## Traffic Laws and YOU

### JULY 4th HOLIDAY

Ten persons are expected to die on the Texas highways on Thursday, July 4th. If the first days of this week are any indication, it appears that this number may be far short of the number who will die.

However, all the members of the Texas Highway Patrol, plus 120 extra units will be patrolling the highways during the 24 hour period and every effort will be made to take dangerous drivers off the highway before accidents happen.

The best thing to do? Stay at home if you can, but if you must travel, leave in plenty of time to get where you are going by driving at a moderate rate of speed, drive carefully and do not indulge in intoxicating beverages.

### LOCAL CONDITIONS

Some local traffic conditions have improved during the past few weeks and others need to be improved. M. R. Simmons, local Deputy Sheriff, reports one of the most frequent violations he has noted lately is cutting corners at intersections, primarily at the corner of Wallis Avenue and North 2nd Street. Simmons said that with the detour on the Rockwood Highway now running on 2nd Street to Wallis Avenue, this condition is much worse. Drivers are supposed to pass the center of the intersection before making their turn to the left and a lot of them are turning before that time. This is likely to cause a head-on collision and someone could be hurt very seriously.

### RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITHOUT A TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGN OR SIGNAL

1. If two vehicles are approaching an intersection on different roadways and it appears that a collision will result unless one vehicle slows down, then the driver of the vehicle on the left shall slow down and give the right-of-way to the vehicle that is approaching on his right. As long as the two vehicles are approaching at or about the same time, the right-of-way belongs to the vehicle on the right. (This rule also applies at traffic circle intersections.)

2. You must give the right-of-way to a vehicle that is already in an intersection while you are still approaching the intersection. (This rule would apply only in a situation where Rule No. 1 above would not apply, such as when a vehicle is already in the intersection waiting to clear vehicles or pedestrians before the vehicle on the right approaches.)

### RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITH A SIGNAL LIGHT

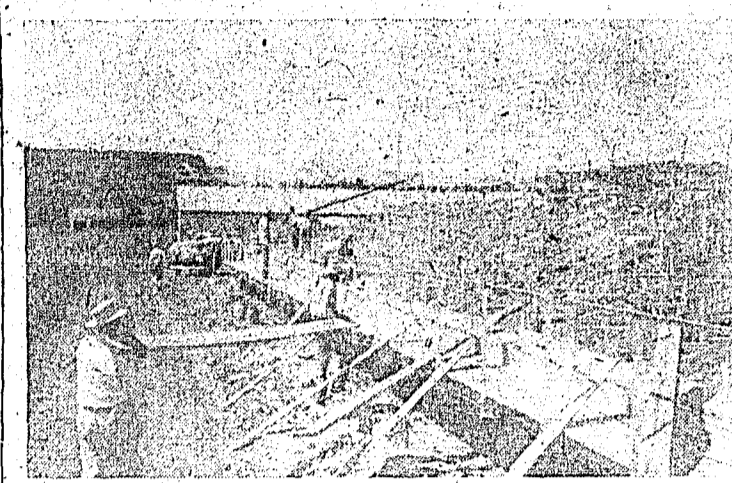
1. When stop-and-go lights are operating, a driver entering the intersection on a green light and/or clearing the intersection on a yellow light has the right-of-way. Note: If you enter the intersection on a yellow light, you must clear the intersection before the red light comes on.

2. When stop-and-go lights are operating, a driver approaching the intersection on a red light must stop and must not enter the intersection until the green light or a green arrow shows. When a green arrow shows, the driver may drive only in the direction of the arrow points but shall give the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully using the crosswalk and to other traffic lawfully using the intersection. A right turn on a red light, even after a stop, is illegal unless a green arrow permits the turn. (The only exception is a flashing red light.)

3. When a flashing red light is operating, a driver approaching the red light must stop before entering the intersection. Procedure after stop is the same as at a stop sign.

4. A flashing yellow light is a caution signal to warn drivers of a traffic hazard and requires a speed low enough to stop to avoid a collision.

## NEW FOOTBALL STADIUM



Pictured above are some members of the Santa Anna Quarterback Club putting the seats on the bleachers at the new football stadium, just west of the old one at the high school. The club contracted to put the seats on the bleachers for the same price the original contractor would have received, but thus far they are a little slow in getting the work done.

The bleacher pictured will seat 750 persons and is located on the east side of the field. It will be used as the home side. Another bleacher with a seating capacity for 250 persons has just about been completed on the west side of the field for the visitors.

The new field is being worked on daily and should be in first class condition when the season opens this fall. It will be dedicated at the first home game in September.

## Brady July Jubilee Gets Underway With Big Parade

Because of the outstanding parades of the last few years, and the fact that it will be held on July 4th, the largest crowd in the history of the Jubilee is expected to view the 1957 Brady July Jubilee Parade.

The Grand Champion Float will be awarded a special 2 1/2 feet tall gold trophy to be presented on July 5th at the race-track. The parade will be held at 10:00 a. m. on July 4th, to be preceded at 9:30 a. m. by an air show, composed of Jets and B-25s from Goodfellow Air Force Base, and Navy Jets from the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station. The special gold trophy will be presented to the best decorated locally entered float.

Jubilee Parade Chairman C. P. Rockwell announced that 182 units have been entered.

The Gladiola Clowns will appear to entertain the children. Marching units will include the Civil Air Patrol Cadets with their queen, from San Angelo; the U. S. Navy Band from Corpus Christi Naval Air Station; the 62 member Drum and Bugle Corp from Lackland Air Base; Coleman High School Band; Brady Bulldog Band; and the U. S. Marine Color Guard.

Jubilee Race-track Jockeys will be there in their colorful silks, and Miss Betty Lamb, trick and fancy rider from Dallas, who will ride in the parade, will also perform between races at the race-track.

Grand Marshal for the 1957 Jubilee parade will be Admiral R. S. Clarke who will be followed by state, Jubilee, and City Officials. Climaxing the show will be 1957's July Jubilee Queen, Miss Dee Anna Smith of Lohn, who will be riding the beautiful Jubilee float, along with her little "Future Queen", Miss Gayle Watkins.

A new "Kiddle" section has been added this year, composed of children from 6 to 12, dressed as clowns, cowboys, Indians, etc. Another new feature will be the "Horseless Carriages", from the Abilene Horseless Carriage Club, which will enter carriages from 1906 to 1927 models, and from the Waco Club, which will enter 10 others.

### RACE MEET ON JULY 4th, 5th, 6th

Post time will be 2:00 p. m. for Brady's 1957 Race Meet on July 4th, 5th and 6th, at the big, cool Jubilee Grandstand. Purses of \$4200, plus 8 blankets will go to the winners of 7 big races each day. 170 of the most outstanding horses from Texas and Oklahoma have already been entered, with more arriving daily.

## Report Shows Increase In Local Bank's Assets

A report of the condition of the Santa Anna National Bank, as published elsewhere in this issue of The News, shows considerable improvement in the assets over the financial condition three months ago.

The assets increased \$159,316.88 as of June 6 over the report of March 14. The increase in deposits was \$162,485.91.

Loans and discounts on March 14 were \$540,644.75 and in the present report they are \$541,497.35. C. C. C. loans and Bonds and Warrants are about the same as three months ago with cash on hand and due from other banks increasing from \$460,315.96 to \$619,125.70.

Total assets of the bank are \$1,873,956.31.

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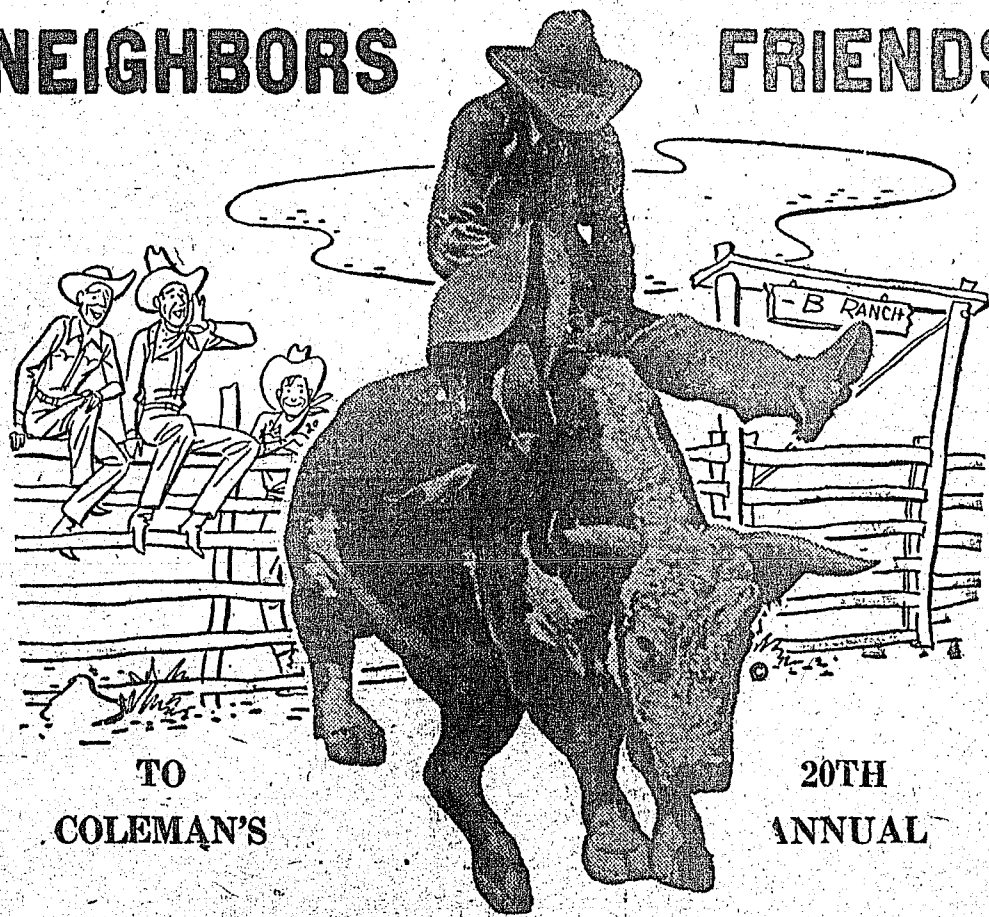

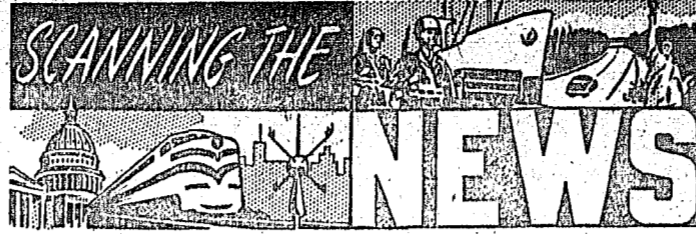

**SCANNING THE NEWS**

"Needed: a New Foreign Aid Policy."

This is the opinion of the Committee for Economic Development, a non-partisan, non-political, objective organization composed of 150 leading businessmen and educators of the nation. As a matter of fact it is the opinion of the CED Research and Policy Committee, and not necessarily agreed to by all the CED membership. The Research and Policy Committee is composed of 39 members, headed by Frazar B. Wilde, President Connecticut General Life Insurance Company, as chairman.

The sub-Committee on International Economic Policy, composed of 13 members headed by Howard C. Petersen, President Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Company declares that a fundamental re-assessment of the United States Foreign economic aid is urgently needed to shift our economic aid to the needs of more than a billion people living in grinding poverty in 75 countries of the world. These countries span most of Asia, the Middle East, Africa and Latin America.

Our foreign policy in the past has been aimed at the direct relief of distress in war-damaged areas; the rehabilitation of Europe under the Marshall Plan, and the military strengthening of our allies in Europe, the Middle East and Asia.

Of the 57 billion dollars of foreign aid in the 11 years since mid-1945 these under-developed nations have received only ap-

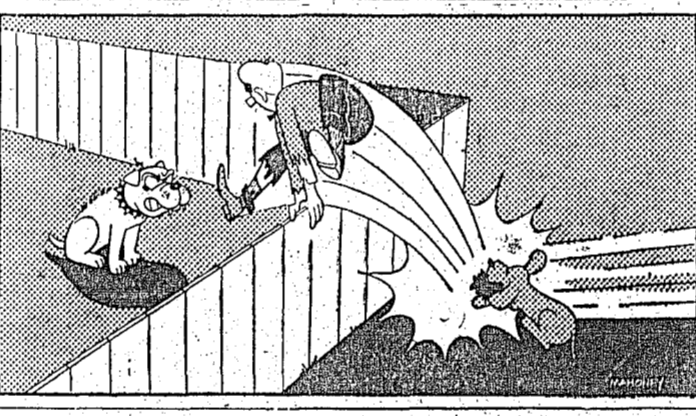
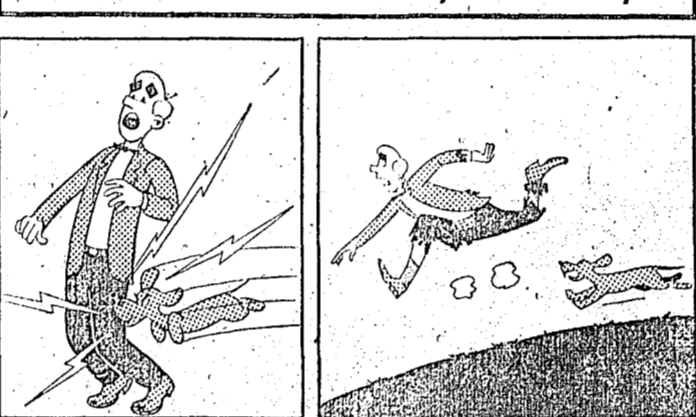
proximately \$3.8 billions. CED believes that our economic aid should be shifted to this under-developed world for their economic growth for three reasons:

1—It is vital to our national security that these nations should be stable, peaceful and independent—not necessarily allies, and certainly not "satellites", but independent. Deeply resented poverty and a frustrated desire to progress are not conditions in which stability, peace and independence can be expected to grow.

2—Economic growth in areas comprising half the globe and where over a billion people live could not fail to enrich world trade and investment opportunities—including our own.

3—As individuals and as a nation we have a traditional humanitarian concern with the well-being of people everywhere. CED would prefer to see private investment become the major instrument for development of these countries, however, "It is not realistic to expect that private capital can meet the needs of these countries until their development has proceeded beyond the present stage. Basic, but non-revenue producing facilities such as roads, harbors, irrigation—are not sufficiently attractive for private investors. Once these facilities are created, private investment can play an important and perhaps a major role in developing manufacturing, extractive industries, trade and similar productive enterprises."

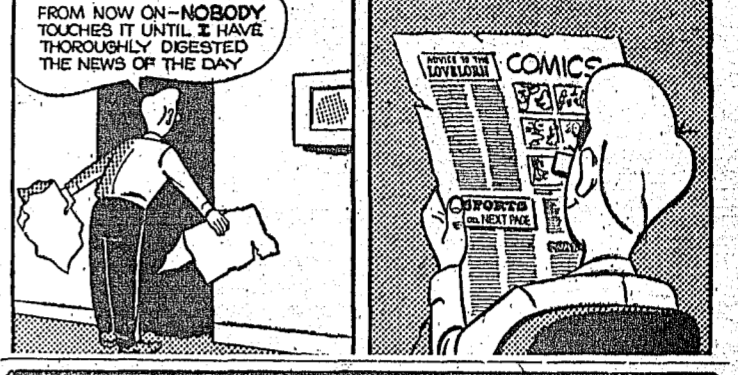
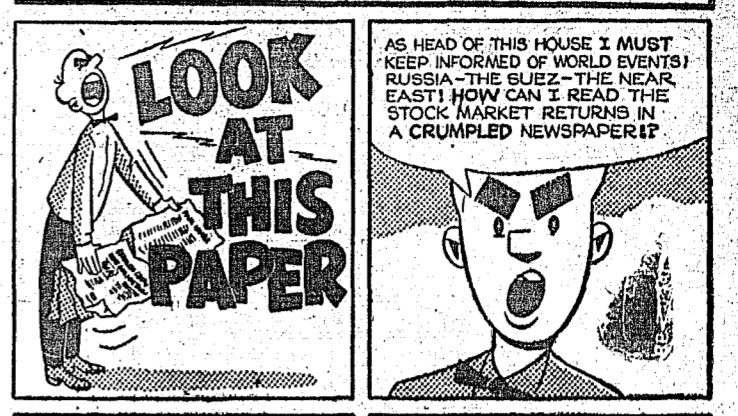

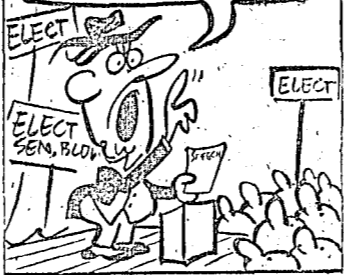
**CYCLONES**

 Broiled Canadian Bacon  
 5 pounds Canadian bacon  
 1 tablespoon whole cloves  
 2 tablespoons horseradish, mustard  
 Peach halves  
 Pineapple Spears  
 Remove casing from bacon, keeping the meat in one piece. Score meat, stud with cloves. Place under broiler for 30 minutes, turning to brown evenly. Brush evenly with mustard and continue broiling for 10 minutes longer. Serve garnished with peaches and pineapple. Bologna sausage may be used in place of the bacon.

In thin slices of boiled ham before broiling and serve in buns warmed over the charcoal fire with zippy barbecue sauce.

Let the folks fix their own salads by just setting out sliced tomatoes, cucumbers, onions, radishes and carrot strips on a large platter. A shaker of dressing gives them the opportunity to do their own "tossing."

If you're going to do some lengthy cooking on the grill, be certain to set it in a shady spot so the sun won't roast you while you cook.

Charcoal burns to fine lasting coals and gives a nice steady fire. For best results burn until the flame disappears (10-15 minutes) and coal is glowing before placing the meat on the grill.

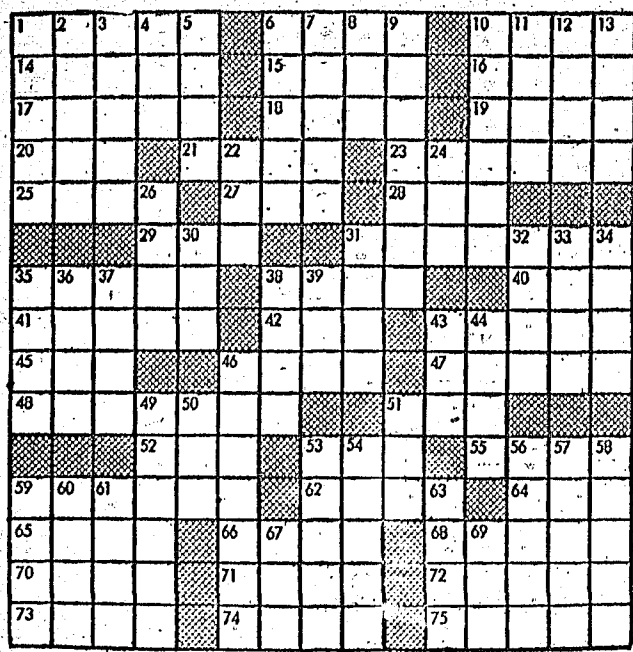

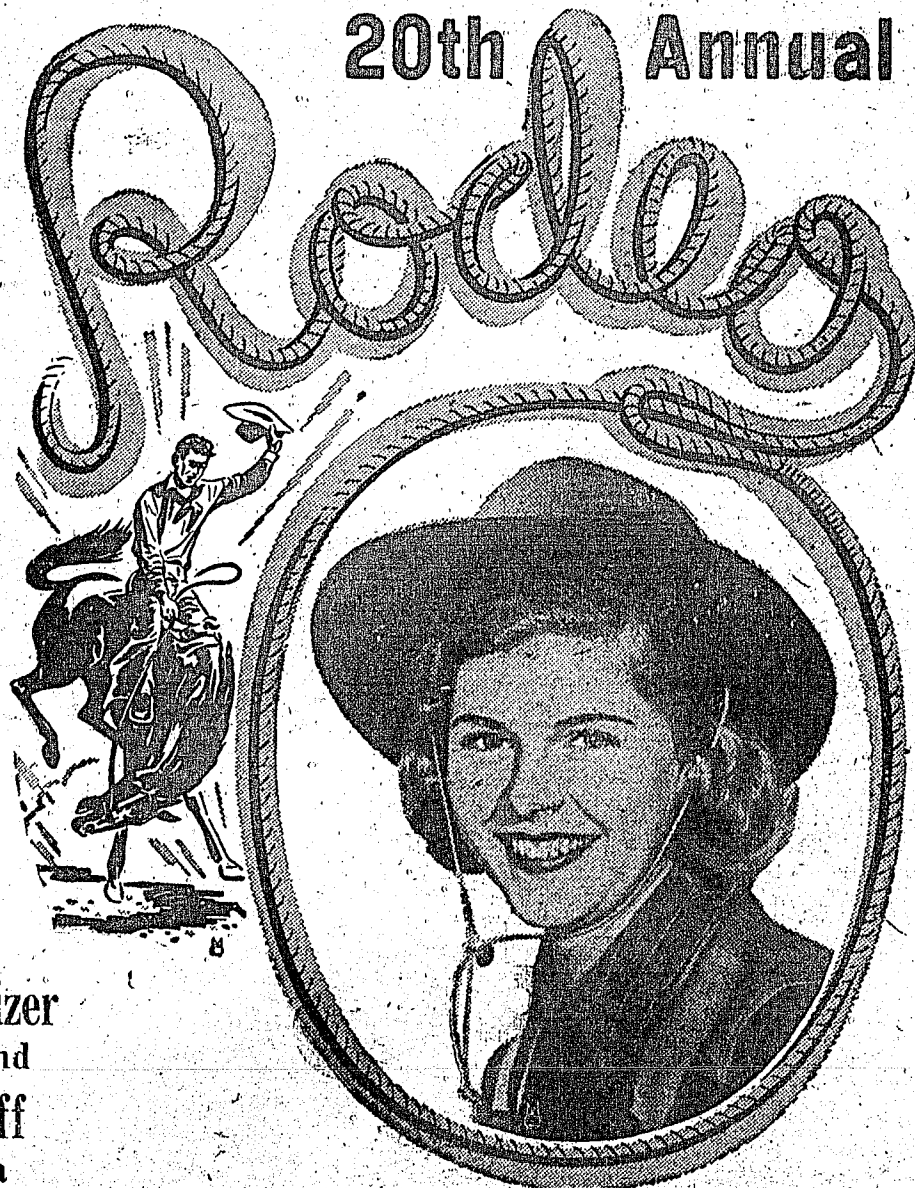

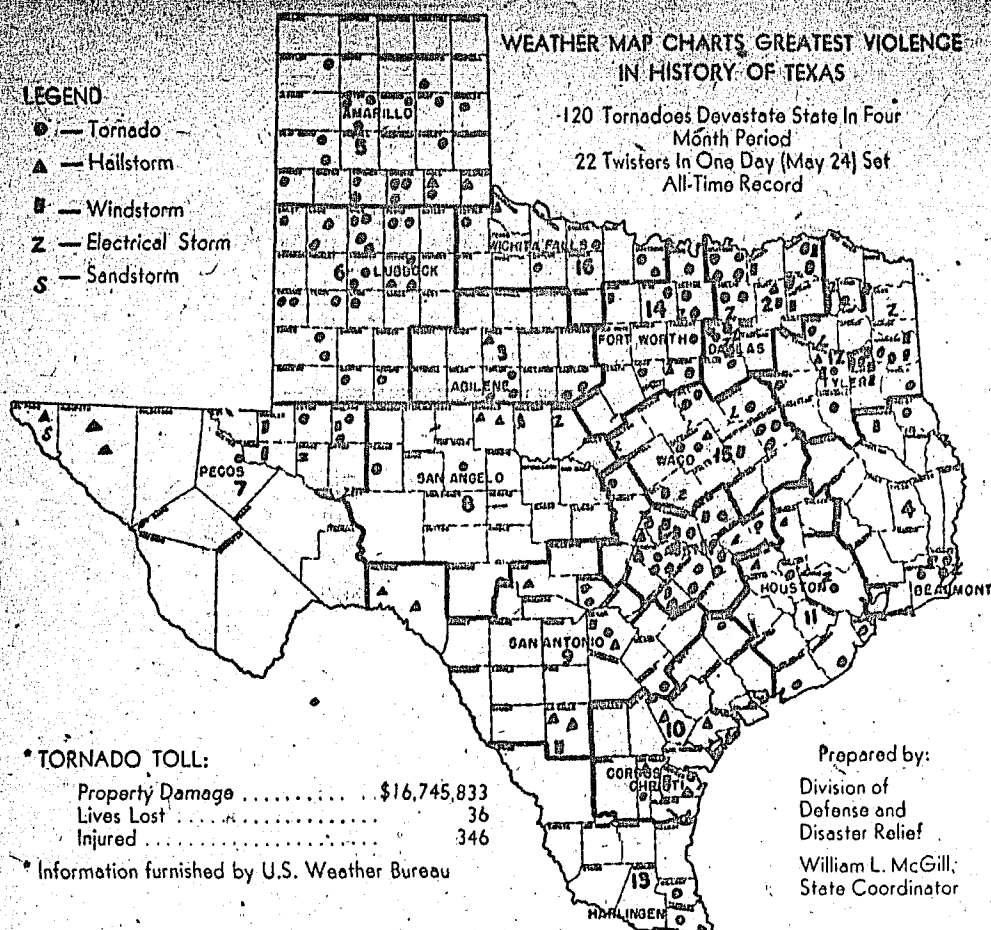

**AUSTIN** — Unprecedented floods, tornadoes and severe weather during the first five months of 1957 have taken a property toll in Texas estimated at \$91,106,224. These are the figures submitted in a report to Governor Price Daniel by State Defense and Disaster Relief headquarters this week.

Preliminary estimates place the flood damage at \$69,700,000. A new survey of crop damage now being conducted may raise this estimate.

The Weather Bureau estimates damage by tornadoes, hailstorms, the March blizzard and other severe weather from February 16 through May 31 at \$16,745,833. This does not include

floods and loss of livestock. State agencies' contribution to disaster operations is now placed at \$3,360,391.

In addition, the cost of Red Cross assistance in meeting eligible needs of individuals and families is now estimated at \$1,300,000.

A tornado, which struck near Harlingen February 16, touched off a chain of weather violence unequalled in the history of Texas. This was followed by the worst spring blizzard (March 19) ever to hit the Texas Panhandle. With thousands stranded, the death toll was held to a surprising seven. Then came the disastrous Dallas tornado of April 2 that claimed nine lives.

This was followed by the devastating Lampasas flood on May 12 that destroyed 90% of the business district, smashed 310 homes and killed five persons. Following close on the heels of this disaster, a roaring funnel descended out of black clouds just before midnight May 16 and destroyed Silverton, killing 19 people.

It was on May 24 that 22 tornadoes churned across Texas. Scores of other funnels were sighted but did not dip to the ground. Never before in the history of the Weather Bureau had there been such a day of violence, setting a new record which Texans will not point to with pride.



### IMPACT OF TEXAS' NEW EGG LAW

The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective in a few weeks, will have probably a more far-reaching impact on the citizens of Texas as a whole than any agricultural legislation of recent times.

Although regulations will extend only to certain areas of the egg industry itself, the effect of the law will be felt not only by producers and other industry men, but by consumers as well. And the effect felt will be a good one.

What the law actually does is to stop misrepresentation of inferior eggs as quality merchandise and to place emphasis on accurate product labelling of quality eggs and a better product for consumers.

This is accomplished through

a system of egg grading which requires all eggs offered for sale to consumers through retail outlets to be accurately labelled according to size, grade and condition of freshness.

**Small Producers Are Protected**

Heretofore, labelling of eggs as to grade and condition was a free and open affair with no recourse available even in the most flagrant violations. The new standards require that no egg below actual "A" quality be sold or advertised as fresh, selected, infertile, cage or any word of similar import.

Producers of eggs who sell only the production of their own flocks are exempt from provisions of the act unless they claim some kind of grade. If producers choose to claim a grade, their eggs must confirm completely

with provisions of the law.

The act becomes effective August 22. Deadline for obtaining licenses (by retailers, dealers, wholesalers and processors) is October 20. Actual enforcement of violations, which carry fines up to \$1,000, will start after February 17, 1958.

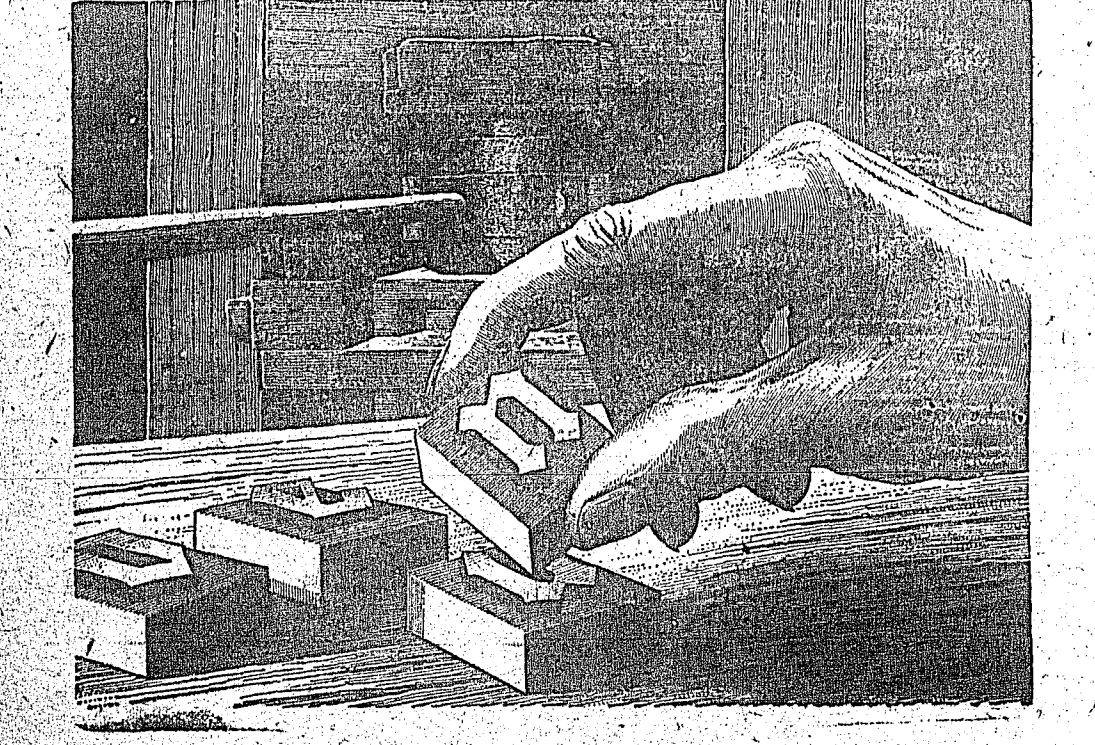

## SPARKS FOR MINDS

ALMOST five centuries ago, Gutenberg's invention of movable type started a revolution. It has been going on ever since.

For five times five centuries—and soon before—a few men were the privileged rulers—by accident of birth or of circumstance. The people were subjects, supporting those thus kept in authority.

However, movable type, by cutting the cost of printing, began the process of making knowledge more widely available. People's understanding then grew. ### Our WASHINGTON Letter

By Congressman C. C. FISHER

REQUESTS FOR MONEY to pay for 28 additional Mexican bracero program compliance officers, costing \$205,000 per year, was deleted from the Labor Department appropriation bill recently. When the bill went to the Senate, Congressman E. C. Gathings of Arkansas and I testified before the Senate committee handling the bill for the Senate in opposition to the increase in funds for that purpose.

The measure has now been sent to the White House at the \$205,000. It means that 28 fewer snoopers will be assigned to see if braceros are housed according to fantastic regulations that were issued last January.

SPEAKING OF the bracero program, in my testimony I pointed out that the border area is seething with all sorts of enforcement officers, including 1,106 border patrolmen. This includes 622 assigned to Texas alone.

Much of this is completely unnecessary. The setback problem is now of minor significance. I have urged the Commissioner of Immigration to drastically reduce this.

## Control Of Roaches Is Vital To Health

Second in a series of articles on bug control prepared by the Home Insect Control Bureau for the Real-Kill Co.

Ever lick an old stamp and find the glue gone? Chances are some cockroach was there ahead of you, getting his daily requirement of protein.

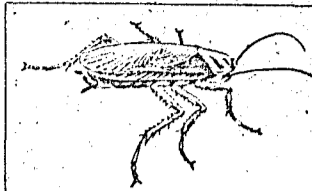
The unsightly cockroach, the most common household pest, constitutes a serious menace to our health. Much of the nation's food poisoning can probably be traced directly to this ugly disease carrier.

The cockroach has only one effective natural enemy, cold weather. Man, by providing food and shelter for himself, created a haven for the cockroach, too. And, very probably, the cockroach moved in first! Thus it evolves into a pitched battle between man and the cockroach. You either get the roach, or he gets you.

**Requires Balanced Diet**  
Cockroaches feed on anything, but require a balanced diet the same as human beings. Glue and other adhesives have great attraction for them, as do bread, eggs, dog food and soiled clothing.

The life span of the adult cockroach is from six months to two years. One pair of German cockroaches, if all its young lived and reproduced normally, could multiply into an army of 600,000 in one year.

There are four species of cockroaches, and all four could be found in the same house. The American and Oriental roaches are found in basements

and other damp, dark places; the German roach is found in kitchens and bathrooms, and the Brown-Banded roach abounds in the family living area; bedrooms, living room, etc. The latter probably got the glue on your stamp.

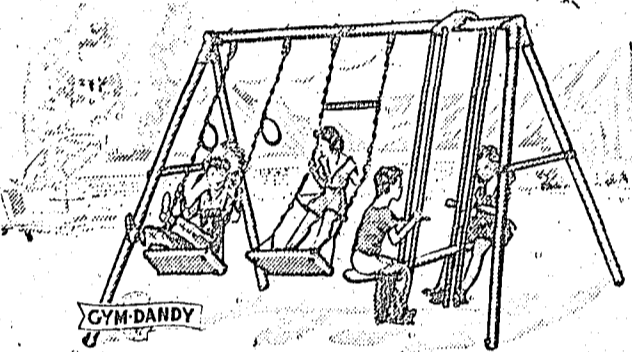
**How To Control Roaches**  
Spray all cracks and crevices with a stainless, long-lasting surface insecticide containing a powerful bug killer such as Dieldrin, the newest and most effective agent. One-half percent solution of Dieldrin is considerably more effective and safer than five percent DDT. Spray every surface until wet, to afford longer protection. Spray cracks and crevices in the kitchen, bath and other rooms. Spray baseboards, under stoves and refrigerators, along shelf edges and drawer slides. In the basement or utility, room spray above furnaces, hot water heaters and around floor drains. Outside, spray the foundation walls above the ground.

The best insect control is, as always, preventive control. Spray before a roach is seen. As a precautionary measure, spray at least three times a year. **NEXT: THE ANT**

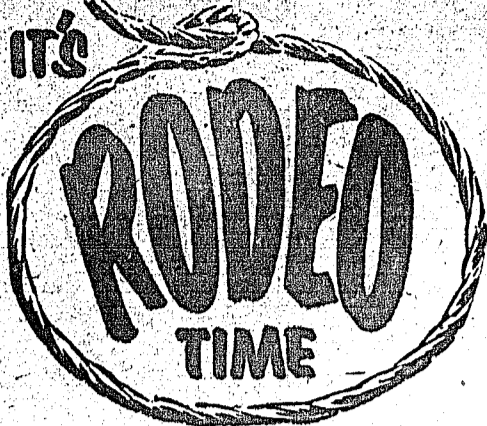

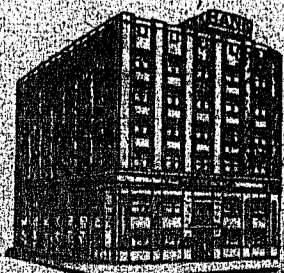

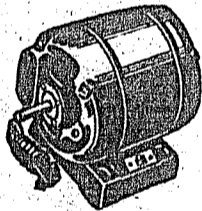
