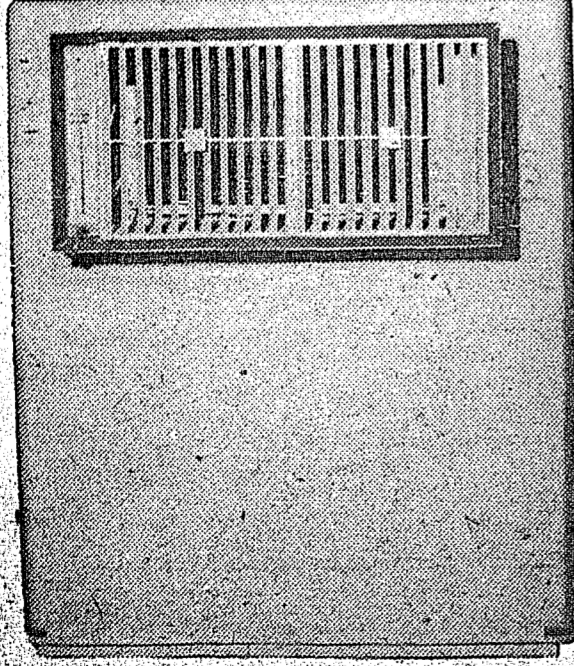

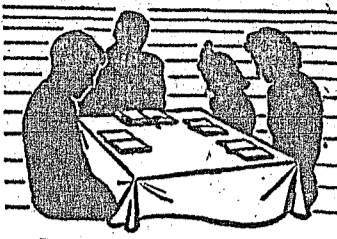
After a trip to Florida, the couple will reside at 5532 Pershing in Fort Worth. The bride wore away a pink silk frock with silver gray accessories.

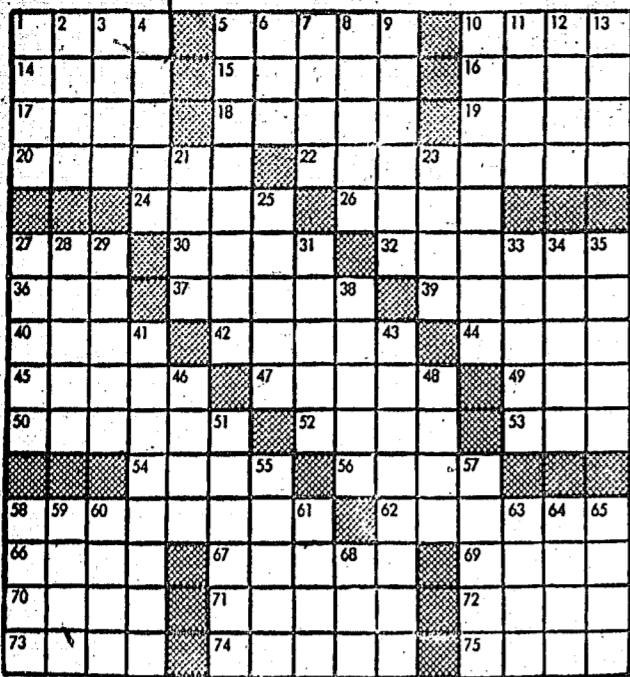

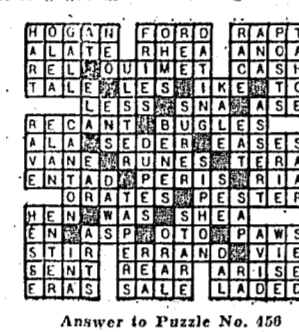


CROSSWORD PUZZLE

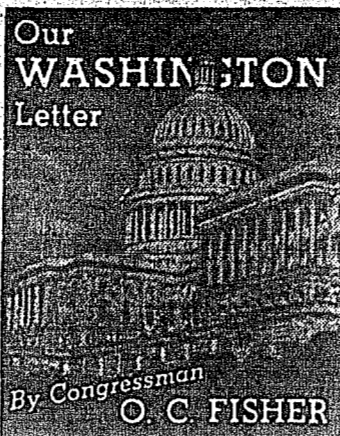

WEED KILLING OPERATIONS THREATEN CROPS
Hormone-type herbicides such as 2, 4-D and 3, 4, 5-T are among the most effective weed and brush killers available - but their very effectiveness calls for extreme cautiousness.

Damage to cotton by herbicides has increased alarmingly in unregulated areas of Texas this season. As many as 9,000 acres in four West Texas counties suffered slight to severe effects from herbicides sprayed in adjacent areas during periods when wind drift was excessive.

In contrast, not a single report of damage has been received from counties where the Texas Department of Agriculture regulates the sale and use of herbicides.

Some 125 counties are regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law. Permits must be obtained for applying herbicide chemicals in these counties and a Department of Agriculture inspector must supervise spraying operations.

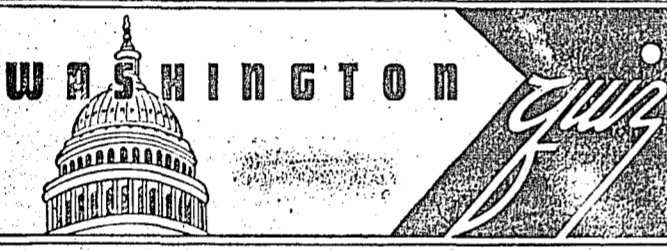
