## Traffic Laws and YOU



### SPEED LIMITS

A motor vehicle is required to be driven at a speed that is reasonable and prudent under the conditions then existing. Any speed over the posted limit is presumed not to be reasonable and prudent. Charges can be filed for speeds under the posted limits if the speeds are not reasonable and prudent for existing conditions which may be created by weather, traffic or hazards alongside the roadway.

The normal speed limits are: Outside Business for Residential Districts, automobiles or light commercial vehicles designed for a load of 1,500 pounds or less, 60 mph in daytime, 55 mph at night. Other commercial vehicles, including all trailers, 45 mph day or night. Buses, 55 mph day or night. NOTE: Lower limits may be posted.

Business or Residential Districts, all vehicles 30 mph day or night (unless another limit is posted).

### RACING

Racing of vehicles on any highway is illegal.

### SLOW MOVING VEHICLES

It is illegal willfully to drive a vehicle so slowly as to obstruct or impede the normal, reasonable and safe movement of traffic.

### SIGNALS

A driver is required to signal his intention to turn from a direct course in the roadway, or to change lanes, or to turn right or left at an intersection or to stop or slow down when any traffic will be affected by his movement. The signals may be given by hand and arm or by approved signal lamp or signal device (stop light or directional signals). Signals shall be given continuously for at least the last 100 feet before turning, slowing or stopping. When hand and arm signals are used, they shall be given in the following manner:

Left turn — hand and arm extended horizontally; right turn — hand and arm extended upward; Stop or slow — hand and arm extended downward.

Giving a signal does not relieve a driver from complying with right-of-way laws.

The horn must be used when it will help to insure the safe operation of a motor vehicle, but shall not otherwise be used when on a highway. The horn must be used where the view is obstructed within a distance of 200 feet, as on curves or winding mountain highways.

Sirens, whistles or bells are prohibited on all vehicles except authorized emergency vehicles.

Flashing lights (except directional signals) are prohibited on all vehicles except authorized emergency vehicles and school buses, which may use them only when bus is being stopped or is stopped for children to board or alight.

Red lights to the front are prohibited except on authorized emergency vehicles.

## Important Elections To Be Held Here Saturday

### Some Changes To Be Made In Auto Inspection Law

L. A. Welch, operator of the only Official Motor Vehicle Inspection Station in Santa Anna, said early this week that several changes would be made this fall in the inspection procedure of vehicles that travel the highways.

The new inspection period will begin September 1 and continue through April 15, 1958. Some of the changes will include pulling one wheel (the inspector's choice) and checking brake linings and drums, brake fluid in the master cylinder, and making a much better examination of the vehicle in general. Welch said it would take considerably longer to make the inspection this year than in the past, because there will be so much more to do.

If rivet brake linings are 60% gone (worn to head of the rivet), the lining must be replaced. On bonded shoes, if the lining is 75% gone, it must be replaced.

Welch said it would be worth the time if every vehicle owner would go by an inspection station and see just what has to be done in order to get the safety inspection sticker on your windshield. He said less than 10% of the people actually know what and why they must get the inspection.

## Fire Department To Work On Football Stadium

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department voted Monday night to dispense with their regular third Monday night meeting this month, to meet at the football field Monday night, August 12, and do everything possible to get the new bleachers completed. About 20 to 22 of the 25 members are expected to be there.

Fire Chief Ben Vinson said most of the firemen are members of the Quarterback Club and they will do all they can to help the organization get the seats completed by the time school begins.

There is still lots of work to be done, and the more people that will help, the sooner the job will be completed. Vinson said they would like to have help from everyone who can be there Monday night.

Every qualified voter in the Santa Anna School District is urged to express your opinion by voting. Qualified voters are residents of the district who are qualified property taxpayers in the school district and who have duly rendered same for taxation. The district includes the Rockwood District recently annexed with the Santa Anna District.

The proposition in the Bond Assumption election is: Shall the Santa Anna Independent School District assume and pay off the \$244,347.36 bonded indebtedness of the district, the bonds which were issued prior to the creation of the present district, and shall the Board of Trustees of said district have the power to levy and collect annually a tax sufficient to pay the interest thereon as it accrues and to create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal as the same becomes due.

The proposition to be considered in the Tax Election is: Shall the Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District have the power to levy and collect an ad valorem tax on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property in said district, for the

## Fall Grid Workouts For 734 Schoolboy Teams Open Aug 26

AUSTIN — Fall workouts for 734 of Texas' 909 high school football teams in the Texas Interscholastic League open Monday, August 26.

The total of 909 schools shows a gain of seven since last year and TIL athletic director Rhea Williams said it is more complete than in any other state in the nation.

August 26 is the first legal day for teams in Classes AA, A, B and six-man to open workouts. The 175 teams in AAAA and AAA which are permitted spring training, are not allowed to start until Friday, August 30.

Class B is the only division with less teams than last year. It has lost three teams and now has 226. There are 87 in AAAA, a gain of one; AAA has 888, also up one; AA has 165, a gain of one; A has 191, an increase of four; and six-man has 153, up three teams.

## Tooth Decay Is A Major Problem Of Nation's Health

AUSTIN — One of our most important public health enemies in America today is tooth decay, a virtually incurable chronic disease which must be prevented if it is to be conquered at all. The ailment is so widespread that it involves 95 of every 100 persons and is still increasing.

It is estimated that there are now one billion cavities in the mouths of Americans, mostly children of elementary school age. And for every cavity a dentist fills, six are left unfilled because of failure to visit a dentist. Dental authorities say the situation is now so acute that at its present rate of increase,

within 10 years, decay will have turned us into a nation of dental cripples.

Children develop cavities at about the same ratio as do adults — approximately one per child per year. But whereas one-third of the adult need for fillings is being met, only one-fifth of the cavities in children's teeth are being repaired.

Perhaps the reason is that so many parents still cling to the totally false notion that so-called "baby" teeth are unimportant because they are temporary. The frequent result is that good dental health for children is still a relatively scarce commodity.

There is one positive step all parents can take to avoid a fate of toothlessness among their children. It's a simple step, requiring only that the youngsters be taken to a dentist for tooth and gum inspection before being enrolled in school each fall.

The dentist will follow a careful routine in making the inspection. He will painlessly probe all tooth surfaces, looking for signs of impending trouble. Using an ingeniously simple little mirror, he can check even the most difficult-to-get-to corners, removing accumulations of "tartar," the name given to incrustated salivary mucous and food residue.

If spots of decay are found, he will remove it and fill the cavity with a material called "amalgam," a combination of mercury and bits of silver. Or per-

haps he will choose a porcelain cement, also in use as a filling material.

Before the visit is concluded the dentist will have tutored the youngster in good dental hygiene at home — such things as when and how to brush his teeth and how to make an excellent dentifrice from baking soda or table salt.

When enough children have received such instruction, and are encouraged by parents to follow them, we will be well on the way toward avoiding the fate predicted for us: that within a decade we will be a nation of dental cripples.

### PROVISIONS OF RECENT EGG LAW EXPLAINED

College Station — The Egg Law, just recently passed by the Texas Legislature, will have a widespread impact on Texas citizens. It will affect egg producers, dealers, retailers, wholesalers, brokers and processors as well as consumers.

But just what does this law do? How will it affect those people just listed? F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, lists a few of the law's highlights.

(1) It provides for the establishment of standards of size and quality of eggs. The standard of quality as determined by candling and conditions of shell, the grades and standards of size as determined by weighing shall be the same as the standards and grades prescribed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for shell eggs.

(2) The law provides for proper grading and labeling. The eggs are inspected primarily at retail outlets and labeled according to grade, which includes size and quality. Unless the grading is under USDA supervision, it shall be unlawful to use the prefix "U. S." on grades and weight classes.

(3) Provides for licensing of egg retailers, dealers, wholesalers, processors and brokers. There is no licensing fee to any retailer as defined by law—that is, any person selling or offering for sale, eggs to consumers only in this state. All retailers must have a license even though there is no fee.

(4) Provides that the law will be self financing through the fees collected.

(5) Provides penalties for violations. Any person convicted of violating this act is subject to a fine. The license of a violator may be suspended for a period not to exceed 90 days.

(6) Gives exemption to producers selling eggs from their flocks unless a grade is claimed. But if they wish to claim a grade, then their eggs must meet

the standards specified by the law.

(7) It establishes an Egg Marketing Advisory board to be appointed by the governor. This board will be composed of the Commissioner of Agriculture, who will be chairman, and nine other members, all from Texas, who will serve six year terms.

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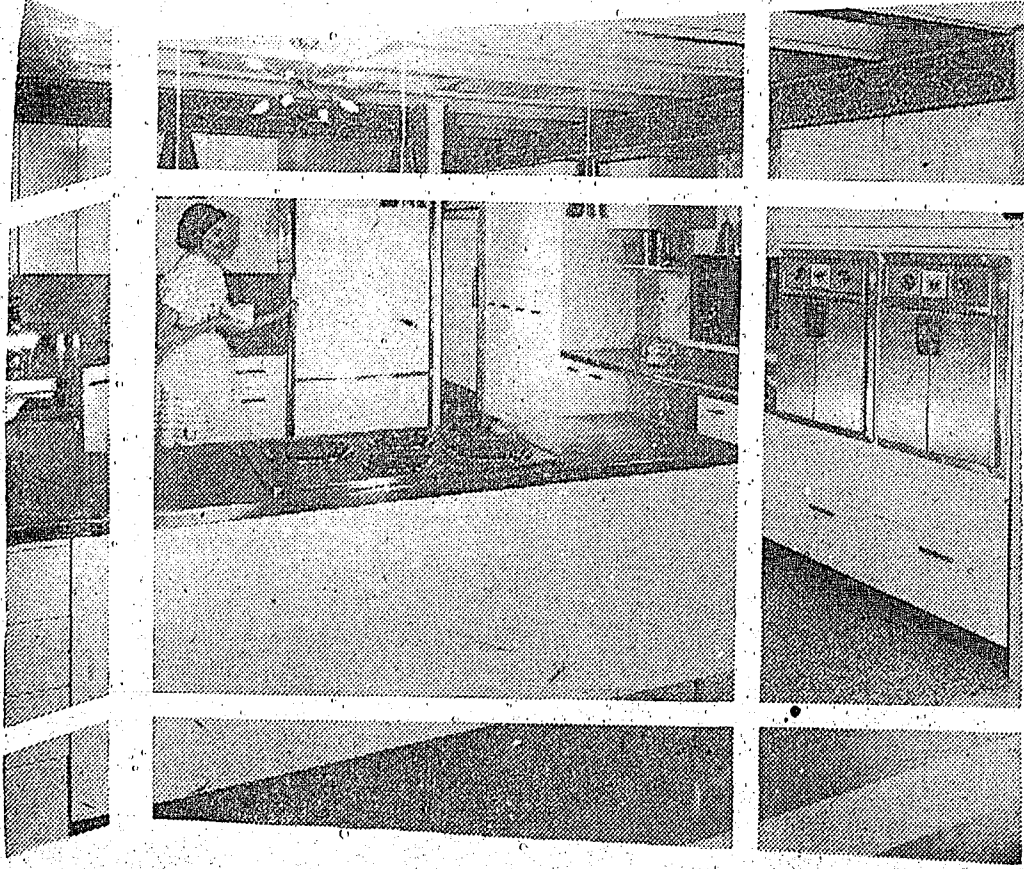

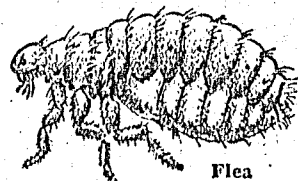

Spray Pets' Bedding  
To Kill Fleas, Ticks

Seventh in a series on bug control prepared by the Home Insect Control Bureau for the Real-Kill Co.



The most elusive of all insects is the tiny flea. Because of his ability to evade the fingers of man and the teeth of animals, this agile menace leads a relatively unrestricted life in carrying such dread diseases as bubonic plague and typhus.

A flea, no bigger than the head of a pin, can leap 13 inches horizontally and seven inches high. An equivalent leap for a man would carry him 275 feet in the air and 450 feet horizontally.

Adult fleas, the ones which do the biting, can be found any place in the home. The young reside in the nests of rodents, in the bedding of pets or in any crevice where organic debris can be found.

A flea bite can be extremely painful, and can cause allergic reactions.

How To Control Fleas

Spray the bedding of pets with a residual spray containing an effective killing agent such as Dieldrin. This will continue to kill the fleas for many weeks. Allow the area to dry thoroughly before reuse by pets. Spray all areas, including furniture, frequented by pets.

Spray all cracks and crevices around the pets' sleeping area. Seek the advice of a veterinarian on ridding pets of fleas.

Ticks Are Serious Problem  
Ticks are parasites. They attach themselves to human beings, animals, birds and reptiles. They remain on the host several days while feeding. Certain ticks, feeding on the neck or near the base of the skull of their host, inject a



venom that produces paralysis. This paralysis can be fatal. The most important tick-borne diseases are Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Relapsing Fever, Texas Cattle Fever and tularemia.

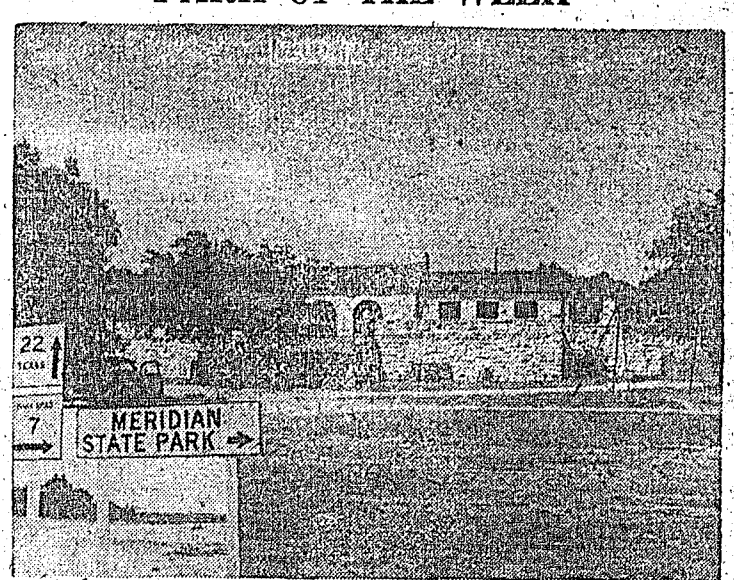
Ticks are often found in buildings and sheds, under porches, and within the home on baseboards and wood trim.

How To Control Ticks

For home control, spray thoroughly into all cracks and crevices in areas where pets frequent. Spray the bedding of pets, allowing it to dry thoroughly before reuse. Spray all baseboards and wood trim. Use a residual insecticide containing a powerful chemical such as Dieldrin.

PARK OF THE WEEK



MERIDIAN STATE PARK returned to favor this year as one of Texas' popular fishing resorts. Water began flowing over the spillway of its dam on May 2, 1957 for the first time since May of 1951. MERIDIAN STATE PARK on State Highway 22 returned this year to its high popularity among Texas fishermen. Restrictions that had been in force during the drought period were lifted and fishing is again permitted on all days of the week. Water level of the park lake had dropped 21 feet through the years of dry weather.

During April and May of this year the lake level rose rapidly and early in May water was again running over the dam spillway for the first time since September of 1951.

During the low water stage the opportunity to remove choking vegetation was utilized and a clear 80-acre lake was restored. Rough fish were taken out and the lake restocked. Fishing was limited to specified days keeping the fish population at a recommended density for the quantity of water. In the same period of low water the swimming beach was improved.

Because of its reputation for good fishing, other attractive features of Meridian State Park as a recreation area in Bosque County are overlooked by many people.

While the lake is the central theme of the park, it offers much more. There are 5.3 miles of scenic roads in the park, mostly hard surfaced. The roads lead to well placed picnicking areas and there is plenty of room for hiking, nature study and riding.

The central concessions building, overlooking the lake, is constructed of native limestone. It provides rest rooms, dressing rooms for swimmers, a dance pavilion and an indoor gathering place for park visitors.

Cabins and fishing barracks supply limited overnight facilities. Meridian State Park was started by Bosque County residents in 1933 by the purchase of 465 acres of land for donation to the State. The dam and other park improvements were installed between 1933 and 1935 by Civilian Conservation Corps and Public Works Administration units. A local sportsman's organization has continued interest in the park and helped supply facilities.

The park entrance is on State Highway 22, three miles southwest of Meridian.

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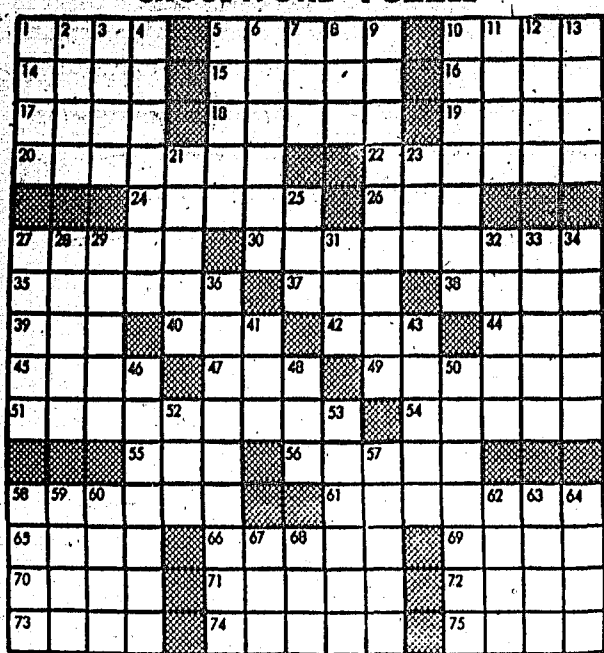

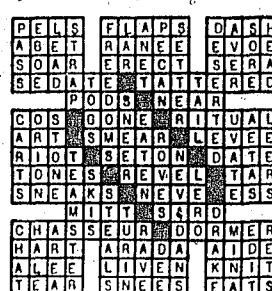

WHAT was bound to happen, has happened. The American people have become fed-up on "witch hunts" and "fishing expeditions" and "punitive probes" by congressional committees.

Go back only a few years ago when a ruthlessly powerful Senator had the country almost in a state of hysteria over "Communism" rampant in the ranks of government agencies, within the higher echelons of the Army they had gone "soft" on Communism and a new word was coined... McCarthyism.

The Supreme Court has struck down many of the practices which made McCarthyism possible; which made, only a few weeks ago, it possible for members of the McClelland Committee to brand men as thieves while on the witness stand... men who may be thieves, but who had never been tried or convicted in a court of law... guilt from hearsay... guilty from secret testimony... guilt from witnesses unknown to the defendant.

And so the United States Supreme Court ruled that while Congress has broad powers of investigation, its powers are not unlimited... witnesses have a right to know certain things; for what purpose they are being questioned—and the Committee inquiry should be clearly and specifically laid down by Congress itself.

The Court held the essential job of Congressional investigations is to aid in the preparation of legislation. It is not the job of these Committees to punish people, nor to expose for the sake of exposure. The job of punish-

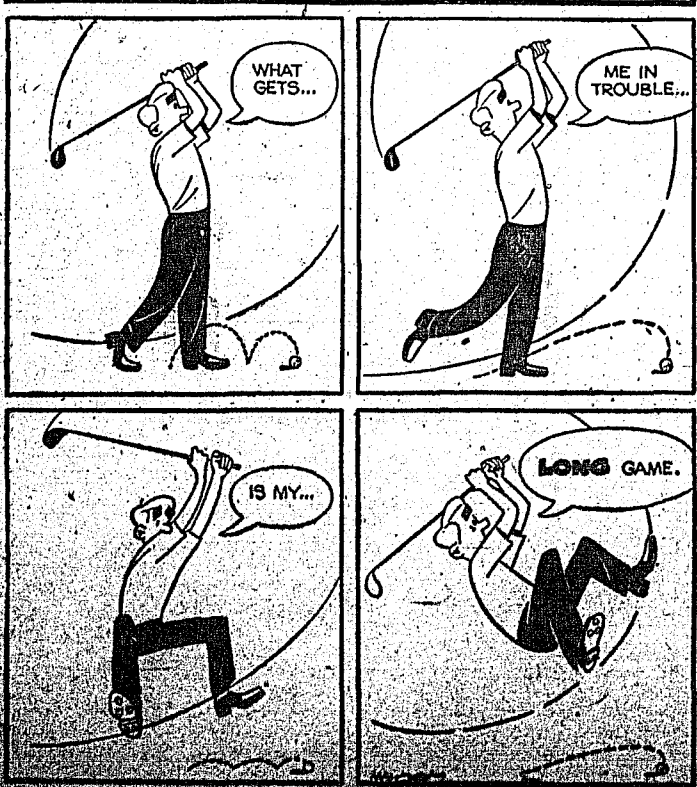
ment is reserved for the Judiciary branch of the Government, not the Legislative branch.

The Court said that defendants cannot be convicted on the basis of secret testimony; that if the Government wants to use material from files of the FBI, the defendant has a right to see it, so as to be able to answer the charges properly... that the FBI files cannot be opened indiscriminately, but they are by no means sacred.

The court held that evil doers and even Communists who are citizens of this country have the right to protection of the Bill of Rights and that subversion investigations must also adhere to the Constitution; that States must respect these factors as well as the Federal Government.

It has been only a few short years ago when it was the Liberal elements in the country who were abusing the "conservative" court as they knocked down one "New Deal" law after another (much to the delight of the powerful reactionary groups) and brought the charge that Franklin D. Roosevelt sought to "pack" the Court. Today the shoe seems to be on the other foot, with the reactionaries preaching the Court is "power wild." There were speeches then calling for legislation to clip the wings of the Court, just as there is today a scramble for legislation which would control the power of the court. However the Court's power is set out in the Constitution and it is not quite clear just how these powers can be clipped with Congressional legislation, which the Court must pass upon.

THAT CIVIL RIGHTS BILL has not passed, the issue remains unsettled. That is true despite the apparent break in the Senate filibuster after the approval of a modified right of jury trial for those who may be accused in the courts of violating the terms of the bill. As it passed the House, the traditional Anglo-Saxon civil right of jury trial was expressly prohibited.

As it looks now, the Senate will probably pass the watered-down bill and send it back to the House. There, if an attempt is made to approve the Senate amendments, a single objection can send it to the Rules Committee. Then the wrangle will begin. The Rules Committee is about through for this session and it won't be easy to get them together before the recess.

Even if the Rules Committee should meet and act, the Civil Rights extremists in the House may refuse to concur in the right of trial by jury. They have promised the Negroes back home they will not stand for such a right for alleged violators, and since it is all politics anyhow they may choose to keep the issue alive by refusing to concur in the Senate amendments.

IT LOOKS LIKE the Republicans stand to gain the most from this Civil Rights fiasco this year. That is, since it is all designed anyhow as a sop for the gullible Negro vote, the Republicans will claim they would have achieved victory except for the Southern Democrats, responsible for the watered-down version and the road-block against final passage.

On the other hand, some dopsters foresee the Republicans in the House accepting the Senate amendments, maybe hereby tilting the issue in favor of House approval. If so, the Republicans could still claim credit for everything the extremists want and could blame the Democrats for everything in the bill the extremists don't want.

And so it goes, a plague on both houses. Right now the chances of any Civil Rights bill being passed is about 50-50.

### Widow's Income Does Not Affect Death Compensation

A widow's income does not affect her eligibility for death compensation payments if her veteran husband died of a service-connected condition, Dr. George T. McMahan, manager of the Veterans Administration Center in Waco, said today.

Some misunderstanding may exist on this point, Dr. McMahan explained.

"Death compensation," he added, "may be paid the widow of a veteran whose death was the result of his service. Her other income has no bearing on its payment."

"However, income limitations do apply to VA death pension, which may be paid the widow of a wartime veteran who died of a nonservice-connected condition," Dr. McMahan said.

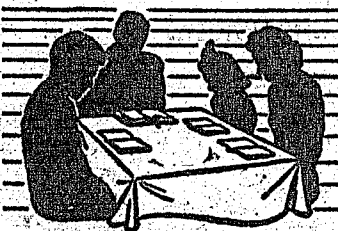

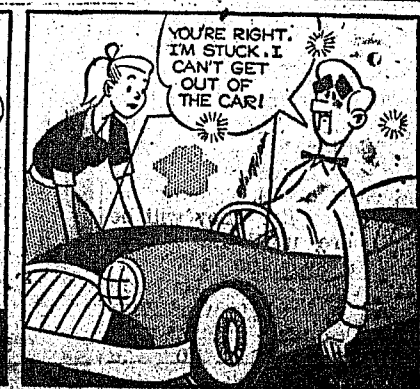
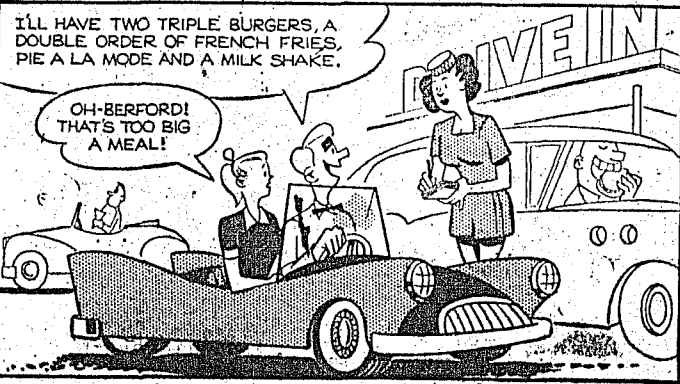
