## Filing Deadline For City Offices Is Saturday

The annual City Election will be held in Santa Anna Tuesday, April 2 and a mayor and two aldermen will be elected. The terms of Mayor W. Tilden Jones and Aldermen Hardy Blue and Tom Hays expire this year. Aldermen F. C. Williams, Ben Yarbrough and O. A. Etheredge have another year to run. Williams attempted to resign a few weeks ago, but the other members of the council did not accept his resignation.

Mayor Jones said he definitely would not be a candidate for reelection, as it is against the wishes of the board of directors of the hospital.

Alderman Hardy Blue said he had served two terms, or four years, and that he definitely would not be a candidate this year. Alderman Tom Hays has also indicated that he did not intend to be a candidate again this year. He has also served four years on the council.

So, it would seem that the field is wide open for anyone who might wish to serve a term on the City Council. Anyone desiring to serve must file their name with the City Secretary not later than Saturday, March 2, in order to have their name printed on the ballot.

The City Hall will be open until noon Saturday and Miss Jettie Kirkpatrick said if anyone wanted to file later than that time, she would be available at her home during the afternoon.

## Car-Train Crash Injures Five Monday Night

A late model Mercury and a Santa Fe switch engine collided at the railroad crossing in the east part of town about 8:25 p. m. Monday. All occupants of the car were injured and the car was thought to be a total loss.

In the car were Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Stephens and two sons, Dwayne, age 3, and Dwight, age 2, and Miss Carolyn Jordan, sister of Mrs. Stephens, all of Odessa. Mr. Stephens, 25, suffered severe lacerations of the scalp and numerous bruises on the body. He was driving the car. Mrs. Stephens, 21, suffered a broken left leg, numerous lacerations of the head and face and almost went into a state of shock. Dwayne suffered a broken right leg and multiple laceration about the face. Dwight suffered lacerations of the scalp. Miss Jordan, 15, suffered several bruises on both legs. Mrs. Stephens and Dwayne were transferred from the local hospital to an Abilene hospital that night and the other were released after treatment.

The group were on their way from Odessa to Stephenville to visit relatives. The switch engine had backed several empty freight cars to the Santa Anna Silica Sand Co., and was heading back to the main line when the accident occurred.

The drawbar on the engine hit the car just back of the left front headlight and pushed the car down the track several feet before coming to a halt.

The accident was investigated by Deputy Sheriff Bud Simmons. No charges were filed, but the investigation is still underway.

## 159 Students Lost In Coleman County School System

Mr. D. E. Loveless, County School Superintendent, announced this week that 159 students was lost in the census of the county for the next school year. The census was taken in January.

Total census for the 1956-57 term showed a total of 2680 students in the county. The new census shows a total of 2521 for next year. White students this year numbered 2587 and Colored students numbered 93. Next year there will be 2433 white students and 88 Colored students.

Broken down into school systems, following is the story for each school:

Burket has a total of 70 students this year and next year will have 57 students; Novice has 130 students and next year will have 128; Mozelle has 165 white students and eight Colored students and next year they will have 148 white students and eight Colored students; Centennial has 104 students this year and will have 95 next year; Coleman has 1489 white students and 70 Colored students this year and next year they will have 1423 white students and 71 Colored students; Rockwood has 39 students this year and next year will have 44 students; Santa Anna has 463 white students this year and 15 Colored students and next year they will have 428 white students and nine Colored students.

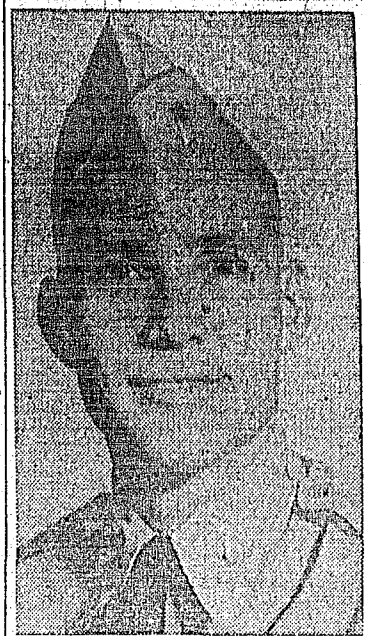

## Public Schools Week To Be Observed In Local Schools All Next Week

Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent of the Santa Anna Schools, said both the elementary school and high school were going all out this year in the observance of Public Schools Week, beginning Monday March 4 and continuing through March 9. A number of activities have been planned during the week and everyone is urged to attend every function possible.

Citizens of the area are also invited to eat at the lunchroom one day during the week. If you plan to eat at the lunchroom, you are requested to notify the supervisor, Mrs. Christine Smith, as to what day you plan to be there. This is requested in order that plans may be made ahead of time to take care of everyone, and so that no more food than necessary will be wasted. Adult meals will be 30 cents each.

You may look at the lunchroom menu elsewhere in this issue of The News and know on what day you would like to be there.

Everyone is invited to visit the school anytime during the week. Mr. Perry said he would like to have every parent of local students visit each class their children attend. A registration desk will be at each school and you are invited to register when you enter the building. A student will be at the registration desk to answer questions.

Below is a complete schedule of all classes from the Sixth Grade up with the teacher and time of class listed. You may pick the time, class and teacher you would like to visit and make every effort to visit at least one during the week.

A number of additional activities have been planned for the week you are urged to attend them. On Monday night a regular meeting of the School Board will be held in the lunchroom of the elementary school. All board meetings are open to the public but very seldom anyone attends other than the regular members. A complete report on the operation of the school at mid-term will be given at this meeting and also a financial statement. Several other activities have been planned for the meeting.

On Tuesday night all the students participating in music in both schools will present a program in the high school auditorium. There will be a band concert and several musical numbers by the choral groups. The program is planned to last about two hours.

No program is planned for Wednesday night.

On Thursday night a complete schedule of classes will be run with all the teachers from the Sixth Grade up taking about 12 minutes to tell parents what and how they teach each subject. No questions will be asked the adults; this is a program designed to inform each parent what their children are studying and the methods used to teach them. It will be very informative and all parents are requested to be there if possible. A copy of the school's schedule will be available and anyone desiring other information will find teachers and students ready to answer their questions.

All the evening programs will begin at 7:30 p. m.

The parity formula may be in trouble.

A plan by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson to "improve" the present means of establishing fair prices for farm products is expected to meet with heated debate in Congress.

The present plan establishes the same purchasing power for farm commodities which they had in the years 1910-1914 when prices paid and received by the farmers were considered in good balance. This base period ratio is adjusted to reflect average price relationships over the most recent 10-year period.

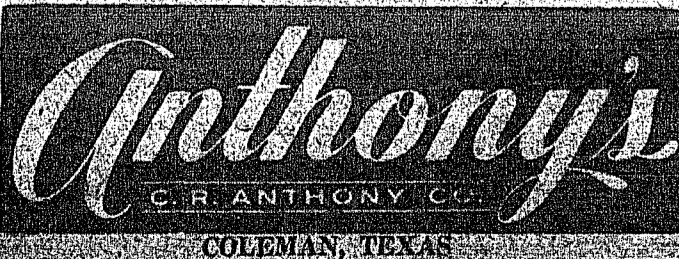

Benson's recommendations, submitted in a report to Congress, would change the selected base period to the years 1947-56 in figuring the ratio. This would enable Benson to lower price supports without actually lowering percentages of parity rates.

The wider, more recent base period would involve a complex change which finally would boil down to this: an over-all two percent reduction in price supports.

The 1947-56 period is one in which agricultural prices fluctuated widely. It reflects changes in administration and in farm programs.

If Congress keeps this in mind, which it undoubtedly will, this plan is very unlikely for the law books.

**Meat-Vegetable Casserole**  
(Serves 6-8)  
1 can corned beef  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 1/2 cup uncooked noodles  
1 No. 2 can whole kernel corn  
1 cup diced cheese  
1 green pepper, diced  
1 3/4 cups tomato juice  
Dice and brown beef in shortening. Season. Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and blanch. Alternate layers of meat, noodles, corn, cheese and green pepper in buttered casserole. Add tomato juice. Bake in moderate (350° F.) oven for 30 minutes.

Serve either plain or with very thin slices of pound cake.

Pot roast will have a wonderful flavor if you season it with a few bay leaves and easy-to-use instant onion.

Layer green vegetables and sliced onions with cream sauce to give yourself a wonderful vegetable dish. If you like a "crisp touch", top with a few slivers of almonds.

Cole slaw is crisp, but it can be crunchy, too, if you pop a few broken walnut meats in it just before serving.

Cooked carrots are easy to glaze with 2 tablespoons of butter and 1 tablespoon of sugar over low heat. No browning, please!

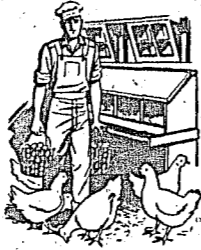

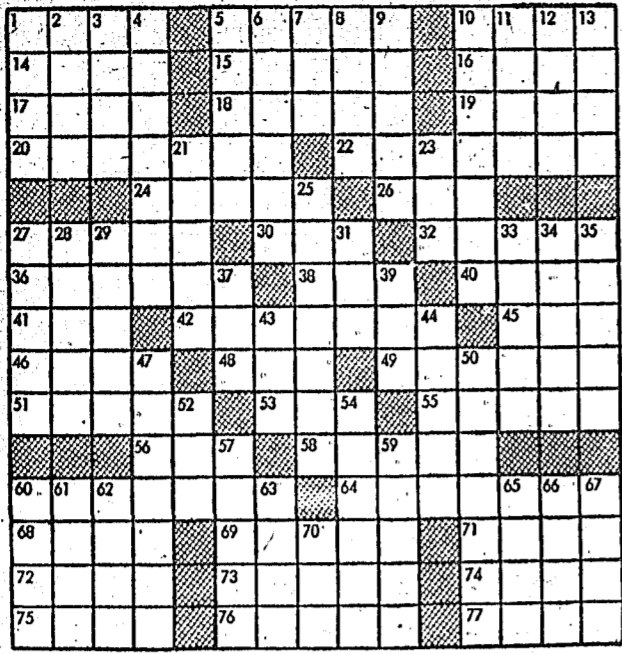

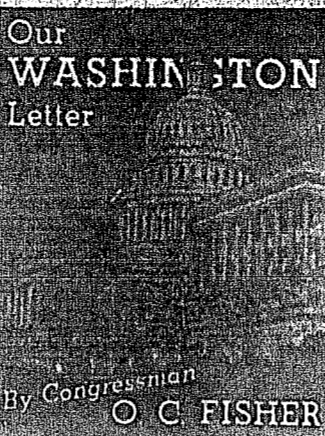

**OUR WASHINGTON LETTER**  
By Congressman O. C. FISHER

THAT RAIN IN TEXAS LAST week caused a bit of a sensation even in the Nation's capitol. It was front-page news in the dailies here, and telephone calls were rather frequent, inquiring about the extent of the moisture.

Over in the Senate, an appropriation bill was amended last week to require the Secretary of Agriculture to undertake a protein supplement feed program in the drouth area, patterned after the hay program. Ultimate fate of this proposal sponsored by Senator Johnson — which was also considered in the House Agriculture Committee — remains in doubt at the moment.

In Washington for the annual Grand Masters' Conference, Paul Turney and Mrs. Turney of Sonora, visited us on Capitol Hill while here. Mr. Turney is presently Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas. Nearly a dozen Texas Congressmen attended a down-town dinner one evening, as Turney's guest. The Turneys went on to New York before their return to Texas.

A report from H. N. Smith, State Soil Conservationist, of Temple, states that survey work is continuing on possible upstream watershed programs, including the one of Sulphur Creek in Lampasas and Burnet Counties. The work plan for that project has been completed, and should be ready for transmittal to Congress within about 60 days.

Getting back to water and the drouth, I introduced a bill last week to ease the requirements of economic justifications before the Army Engineers are allowed to recommend flood control projects. The law now requires that the costs and benefits must balance. Under my bill, applicable only to the disaster area, the costs of a dam could exceed the benefits by 20%. Although this involves a lot of difficulty, I find quite a bit of interest in some sort of legislation that would relax the hard-and-fast rules and thereby enable more projects to be approved.

B. W. Allred, former chief range specialist for the Soil Conservation Service in Texas, was my guest at a Texas delegation luncheon dinner last week. At that meeting I showed and explained a number of slides prepared by Texas A. & M. College, depicting the extent of the drouth and its effect. Mr. Allred told the delegation something about the problem of re-seeding and re-grassing the land which has been denuded by the long seige of dry weather. Allred is presently on a special assignment with the Department, working out of Washington.

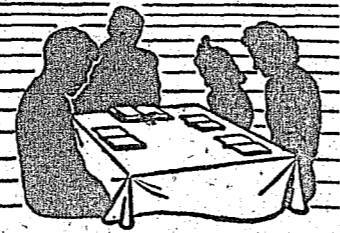

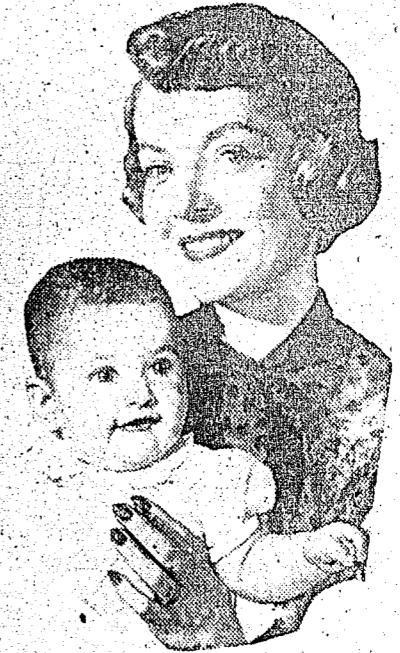

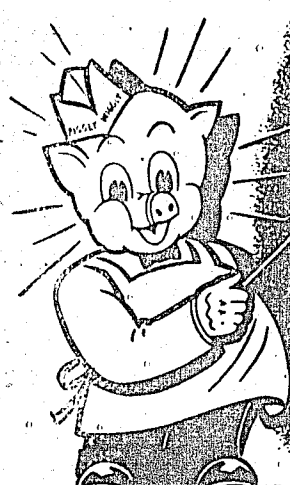
