuclear reactors, by-products, to the use of X-rays.

These men agreed on just one thing. That is that atomic radiation whether from Bomb fallout or whether from peacetime uses, if it penetrates the human body, is genetically undesirable and that even small quantities have the power to injure the hereditary organs or gonads. But just how undesirable, just how dangerous and just what unfortunate results would follow over-doses of atomic radiation, they could not give precise answers. And actually these scientists will not know in any precise terms, until they have tested and checked several generations of humans who have absorbed this atomic radiation.

About the testing of the big atomic and hydrogen bombs, this is a calculated risk, if they are to be continued. The report says that if the testing of these bombs by the Atomic Energy Commission is continued at present levels, the risk may not be too great. But this report is essentially a United States report and it refers to fallout in the United States only. This fact was brought out in the press conference which followed a personal and discussion of the report.

"The scientists cannot say with exact precision just what biological risks are involved in various levels and sorts of radiation exposure; nor can any one precisely evaluate the over-all considerations of national economic strength, of defense, and of international relations," the report says.

But, the scientists are so concerned about any increase in the volume of radiation in the air over and above that from natural causes, such as the cosmic rays of the sun, they have got a so-called "safe" average amount a person could take into his body cumulatively at 10 roentgens, insofar as his hereditary organs are concerned. A man can take much more of a dose than this without damage to his own person, but, says the report, "a concept of a safe rate of radiation simply does not make sense if one is concerned with genetic damage to future generations. What counts, from point of view of genetic damage is not the rate; it is the total accumulated dose to the reproductive cells of the individual from the beginning of his life up to the time the child is conceived."

Therefore extreme precaution should be taken by persons up to 30 years old at which age about half the children in the nation are born; up to age 40, when about 90 per cent are born.

"This is one reason why we must be cautious about increasing the total amount of radiation to which the entire population is exposed, for increased and prolonged radiation might so raise the death rate and so lower the birth rate that the population, considered as a whole, would decline and eventually perish," the report said.

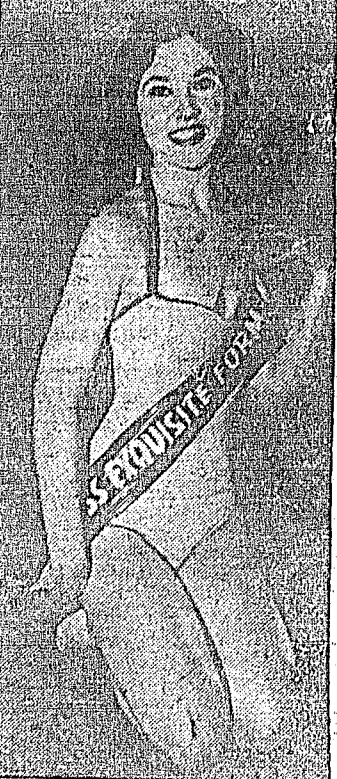

Drought Freight Rates Revised

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, has been advised by the Secretary of Agriculture and the Governor of Texas of revised routines in the execution of freight rate certificates entitling eligible applicants to reduced freight rates under Interstate Commerce Commission Drought Orders.

These orders provide in part that the class of persons entitled to reduced rates are those designated as being in distress and in need of relief by the United States Department of Agriculture or by such State agents as designated by the Department. The Secretary of Agriculture has authorized Governors of all drought stricken states to designate persons entitled to reduced freight rates. Effective November 15, 1956, Governor Shivers redelegate to all county judges in designated drought counties in Texas the authority to execute certificates.

"Heretofore, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisors were authorized to execute certificates and only stockmen who were eligible for emergency feed could obtain the certificates. This revised authorization will extend the benefits of reduced freight rates to all stockmen in designated counties," McKay stated.

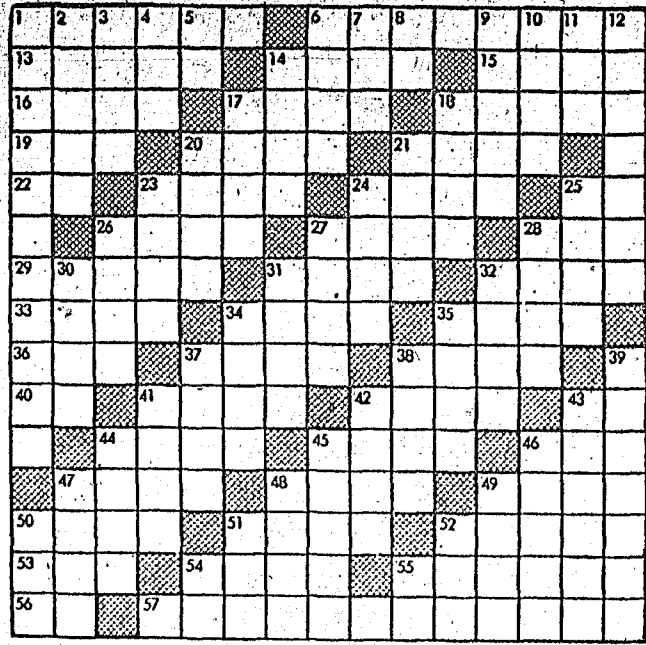

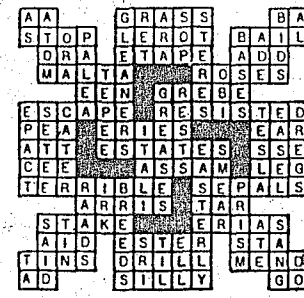

Every year in the United States there are literally thousands of people killed by fire. Many people are ignorant to the real causes of fire. The word real in this statement should certainly be stressed.

If you were to ask persons what they believed to be the real causes of fire, probably three out of five would say, "Well I suppose matches, cigarettes, false wiring, spontaneous combustion, and many other numerous reasons that could be corrected are."

The cigarette butt, unknown to Mr. Brown, lands in a bed of very dry grass, along the roadside. The highway and fire departments said it was a puzzle to them who started the fire, but that many farmers lost valuable

crops as a result of it.
Mr. Brown arrives home and sees Mrs. Brown in the kitchen busily ironing. Yes, too busy to see that she has the electric outlet she's using overloaded. Let's see, there's the iron, the radio she's listening to, the lamp for better light, the toaster, the coffee percolator and the electric clock. Mrs. Brown, how dangerous can you become?

At this moment, Mr. Brown smells smoke. It's coming from the store room where Mrs. Brown has carelessly left some very oily rags, without putting them in a metal container, and spontaneous combustion has been at work. Mr. Brown was able to put the fire out, but not before valuable articles in the store room were damaged.

Meanwhile, the boys, getting into double mischief because of being twins, have found a box of matches that were left laying around by their parents. The boys thought it would be great sport to build a bonfire in the garage, where Mr. Brown had previously left some old gasoline cans, one-third full of gas.

The cans exploded and later the doctors told Mr. and Mrs. Brown that plastic surgery might improve Pat's badly scarred face and that Mike might restore part of his eyesight. Careless parents, weren't they?

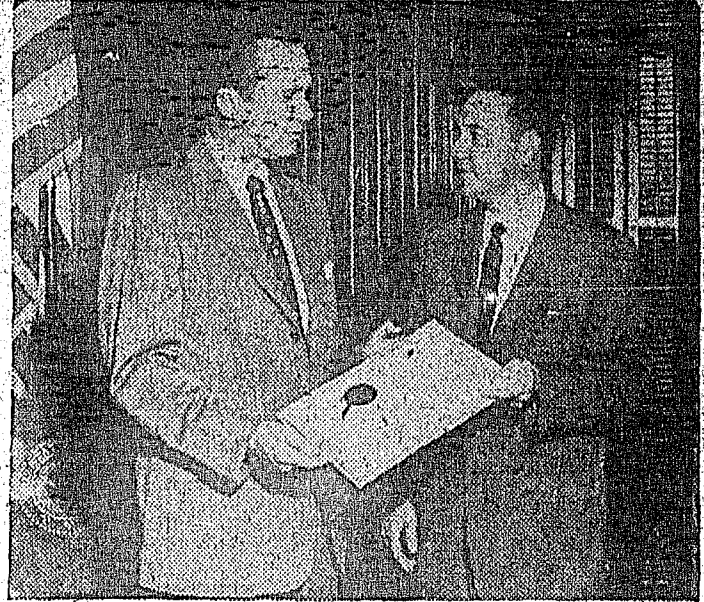

The only thing she had hidden them on the bottom shelf right in the little girl's reach. Little Peg wanted to play the piano when she became older, do you suppose she ever will?

Maybe you say all this is impossible to happen to the same family. No, it's not impossible and this could be your family. Start now protecting your family from fire. Prevent fires and save lives. If you, and everyone else will do this, there will definitely be a safer tomorrow.

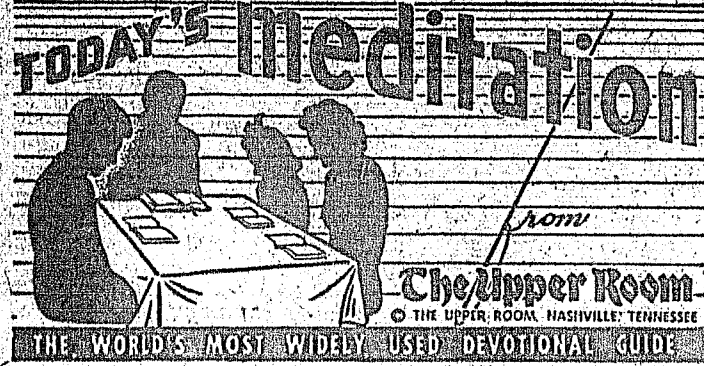

"Doc" Oakes Completes 22 Years Of Service In Texas National Guard

(Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Sunday Brownwood Bulletin. "Doc" is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Turner Oakes, longtime residents of Santa Anna.)
This article is dedicated to O. L. Oakes, a man who has seen

them come and go in the National Guard and the 36th Infantry Division.
If he is in Austin, Ft. Worth, or any other installation where there are old Guardsmen, he is known and liked. Recently on a trip to Austin with him, I was

amazed that everywhere we went through the various agencies of the National Guard people knew "Doc".

For 22 years, through peace and war, he has never missed a drill or lost a day of duty. This could be a record. I don't know. I do know that it is beyond my power to put into words the contributions made by this man to the Texas National Guard.

Doc Oakes, as he is known by almost everyone in the regiment, was born May 22, 1913, under the

shadows of the Santa Anna Mountains. He was christened Osbourne Lenton Oakes.

On October 19, 1932, 19 years later, the ranks of the Texas National Guard received a recruit who soon learned the art of wrapping leggings, doing squads right and the precise angle of the campaign hat.

Doc mobilized with the 36th Division and served throughout Africa, Italy, and Southern France while the division was compiling a record for the most

consecutive days of combat ever known by any modern division.

After the war, Sgt. Oakes moved back to Santa Anna and became the unit caretaker of the Tank Company, 142nd Infantry. In 1951 he moved to Brownwood to become a member of the Brownwood Service Center, which is a fulltime operation.

He resides at the guest house at Camp Bowie with his wife, Lucille, and their three children, Robert Lenton, Lenda Carol and Charlotte Ann. Mrs. Oakes is

president of the Woodland Heights P-TA and her husband is active in committee work.

Recently Sgt. Oakes completed 22 years of continuous service with the National Guard without missing a drill. That is equivalent to working for around five years without missing a day.

Here is a man who deserves all that is possible from the National Guard. May he serve 22 more years (if he wishes) and may all of us try to be as faithful and dependable as Doc.
