

OVERNMENT spending is keeping the old mare going.

At the turn of the year inventories were at a new high record . . business had added to inventory in late 1956 at a rate of \$4 billions a year. In recent months there has been a scramble to unload these high inventories now at about a million-dollar-a-year clip. This same situation obtained last in 1953 and early in 1954 and brought on the 1953-54 recession. What is different in the picture today? Government spending makes the difference.

In 1953 and 1954 the Eisenhower administration was reducing expenditures. For instance between mid-1953 and early 1955 Government spending had dropped \$9.7 billions . . . from \$74.3 billions to to \$64.6 billions.

But spending at the end of fiscal year 1957 was \$69.8 billion, up \$3.3 in one year since fiscal 1956. Taxing was \$70.7 billions, up \$2.5 billion in one year. That's what the bookkeeping budget shows. Actually cash spending from accumulated funds in fiscal 1957 was \$79.2 billions, up \$7.2 billions in one year and cash taken in was \$81.9 billions, up \$4.8 billions in one year. And it may be that this is a factor which some economists count on to increase buying later on this year. A lot of people may get out of debt, and able to plunge back in by buying more goods and wares.

Texas farmers are reminded, however, that only one refund claim per farm operator will be permitted. Each claimant is cautioned to make certain that his refund request includes all eligible fuel used.

Form 2240, for filing the 1957 tax refund claim, has been mailed to each farm and ranch operator who applied for the tax refund in 1956.

Farmers who desire to claim their refunds and have not received Form 2240 can probably obtain them from their county agent or from the nearest Inter-

nal Revenue office.

The procedure for filing is simple, but just to make it easier, a bulletin has been published explaining the methods. Publication 308, "Farmer's Gas Tax Refund," is available for those

who request it. The pamplet also explains how the new federal excise law re-lieves farmers from federal excise taxes on diesel and special

motor fuels.

# THE SOUTHERN DIET

Nutritionally speaking, Texans and other southerns are eating better these days than


they were twenty years ago.
Comparing the hang-over depression days of the thirties with present-day living conditions, people will not find this inform-ation too surprising. Still, foods need not be expensive to be nutritious, and the trend of southern families toward better-bal-anced diets as evidenced by a recent survey is most encouraging.

To illustrate, a study by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1936 showed about 49 percent. of southern diets to be "poor" Judging from the same standards used in that study, a sim-llar survey conducted in 1955 indicates only about 20 percent of southern family diets to be nut-

ritionally deficient now. This is not to say, however, that 20 percent of southern families are actually undernourished since the levels of nutrients recommended provide for a safety margin over average needs.

The most common fault among diets studied was a shortage of vitamin C, calcium, vitamin A, and riboflavin, in that order. About 80 percent of southern families were getting twothirds of the vitamin C recom-




