ings and everybody will gain. You are asked to separate your Christmas cards into two bundles, local and out-of-town, and to be sure that addresses are correct and plainly written with your return adresses in the upper left-hand corner of all par-cels. On the outside of your packages you may place a "Do Not Open Until Christmas" label or you may write or print it.

Keep in mind the December is "Wrap it well, Address it plainly, Mail it now".

Speaking from his Austin office, J. O. "Jim' Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, issued a word of caution to Texans, today regarding Christmas tree-decorating safe-

"Accidents at Christmas time always seem so much more tra-gic," Musick said. "And this is especially true if the accident results in a fire that costs a family their home, maybe serious injury to one of the family".

preventable, if only a few common sense precautions are taken. As an example he listed the

1. Keep tree outside until time to trim. 2. Place tree away from all

heating units. 3. Use non-flammable decora-

tions. 4. Never use candles near tree. 5. Make sure lights, sockets and wiring are in good condi-

tion. 6. Anchor tree, at top, with wire to prevent it from falling. 7. Turn off tree lights at bedtime or when away from home. 8. Dispose of tree safely; never burn in fireplace.

"Remember", he concluded, "It takes less than 60 seconds for the average tree to burn up completely, so make your Christmas a bright one, but with happiness not with fire."

THE flying team of Daedalus and Icarus never had a chance to reach the sun. Even though solar heat hadn't melted their wax wings, the high altitude would have resulted in the first space travel casualty. When flying, the effects of oxygen want are usually not felt below 5,000 feet. Up to



10,000 feet they usually are not serious. Flying above 10,000 feet may give the fiver a false sense of well-being. Every act requires more effort above 14,000 feet, and vision and judgement are impaired. From 23,000 to 25,000 is considered the maximum to which man can ascend for brief periods without supplementary oxygen. However, some barrel-chested Chilean natives live at altitudes of 17,000 feet and work in mines at altitudes as high as. 19,000 feet.

Thousands of people owe their lives to parachutes when they have been forced to abandon an aircraft. The correct packing of parachutes is so important that "riggers" are licensed by the Civil Aeronautics Authority. Parachutes must be inspected every 10 days and repacked every 60. Civil aircraft don't have to carry them, except when acrobatic flying is to be done. Occupants of military and naval aircraft must wear them. A man falling freely will reach a terminal velocity of about 110 miles per hour.

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
