

## Rites For E. H. Wylie Held Tuesday At 3:00

Funeral services were held on Tuesday, September 10, at 3:00 p. m. in the First Christian Church for Ernest Holmes Wylie a former long-time pastor.

He died in the Santa Anna Hospital at 1:55 a. m. Monday, September 9, after being a patient there and seriously ill for about three weeks.

Rev. Jimmy Henderson, pastor, and Rev. Bert M. Gillis, pastor of the Methodist Church at Bangs, officiated.

Bro. Wylie, as he was familiarly known, was born at Pilot Point, Texas June 16, 1876, being 81 years, 7 months and 23 days old at time of death. He was married to Miss Willie White at Whitesboro June 7, 1899.

They observed their golden wedding anniversary at their home here in 1949. In May, before their marriage, he was ordained into the ministry of Christian Churches, and remained true to the end, to the pledges and promises he made.

He and his family moved to Santa Anna in July, 1927, as pastor of the local Christian Church. He pastored the church for several years. While not acting as pastor of the church, he was still active in the work of the church. Later he again became pastor for a longer period, which ceased as his health began to fail.

For a number of years he was Chaplain of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department. In his younger days he was affiliated with fraternal orders.

He is survived by the wife of Santa Anna; one son, Norval Wylie of Santa Anna; three daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Simpson of Mathis, Mrs. Margaret Sikes of Bangs, and Mrs. Kathryn Petree of Abilene; and nine grandchildren. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. J. R. Windle of Pilot Point; and two brothers, J. A. Wylie of Marlowe, Okla., and M. R. Wylie of Dallas.

Pallbearers were Doug Moore, Bill Pritchard, Oscar Boenicke, A. D. Pettit, Vernon Parker and Ben Vinson.

## High School Enrollment Up; Ward Down

## Football Field Dedicated On Friday Night

During the half-time activities of the Santa Anna-Clyde football game Friday night, the new Mountaineer Stadium was dedicated.

Cullen Perry, Superintendent of the Santa Anna Schools, gave the history of the new field, and told of the reasons why the new field was needed. It has been in the process for about 6 years, and only this year did the board of trustees feel it was time to go ahead with the construction.

The field was made ready for use Friday afternoon, with the installation of the goal posts.

There is a number of other improvements planned for the field and these will be added as needed.

There was almost a capacity crowd attended the game Friday night. On the Santa Anna side of the field is 750 seats and 250 seats are on the visitors' side. Mr. Perry said if crowds continue as they were the first night, it would not be long before more seats would be needed.

The stadium is built in such a manner that new seating capacity can be added rapidly.

The Santa Anna Band participated in the dedication ceremonies. The dedication prayer was offered by Rev. Frank L. Turner, Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church.

## Santa Anna Band Program Attracts 94 Students

The Santa Anna Band program at the SAHS has reached a higher membership than it has had in several years. There are 94 students taking part in the instrumental music program. This is approximately one-fourth of the entire student body. Of this number there are only two seniors and four juniors in the program. The Senior High Band has 45 members and the Junior Band 26 members. There are 23 in the Beginners Band.

The school furnishes instruments whenever possible. However, with the increased attendance it has been impossible to furnish some students an instrument. Parents are asked to see Mr. Mallow, band director, and try to work out a plan for instruments, so no student will have to be turned town.

The Senior Band gave its first public performance Friday night at the Santa Anna-Clyde football game, by helping dedicate the new Mountaineer Stadium. The band will again appear at the Santa Anna-Bangs football game Friday night at Bangs. They will do a series of maneuvers and feature the twirlers.

## H. R. Hallock To Head Texas Atomic Energy Research

Houghton R. Hallock, who recently retired from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers after 20 years service, has been elected executive vice president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. It was announced by Cal Young, WTU President and a Director of the Foundation.

The Foundation, organized last April by eleven Texas electric power companies, has contracted with General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation for a joint \$10 million, four-year research program.

The objective of this long-range research program is to develop an understanding of the basic processes which make the generation of electric power by nuclear fusion.

Colonel Hallock, who served from 1951 to 1954 as Fort Worth District Engineer, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, returned in June from army duty on Okinawa.

## Wardens Find Few Violations

Austin — Opening of the 1957 hunting season went by with a minimum number of violations, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission.

"Wardens reported wonderful cooperation from all over the north zone, with the opening of the season last Sunday afternoon," the director said.

He warned, however, wardens will begin to get strict on enforcement of the license regulations. Licenses now are available from all wardens, county clerks, and most sporting goods dealers.

A new map, loaded with historical and geographic information about Texas, has just been published by the General Land Office, Austin, Texas.

Copies are available without charge. Schools are expected to find it particularly useful.

Markings include the lakes, mountains, rivers, dams, reservoirs, off-shore tidelands, state-owned lands, old cattle trails and stagecoach routes.

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**  
By Congressman **O. C. FISHER**

**THIS YEAR'S ECONOMY TIDE**, which flowed high at the beginning but ebbed somewhat as the session progressed, finally achieved a net cut of nearly

10% below the President's budget estimates at the beginning of the session. A total of \$6 billion was whacked from requests. Some of this is paper saving. Some of it will be rubbed out by later supplemental appropriations. But all-in-all, the economy record of the session is worthy of some praise. At the same time, some unnecessary commitments for future spending were voted, and some old expensive and non-essential programs were continued.

For example, I led a drive to cut out the annual \$50 million grants to the local communities to help them with their sewer systems. Spread over the remaining 9 years of the program, if stopped now and discontinued, the amendment would have halted a non-essential outlay which will total \$450 million. But the economy effort was a case where local pressure prevailed. Initially successful by a substantial vote, my amendment was voted down in final action two days later after an avalanche of telegrams flooded Capitol Hill from City Managers, Mayors, etc., whose appetites longed for more Federal checks.

But that is the way the ball bounces. The mammoth foreign aid request was cut by \$1 billion — a half billion below the Senate's figure and the full billion under the Administration request.

Even though this trimming looks good, fiscal headaches continue. Bob Anderson, Secretary of Treasury, has made it known to House leaders, that the present debt limit is being pressed severely.

Of major importance was the action by the House in killing the multi-billion dollar school

From the Newark Courier-Gazette, Newark, N. Y.: About 150 years ago, John James Audubon, the painter of the monumental "Birds of America," estimated that he saw 2 billion passenger pigeons at one time. They darkened the sky and whitened the earth as they passed.

Less than one century ago, buffalo roamed the Western plains in vast herds. Now only a comparative handful are left.

The great whooping crane was once known in great numbers. Now only about 30 have been counted in the Florida sanctuary to which they migrate, and there is grave fear that this species may soon go the way of the passenger pigeon.

It is a rare American who has no stake and no interest in the out-of-doors and its creatures. In a recent year something like 14 million fishing licenses were sold. Many millions go hunting. Untold numbers go to the streams, the mountains, the seashores and the forests for recreation and restoration of the spirit. Is it not the part of the most elementary wisdom — selfish wisdom — for everyone to help conserve these resources to the limit of his ability?

From the South Pasadena Review, South Pasadena, Calif.: There is much Congressional talk

of the Anti-Trust Act applying in organized baseball. How about the draft in football?

In baseball they at least have to talk terms with the player they want and he has to sign an agreement or contract; if he is a minor his parents also have to sign. Thus a bonus player in baseball joins a club or farm system of his own free will.

Now take a glance at football: They have a draft; and all the owners of the National Football League meet, possibly in some New York hotel. They have a list of all the graduating seniors of all the football teams. Last fall Bobby Cox was drafted while having one more year to play at Minnesota. The owners have possibly never seen the players they are drafting; they have asked them no questions as to whether or not they want to play with their team; they have never discussed salary or a so called bonus. Nevertheless if Joe Zilch, owner of a National League club, picks Joe College from any campus in the nation Joe College will play for Zilches team and at the salary Zilch states or Joe College will be blackballed and not allowed to play for any National League team for all time unless drafted Joe College fulfills his "obligation" to Joe Zilch and his team.

Construction aid bill.

**OVERSHADOWING THE PICTURE** was the passage of a so-called Civil Rights bill — the first of its type in 82 years. A hodge-podge which makes a farce of traditional right to trial by jury, the measure is recognized by all concerned as a political effort to corral certain minority votes — with both sides now claiming credit for the bill. And it's anybody's guess as to who will get the most credit — or blame. Senator Johnson deserves much credit for improving the bill in the Senate.

A GOOD BREAK for hundreds of drought victims and feed dealers in our district and elsewhere was scored at the last minute of the session when the so-called Feed Dealers bill got final House approval. It will prevent the Government from reaping a windfall that could approximate a million dollars in our area alone.

This bill, authored by Congressman Poage and myself in the House and Senator Lyndon Johnson in the Senate, passed the House unanimously last May but has been locked in the Senate by a Northern Senator. Johnson managed to get it passed the last day, and a minor Senate amendment was then

promptly approved by the House.

This feed program, which allowed a credit of \$1 per hundredweight on certain feed purchased, of which the Government owned a surplus, began in 1954 and the trouble which made the bill necessary resulted from misinformation and lack of information to the feed dealers in regard to time of sale and delivery of the feed in relation to the date of the Purchase Orders issued to drought victims by county committees.

Our bill simply validates all such deliveries, if they were made within six months.

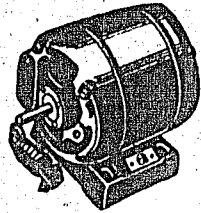

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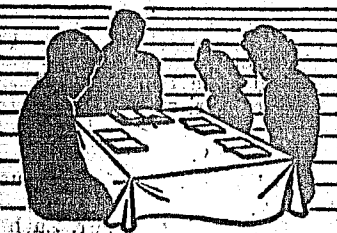

When Hugh Price Hughes was head of a London Mission, he received from an unbeliever a challenge to debate the truth of the Christian faith.

In accepting the challenge, Mr. Hughes made this statement, "I will bring with me to the debate one hundred men and women who have been saved from lives of sin by the gospel of Christ. They will give their evidence, and you will be allowed to cross-examine them. They will be men and women reclaimed for Christ from the vices of drink and intemperance. 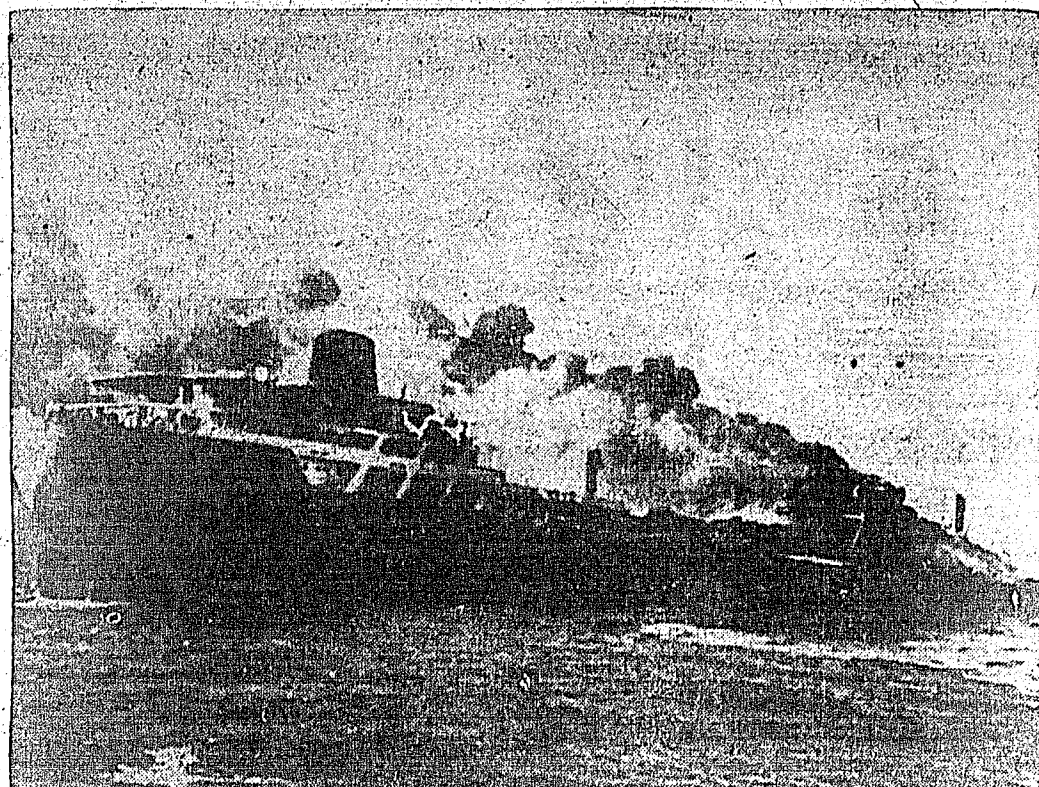

TEXAS MESQUITE — CURSE OR CURE?

One of the most astounding developments to come of agricultural research in recent years has been the discovery that common Texas mesquite wood can be made useful as an edible roughage for cattle.

During the past two decades, Texas farmers and ranchers have been fighting a common enemy in the die-hard mesquite which has spread in abundant growth from the Rio Grande Valley northward.

In an effort to reclaim the countless acres of grassland all but lost to dense undergrowth of mesquite brush, a number of eradication measures have been applied, varying from oil treatment to mechanical uprooting.

Then, just a few years ago, someone got the idea of grinding some tender mesquite into meal and analyzing the product, chemically to determine its food value. The analysis showed that mesquite meal had a higher protein, fiber and calcium content than cottonseed hulls. Another essential nutrient not present in many dry roughages, Vitamin A, was also found in the mesquite meal. Fat and carbohydrate content was slightly lower than in usual roughages.

In subsequent feeding tests at the Spur, Texas, Agricultural Experiment Station, the mesquite meal was mixed with other concentrates plus the important addition of molasses which served to give the feed moisture, sweetness, and a more desirable odor. In every instance, cattle fed on mesquite meal not only suffered no ill effects but gained weight in similar ratio to cattle fed on other roughage.

This does not mean that all other meals and roughages should be thrown out in favor of mesquite, but it does mean that mesquite may prove to be a dependable source of rough feed during time of drought when feeds are scarce and high in price.

In the trial feeding periods, it was found that branches and stems with slick bark provide better feed than larger, dryer tree parts. Also, freshly-ground wood proved more palatable than dry wood and fresh supplies were ground weekly.

In order to prepare mesquite meal as a cattle roughage, a wood chipping machine costing about \$1,200 delivered in Texas, a heavy-duty hammer mill, and a molasses mixer are needed.

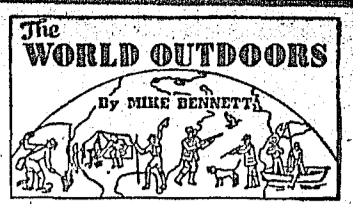

**GIGGING** frogs is a popular and well-known sport over most of the country, but did you ever see a fellow go frog fishing?

It can be done although I wouldn't believe it myself until I saw it. The equipment used was a standard casting reel, a large crippled minnow lure with treble hooks and a good degree of casting skill.

We were casting for bass in a good-sized private pond, letting our boat drift idly along the shoreline. Giggling wasn't permitted on this particular lake, so frogs were more than plentiful. At dusk they began to appear in numbers along the weedy shore and under the willow trees.

My companion, an accomplished biologist, commented upon the fact that big frogs were far from finicky eaters and would often attack large artificial lures. I asked to be shown and was promptly accommodated. My companion neatly tossed his lure near the bank where a big frog perched under a willow tree. He twitched the lure slightly and began to slowly reel it in. With one big jump, the frog pounced on the lure and was promptly wrapped in treble hooks and reeled boatward. To prove it was no mistake, the feat was repeated two more times.

What makes the frog strike? Probably, as is often the case where bass are concerned, it's the action of the plug or bait, and perhaps, the sudden action of the lure, which prompts him to impulsive action. It is the habit of the big frog to sit motionless along the shore watching for any movement which might indicate that a good meal is somewhere in the vicinity. Although he's sitting quite still, actually he is alerted and poised for the jump that will put him top of his prey.

button window cleaners. Simply wipe with a lintless cloth for a really clean surface which will stay clean longer because of the special protective film.

Porcelain enameled ranges which have brown spots on them that don't yield to ordinary cleaning measures may respond to a paste of baking soda and a chlorine bleach. Let stand for a while to bleach the stain, then rinse off thoroughly.

Cellulose mops which hold a lot of water and weigh little are excellent for mopping spillovers in bathroom or kitchen. They wash out easily and never sour.

Swish your pots and pans after each use with soap-impregnated steel wool pads to keep them shiny. Then you can avoid prolonged scouring.

Keep your silverware away from rubber, eggs, matches, salt and fruit juices if you want to avoid tarnishing it.

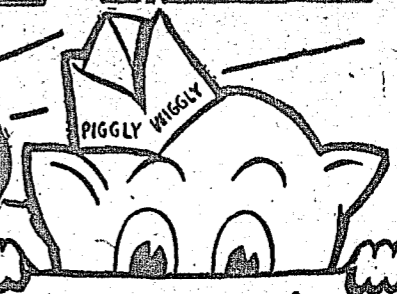
