Memorial Day Is Holiday For **Local Merchants**



The secretary of State has announced that he will re-appoint all persons who now hold a Notary Public Commission, and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1957 and June 10, 1957.

The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary Bonds, and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State.

All notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Imprisoned Vets May Lose Pensions Says VA Manager

Not affected by the law are compensation payments made to veterans or their survivors for disability or death incurred as a result of either wartime or peacetime service. Dr. McMahan mphasized.

Imprisonment periods of less than 61 days, or of any length before actual conviction, will not stop pension payments, Dr. McMahan said.

To prevent hardships, the law provided that VA may pay pen-sion to the eligible wife or children of a veteran who forfeits his own pension during imprisonment

VA pension being received by a veteran's widow is forfeited for her period of imprisonment greater than 60 days. However if she has eligible children, payment may be made on their behalf, Dr. McMahan pointed out The 60-day rule also applies to any part of a pension being paid on behalf of a child under similar circumstances.



We Maintain 1,068 bases, from small radar outposts to the gigantic bases and depots. Of these 733 are in the U.S., the remainder are outside.

A total of 48,000 airplanes are being operated, 780,000 trucks, cars and jeeps; and nearly 3000 ships.

The fuel bill alone costs \$1 billion a year - 220,000 barrels of fuel

In Addition, the military services have built and they maintain 51,000 miles of roads and streets. That is enough pavement to reach twice around the world. We have built and we maintain 4,500 miles of runway 150 to 250 feet wide. And operate over 12,000 miles of railway. Water consumption at these

Water consumption at these bases amounts to a billion gallons a day.

The military grocery bill is \$650 million a year. This includes 386 million pounds of flour, 300 million pounds of chicken, 107 million pounds of chicken, 68 million pounds of frozen vegetables; 60 million pounds of coffee.

Defense is big business. It can be readily seen that further good housekeeping methods can easily save a billion dollars a year.

Speaking of more efficiency, Hoover Commission recommendations are now 73% in effect, according to the most recent announcement.
