The exact time that the vaccine will be administered will one under the age of 21 years so receive the vaccine free of charge if they are unable to pay for it.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis urges everyone under the age of forty years to get the entire series of three shots. The second shot is administered four weeks after the first one, and the third shot is administered about months later. There is no need to take just one shot, as it has very little effect without the second shot. The third shot is the most important of all, as this is the one that gives the immunization against

The first and second shots will be administered to those under 21 years of age free of charge, but at the present time no arrangements have been completed for the third shot, which should be given after school begins next fall.

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



Social Security Information On Household Help

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of articles to better acquaint employers of domestic help of their responsibilities under both tax and benefit laws of the Social Security Administration.)

Housewives employing a maid, cook or laundress and paying cash wages of \$50 or more in any calendar quarter, are required to withhold 21/4 per cent of their cash wages as social security tax. Previous to 1957 the tax was two per cent.

The employer then matches this amount and forwards the total to the district director of Internal Revenue at the close of each quarter.

This announcement was made jointly here today by R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of the Abilene Social Security Office and A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene district Internal Revenue Service. The Revenue official explained that the tax is paid to IRS on a simple, easy-to-use form called Form 942, which any Revenue office can provide. He pointed out that such wages include

'According to Fogle, Form 942, showing name, social security number, wages paid and tax withheld from each household employee, should be completed and sent to Revenue's district director witnin one month after the end of the calendar quarter. That's by April 30, for the January-March period.

Fogle said that the law applies to such domestic workers as maids, cooks, waiters, butlers, housekeepers, governesses, valets, baby sitters, janitors, laundresses, furnace men; gardeners, and chauffeurs for private cars.

Because Federal conservation purchase. acreage measures fail to stipulate that seed bought for us on reserved acreage be tested and tagged to qualify for federal payment, some persons are dis-regarding state laws which establish standards of purity and quality for commercial seed.

For example, the Federal Government has agreed to pay 30 percent of the purchase price for grain sorghum seed used on retired acreage, whether the seed be cleaned, tested, tagged, treated, or not.

False Encouragement

Those who have construed this as encouragement to plant 'cheap" seed in order to effect slight savings in costs are endangering the value of their land in the long run. It is hoped that the oversight which might cause such false encouragement will be cleared up soon.

Texas seed laws provide that all seed sold or offered for sale in the state, excepting some transactions between farmers. must meet certain requirements to prevent the return to the of undesirable weed seed contained in crop seed.

For only a few extra cents per acre spent on tagged and tested seed, a farmer can be assured that his land value will not drop. If he unwisely and ill-advisedly uses low-quality and possibly polluted seed, he may well be incurring a higher loss than whatever payment he will receive from the Soil Bank.

No Bargain Basement Seed Failure to use good, tested and tagged seed for any soil-building program defeats the entire purpose for which the land is being retired. The risk is great

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



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

CHICK CHATS-Sanitation Is Brooding 'Must'

When you're handling something as delicate as baby chicks, you need the help of a good, strong sanitary program.

Sanitation is the No. 1 necessity in preventing most poultry diseases. It is also a control over infectious diseases that have broken out. It is cheap. practical disease insurance but requires some hard work and attention to make it work.

No one (or at least, we hope, no one) would think of starting chicks without a thorough clean After pushing the total cuts up of the brooder house. But it's below the budget estimates past just as important to keep up up of the brooder house. But it's sanitizing during the whole brooding period.

Clean Fountains Daily

Clean the water fountains daily. Empty stale water, wash out and scour, and use a disinfectant to kill germs. Then refill with fresh water.

Feeders should be cleaned at least once a week. Disinfect

Care of the litter is an essential part of poultry sanitation. The litter should be dry and loose. Work it over lightly once from week to week.

If the ventilation is right, it will help keep the litter dry. Ancrowding: this may become a problem when the birds get old-

Be sure to place the fountains of damp spots. Remove damp movement in 1881, designed as a cupancy and a recognition of litter promptly.


