We are as follows: a lot of the responsibility for this lies with the parents of these teen-agers and would like to suggest that parents keep a little closer check on what their children are doing while they are driving the family car and when they reach the age of 16, see that they get a driver's license if they are to drive any vehicle on any public road.

It is our plans to attend as many sessions of city court as possible and ride with the local law enforcement officers during their tour of duty as much as possible during the next several weeks. Violations seen and brought to court will be reported and commented on where we think we can be of assistance to drivers in keeping down traffic violations. We also plan to publish a large number of traffic laws during the next several weeks in order to better acquaint the public with laws that every driver should be throughly familiar with. Homer Garrison, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said recently, "A driver who can read and does not know the traffic laws is no better off as a driver than a person who cannot read."

Ignorance of the law does not excuse a person from prosecution. It will be for the benefit of every driver, young or old, to pay close attention to the traffic laws published and to become throughly familiar with all laws. The first step in doing your part in preventing traffic accidents and congestion on our highways is to know the rules designed to promote efficient use of our highways. It is essential that drivers and pedestrians understand and comply with a set of driving and walking rules in order that they may cooperate with one another in the safe use of our roads. Even, if driving rules were not laws (and they are) they would be just as essential to the prevention of traffic accidents. Very few, if any, accidents occur where at least one or more traffic rules are not yiolated.

What we hope to do is get as many drivers as possible to stop violating the rules of the road and quit getting traffic tickets.



The Plentiful Foods Program will be a part of the dairy industry's cooperative efforts in behalf of June Dairy Month.

There are also plenty of strawberriës. They are scheduled for extra emphasis during the month, mostly in connection with dairy products.

Although the supply of fresh fruits will be low during June, canned purple plums and canned freestone peaches will be available to the housewife in plentiful supplies.

Other plentiful items include potatoes, peanuts, peanut butter and vegetable fats and oils.

Some Veterans May Be Entitled To Second GI Loan

Sale of a veteran's GI-pur-chased home because of a new, and better job in a different Sale of a veteran's GI-purchased home because of a new and better job in a different city may entitle him to new GI

Mrs. Jim Lovelady, chairman George T. McMahan, manager of

Cénter in Waco, said today. "Better job" was defined by Dr. McMahan as being one that would increase the veteran's income or provide him with greatopportunity for advancement.

Restoration of GI loan eligibility formerly was made only if the job change or transfer to another city was involuntary or beyond the veteran's control.

The new ruling, Dr. McMahan said, also applies to veterans moving to a different city following retirement.

Other circumstances under which a veteran may be entitled to a new GI loan eligibility are

when the property: 1. Was taken by a government agency for public use;

2. Was destroyed by natural hazard; or, 3. Was disposed of for com-

pelling reasons of health or other specified reasons beyond control of the veteran. However, no GJ loan entitle-

ment can be restored unless the VA is relieved of liability on the old loan. This generally is accomplished by payment of the loan in full, either by the veteran or the new purchaser.

Up to May 21, Possum Kingdom released 1,773,540 acre-feet of water downstream. Meanwhile the dam was holding vast quantities of water. Just a few weeks earlier this was drouth-parched land. The U. S. Corps of Engineers estimated that, up to May 6th, the two great flood-control dams -- Whitney and Beltonhad prevented damage of \$23,700,000 during recent floods in the Brazos River Basin. 





Inside Story on the Formosa riot, which saw the American flag ripped from its staff and Americans reviled and spat upon by a howling mob, connects that anti-American uprising to Chiang Kai-shek's son, General Chiang Ching-Kuo The latter, in charge of police and internal security, was educated in Moscow and is married to a Russian

woman. That does not mean that Kuo is a Communist. But it is known that he is not pro-American, despite the fact that the U.S. has poured nearly \$3 billion in military and economic aid into that Free Chinese bastion since the Generalissimo was chased from the mainland 8 years ago.

Kuo has organized a youth novement, including many stulents. At their meetings many inkind things have been said about the U.S. and about the Americans.

Thus, sentiment was ripe for the outburst, and resentment to the acquittal of an American sergeant for slaying a Chinese peeping tom served to trigger the explosion.

Kuo's hasty denial that his youth members were anti-American was very unconvincing to insiders. In fact, while it has not blame that has fallen on Kuo is the Generalissimo, is planning to send his son to America to "study" in an effort to placate the critics.

About five years ago, an acient plant never before grown commercially in this country was introduced to farmers in the cotton producing areas in Texas.

It was Sesame, a plant that grows under conditions favorable to cotton. It produces tiny seeds from which vital oils are extracted.





Coccidiosis Can Be Controlled

Coccidiosis is a general term applying to infection with one more species of coccidia, which are microscopic singlecelled parasites. It is certainly one of the most important poultry diseases

Coccidiosis occurs practically everywhere poultry are raised. In the acute forms, the disease causes high death losses and profound weakening and stunting of the surviving birds. In the more chronic forms, coccidiosis causes extreme unthriftiness and gradual loss of weight.

In addition, the presence of coccidiosis in a flock may present a stress that permits the establishment of other diseases

Prevention of Coccidiosis

It is practically impossible to prevent all contact of poultry with coccidia. Good management, including clean litter, clean range, and continuous sanitation, will help keep down the occurrence of this disease. However, most poultrymen with flocks of a considerable size will find it more practical to prevent coccidiosis with a continuous low-level medication; which permits birds to attain an immunity through mild infection.

Usually, preventive medication is successful against coccidiosis, but poultry-disease specialists have found that sometimes the coccidia circumvent a barrier of this type designed to let only a fewthrough — and , pour through onto the chicken. The result is what is called a break - a breach in the protective armor.

It may actually become an

outbreak in the flock. Controlling Coccidiosis

If explosive outbreaks of coccidiosis occur, or if there are stubborn cases defying treatment, there are various drugs that, used promptly and in sufficient concentration, may check the disease.

Prompt treatment with a recognized drug will usually prevent serious losses from coccidiosis. Other steps may be taken to aid the affected birds in their recovery; since coccidiosis does primary damage to the intestinal tract and ceca, it is important to feed birds a highly dl-gestible ration. Attempts to stimulate appetite may be undertaken.

If much hemorrhaging has occurred, it is good to help the blood rebuild by giving supplements or additives rich in iron, copper, and other blood-building substances.

Stain Removal From "Special Finish" Fabrics

.College Station - Special finishes now being used on many cottons, linens and rayons give wrinkle-resistance, extra sheen and body to these fabrics.

Problem now is, how to remove stains from fabrics that have these special finishes. Chlorine bleaches may be used on some, according to extension clothing specialists. Other finishes are damaged by such treatment because special resins in the finish absorb and retain chlorine.

Best rule to follow, according to the USDA Agricultural Research Service, is to look for the directions regarding use of bleaches on the garment. If no information is given, avoid use of chlorine bleaches on fabrics with special finishes.

Some stains cannot be removed without bleaching. In such cases use sodium perborate or a powdered bleach that contains it. Soak washable colorfast fabrics for several hours, or overnight if needed, in a warm solution containing one to two tablespoons of sodium perborate to a pint of water. Another method is to sprinkle dry bleach on the dampened spot, then dip in a pan of very hot water for a few minutes.

This reminder from the clothing specialists — Always check garments for stains before laundering, and remove. Other-wise hot water may set stains.
