Yarborough Wins Senate Seat

Ralph Yarborough of Austin won the U. S. Senate seat in the election held throughout Texas on Tuesday. At the latest tabulation of votes Yarborough was several thousand votes ahead of his nearest opponent, Martin Dies. Third man in the race was Republican Thad Hutcheson.

All others in the race received only token votes throughout the state.

The Coleman County vote was close between Yarborough and Dies with Hutcheson running third. Yarborough polled 671 votes in the county and Dies polled 661, running second by 10 votes. Hutcheson polled 222 votes in the county.

In Santa Anna Yarborough polled 110 votes to 93 for Dies and 51 for Hutcheson.

A total of 129 votes were cast in the Senate race in the North Ward with Yarborough getting 43; Hart 7; Dies 43; Bracewell 2; and Hutcheson 29. In the South Ward 141 votes were cast and Yarborough polled 67; Hart 2; Dies 45; Bracewell 3; White 2; and Hutcheson 22. The other candidates did not get any votes in Santa Anna.

In the race for alderman, D. H. Moore received 151 of the 155 votes and Ozro Eubank received 153 votes. Ben Vinson received one write-in for alderman.

Contract Let To Re-build Highway To Rockwood

A contract for 18.8 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 283 in Coleman County has been awarded to an Austin firm. It was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Holland Page submitted the low bid of \$710,818.71 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing from one mile south of Rockwood to U. S. 67 and U. S. 84 in Santa Anna is expected to take 300 working days, according to Robert J. Milligan, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood. The awarding of the contract to this firm is subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Erle C. Mayo, Sr., Resident Engineer at Coleman will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

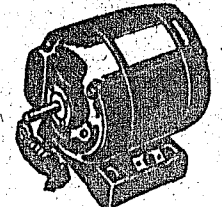
DENNIS FARMER NAMED TO SORORITY GROUP

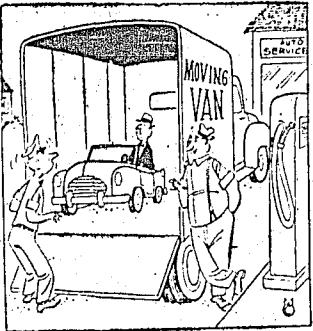

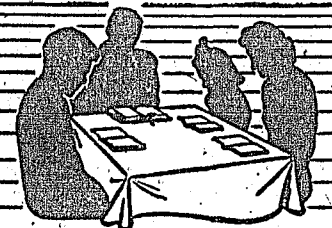

And they (Paul and Silas) said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." (Acts 16:31, RSV.)

CHICK CHATS—
Ward Off Some Poultry Diseases

A poultryman is often forced to be on the defensive against poultry diseases. In some instances, however, he can take the offensive and ward off trouble before it strikes. Such is the case with two important, virus-caused diseases—Newcastle and infectious bronchitis.

Virus diseases do not respond well to treatment but can often be prevented by immunization. Early vaccination of chicks has been practiced with success to help prevent Newcastle disease and infectious bronchitis. Newcastle disease, a respiratory-nervous disorder, attacks chickens of all ages. Mortality is frequently very heavy in chicks and poults and young growing stock. Normal growth may be seriously retarded in birds that do recover.

Vaccinate Chicks
Vaccines have been used for several years to prevent Newcastle disease. Although it is permissible to vaccinate day-old chicks if Newcastle threatens, it is usually best to vaccinate when chicks are 4 to 10 days old.

The birds should be revaccinated by the time they are 8 weeks old (at 4 weeks if disease is prevalent in area). Replacement pullets should be vaccinated.

ed again at 4 months of age. In areas where Newcastle is especially severe, it may be necessary to reaccinate every four months.

Bronchitis Vaccine
Early protection from infectious bronchitis also can be obtained by vaccination. With symptoms that are indistinguishable from some other respiratory diseases, infectious bronchitis causes highest mortality.

Infectious-bronchitis vaccine has been proved effective in preventing the disease. Chicks should be vaccinated during the first few days (a combination Newcastle-bronchitis vaccine may be used).

Birds should be revaccinated by the time they are 4 months old.

Help your chicks ward off these two destructive diseases with early vaccination. Remember that it is often better to prevent a disease than to give treatment after it strikes the flock.

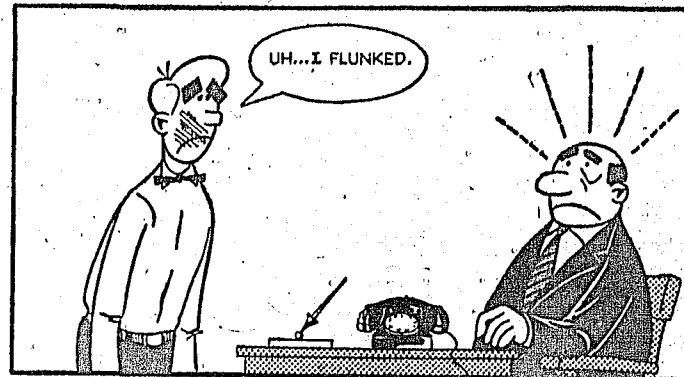
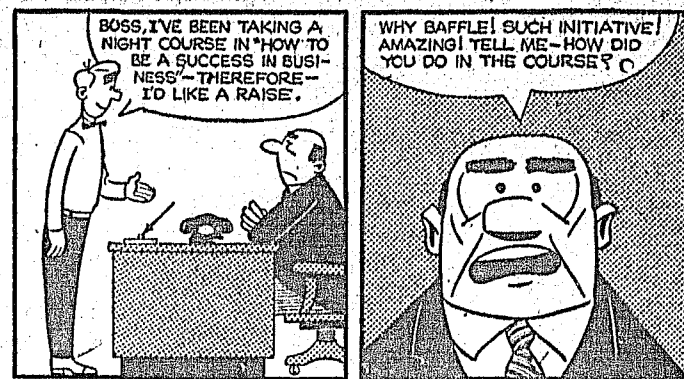

Social Security Information On Household Help

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of articles to better acquaint employers of domestic help of their responsibilities under both tax and benefit laws of the Social Security Administration.)

Housewives failing to report the earnings of their domestic workers under the Social Security law may be depriving them of valuable credits at retirement or death, warned R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene Social Security office, and A. E. Fogle, Abilene district Internal Revenue Service Administrative Officer.

At the same time, they are headed for trouble with Uncle Sam, added the Revenue director.

One day the domestic worker will report the housewife who fails to pay the tax, they warned, as most maids and other domestics are beginning to realize advantages of such payments for their old age or for their survivors in the event of death.

Fogle revealed that severe penalties may be applied to willful delinquencies.

Tuley said that the social security tax amounts to 2 1/4 per cent for each employee and employer, since January 1957. The tax had been 2 per cent. Employers must pay on household employees who earn \$50 or more in any calendar quarter, such as January through March.

The law applies to such workers in and about the home as maids, cooks, waiters, butlers, housekeepers, governesses, valets, baby sitters, janitors, laundresses, furnace men, gardeners,

and chauffeurs for private autos.

Fogle said the tax is paid to Internal Revenue Service on a simple easy-to-complete Form 942, which IRS will supply upon request. Wages include payments in cash, check or money order. Not included for household workers is the value of food, lodging or clothing. Cash payment for car fare is included, but not the cost of bus tokens.

"Here's a typical question that we get daily at our office," Tuley said: "I do work in private homes, one day each week for three different employers. Should all my employers deduct social security tax?"

Social Security's reply: "Yes, if each pays you \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter." Fogle concluded, "Form 942, showing name, social security number, wages paid and tax withheld from each household employee, should be completed and returned to Revenue Service within one month after the calendar quarter's end - that's by April 30, for the January-March period."

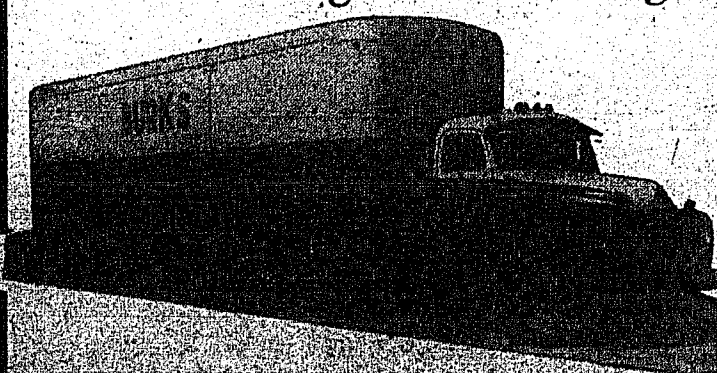


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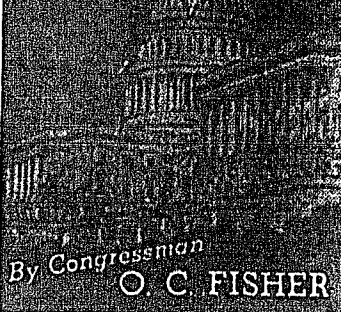
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Our WASHINGTON Letter

When is a President not a President? That question is engaging a lot of attention these days and may be resolved soon. At least, the issue has been submitted by Attorney General Brownell to the House Judiciary Committee where all constitutional amendments are considered in the House. President Eisenhower wants something done about it.

The hiatus stems from indefinite language in Art. II, Sec. 1, Clause 6 of the Constitution, which raises, but does not answer precisely, a number of questions about what happens in the "inability" of the President to "discharge the powers and duties" of his office.

The Constitution says the Vice President takes over when "inability" prevents the President from acting. But what is meant by "inability"? Who decides if and when a President is unable to continue to serve? Does the President decide it? Does the Vice President decide it? It is to clear up those issues that all this talk is now taking place.

Suppose a President becomes deranged, is stricken with an illness that renders him unconscious, or is captured in time of war? The Constitution simply does not answer the question of who would decide upon the question of the Vice President taking over.

The issue popped up when President Eisenhower had his heart attack in September, 1955. But the same concern has been debated scores of times in the past, even during the Constitutional convention.

President Garfield was hopelessly unable to perform an official act for 80 days after he was shot in 1881.

President Woodrow Wilson was partly paralyzed and hardly able to function from September 1919 to March, 1921.

In both of these instances there was much talk about passing on to the Vice President the duties of the office, rather than allowing the affairs of state to drift while experts debated the ambiguities of the Constitution. It is self-evident, therefore, that this serious flaw in the Constitution should be corrected. Either the President's cabinet, or a special commission, should be charged with the responsibility of making the decision, in conjunction with the written views of the President himself concerning his inability. Anyhow, this old, unanswered question is being kicked around again.

There's fun for all the family at Bonham State Park, three and a half miles southeast of Bonham on Farm Road 271. An artificial lake supplies fishing, boating and swimming. There is plenty of playground equipment for the younger children, two large picnicking grounds, two pavilions, a large concessions building with bath house and a group camp that can house 80 people.

Bonham State Park provides nearly every kind of outdoor recreation for all people in a well planned, compact space of 555 acres in Fannin county, 3 1/2 miles, southeast of Bonham on Farm Road 271.

Swimming, boating, fishing, picnicking, camping, nature trails, playgrounds and a dancing terrace are placed so that one activity does not interfere with another.

Shelter from rains is ample. On the lakefront convenient to the playgrounds there is a large pavilion with double wings, paved floor and terrace. In another part of the park is one of the largest sheltered picnicking units in the entire state park system.

A park road circles the lake, using its dam as part of the roadway. The park lake yields

bass, crappie, bream and channel catfish. There are rental boats, a good boat house, boat dock and fishing pier. Dressing rooms for swimmers are a part of the concessions building.

Two separate picnicking areas are maintained. The northeast grove is equipped especially to care for large gatherings. The other has more individual units and a place for moderate sized groups.

The group camp in the park can house parties of 80 persons. Four dormitories, a fully-equipped kitchen and dining room make up the principal part of the seven-building camp.

Bonham State Park is especially attractive to nature students because of its wide variety of flowers, shrubs and trees.

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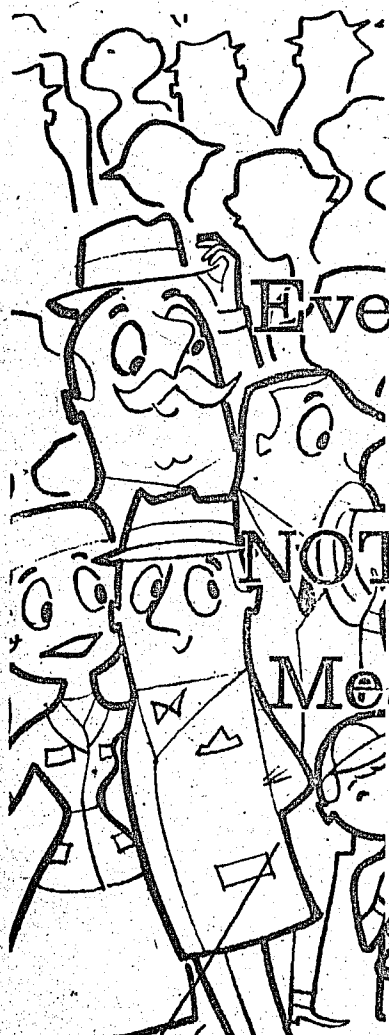

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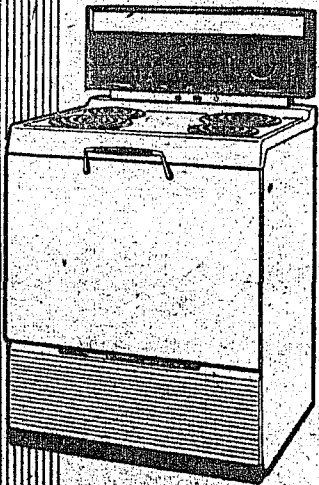

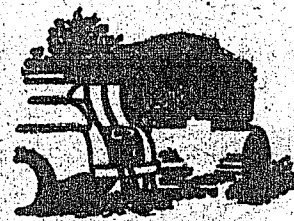
