Ten persons are expected to die on the Texas highways on Thursday, July 4th. If the first days of this week are any indication, it appears that this number may be far short of the

number who will die.

However, all the members of the Texas Highway Patrol, plus 120 extra units will be patrolling. the highways during the 24 hour period and every effort will be made to take dangerous drivers off the highway before accidents

The best thing to do? Stay at home if you can, but if you must travel, leave in plenty of time to get where you are going by driving at a moderate rate of speed, drive carefully and do not indulge in intoxicating beverages.

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

2 tablespoons horseradish mustard

Peach halves Pineapple Spears

Remove casing from bacon, keeping the meat in one piece. Score meat, stud with cloves. Place under broiler for 30 minutes, turning to brown evenly. Brush evenly with mustard and continue broiling for 10 minutes longer. Serve garnished with peaches and pineapple. Bologna sausage may be used in place of the bacon.





SPARKS FOR MINDS

ALMOST five centuries ago, Gutenberg's invention of movable type started a revolution. It has been going on ever since.

For five times five centuries - and cons before - a few men were the privileged rulets-by accident of birth or of circumstance. The people were subjects, supporting those thus kept in authority.

However, movable type, by cutting the cost of printing, began the process of making knowledge more widely available. People's understanding then grew. Sparks of hope were awakened in the minds of men. . When it became apparent to entrenched authority that permitting wide dissemination of information and ideas might in time destroy their sinecures, censorship was exercised.

In a search for greater freedom, men of many

races and creeds crossed the ocean to establish homes on this continent. They and their children founded here a nation dedicated to a new principle: government by the people, and for the people. And knowing that liberty could be overthrown only by subdu-ing freedom of speech and the press, they provided further that this bails freedom should never be

abridged. That system of government created an opportunity for all men to advance, limited only by their efforts. In but a few generations it won for this people a higher standard of living and of human welfare han had ever before been dreamed possible.

America's freedom of the press has proved to the orld that the patriotic instinct of an informed plain people can be relied on to govern wisely and well.

Col Garrison pointed out that examiners are thoroughly trained in all phases of traffic laws, highway law, driver license law and other subjects pertaining to the job before being assigned their stations.

He said applications mailed to Austin should be addressed to A. F. Temple, chief of the Driver License Division.

Applicants applying for the position of DL Examiner must be between the ages of 21 and 35, be a graduate of high school, physically fit and of good character and weigh not less than two pounds or more than three pounds per inch of height.

For benefits and advantages of the law enforcement position Col. Garrison suggested that persons interested either write to the division in Austin or contact a DL Examiner locally.
