This past week I met with certain members of the Senate committee which has been studying State expenditures. According to some newspaper articles we don't need any new tax money; also, that the Comptroller and Treasurer have said our deficit was only ten million dollars. The State Auditor has fixed it at fifteen million dollars as of September 1st of this year; at approximately twenty million dollars September 1 1938; and approximately twenty-four million dollars September 1, 1939, if no new taxes were

# Sealy Hospital In Need Of Iron Lung. Will You Contribute?

A few days ago a twelve year old boy died in the local hospital of infantile paralysis. An iron lung might have saved him. Doctors and nurses did everything in their power to save the child, but without the iron lung equipment, it was only a matter of time. The nearest "iron lung" is in Fort Worth and is not available for use except to citizens of the Fort Worth communities and it is now in continual use. Cases hr this community are steadily increasing and unless the iron lung equipment is acquired many of our local children may suffer.

Citizens of Abilene are now donating toward the purchase of a lung in a hospital there. The News is asking the citizens of Santa Anna and friends of the Sealy Hospital to begin contributing to a similar fund. The hospital serves hundreds of people in this section of Texas and has been one of the foremost in Texas in donating services to charity work. In fact so much charity work has been done here at the Sealy Hospital that the purchase of such equipment as the iron lung by the hospital itself would be almost impossible.

The "iron lung" can be purchased for \$1650. The equipment can be used not only for infantile paralysis victims, but for all types of paralysis of respiration and for artificial respiration. It is fast becoming a necessity for the safety of the community and of your family since infantile paralysis cases have reached epidemic proportions.

to the cigarette tax law, to which Sheppard turned his attention as soon as the gasoline tax law had been corrected by the Legislature. Although a smaller total amount is involved, the showing is even more impressive — an income more han doubled without any increase in price. While a small part of the increase may be due to increased consumption of cigarettes, most of the increase is due to the halting of tax ev-

Four years ago, when Sheppard took hold, the counterfeiters of cigarette tax stamps and the itinerant peddler of untaxed cigarettes were making unbelievable inroads into the state's collections. Even making a substantial allowance for increased consumption, it is estimated that the state was losing \$3,000,000 annually to these

An examination of the law disclosed many defects. As was true with the gasoline tax law, the enforcement provisions were entirely inadequate. The stamp then in use was readily adaptable to counterfeiting.

The new cigarette tax law and the new gasoline tax law were enacted by the same session of the Legislature, in 1933. A new type of cigarette tax stamp, a serially numbered decalcomania stamp, which could not be duplicated or re-used, vas devised. Numerous other leaks of a technical nature like-

wise were corrected. This year, the cigarette tax will show an income of \$6,660,-800; in 1933, the last year under the old law, the net income to the state was approximately \$3,000,000.00 That's a gain of more than 100 per cent.

One further phase of the tax

collection program: A corps of auditors was put on the books of gasoline and cigarette distributors, with in-structions to find whether the state had been cheated in any instances. As a result, the state found claims of more than half a million dollars in delinquent taxes, and suits were filed through the Attorney General. Several thousands of dollars have been collected through this and several offenders have been convicted under the new felony statutes.

Comparison of the collection costs on these two tax laws with other tax laws shows the tax has been collected at remarkably little expense to the state. The cost of collecting the gasoline tax amounts to 1 per cent; of collecting the cigarette tax, 2 1-2 per cent, while to collect ad valorem or property tax, the cost is 5 per cent. In dollars and cents, to collect \$46,000,000 in gasoline taxes cost \$423,944.06, while to collect \$16,000,000 in ad valorem taxes cost the state approximately \$800,000.







Included in the early group are mustard, radishes, turnips, leafy lettuce, and similar vegetables which will be ready for harvest in around 45 days. The medium group is made up of Irish potatoes, beets, onions from sets, Swiss chard, collards, and the like, which will mature in 60 to 70 days. The slow maturing group includes spinach, cabbage, carrots, beans, and similar types, which require about 100 days to reach matur-

Summer weeds should be cut and removed from the garden site, Rosborough said, as they will dry out the soil through heat generated by decay. From three to four wagons of well-rotted manure per half acre of garden will hold moisture aand nelp growth.

Rosborough warned that fall gardens should not be planted until rains had provided plenti-ful subsoil moisture. To insure a fair stand of fall vegetables under unfavorable fall conditions, fall sown seed should be planted at a much thicker rate than is necessary in the spring.

### Health Dept. Warns Against Appendicitis

Austin, Texas, Sept. 15.—Durng the past year 786 persons lied of appendicitis in Texas, according to Vital Statistics compilations of the State Department of Health. Many of these deaths might have been prevented had the patient been more aware of the disease and

its symptoms. There are two forms of appendicitis, acute and chronic. The form that appears suddenly, with great pain and sickness is acute. Chronic appendicitis may extend over a long period of time and consists of slight attacks at intervals, but, at some time, there will usually occur an attack worse than any before and the disease may then

become serious. "In the presence of abdominal pain, give nothing by mouth. Never give laxatives. Apply an ice pack. Call your family physician. Abdominal pain which persists over a period of six hours is usually serious," advises State Health Officer Geo. W.

Hospital records show that the above advice has reduced appendicitis deaths 75 per cent. When otherwise healthy people are operated upon soon after the beginning of the "pain in the stomach" caused by appendicitis, little danger is experienced, but the surgeon's work is made more difficult and the patient's chance of recovery considerably lessened when there is a long delay in seeking medical help, and especially if a cathartic has been given.

How to prevent appendicitis? Keep the body in perfect health as long as possible. Watch your teeth, your tonsils, any place where an infection may occur. 





We have learned too, along with other things to be economical and use the material we have at home. For example, when we made our cup towels we used flour sacks and feed sacks that had been washed, bleached. They are nice and soft, about a yard long, and cost very little. In making slips we chose very closely woven cotton materials in pastel shades. We used French seams on the sides and whipped or blind stitched inhems. Our school dresses were plain or printed cotton materials, in which we chose colors most becoming to complexions and hair. By the time these articles were finished we had learned to use a machine; to make evenly whipped hems, plain, and French seams; put on pockets, collars, and cuffs; methods for finishing facings, bindings, and hems.

The club interest almost died during the very hot summer months, but became intense with the election of new officers in the fall of time I was elected Secretary of the club. I have enjoyed the work and feel that it has been most helpful to me.

Our goals in Clothing for 1937 were to: 1. Equip a sewing box and making a clothing plan; 2. Provide closet with 12 hangers and make a shoe rack Check D-105 each week, 3. Make kitchen apron, gown or kimono, and a sport dress to wear to the Countywide Contest

The goals in Gardening were to: 1. Make a garden plan to provide enough row space to produce 200 lbs of other vegetables for each member in the family; 2. Conserve 15 containers of canned quality products, 4 qts. in glass jars for judging and scoring contest; 3. Prepare and serve these vegetables at

least 6 times during the year. In January 1937 we made our kitchen aprons, which called for the making straps, strings, pockets, and the damask stitch. These aprons were made from cotton prints and from discarded sacks.

Our February program was on making garden plans and how to deal with insects. Miss Alice Glenn Young, County H. D. A., gave the program on the gar-den plans. By this time everyone was much interested in club work. I was much pleased when the club elected me wardrobe demonstrator, as I enjoy sewing very much.

I had an old closet in our hall that we use to house shoes and old coats. It was very dark inside and outside, and located in a dark corner—really, I didn't think that it could be remodeled. The height of my ambition was to see if I could make it into a nice adequate closet. That was one of the reasons that I wanted to be wardrobe demonstrator.

Other goals to work toward were the prizes to be offered at Rally Day to the three demonstrators who had done the best work during the year. I will tell you something about Rally Day later, but just now, I will continue with our work.
